IMPORTANT NEWS FROM THE BAFEPOW COMMITTEE!

Sadly we have had to make the decision to cancel the Annual Christmas Lunch because of the possibility that we may still be in some form of lockdown at that time due to a second wave of Covid-19. We have taken this decision after much consideration for the wellbeing of all of our members and also bearing in mind the anxieties that many of us might feel about using public transport to get to the Holiday Inn. We will get together again as soon as it is safe for us to do so and we are still hoping to hold the AGM at the Holiday Inn in July and to commemorate VJ75+1 with a lunch, also at the Holiday Inn, in August. So, we have much to look forward to in 2021 and I will keep you informed plus I do still enjoy hearing from you by phone or email at any time too. As we won't be together in December on Tuesday the 8th, Tony Truett has come up with what I think is a brilliant idea! We always start our December lunch meeting by remembering our dear FEPOW and recognising the fact that for three Christmases (four for those who were in Hong Kong in 1941) they were in far off lands away from their loved ones and they were possibly wondering if they would ever make it home - and we think we're hard done by just missing our 2020 lunch! Tony has suggested that on the day that we would have all been together in Birmingham that, at either 12.00 or maybe 13.00 (we will confirm the time later), at the time that we would have been starting our lunch, we all toast our FEPOW in our own home while having our own lunch. It can be any drink that you fancy, but let's be united in remembering those who gave so much so that we are able to commemorate them in our own way 'together', usually in Birmingham, in what I consider to be very special company - the members of BAFEPOW!

We recently had some very good news for BAFEPOW. I was contacted by a solicitor acting on behalf of the estate of Mrs Margaret Walters who has sadly passed away. She has left a bequest in her will to BAFEPOW for the very generous amount of £5000. Having received the bequest, I wrote to the solicitor to see if there were any stipulations regarding the use of the bequest and I have now had a letter to say that there are none. I also enquired about Margaret's link to BAFEPOW and Margaret's husband Frank was a member of FEPOW, number 210, so presumably that could be the Federation or Association of FEPOW? Frank was a member of the Royal Corps of Signals and he arrived in Singapore on the 13th January 1942 where he was soon after taken prisoner. Frank passed away in 1995 and Margaret continued to receive notices and minutes from the FEPOW group. The executors of Margaret's will were very good friends with her and if the bequest is used to restore or establish a memorial the solicitor would pass news of this on to them. They are happy for Margaret and Frank's history to be acknowledged in connection to any memorial that we do set up. I will contact the solicitor and thank her for sending me this information and also to say that it may be some time until we are able to make any plans for the use of the bequest but that we will, hopefully, let her know what use it is put to.

Do any of you know anything about Margaret or her husband, Frank. The FEPOW group that he was a member of must have meant a great deal to them both for them to have made this bequest to BAFEPOW.

The recent VJ Day 75 commemorations were the inspiration for an idea to create a very special tribute to those who served in the Far East in WW2. This was the war that didn't end on VE Day - the war that saw thousands facing a very different enemy in the jungles of Burma and elsewhere across South East Asia, and thousands more subjected to brutality and starvation in Japanese PoW camps. Many

never made it home, and the majority of those who did were left mentally and physically scarred by the experience. They deserve our thanks and our respect – and they deserve this very special tribute, which we would like to complete in readiness for Remembrance Day 2020. But we need some help please to make it happen!

Our aim is to collect a thousand photos of those who were involved in the war in the Far East – one thousand photos to symbolise the many thousands overall who sacrificed so much in the service of their country. We are asking those who have a relative who served in the Far East in WW2 to please allow us to include a photo of them in our 'Gallery of Heroes'. So far we have collected just over 500 photos of these brave men (and a few women too!).

Please help us to achieve our target of 1000 photos by November by making more people aware of this idea so that more relatives of those involved in the war in the Far East are able to participate in this tribute by submitting their photos. THE DOUBLE 10TH AND BISHOP LEONARD WILSON

The Birmingham Association of FEPOW was so fortunate to have such an excellent, founding group of ex prisoners of the Japanese. They had been held in various camps across the Far East. We, as their descendants and friends continue to keep the association going in their memory and to commemorate all FEPOW, whether they sadly died as a result of their captivity or for those who survived their awful ordeal and who returned bearing the mental and physical scars throughout the remainder of their lives. One of the founding members of the Birmingham group was Bishop Leonard Wilson who had been appointed to our diocese in 1953 and who understood the challenges facing the FEPOW as they readjusted to civilian life. He was an amazing human being and gave many prisoners in Singapore the strength to carry on when they were in the most dire circumstances and were desperately clinging on to their physical well being as much as their mental ability to survive. Bishop Leonard suffered horrendous torture in the hands of the infamous Japanese Kempeitai and knew first hand what cruelty their captors were capable of inflicting upon the unfortunate prisoners. There is a beautiful tiled commemoration laid into the floor a short distance from the altar of St Phillip's Cathedral in our city centre. While looking up more info on the Double Tenth, I came across the information that I have included below and while I am sending out the news sheet by email, this makes it possible for you to click on the links that are in blue which will take you onto more detail from Wikipedia. This is just an experiment and I do hope that you like it. If you click on the blue titles it should take you to a link on Wikipedia to find more information - hope it works for you!

Service in Singapore

After serving as Dean of Hong Kong, Wilson became Bishop of Singapore in 1941. At the time of the fall of Singapore in February 1942, Wilson, assisted by the Reverend Reginald Keith Sorby Adams of Saint Andrew's School, Singapore, and John Hayter, ministered unstintingly to the people of Singapore. Subsequently they were able to continue their ministry for a year, thanks mainly to the help of a Christian Japanese officer Andrew Ogawa. However the growing popularity of the cathedral and the use of English was regarded by the Japanese authorities as a threat and in 1943 they were interned in Changi prison.


The discovery of some notes by Wilson about T. E. Lawrence (Lawrence of Arabia) raised suspicions of plans to stir up the local population to revolt. In the prison they worked hard to maintain morale. Wilson was then one of 57 civilians who were



tortured by the Japanese authorities in the "Double Tenth Incident", so-called because it started with a raid on the Changi internment facility on 10 October 1943; the Japanese were seeking evidence that the internees had assisted in Operation Jaywick, in which Australian and British commandos operating from Australia sank several Japanese warships in Singapore's Keppel Harbour on 26 September 1943.

Wilson was one of those who gave evidence of the nature of the torture to the investigation commission set up by the authorities of the Sime Road Internment Camp following the Japanese surrender in August 1945. By the end of the war he had made several conversions to Christianity, including some of the Japanese captors.

Later career

From 1949 to 1953, Wilson was Dean of Manchester and, from 1953 to 1969, Bishop of Birmingham. During this time he also lead the Festival of Remembrance service at the Albert Hall In London.

Repatriated: Bangkok to Rangoon, sailed on SS Orbita to Liverpool
