Normal Services being resumed



COFEPOW is delighted to announce that, at the close of 2022, normal memorial parades and special remembrance services are gradually returning to normal, after the crushing impact of the Covid-19 pandemic.

From the beginning of 2020, all memorial activities organised by the COFEPOW charity have been severely hampered, even though many officers and members ploughed on through the various restrictions imposed, to help overcome this vicious infection and continue the fundamental duty and responsibility of the charity.

Whilst the consequences of the pandemic are still being felt, and illness and loss remain, the trustees of COFEPOW



believe there is evidence to show that into the new year and beyond, we can continue to pay our respects to those who endured greater hardship and deprivation than we, their descendants, can ever imagine.



100th issue

The January 2023 issue of COFEPOW Quarterly is the 100th edition of the official COFEPOW charity newsletter. The magazine format publication has increased over the 25-year history of the association, from the early days as a black and white 12-page mailing, to very often, a 24-page full colour publication, printed and delivered both conventionally and digitally.

The objective of the newsletter is to keep all members, old and new, informed of the activities of the charity, the work of the trustees and officers in maintaining the memory of FEPOWs and civilian internees and their horrific incarceration during the Second World War, and to help inform and educate the general public and maintain memorials dedicated to our brave forbears who served and suffered in the Far-East theatre of conflict.

Apart from printing costs, the origination and assembly of the newsletter is produced entirely without charge by COFEPOW members.





Chour's Notes

Keats called Autumn 'the season of mellow fruitfulness'. For COFEPOW, it is the season of remembrance.

The main event is, of course, the national one at the Cenotaph in London, which I have reported on elsewhere in this issue, but we should not forget or set aside the very many smaller ones up and down the country, where locally, we can remember both the FEPOWs who returned and those that did not.

As not everyone can attend the London service and parade, being present at these regional events is encouraged, so that our FEPOWs are remembered and their message and spirit passed on to new generations.

This is especially true of the commemoration at Southampton, which I joined on Friday 18th November, and which is focused on the returning FEPOWs who arrived at the dockside there and in particular, Bob Hucklesby, whose determination resulted in the Memorial being established there, after having seen a similar one in Liverpool.

This event is particularly special, with contributions made by local children, who attend the event each year and make wreaths for the occasion and have prepared and made speeches and read out poems in the past.

Thinking of Liverpool, I must report that the Memorial there needs some TLC. I visited in September and saw that the names are beginning to come off and generally, the memorial is no longer in good shape. We are looking at establishing a dedicated fund-raising programme to commision and purchase a replacement memorial, that will be able to withstand the harsh coastal weathering at the seafront on the Mersey, more effectively.

Book talks & sales





One or two of the photographs taken over the weekend are shown in this column and in the left-hand column overleaf. In the first picture, Chris Wills chats with members as she introduces Christine Ogborne, who gave a very interesting outline of her book 'October Tides.' During the weekend, Christine sold 6 copies of the book. The author continues:

"October Tides' is a biography of my Uncle Tom, illustrating his early life in South Wales, where he was born in 1920 as one of twins, in a family with ten siblings. Life in the Welsh Depression of the 1920's was not easy and there were very sad as well as happy times for him.

"As a teenager, he lived in Exeter, Devon, working as a hotel porter, no doubt adding to a yearning for adventure and seeing the world, as he handled suitcases for people who were widely travelled. He joined the Royal Navy, signing up for 12 years, and began his training as a stoker in Plymouth.

"By 1938, Tom was based in Hong Kong, just as fears of war in Europe were beginning to be realised. As hostilities progressed of course, the Far-East became involved and Hong Kong fell to the Japanese. Tom became a POW and had to endure life at the cruel hands of his captors.

"Just as his early life had sad and happy times, Christine has tried to show how Tom's spirit amongst his fellow prisoners shone through despite the hardships." 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Homage to the Wartime Generation...

Caroline Repton gave a talk about 'Lotus-Eating Days', the memoir she wrote about her parents, published by the Book Guild in February. Her father, Christopher Repton, was the eldest child in a middle-class English family: her mother, Theresa Pang, the 13th child of Chinese immigrants in Singapore. Both survived the war - he as a POW on the Thai/Burma railway, and Theresa working in Japanese-occupied Singapore. 'Lotus-Eating Days' is the story of how they grew up on opposite sides of the world, and against all odds, met and married in Singapore after the war.

Caroline comments:

"The book describes my father's experiences as a British soldier in the Queen's Royal Regiment in India, Malaya and Thailand and Theresa's in Singapore. After the war, my father sailed home on the 'Corfu', one of the first troop ships to arrive in Southampton in October 1945. He and his fellow FEPOWs met up in the months after the war, as only they could understand the ordeal they had endured.

"There are many letters from his former POW friends. and lifelong friendships are formed. Dramatic events in Java ensue, amid the Indonesian revolution and Malaya's 'Emergency'. Then there are happier episodes in peacetime among friends and family, culminating in my parents' wedding in Singapore and four-month honeymoon in Malaysia, the UK and Europe in 1959."

The book is a kaleidoscope of voices from a bygone era, telling the story through letters, diaries and recordings, plus the piles of unseen letters and photographs found in Christopher's wardrobe, after his death in 1998.

"In 2000, my mother, who was by then blind, recorded her life story on about a dozen cassette tapes. So, I was able to combine their stories and in February 2022, publication coincided with marking the 80th anniversary of the Fall of Singapore.

Whitehall Remembrance Day Service and Parade 2022

David Brede reports on his first year as organiser of the COFEPOW Remembrance Day Service and Parade at the Cenotaph...

"This year was my fourth March-past, but my first as the co-ordinator. Pam Gillespie was amazing at fulfilling the role, so I had a big pair of boots to fill.



"It was good to take advantage of the arrangements that Pam had made and used before with the Ship and Shovell pub, for the after-march refreshments. Again, they came up trumps with their 'ploughman's plates' with thick doorsteps of ham or cheese, with salad and pickles.

"The lead up to the event involved the negotiation with the Royal British Legion about our attendees. Disappointingly, some of our attendees could not make it on the day and unfortunately, we were unable to backfill the spaces with others who were eager to attend.

"The night before the event, there was a get-to-together with ten of the marchers, at the Strand Palace Hotel, for a lively catch-up and some dinner.



"The big day started a bit misty and damp, and after a decent breakfast, we made our way to the assembly point in Whitehall via the necessary security.

"The muster-point was near the memorial to the women of World War Two, which was also where Sophie Raworth and the BBC team were located. She mingled among us, but mainly to speak with the crowd next to where we were standing.



"Like Pam before me, I had some sweets to sustain the contingent during the wait and others had thought the same. It is a great relief when the bands start to strike up and we know that the formalities of the ceremony are due to start. The muster-point is in line of some large TV screens so we could see the events at the Cenotaph itself.



"On completion of the service and wreath-laying by the dignitaries, the March-past commenced. We were in the fourth line, so one of the last to leave Whitehall. But, in due course, we set off with a quick march at 100 paces, past the Cenotaph. The wreath was handed over and we proceeded apace to Parliament Square, into Great George Street and right back to Horse Guards parade ground for the salute from HRH and then dispersal.

Guidance on new online membership system

The trustees are delighted with the progress being made in introducing a major technological improvement to the system used to record, retain and inform new and existing members.

'Memberstack', as the new system is known, is a significant move forward for the charity, although inevitably, with all things new, it's taking time to integrate into existing manual methods. The change in how COFEPOW logs and manages its membership data has also coincided with the transition from former, to new Membership Secretaries.

As work on the system progresses, there will be a delay in the announcement of new members, their contact details (if consented) and the brief description of their FEPOW relative's war-time experiences, in order that existing members can make contact if they wish.

Membership Self-Service Dashboard

This is a secure area where you can manage your membership. The Portal is available 24/7 and can be used to:

- Quickly and easily renew your membership
- Update the postal address, email address or phone number linked to your membership

COFEPOW takes active part in Festival of Remembrance

Following an invitation from the Royal British Legion to attend the Annual Festival of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall in November, COFEPOW trustees. Nick Bullen-Bell, Merchandise Officer, and Karen Brown. Membership Officer, were delighted to represent the charity and participate in the event.

Nick relates the story of the thrilling, yet daunting honour of taking part...

"After arriving home from work one day, my wife, Sylvie, said:

"How would you like to go to the Royal Albert Hall for the Festival of Remembrance?'

"As COFEPOW had been offered the opportunity of attending this magnificent and important occasion, the question was asked of the COFEPOW trustees: "Who would like to attend?"

"Instantly, I said yes, having never been offered this opportunity before and thinking it was just an invitation to be part of the audience. I didn't think much more of it until the emails and paperwork started to arrive, with confirmation that we, and I, had been accepted.

"After trying to accept our invitation and book tickets through emails (that was probably the hardest part), little did we realise that Sylvie was going to be in the audience for one show and I was going to be part of the Civilian Muster, and still didn't appreciate what that entailed.

"Instructions and tickets arrived, the weekend got nearer, train times were checked, re-checked and checked again due to rail strikes, and I set off on Friday 11th November for a 4.00p.m. appointment at the Royal Albert Hall to collect my security pass, get all the instructions, meet the other civilians involved and sit through a rehearsal. Only then did it actually sink in what I was to be part of!

"I sat with the others in the Royal Albert Hall, watching and listening to stories of those who had served and been lost, those who had served and witnessed untold horrors, and those still serving. And that was just a rehearsal!

"An early start on Saturday, as





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Sylvie and I arrived at the Royal Albert Hall at 7.10a.m, 10 minutes late! I was allowed in, having been already checked by security, but Sylvie wasn't and had to walk around South Kensington for ten hours, before she was allowed in for the evening performance. Not a good start for us.

"Our Royal Albert Hall guide also did a vanishing act, and we were all left to our own devices. Eventually, we were reallocated some guides and lots of apologies, a breakfast and then rehearsal after rehearsal after rehearsal, by then, fully aware that anything short of perfection was not going to b

David Brown (COFEPOW Treasurer) and Karen's husband, was also part of the performances, representing the Royal British Legion and COFEPOW as Standard Bearer, along with all the other Standard Bearers performing with perfection and discipline.

"Lunch and lots of waiting around followed, until the first actual performance took place in front of a full house. Our instructor - an RAF Regiment Sergeant/Drill Instructor - really meant business and we were part of a surreal, highly-charged and very emotional experience.

"The next (and last) performance at 7.00p.m. was in front of our

new King (and Sylvie!), and had to be even better. With heart pounding, terrified of making a mistake or slipping down the steps, we did it. What an honour! The biggest honour ever for me, to be there to represent my Dad, who served with the 2nd Battalion,





Cambridgeshire Regiment and spent three and a half years as a POW. We were there to represent COFEPOW on behalf of ALL other FEPOWS and their families and to do it in front of a full-house audience and His Majesty the King.

"Words cannot express my pride, nor explain how it felt to be part of such a huge public occasion. There are no words that do justice to the pride I felt in my Dad. Finally, thank you to COFEPOW from the bottom of my heart for being chosen to represent the charity (I still have to keep pinching myself to check it was actually real) and to the Royal British Legion for inviting and allowing Karen and I to be the representives on behalf of COFEPOW.

"It was an experience I will never forget."

Remembrance Day Service and Parade

Whitehall, 2023

COFEPOW will be asking the Royal British Legion for tickets for the Whitehall Service and Parade in November, now that the prevailing situation regarding the pandemic has allowed for a resumption of normal activities.

Until Chair, David Brede, receives full details, we are not sure whether the RBL will maintain their stipulation introduced during Covid, that tickets will only be given to veterans, their widows and first generation descendants.

In the event that that continues to be the case and you would like to be considered for a ticket, please register an interest by contacting David Brede, COFEPOW Chair, by post at 3, Blossom Way, Little Billing, Northamptonshire NN3 9ET or by email at cofepow.chairman@gmail.com or by phone on 07930 960241.

Please include your connection/ relationship to the FEPOW you wish to represent in your message, and tickets received will be distributed subject to the revised arrangements, on a first come, first served basis to those eligible.

The procession along Whitehall is scheduled for Sunday November 12th.
As the event gradually returns to its regular form, please be aware that:

- Those who wish to attend are advised that they must be on Whitehall by 9.00am: extra time is needed to go through security so it is an early start on what could be a cold and wet morning.
- There is a great deal of standing about, from assembly, through the 11.00 Silence and Service and until the final march-off. The parade is usually dismissed at about 12.45.
- Once COFEPOW is able to confirm the number of tickets and allocate them, personal details have to be submitted to the RBL for security checks. Tickets are strictly non-transferable as they are issued to people by name and proof of ID will be required.

Southampton commemorates...



Walter Tuttlebee, son of former FEPOW, Gunner/Driver William Henry Tuttlebee of 281 Battery, 85th Anti-Tank Regt, RA., reports on the annual service to mark the homecoming via Southampton, of so many of the POWs released from captivity after the war in the Far-East...

"Mandy, who runs the nearby brewery/restaurant 'The Dancing Man' kindly opened up early again for us, as in past years, to welcome and host us with free refreshments shortly after 10.00am, as children, relatives and friends of Far-East POWs gathered. Our Standard Bearers. Nick Roberts and Paul Nicholls, had risen very early, setting off at 6.00am to drive down from Wolverhampton to serve us, for which we were very grateful. Nick and Paul are long-time friends of Bob Hucklesby, the original instigator of the Memorial. It was a joy and privilege for them to be with us again, along with a few of Bob's relatives

"Southampton's Lord Mayor, Councillor Jacqui Rayment - the 800th Mayor of Southampton and the city's first Lord Mayor - also joined us, laying a wreath on behalf of the city. "As 11.00am approached, we were led across to Town Quay Park by our Standard Bearers, with the warm sun shining brightly. It was great weather and a good turnout of around 40 people, similar to pre-Covid years. Pauline Simpson, the national FEPOW Chaplain, and other friends from Norfolk, had planned to join us, but last minute challenges unfortunately prevented this and apologies were conveyed. Likewise, Meg Parkes of the Researching FEPOW History Group (RFHG) - the other driving force behind the memorial alongside Bob - had also sent her apologies.



"For a few of those present, it was their first time at the Southampton Memorial, but I'm sure not the last. Many children of Far-East POWs had fathers amongst the 20,000 or so who returned *Continued overleaf...*

from their imprisonment and hard labour via the city, and each year, more of them are rediscovering the stories of their fathers' experiences and journeys home, with new people making contact and visiting each year. A photograph of the memorial plaque, which lists the ships that brought POWs home to Southampton in autumn 1945, is shown below.



"After a brief welcome from myself, Dave Adcock led the Service, explaining how he had first met Bob Hucklesby and heard his story on a veterans' trip to Normandy, which he was covering for BBC Radio Solent. Dave's brief address, explaining the significance of remembrance on this day, was followed by the exhortation, the Kohima Epitaph, FEPOW prayer, the Last Post, the Silence and Reveille. These were followed by the laying of wreaths and planting of crosses, including several beautiful hand-crafted wreaths made and laid by the children from nearby St John's school (see top).

"Some folk stayed on at Town Quay Park a while afterwards to reflect in silence, whilst many others returned to 'The Dancing Man' where people shared a few of their fathers' stories and had the opportunity to view articles from a 1945 Southern Daily Echo, including the repatriation ships and the FEPOW camp on Southampton Common.

"Jill Robertson - author of the recently published book, 'Captured in Singapore: A Diary of a Far-East Prisoner of War', had also joined us for the day and made copies of her book available.

"One of those present, Elizabeth Hallett from Chichester, suggested that some of us may wish to share email addresses, to stay in touch. If you would like to share in this, please email me at: walter@tuttlebee.com stating that you'd like to do so and live it forward your details

The men of the Lanarkshire Yeomanry were once again remembered on Remembrance Sunday at the two Memorials situated at Carluke and Wishaw. Agnes Dougan reports on the day...

"Following the Community Service in the Market Place in Carluke, friends and relatives of the Lanarkshire Yeomanry gathered at the Lanarkshire Yeomanry Memorial, where a prayer was given by Campbell Thomson, after which wreaths and tributes were laid.

"Gavin Whitehead, the Vice-Lord Lieutenant, laid a wreath on behalf of the Lieutenancy of Lanarkshire and Clr. Eileen Logan laid a wreath on behalf of South Lanarkshire Council.

Bethany Black laid a wreath in memory of the men of the Lanarkshire Yeomanry. Wreaths were also laid in memory of Sgt. William G. Anderson of the 155th (Lanarkshire Yeomanry) Field Regiment R.A., who died whilst a POW at the Kinkaseki copper mine in Taiwan, and in memory of Neil Moore, who was killed in World War I, while serving with the Royal Navy, and his son Neil Moore Jnr., who was taken POW by the Japanese while serving with the Royal Army

Ordnance Corps in the Far-East.

"A tribute was also laid by the Cameronian Association, in memory of their comrades in the other Lanarkshire Regiment. The Service ended with a recital of the Kohima Epitaph.

"Later in the afternoon, we participated in the Community Service in Belhaven Park, Wishaw. Agnes Thomson gave the reading, and a prayer was said by Rev. Terry Moran of South Wishaw Parish Church. Some of those who were present at the Service in Belhaven Park gathered at the Lanarkshire Yeomanry Memorial.

"Wreaths were then laid at the Lanarkshire Yeomanry Memorial on behalf of the families of Gunner James Fegan of the 155th Lanarkshire Yeomanry Field Regt. R.A., who was held as a POW in the Far-East, and Harold Coleman, of the 156th Lanarkshire Yeomanry Field Regt. R.A., who had fought with the regiment in Sicily, Italy and Western Europe.

"The Service ended with the recital of the Kohima Epitaph, followed by a Blessing by the Reverend Moran".

Museum of Singapore: data building in action

Following a recent article in COFEPOW Quarterly about the National Singapore Museum asking for details of any POWs detained in Changi, Keith Nicholls of Somerset, contacted Rachel Eng at the museum about his father, William Coates Nicholls, who served in the Royal Navy. William was stationed in Singapore at the time of capture and spent three and a half years as a POW, the last nine months in Changi Gaol. Having forwarded a detailed account of his father's experiences, he was delighted to receive the following response from Rachel, which he has forwarded for all to read

"Dear Keith,

"Thanks very much for sending over this detailed story about your Dad and your family's history – it was great to learn more about his experiences.

"Unfortunately, the database at the museum has a bit of a word limit and I've attempted to condense your Dad's story below. I've taken the liberty of calling him 'William' in the narrative, but please let me know if you'd like to refer to him in a different manner. The original email that you sent us will be kept for reference so we'll still have all the information with us. Please let me know if you'd like to make any changes or additions. Thank you! Rachel." The entry reads...

"William Coates Nicholls was a member of the First World War 'baby bulge'. He was born on 29th April, 1919. He had a sister, Mary, who was born on 1st January, 1912, so she was thrilled to have a baby brother to look after. With his mother, they all lived in a terraced house at 21 Church Street, Bridgwater, Somerset. His father suffered from the effects of wartime gas raids, but managed to go back to his work as a hairdresser in a small shop in Bridgwater.

"William was a good old-fashioned boy, always up to mischief and always getting into trouble. They all went to church just round the corner and he went to the church school, opposite the church. His schooling ended at the age of 14 and he was told that he would go into his father's business as an apprentice hairdresser. At that time, working hours were 8.00a.m. to 8.00p.m. and on Saturdays 8.00a.m. to 10.00p.m. In those days,

many men came to the shop for their daily cut-throat shave, so he became an expert at this as well as hairdressing.

"William joined the navy on 25th October 1939, at Butlin's Holiday Camp Skegness, on HMS Royal Arthur and was drafted to HMS Drake in Plymouth on 30th November 1939, then to HMS Sultan II in Singapore. He left Plymouth by train to Portsmouth, to Cherbourg and on to Marseilles, joining the cruise liner 'Andes' and arriving in Singapore on 1st May 1940. There, he served on HMS Dragonfly, a Yangtze river gunboat, until 27th April 1941, before returning to barracks.

"After war broke out against Japan, William was moved to Pilot House and on to a water boat, waiting for soldiers who were cut off. He then moved to R.A.F. Seletar, then to an Admiralty tug, from there to a petrol station and then back to another tug, the 'Yung Ping'.

"Eventually, William left Singapore on 13th February 1942 for Australia, but his ship was sunk in the Banka Strait two days later. After 16 hours clinging to a lifeboat, he was picked up by an RAF rescue launch but was taken POW in Banka. A week later, he was sent to Singapore, where he was imprisoned on a coaster, named 'MV Rompin', at Singapore Naval Base, until 1944. During imprisonment, he served on work parties around the base and also made two trips to Sumatra to bring timber.

"In 1944, William was moved to Changi Gaol, where he was employed as hairdresser to the warrant officers. Occasionally, he was sent to work on the aerodrome. As a POW, he earned about \$6 a month.

"After liberation, William had his first taste of normal food – eggs and bacon. He returned to Liverpool, on the hospital ship 'Monaway', where he was greeted by his sister, aunts, uncles, and the town dignitaries. He was eventually discharged from the navy after six months and returned to his father's shop to continue running a successful hairdressing business until he retired in 1984."

New National Event Co-ordinator needed

Applications are invited to fill the role from suitably committed members who wish to help the COFEPOW charity fulfil its annual event calendar.

Chris Wills, former and now temporarily re-installed National Event Co-ordinator, had announced plans to retire from the role in 2019, and was scheduled to step down after the 75th Anniversary commemoration of VJ-Day in 2020. 

The three principal objectives of COFEPOW

COFEPOW is a registered charity, first established in 1997 to preserve and promote the memory of all British and, at that time, empire service and civilian men and women, who were Prisoners of War in South-East Asia under Japanese occupation during World War II. 1941-45.

Secondly, the charity exists to provide and maintain memorials to the above, and thirdly, it aims to advance the education of the general public about the suffering endured and sacrifices made by Far-East POWs (FEPOWs) during their incarceration and as a consequence of their wartime hardship.

Submissions invited for second 'Poems of Hope'



In 2019, the trustees of COFEPOW initiated a drive to collate as many poems written by FEPOWs and their families as possible, to create an anthology of poetry. The collection featured over 80 poems, many of which were written during captivity or based on recollections or emotions experienced by close family since the war.
