### **NDIS UPDATE**

As you all know, 2019 is set to be a big year for HOPES as we transition to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS)

We have had a number of meetings and discussions with residents, families, support services and both state and federal governments around what the transition process looks like, both for individuals here at Laetare Court and for HOPES as a service.

The good news is that as of last week, all of our HOPES residents have been accepted as eligible for NDIS funding, at the individual level. This is good news for everyone, regardless of whether you receive individual

with regards to HOPES as a service, we have been advised that funding for the HOPES cooperative component will be transitioned from State Disability Services to the NDIS at the end of March this year. We understand this means HOPES' operational costs will be split evenly among all residents and this amount will be incorporated into each individual Laetare Court resident's plan. This will not affect the funding for personal support in your NDIS plan.

HOPES staff remain available to assist you with your individual NDIS planning and transition process, at your request.

To assist HOPES' planning for the transition process, we ask that you advise Chris or Karen in the Community House (if you have not already done so) of:

- Your NDIS number
- The manager of your NDIS plan (i.e. are you the manager, or is the manager a nominated plan manager, the NDIS or a family member)
- Your Support Coordinator (if you have one)
- Your local Area Coordinator (the person who did the initial interview from Baptcare)
- The date you have been told your new NDIS Plan will start from.

(Please note: The information required will be available at different times for each resident.)

## Autumn Recipe

### **Baked Mushrooms**

### Ingredients:

One large mushroom for each person. Ricotta cheese

Herbs—e.g. chives, parsley, thyme, rose mary. Parmesan cheese.

Cooking oil

- 1. Preheat Oven to 180 degrees
- 2. For each person a large mushroom.
- 3. Wipe each mushroom gently, to ensure it is clean.
- 4. In a bowl, mix together ricotta cheese, some finely chopped herbs (such as chives, parsley, rosemary, thyme), ground pepper and a little finely grat ed parmesan or other 'sharp' cheese.
- 5. Snap or cut out the 'stem' of the mush room.
- 6. Fill it with the mixture.
- 7. Place on an baking tray.
- 8. rush or pour on a little Extra Virgin Olive Oil (or oil of your choice).
- 9. Bake for approximately 25 35 minutes.

Enjoy with perhaps a lovely fresh salad and a few little steamed spuds.!

### Visit to Old Hobart Town, Richmond

On a warm Tuesday morning in December we ventured out to the old Hobart town on Bridge Street, Richmond.

It is a miniature historic village that shows Hobart in 1820. Built from original plans, it covers current day downtown Hobart, and there is a program which lets you make comparisons between then and now.



There are over 60 miniature buildings and over 500 mini figurines featuring convicts, guards, fancy landowners and trades people. There is lots going on, with people escaping, drinking, romancing, fighting – pretty much everything you'd expect from a colonial outpost.

It is wheelchair friendly, though not always easy to see what is going on in the village from the paths. As far as recommendations go from our group, the response was mixed. There are pensioner discounts, though we still had to lend Sue money! (which I paid back)!!
