Jeremy Waldron is University Professor and Professor of Law at New York University. Professor Waldron was educated in New Zealand and at Oxford, and his career has included appointments at Edinburgh, Berkeley, Princeton, and Columbia. Until recently he combined his position at NYU with the Chichele Chair in Social and Political Theory at All Souls College, Oxford. He is well known for his work on constitutionalism, human dignity, historic injustice, national security issues, and the rule of law, as well as historic political philosophy. His books include Law and Disagreement (Oxford, 1999), The Dignity of Legislation (Cambridge 1999), Torture, Terror and Trade-offs: Philosophy for the White House (Oxford, 2010), The Harm in Hate Speech (Harvard, 2012). A collection of his essays on political institutions (including courts), entitled *Political Political Theory* was recently published by Harvard University Press. His new book, One Another's Equals: The Basis of Human Equality, was published in Spring 2017. Professor Waldron was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1998 and, in 2015, to the American Philosophical Society (which also awarded him its Phillips Prize for Lifetime Achievement in Jurisprudence). He has been a Fellow of the British Academy since 2011. He has delivered major lectures around the world from Buenos Aires to Jerusalem, including the Storrs Lectures at Yale Law School, the Holmes Lectures at Harvard University, the Tanner Lectures at Berkeley, the Gifford Lectures at Edinburgh, and most recently the Niemeyer Lectures at Notre Dame.
