# **About Allsorts Youth Project**

Established in 1999, Allsorts Youth Project is a Sussex-based charity that listens to, supports and connects children and young people (ages 5-25) who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans or in the process of exploring their sexual orientation and/or gender identity (LGBT+), and their families.

We challenge exclusion, prejudice and discrimination in all areas of LGBT+ children and young people's lives, with a view to seeing a world in which LGBT+ people are free to be themselves.

Our approach is three-pronged. We provide:

- 1. Youth Services: youth groups, activities and one-to-one support
- 2. Family Services: parents/carers peer support group, family activities and one-to-one support
- Training Services: for the wider community so that all spaces are safer and more inclusive for LGBT+ people

### **What Allsorts Does:**

- Provide youth and family services built on the pillars of youth and community work (member of Institute of Youth Work): empowerment, educative, participative, inclusive and expressive.
- Facilitate fun groups, workshops, residentials and activities where LGBT+ young people can meet new people, make new friends and have access to opportunities.
- Listen to children, young people and their families, and provide spaces for them to talk through challenges they may be facing surrounding their (or their child's) LGBT+ identity.
- Embed feedback opportunities into all areas of our work, to ensure services are informed by and meet the needs of our service users' continued and/or changing needs, acknowledged by our *Investing In Children Membership Award* (2022).
- Signpost to other youth services where applicable (see our Help & Support Page).
- Provide LGBT+ Inclusion and Awareness training to a wide range of schools, colleges, universities, and other businesses/organisations.
- Celebrate diversity within and outside of the LGBT+ community.

## Why are LGBT+ Youth Services Important?

It is important that our services exist because LGBT+ children and young people often experience loneliness, isolation, stigma and bullying both at school and in the wider community

as a result of their LGBT+ identities. In our March 2023 survey with 62 Allsorts young people, 69% had experienced some form of LGBT-phobia within the previous 6 months.

These LGBT+ specific challenges and inequalities lead to the highly disproportionate rate at which LGBT+ children and young people told Allsorts they experience mental health challenges (92%), self-harm (48%) and suicide ideation (58%) and attempts (18%). These figures have been echoed by a range of studies and surveys.<sup>1</sup>

However, the same survey revealed that 100% of young people had been helped by one-to-one support, 98% said youth groups had been of help to them, 89% felt more confident in expressing their voice/opinions, and 79% felt more able to access peer support.

### What Allsorts Does Not Do:

- Allsorts is not a crisis, mental health or clinical service and is not part of any referral pathways into healthcare services.
- In line with Allsorts' confidentiality and safeguarding policies, we do not comment or share information on existing and/or past service users.
- We do not advise, recommend or direct children, young people or families to seek or take medical pathways or to seek out specific medical practitioners.
- Allsorts is non-judgemental and non-directive. We do not tell people how they should present or describe themselves.

## **Our Comments On The Following:**

### Safeguarding

- Allsorts Youth Project works within the jurisdiction and framework of the Pan Sussex Child Protection & Safeguarding Procedures Manual and regards the safety and wellbeing of children as paramount.
- We work closely with safeguarding bodies, such as Front Door for Families, MASH, Adult Social Care, The Police and other teams responsible for safeguarding to ensure all safeguarding issues and concerns are reported and managed in the appropriate way.
- Our Designated Safeguarding Lead attends lead training delivered by the NSPCC and our lead at trustee level has completed training in Safeguarding Children (Level 1 and 2), and holds 20+ years in services supporting vulnerable adults and children and young people, including domestic abuse refuges, carer support and youth provision.
- All staff, volunteers and trustees undergo safeguarding training on a two-yearly basis as well as undergoing an enhanced DBS check.
- Our Designated Safeguarding Lead delivers annual safeguarding training to our youth support team which covers pan-Sussex and regional safeguarding themes and concerns
- Our Safeguarding Policy is updated every three years, and is available on our website.
