I would also like to thank our funders for their continued support of the Allsorts Youth Project. Without your generosity and enthusiasm, we could not do what we do.

CEO's Welcome

This financial year (22-23) saw us bring our new strategic plan to life whilst continuing to listen to what children, young people and families needed from Allsorts and ensuring their voices were raised and heard across the voluntary, statutory and health sectors.

When Allsorts first started way back in 1999, we lived in a very different world. LGBT+ people did not have equal rights with the rest of the population. We were not able to get married, it was illegal to support or talk about LGBT+ identities in schools under Section 28 and the Equality Act was still a decade away. We've come such a long way in those 24 years but we know that LGBT+ children and young people are still facing a lot of barriers and challenges.

Last year continued to be a tremendous challenge for many LGBT+ children, young people and their families, particularly those who are part of the trans and non-binary community, who have continued to be targeted and demonised by society, the press and the government. I set out my thoughts for a better future for LGB, particularly trans and non-binary young people, in April 2022 at the Brighton TEDx event where I talked about the current climate, how we approach our work, and how you can become, or continue to be, an ally to the LGBT+ community.

This year also saw us;

- Launch our Crawley & Eastbourne delivery hubs, with 7 hubs now across Sussex.
- Work towards creating more <u>inclusive spaces</u> for marginalised identities.
- Developed & delivered a 4-week programme, called **Evolve**, for young people and families who are either on the waiting list or currently being supported by GIDS.
- Return to in-person pride's and other events.

Of course, none of this would be possible without the incredible support from our funders, partners, fundraisers, friends, colleagues, supporters and Friends of Allsorts.

We simply could not do what we do without you.

Allsorts of Need

With over 24 years worth of experience in supporting LGBT+ children & young people, we have seen and been a part of monumental changes and progress for LGBT+ people across the UK.

However, informed by the experiences of LGBT+ young people attending the project, we know all too well that they are still likely to face LGBT-phobia and the disproportionate mental health challenges this is likely to cause. In our March 2023 survey with 62 young people, we found that in the last 6 months;



had experienced mental health challenges



had experienced some form of LGBT-phobia



had done something to hurt themselves



had attempted suicide

Allsorts has made me feel like there are people like me everywhere who are funny, interesting and passionate and can support me as I support them. The youth support workers have been great support and make me feel as though there is always someone around if I need them as well as being great role models. 99



Allsorts of Impact

Allsorts gains an understanding of the impact of our services, and the needs of Allsorts children and young people through;

- Youth Representative Clinics: young people give feedback to their reps, relayed to the CEO and Board
- 6-monthly snapshot surveys: Project-wide surveys to feedback on services, wellbeing and experiences as LGBT+ young people in the wider community.
- Informal Feedback: In youth groups and/or one-to-one sessions

Allsorts has helped me accept myself for who I am, and who I've always been. Allsorts has provided me with a space where I can exist fully, show up authentically and be unapologetically my queer self, without fear. Seeing myself in the identities of those running and volunteering at Allsorts has given me real life representation – I'd never had that before. I've gained confidence, connections and friendships that I deeply cherish.

We asked our young people how Allsorts had helped them....

Taken from our 6-monthly survey with 62 young people in March 2023

said that one-to-one support had been of particular help to them

5-11 Gender Exploring & Trans children and their Parents/Carers, Monthly Group

'Is there anyone here like me?' is often the first thing that children say when they meet the Kids Group worker for the first time.

Kids Group provides a welcoming space for trans or genderexploring children and their parents/carers to connect with others who are just like them.

Having had three years of an online/in-person hybrid approach triggered by covid-19, this year saw Kids Group return to its previous full in-person service, providing groups and fun family activities in Brighton.

Under 16s

LGBT+ Youth Groups & Activities for LGBT+ young people aged 11-15



Allsorts under 16s youth groups have continued in Brighton, Horsham, Worthing, Chichester, Hastings and online, whilst launching two new groups in Crawley and Eastbourne.

Requested by young people, we have also been expanding our offer to include more excursions and activities across all locations, including theatre and cinema trips, outdoor residentials, sports sessions and more!

We look forward to expanding these sessions further and continuing to provide spaces for LGBT+ young people to be themselves, have fun and make new friends.

LGBT+ Youth Groups & Activities for LGBT+ young people aged 16-21

Allsorts young people tell us that they want to access LGBT+ spaces that don't revolve around nightlife or alcohol. For them, drop-in groups provide spaces where they can meet new people, engage in activities, access support and socialise with a community of understanding peers and positive role models and without a fear of being judged.

In 2022-23, our over 16s groups also expanded to Crawley and Eastbourne, and are now available for LGBT+ young people aged 16-21.

Transformers



Trans, Non-Binary & Gender-Exploring Groups for young people aged 16-21

Trans & non-binary young people often tell us that they find it hard to have a place to talk about being trans without having to explain themselves. Transformers provides a space where young people are able to explore their gender identity, be seen, valued and understood.

In 2022-23, Transformers monthly groups and activities continued in-person in Brighton and online.

YPoc Group

Youth Groups for young LGBT+ people of colour aged 16-21

This year saw the continuation of our youth group for LGBT+ young people of colour (YPoC). Led by LGBT+ PoC, Allsorts YPoC Group provided safe, non-judgemental and confidential spaces to meet other LGBT+ PoC, have fun and take part in a range of activities.

In 2022-23, Allsorts YPoC Group was available monthly inperson in Brighton.

GIDS Project

In 2022-23, Allsorts received funding from NHS Sussex to run a pilot project for children and their families living in Sussex who are on the waiting list or being seen by the Gender Identity Development Service (GIDS). As part of this project, we delivered two four-week programmes for families to build stronger relationships by participating in activities and workshops which built confidence, resilience and communication skills.

Ten families participated in the programme where they took part in sessions which covered themes such as anger, communication and the family's transition journey. We also had a Forest School session delivered by Sussex Wildlife Trust to give families the opportunity to have fun with each other and learn new skills.

We were very proud of the programme and its positive impact reported on by the families that participated, and with support from NHS, will be continuing to provide this service in 2023-24.

121 Support

121 Support for LGBT+ children & young people aged 5-25

Built on the principles of youth work, Allsorts 121 support sessions offer young people a safe & non-judgemental space to talk to an LGBT+ Youth Support Worker about any challenges they may be facing surrounding their LGBT+ identities and other issues they need support with.

In 2022-23, Allsorts continued to provide 121s online, by phone and in-person (at our delivery hubs, in schools, or outdoor 'Walk & Talks').

Parents/Carers Group

Peer Support Groups for parents/carers of trans, non-binary and/or gender-exploring children & young people

Families can often feel overwhelmed, bewildered and isolated as they face what can be an incredibly challenging time when their child first comes out to them. Being able to connect with a community of empathic, understanding and knowledgeable people can make a world of difference, not only to the parent/carer but to the family as a whole.

Allsorts has been very grateful to be in a position to expand our Family Service over the past year. In hiring two dedicated members of the family team, we were able to provide two inperson groups and one online group per month. In addition to this expansion, our team have developed new activities and themed sessions based on the feedback of parents/carers across the service. The end of 2022-23 saw the recruitment and training of our new family volunteer team, who we look forward to working with more in the coming year.

Family 121 Support

121 support sessions for any family member of an LGBT+ child or young person

Family 121 sessions for any family member of an LGBT+ young person in Sussex can be delivered in-person, online or by phone. They offer spaces to talk about challenges people may face surrounding their young person's LGBT+ identities. This work compliments our youth services and centres positive outcomes for LGBT+ young people whilst supporting their wider networks.

Since 2014, we have provided ad hoc 121 support for parents/carers. 2021-22 saw the piloting and development of the family 121 service in preparation for a full launch of the service in 2022-23.


Secondary schools in Brighton & Hove and East Sussex once again took up Allsorts School Contracts with the aims of;

- Supporting student in schools who are LGBT+ or exploring their sexual orientation and/or gender identity.
- Increasing LGBT+ awareness, inclusion and safety throughout the whole school community through educational workshops, assemblies and staff training
- Increasing the visibility and inclusion of LGBT+ identities and the LGBT+ community throughout the school and the wider community, and across the teaching curriculum.

The contracts offer schools a menu of services to use their dedicated hours based on their needs such as;

- LGBT+ Awareness & Inclusion workshops for students
- LGBT+ Assemblies for students
- LGBT+ Awareness & Inclusion training for staff
- Information, advice and guidance for pastoral staff, senior leaders and governors

This year continued to be a busy one for the Training Service where we delivered our LGBT+ & Trans Awareness Training to organisations such as; Brighton and Hove City Councils Education, Standards and Achievement team, East Sussex School Health Service & Primary PSHE Hub, MET college, Sussex Community NHS Foundation Trust's LGBT+ Network, AMEX American Express Families Network, Intuit, and NHS Brighton & Hove CCG.

We also;

- Continued to develop and implement the Allsorts Allyship Programme.
- Implemented a new CRM to streamline inquiries and bookings.
- Delivered more than four times as many training sessions compared to last financial year.

Allsorts Allyship Programme

What is the Allsorts LGBT+ Allyship Programme?

The Allsorts LGBT+ Allyship Programme provides organisations with training, information, advice and guidance to support them in creating and maintaining an LGBT+ Allies Team within their organisation.

We believe that having a designated LGBT+
Allies Team in your organisation will ensure
better LGBT+ awareness and inclusion, stronger
support for your service users and staff, and
make your organisation a safer space for all LGBT+ people.

An LGBT+ Allies Team will have an active role in your organisation to ensure any issues relating to LGBT+ inclusion are identified and appropriately addressed. Although the time-commitment can be fairly minimal, the impact can be huge!

Ongoing telephone support, information, advice and guidance

In addition to training, the LGBT+ Allies Team will have access to an agreed amount of ongoing support from the Allsorts Team through telephone or email support, information, advice and guidance. The amount of support will be agreed upon depending on the size of your organisation.

What do you get for participating in the Allsorts LGBT+ Allyship Programme?

- Programme Participation Certificate
- Your organisation will receive a certificate showing that you are participating in the Allyship Programme.
- Branded Website Assets and Email Banners
- To allow you to demonstrate your commitment to LGBT+ inclusion in your organisation via your website. The LGBT+ Allies Team will have a unique banner for their email signatures.
- Branded LGBT+ Allies Staff Team Poster Template
- To support the visibility of your LGBT+ Allies Team in your organisation and the wider community.
- LGBT+ Allies Lanyards
- The LGBT+ Allies Team will be given a special rainbow-themed lanyard that shows they are a designated LGBT+ Ally.

Rainbow Flag Award

The Rainbow Flag Award is a national Quality Assurance Framework for all schools and colleges, focusing on LGBT+, (lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, plus other related identities), inclusion and visibility. The Rainbow Flag Award encourages a whole organisation approach to LGBT+inclusion, as well as developing strategies to combat LGBTphobic* bullying.



Previously funded by the Government Equalities Office, via the Department for Education, Allsorts Youth Project have been working alongside our partner organisations; The Proud Trust, Humankind & The Kite Trust since 2016 to deliver this exciting & essential Quality Assurance Framework.

Primary, secondary & SEND schools and colleges across the country have been taking part, with Allsorts Youth Project delivering this award in the South-East region. Between April 2021 - March 2022, 17 schools signed up to the RFA was signed up towith Allsorts Youth Project.

The 6 areas of the award are:

- Red Skilled Teachers
- Orange Supportive Governors & Parents
- Yellow Effective Policies
- Green Inclusive Curriculum
- Blue Pastoral Support
- Violet Pupil Voice

A key aspect of the RFA is to provide evidence of the development of future initiatives informed by the program, ensuring that a legacy of positive cultural change is achieved, and sustained long after a schools project year comes to an end.

The Government Equality Office has acknowledged the effectiveness of the Rainbow Flag Award as "the best model for LGBT provision in the country".





Project Wide Activities

Volunteering, Pride Season, Resources & Strategy



The primary focus of our 2022-23 Youth Reps, alongside relaying feedback from young people across the project to our CEO and Board, was supporting Allsorts to achieve the Investing in Children Membership Award. We could not thank them enough for their invaluable contributions to achieving the award, and although we were sad to see many of them leave at end of 2022, we were thrilled to see them moving onto new ventures and opportunities, including university, higher education and employment.

We saw this as an ideal moment to evaluate and reshape what Allsorts was offering in relation to youth voice and participation. One of our existing members of staff was recruited to a Senior Practitioner role, with one of her main responsibilities being to hold and drive the youth voice aspect of our work.

As a result, we developed the Youth Voice programme for 16-25 year olds who would like to amplify the voices of Allsorts young people and influence change within the project. The new Youth Representatives will be Allsorts service users who will be provided with opportunities to help shape the future of Allsorts and gain meaningful experience to create new pathways for their own futures. We look forward to the year ahead facilitating the Youth Voice programme!

Volunteers

Volunteers are truly the backbone of Allsorts, so in 2022 we were excited to re-introduce volunteer facilitation for in-person youth groups.

We audited our existing volunteering offer and undertook a consultation with our current volunteers, who had been supporting Allsorts pre-pandemic, on how we could improve their experience going forward. The results of this also fed into improving the Youth Service, hence we developed our Youth Engagement Programme, holding six monthly planning days to collaborate as a team and set out the following months activities and structure.

We were also able to set up an Allsorts Volunteering group on the app/website Spond to improve our overall communication, such as ensuring three months worth of activities are always readily accessible to our committed volunteers. The consultation also led us to develop a Volunteering Handbook to clearly set out information in regard to Allsorts staff, policies, supervisions, e-learning and more.

We also came together with our pre-pandemic volunteers who wished to continue volunteering with Allsorts for a fantastic day of refresher training and a social meal at the Shelter Hall.

Pride Season

The summer of 2022 saw Allsorts return to in-person pride events across Sussex in full swing. We were excited to return to Worthing and Hastings for a second year, and jumped at the opportunity to make an appearance at Crawley Pride for the first time.

In Brighton, we were thrilled to be back at Trans Pride for the first time since the pandemic. Our family and youth stalls drew wonderful crowds, and we had so much fun celebrating and marching with the young people and families that joined us for the day.

The Allsorts bus also made it's return as we proudly joined the Pride Parade on sunny August afternoon. Young people, staff, trustees and volunteers celebrated together in the centre of the weekend's festivities.

Within youth groups, we once again celebrated pride season with our Inktober inspired art challenge, 'Pen Pride'. Each week we set a theme for young people to get creative with drawing, painting, poetry and more! The submissions were awesome (as always) and varied from rainbow pianos to gay frogs to space bunnies!





Resources

Young people, staff and volunteers continued to work together to produce and update some excellent youth-led resources. In 2022-23, this included;



The continuation of the *Allsorts of Visibility* collection. A series of resources celebrating and showcasing prominent LGBT+ people of colour. New editions celebrated LGBT+ who were/are also South Asian, South-East Asian, and indigenous people of Oceania.



The release of the reimagined and updated 5 Ways: a resource exploring the 5 ways to wellbeing, by young people and staff at Allsorts. The new version has all new pages made entirely by young people at the project, as well as group pages, and reflections.

We have also added a new section to the resources section of our website which highlights video releases, alongside Allsorts' youth-led podcast, *Allsorts of Thoughts.* In the podcasts & videos section, you can now watch *Finley's Story* made with West Sussex County Council, our Self-Care Series made in collaboration with Allsorts young people, and Katie's TEDx Brighton Talk, *'Why the fight for young LGBT+ people is far from over"*.

Strategic Plan

Following surveys, consultations and in-depth research with children, young people, families, staff, volunteers and stakeholders, 2021-22 brought the development of our strategic plan from April 2022 onwards. We were pleased to release the Executive Summary in <u>our 2021-22 Annual Report</u>. One year into the strategy, here are our key updates.

Financial Statement from the Treasurer

Period: 1st April 2022 - 31st March 2023

From a macro-economic perspective this has been a difficult year with high inflation, a tense labour market and growth stagnation. However, Allsorts continues to navigate successfully through these challenging times and saw once again positive economic results and a solid financial situation, which continues in the year 2023-24.

The project is run very efficiently and effectively by the CEO Katie, the Deputy CEO Billi and the entire Allsorts Team. This is reflected in the strong results.

From an economic point of view the project generated a £16, 000 net income. Gross income grew by 19% to £714,000. About 85% of this comes from grants and other charitable activities, however the contribution from training, both in schools and in corporate settings, continues to grow. This reflects the strategy to find commercial revenue streams that are less dependable from grant provision.

The trends in income show that Allsorts continues to receive support from the local authorities of Brighton & Hove, West Sussex and East Sussex, which is very positive in the current climate where LGBT+ issues are often objects of polarised discussion. The project receives also support from local schools, despite the continuing pressures on school budgets, and more backing also from local businesses.

Costs increased by 35%, which is not only due to high inflation but also to increased activity and consequent expansion of the team. As expected, the biggest expense line is Salaries. This makes up for almost 80% of the total expenditure and grew by about 31% year on year. The other two notable cost lines are Group Activities and Office Costs.

From a financial perspective, the balance e sheet is very solid and funds have grown, for the seventh consecutive time, from £348,000 to £364,000. Again, this is a reflection of the effective way in which our CEO Katie is running the project. Entering the new financial year with a high level of reserves allows the freedom to make brave choices, knowing that there is strong financial backing.

I wanted to close these remarks by thanking all our funders, from the large organisational funders, to small businesses and to individual donors. I also wanted to thank our bookkeeper, Lorraine Heaysman, and our accountants, F1 CRT Limited. Thank you very much for your continued commitment in the work that Allsorts does to support young LGBT+ people and their families in Sussex.
