Monarchs

The majority of Monarch butterflies live in Mexico, central United States and southern Canada. They migrate north in the summer and south in the winter. This may take five generations. Monarchs at a caterpillar phase eat milkweed and wildflowers in the Asclepias family. As butterflies, they eat nectar from native plants.

Monarchs start as an egg and hatch by eating through their eggshells, then they start eating the milkweed plant that they were laid on. They eat milkweed (which is poisonous) so predators don't eat them. When the caterpillar gets big enough, they climb to a high point and create a hard protective case around them.

When they emerge from the chrysalis, they are butterflies. They hang upside down to dry their wings. And when they are ready, they fly.

The turtle made her drinking water dirty. I saw all of it happen. Today I saw her log knocked over, and dirty disgusting dirt mud in her cage.


I like the box turtle because she looks cute.
