Each child learns at their own pace with the teacher guiding and monitoring the learning environment. Teachers are all qualified educators with the ability to guide the children to become independent learners. We ensure that all children graduate with the skills to be lifelong learners and problem solvers.	Academic, Career, Financial Wellbeing & Development Students will work at their own pace with the support of their teacher to ensure they are making steady improvements in reading, writing, science enquiry, research skills and mathematics. This provides them with skills that will ensure success once they move onto other educational institutions. Students' specific needs are clearly communicated to their parents and their individual education plans are discussed frequently. They continually strive to improve their pedagogy and are constantly learning, growing and changing to meet the needs of each child.	Community Wellbeing & Development Calgary Montessori School consists of three locations throughout the city. A fourth kindergarten program will be operating by the 2024-2025 school year. The staff make an effort to bring the kindergarten children from all three locations together a few times a year. This builds community and connections between locations. Students participate in schoworkshops with experts in their field as well as out of school field trips. Our parent council is actively involved in special events, uniform sales, fundralsing and parent volunteer outreach. The Board of Directors is directly responsible for approving tuition discounts based on written requests.

			This will include additional government financial support if necessary. Children from kindergarten to grade 6 will receive the opportunity for speech therapy, occupational therapy, psychology and physical therapy in small target groups through the ECLS fund.		
Strategies for 2023-2026	Students will: Be given opportunities to work at their own pace based on their individual learning needs. Explore the unique perspective of FMNI cultures and apply it to their own learning. Classes will be broken into multi- age groups so students can work with a variety of grade levels and experience the value of collaboration within a classroom context. Teachers will ensure that students are meeting the required curricular elements by the end of each grade level through both individual, small and large group lessons. Teachers will assess students' progress both formally through provincial mandated and school based assessment and informally through observation of each individual child.	Grade 1-3 students will use the Rainbow reading program. Students in grade 4-6 will use Read Theory to track their progress in reading comprehension. Teachers work with student's one on one when necessary to ensure they have a solid understanding of any concept before moving on to the next step. Students will be given opportunities to go beyond grade level expectations in all subject areas using tactile Montessori materials. Ideally, students are in the same classroom with the same teacher for a three year cycle. This allows the teacher to easily track their progress.	Students will: Learn in a safe and supportive environment. Have access to any additional supports they may need through staff members or outside resources when necessary. Have their needs communicated clearly to their parents through IPP meetings and parent/teacher interviews. Parents will be provided with strategies to work with their child at home when necessary.	Teachers will: Engage in professional development to improve their pedagogy and better meet the needs of all students. This professional development includes but is not limited to workshops,mentorship from senior teachers, team meetings and goal setting with school leaders. Be evaluated on a yearly basis by a member of administration. These evaluations will serve as a learning opportunity for teachers and allow them to make improvements to their teaching practices. Apply the TQS and LQS to support their teacher practice and professional development.	The kindergarten teachers at all three locations will be responsible for organizing an educational event where the kindergarten children and parents from all three locations get together a few times a year. The Education Enhancement Fund, which has been operating for 2 years, asks families to donate funds for in school workshops with experts in their respective field. This will continue in the 2023 school year as it was well received by students, staff and parents. Parent council will continue to operate as in previous years. They will reach out to parents who are not on the council to organize focus groups. A parent satisfaction survey will be created by administration and sent electronically to families in spring each year. The board will continue to develop a strategy to make the school more accessible financially to families through tuition discounts and/ or bursaries.
