### **Founders**

Teachers by training, Sarah and William Modest opened the Precious Orphans Children's Home (POCH) in 2010 with the desire to help many orphans and abandoned children in Sarah's hometown of Nshupu. In 2011, Susie Rheault and Gil Williams met Sarah and William and were taken with their mission and plight. In order to help POCH, Susie and Gil returned to the U.S. and formed Precious Project, Inc. as a 501c3 organization. The first project was to build a larger, new residential home for the orphans. Three years later, the Precious Primary School followed as the founders agreed with Nelson Mandela that a good education is the best way out of poverty. Slowly the campus developed and the rest is Precious history!

# Precious Orphans Children's Home



Our residential home added two new children in 2018 for a total of 21 children who now have a safe and nurturing place to live. Supportive "mama's" care for them, ensuring that they are fed three meals a day, do their homework and have all that they need. Some children are orphaned, and others are rescued from neglectful and abusive situations.

One of the new resident children

was rescued from a mentally ill mother after she had confined him to his room with no food or water and burned his clothes and school items. The Precious Primary School's social worker and administrators intervened and had him legally placed in the Home. He is thriving both at home and at school.

### **Precious Farm**





Two hundred additional chickens were added to the farm during 2018. The new total of 300 chickens produces up to 7-8 trays of eggs a day, which are sold at local hotels and lodges to build revenue.



William purchased a half-acre parcel of land adjacent to our existing farm to expand farming operations to a full acre. Two farmhands planted a greater variety of vegetables to include spinach, Chinese cabbage, kale, lettuce and eggplant. A drip water irrigation system was installed in order to stave off drought. Since the land is on the Precious Campus, the school children cared for some of the plants and learned basic farming skills in the process.

# **Precious Music Program**



Thanks to a single donor's generosity, the Precious Primary School has a musical program complete with instruments and a dynamic sound system! The sound system has been used at the graduation ceremony, during other festivities as well as during music classes. Children sing

through microphones and learn electric piano, drums and acoustic guitar! It has been an exciting addition to their regular academics and we are cultivating the natural musical aptitude of talented students.

# **Precious English Medium Primary School**

The Precious English Medium Primary School had 220 students in attendance in 2018, having grown from 180 in 2017. The ten-room school now ranks as one of the top private primary schools in Tanzania after only being open for two years. This ranking comes from our students' National Exams test scores, as they have consistently had the highest grades in the district. In 2018, Precious boasted the top 25 performers on the National Exams in the district.



On October 6, 2018, we held our first graduation ceremony. The turnout was enormous, and it was a festive occasion, complete with performances by the children. All of our seventh-grade students received their diplomas and are now enrolled in secondary boarding schools.

The Class of 2018: Three boys and six girls.

# **STEAM Program**

A large part of the success of the school is the volunteer-led STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) program developed and implemented by Ina Ghaznavi and Allan Andersen. These dedicated volunteers, who have been involved with the Children's Home since before Precious Project was formed, travel to Tanzania twice a year to spend weeks training teachers on the latest educational technology that can be used in the classrooms. The technology is integrated to support all grades and major subject areas, and they work with students and teachers to beta test new programs.





Ina and Allan are actively engaged in the implementation of tablets (iPads) and WiFienabled servers in classes, providing educational software, e-books, coding and productivity programs, video lessons and quizzes. They are designed to improve student performance and develop independent discovery and thinking skills. This year, 22 mini-iPad 4s and two Rachel servers were added to support more students simultaneously participating in the digital learning programs.

Science equipment was also added to support student studies in human biology, botany, and electronics. Among the practical lab materials provided were digital microscopes, which allows students to present their micro-findings on other students iPads to collaborate in their discoveries. Students were also provided hands-on learning in drone technology.

# Capital Improvements in 2018



The Precious Campus exclusively uses solar energy now, saving us \$2,000 a year on electrical bills. The government-run electric company is not always reliable, so the teachers and students are thrilled with the dependable supply of electricity. All the energy needs of the buildings on the campus are supplied by this source. The system is rated to produce 5120 watts of DC power,

which charges the DC battery bank. One donor, David Trice, spear-headed the solar initiative, challenging Precious Project to find other donors by offering to match their gifts.

This project began when David Trice and Gary Johnson visited the campus and spoke with Gil Williams. David volunteered to match any donations we received until we could get the solar panels. We quickly raised the needed funds from the following generous donors: Larry Downes, Gary Johnson, Paul Lundquist, Trammel and Ann Newton in honor of Grey Fairchild, and Michael Richter.



Dormitories were built for our fourth and seventh-grade students so they could receive extra tutoring six months prior to the Tanzanian National Exams. For the seventh-grade students, these exams are used to determine whether they will be allowed to continue their education. The dormitories were hand-built out of brick and cement over a three month period. One section is for boys and one is for girls. Boarding students enjoy three meals a day, and there is always time for music, football (soccer) and socializing so that school isn't all work and no fun.

# Women's Empowerment & Community Programs



Precious Project enabled the women's empowerment group to start a company that makes chicken feed. This Savings and Loan Group consists of 45 women. Trainers held a handson workshop to teach the women how to manufacture chicken feed. Many people in the village raise chickens so this built-in customer base should assure success in this business endeavor. The women

pool their money and vote on which member should receive a loan. The chosen woman starts her business and pays back the loan to the group in installments, which then goes to fund another women's business. They meet weekly to share business challenges, as well as lessons learned.



Parent meetings are held in the community center/dining hall. Ninety-seven percent of the parents attend which provides us the opportunity to share vital educational information. This year, we brought in a health officer from the Tanzanian Department of Health, who gave a presentation on best practices such as hand washing,

and explained malaria, cholera and typhoid vaccinations. There was a Question and Answer session that truly engaged the parents in attendance, who walked away with a lot of helpful health information.




