2021 was an exciting year as the Precious Project continued to see our dreams materialize. Our new secondary school, Precious Leaders Secondary School, was successfully built on time and on budget with no debt. Just ten years ago we didn't even dare to



dream this big. Our secondary school campus of 21 acres is simply magnificent consisting of a 7-acre campus and a large-scale farm. This is a huge step forward as we now with assurance can offer a secondary school education that will continue to support our primary school graduates in a manner that they have grown accustomed to. Our secondary school will eventually have 6 grades and upon completion prepare our graduates to enter University. On January 17th, 2022, our school with all student boarding opened with 90 students in grade 8/form one.

We have continued to build out our board by adding both Jim Logan and Barbara Hazard to our group. Both Barbara and Jim have traveled to Precious many times, and they are both valuable additions to our board making us stronger.

Our U.S. staff was fortified with the addition of Jennifer Wysocki as our Director of Development. It is hard to believe that it has been just a year since Jenn joined our group. Her integration has been seamless. For those of you who have not yet met her you are in for a treat.

Year after year we are deeply touched by the support we receive from donors far and wide. Your trust and belief in our mission touch us deeply but more importantly, it continues to provide these children with that second chance at having a meaningful life filled with hope and potential. Each day we see kids who previously were not sure of when their next meal might appear who now can focus on how they will eventually give back once they complete their education. 
2021 YEAR IN REVIEW


Precious Project's operating budget has doubled with the addition of the secondary school campus, now hovering at around \$1M annually. In 2021, programmatic expenses were higher than usual due to the secondary school construction and start up costs. Total revenue received was just shy of breaking even, ending the year with a small deficit. COVID relief funds provided a much-needed cushion to help close the gap.





SUCCESS STORIES

THREE SIBLINGS JOSHUA, PAULI & DOREEN

Two brothers and a sister joined the Precious Orphans Children's Home after their dire situation was brought to director, William Modest's attention by a farmer who had caught the siblings eating sugarcane from his fields. The children reported that their mother was not feeding them and that she had not been around for days. Their father was deceased and left his deeply troubled wife with five children. The fourth sibling, a 13-year-old, was adopted by a member of the farmer's church, and the fifth child had run away.

The 9- and 11-year-old brothers are both in Grade 3, attending Nshupu's public primary school as the Precious School's 3rd-grade class is full. Their three-year-old sister has joined the baby class at Precious Primary School.

If these children had not been taken in by the Precious Orphans Children's Home, they would have been in jeopardy like the hundreds of thousands of Tanzania's street children who have to



fare on their own and vulnerable to abuse and violence. Thanks to the Precious Home, the three siblings are now well fed and receiving loving care from the Home's mamas and co-directors, William and Sarah Modest. William has reported that all three children are doing well at school and the other children in the home have embraced the siblings and welcomed them into the family.



This little girl is "Queen". She and her single mother showed up at Precious School with the mother begging us to let her attend the school. Her mother, Dorcas was 15 years old when she became pregnant with

Queen and she was forced to stop her education. Dorcas works as a day laborer when she can find work in the fields (on average she is able to get work less than 100 days each year and earns less than \$1.00 day for her labor). The single room they rented had no electricity, a sheet metal roof with holes in it and an outside outhouse pit toilet.

William and Sarah listened to Dorcas story and decided to give Dorcas a job cleaning at the Precious Primary School in exchange for Queen attending the Precious Primary School, food for both Dorcas and Queen and a room to stay in. It has radically change the trajectory of both Dorcas as well as her daughter Queen. Queen is a bright light at the school and fits in with all of the students. Her grades are very good and she is an eager learner. We have no doubt that the impact of this intervention has saved the lives of this mother and daughter. Our motto is "Everyone Deserves A Chance" and this is what that chance looks like.

PRECIOUS CHILDREN'S HOME

In 2010, in the small rural village of Nshupu, Tanzania, nine children were discovered undernourished and sleeping on a cement floor. At the time, the sole support of these children (abandoned and orphans of HIV), was a grassroots initiative of a local church. Then a local Nshupu primary school teacher, who lost his own mother to AIDS, left his secure job to follow his heart to care for these children. Recognizing the children needed better care beyond the means of the local community, the teacher - William Modest, and his wife, Sarah - took on the challenge to raise and school these children. They sought outside help to build a permanent home for the children and provide them with the best in education. Building this home was the beginnings for Precious Project.

Precious Project raised the funds to build and fund yearly operations for a residential home for orphans and other vulnerable children. The home is a healthy, loving, and safe environment for the children to grow and learn. Precious Project provides for the education and care of both the residential children and other local high-risk children.

- An organized family setting is critical to foster continuous learning. We employ two Mamas (caregivers), two guards, and one cleaner to care for our 29 children. The children learn responsibility to the family by doing daily chores, such as caring for the chickens and getting firewood.
- While our home is for abandoned and orphaned children, it shouldn't be considered an orphanage. This is a family where older children look out for their younger "siblings" and our hired "Mamas" and our founders, William and Sarah, create a truly loving, family environment.

All of the children in the Precious Children's Home receive a RESIDENTIAL SPONSORSHIP covering 100% of their tuition and care.

BUILDING A FAMILY ENVIRONMENT

While we can never replace a child's family, we make every effort to create a warm and supportive environment where our children can thrive.

PRECIOUS ENGLISH MEDIUM PRE-K PRIMARY SCHOOL

Our primary school provides the highest-quality education for local children from Pre-K through 7th grade. We offer free education to the most underprivileged children in the region.

Our first academic institution, Precious English Medium Primary School, sets and demands high standards from our students and faculty. Our goal is to improve Tanzania's future through education. When the school opened its doors on January 11th, 2016, we enrolled 135 students. In 2021, our enrollment was up to 347 students. Among this year's school enrollees, 128 children are receiving a sponsorship; a growth of 113% since the school's founding in 2016. The school has repeatedly been recognized by the National Examinations Council of Tanzania as #1 in the district. It was also the first primary school in the region to successfully deploy digital learning school-wide and offer STEM educational programs.

the education sector over the last decade. Here at Precious Project, we also feel it is important to provide quality education to our students in the Village of Nshupu and surrounding villages, as this is one of the major privledges of the developed world.

Precious Leaders Secondary School opened it's doors in Jaunary 2022. This private co-educational boarding school is located in the Arumeru district. Among the key objectives are to educate children who are severely underrepresented in Tanzania's secondary schools, namely the underprivileged and girls.

Precious is taking great strides to keep up with the educational advancements in Tanzania. Evidence shows that increasing access to secondary education will contribute to stronger economic growth, faster poverty reduction and improved child health.

ACADEMICS

In their first four years (Form I to IV), PLSS students study a variety of academic subjects, including English, Kiswahili, math, sciences, history, a second foreign language, and ICT. It is planned that in the last two years at PLSS (Form V an VI), students focus on specific fields of study, such as 'PCB' (Physics, Chemistry, and Biology), 'PGM' (Physics, Geography, and Math), 'HGE' (History, Geography, and Economics), among other offerings. In addition, Precious requires students to be involved in a sport and offers students electives in a range of subjects from music to technology.

ENROLLMENT

When Precious Leaders Secondary School (PLSS) reaches its full capacity, it will offer six years of secondary education to up to 600 students. One important goal for the school is to serve children from the poorest families as access to a quality education is an important contributor to poverty reduction. Precious plans to support 50% of its student body under full sponsorship, with another 25% receiving partial tuition support. Another significant objective is to recruit and retain girls by providing them a safe and supportive learning environment.

ADMINISTRATIVE PRIORITIES

- To set and strengthen the objectives for leading our new students, new teachers, and staff for enhancing the growth of Precious Leaders Secondary School.
- To raise our goals that target academic performance ultimately attributing to good educational outcomes and results. In the future, we earn recognition for earning the first position in the region and to be recognized for national accomplishments.
- Conduct educational seminars for our teachers to enhance their teaching techniques and learning processes for the students.
- Promoting career guidance to our students during their first year of secondary education will bring positive outcomes for their future. This will help shape the future for our students so they can start preparing themselves as their school years progress.















KEY HIGHLIGHTS

- Nearly 15% of operating expenses for the school & home are currently paid through the sale of the extra produce from our farms.
- Precious is growing a multitude of crops, including sisal, maize, sugar cane, banana, papaya, avocado, and a variety of vegetables such as kale, spinach, and tomatoes.
- Poultry coop with approximately 300 free-range chickens that provide meat and eggs for the community, fertilizer and a source of income.

AGRICULTURE & SUSTAINABILITY

Sustainability is a continuous process of improving various aspects of our impact on natural resources. For Precious Project, it will always include small and large projects where we can see measurable impact year over year.

International efforts toward sustainable farming have helped to increase food production, reduce costs, save lives, and generate a revenue source, reducing poverty over the long term. Adopting sustainable agricultural practices to grow more with less land, water, fertilizer, and other costs, minimizing environmental impact.

By modeling organic and sustainable agricultural practices and holding workshops, local farmers learn to increase productivity and reduce the costs of their own farms.

SOLAR

Powerful solar panels provide enough electricity to meet the needs of the schools home and other facilities on both campus. The system is rated to produce 5120 watts of DC power, which charges the DC battery bank and enables Precious Project to save an estimated \$2000 a year in energy expenses.

WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

In Tanzania, women are among the poorest in their nation, despite serving an important role in their rural economy. Tanzanian women farm, sell fruits and vegetables, transport heavy loads of water and firewood, and care for their family. It is not uncommon to meet women who raise families in the absence of a man who might labor away from home, has other families, or never returns for financial or health reasons. While education would be a path out of poverty, many Tanzanian women don't have access to it.

HELPING WOMEN HELP THEMSELVES, THEIR FAMILIES AND COMMUNITY

Our Women's Empowerment group is designed to assist local women to create and control their own self-help organization. Since they know best what they need, they decide what businesses to run that would work best in their local economy. Empowering women with the resources and skills to create businesses and they will be self-sufficient. When women start businesses they provide their families with superior nutrition, focus on their children's education and reinvest in the community.

Savings and Loans

The Women's Empowerment Group acts as their own credit unions to start microbusinesses in the community. Each woman buys into the group by purchasing a share. Those shares are the pool of money that's available to be loaned to members of the group. The group also acts as a support network for one another and many have become business partners.

Education Seminars

Precious Project assists the women's groups by bringing in outside speakers who present ideas for building small businesses lead by women. The first step is always the hardest in any endeavor and the seminars are well attended. The business models chosen are those that would thrive in the Nshupu area.




RESIDENTIAL SPONSOR \$1,500/year
