

# Introduction

The RHS Community Survey deals with factors at a broader community level in order to provide more meaning to the RHS data. While the RHS provides data related to individual health, this Community survey will allow the RHS data on individuals to be cross-referenced with community factors. The information will make it possible to investigate whether and how —for example— having a arena, a youth centre or community control over the school impacts on diabetes and other aspects of individual health. This survey is shorter than the individual-level RHS and is intended to cover a very wide range of subjects very quickly. Once completed, the information produced should be very informative and generate many additional indicators of First Nations health.

At initial contact with a community, regional coordinators or survey administrators (field workers) will seek out potential community experts to fill out the ten sections of the survey. Some communities might have one key person to fill out the sections of the survey, other communities might have three or four local experts. If a respondent feels there is a section they cannot completed, a different community expert should be sought. On the top of each section of the survey, there is space provided to indicate who in the community filled out which section. Also, at the top of each section there is a space for the local field worker to provide their contact information. A form has been provided to help the field workers keep track of who in the community has which section of the survey. The RHS Community Survey needs to be completed and included in the last RHS shipment is sent out from the community back to the Regional organization.

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# **DESCRIPTION OF SURVEY SECTIONS:**

#### I. External Environment

Questions in this section relate to environmental issues such as whether the First Nation has an emergency plan, an Emergency Coordinator, whether there are any mines, chemical plants etc in the area, First Nations bylaws and water treatment standards.

#### II. Shelter and Infrastructure

Questions in this section focus on First Nations housing issues such as waiting lists for homes, road maintenance, heating and energy efficiency.

### III. Food

In this section we are looking for information on the availability and accessibility of fresh, nutritious foods, the cost of basic food items and other food sources such as traditional country foods.

# IV. Employment/Economic Development

Questions in this section are looking at employment within the community, distance to outside employment and community assets.

#### V. Education

These questions cover high school and post-secondary enrollment, adult education, First Nations schools and pre-school programs if any.

### VI. Justice, Safety and Security

These questions relate to community policing, fire and ambulance services, emergency response and police/community relations.

#### VII. Health Services

The Health questions look at availability of health professionals, hospitals and health services, medical transportation and prescription drugs and indoor/outdoor recreational facilities, etc.

#### VIII. Social Services

These questions focus on income support such as welfare, safe homes (also called shelters or transition homes) and youth programs and services.

#### IX. Identity Issues

This section looks at issues such as First Nations languages, cultural programs, repatriation of First Nations children and membership issues.

### X. First Nations Governance

These questions relate to any self-government arrangements or sectors where the First Nation manages and controls services, any other groups with designated authority such as an economic development corporation, and Council representation.

## XI. Wrap-up Questions

The last three questions give respondents an opportunity to expand on key issues and suggest new subject areas.
