A CARAVAN COMES TO TOWN

Caravana de la Vida

November 4-12 saw a caravan move through northwestern Oregon. This was no ordinary caravan though — this was a Caravan of Life! Also known as Caravana de la Vida, the Spanish-language event featured Jose Rojas as the speaker. To date, 229 baptisms have resulted from the Caravan of Life, with more Bible studies and connections still being made.

Starting in Salem, Ore., the nine-day series began with nearly 1,400 people attending the Saturday evening presentation. After a quick teardown on Sunday evening it was off to Hillsboro to set it all up again! Setup took eight hours, teardown only took two hours. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday's meetings were held in Hillsboro and then all was torn down again, this time to be moved to the Oregon

Convention Center for the last three nights.

Pastor Rojas spoke on the real issues of life, including "Light vs. Darkness" and "The Law of God".

Twenty-seven churches worked together to make the Caravan of Life a reality. It took almost a year and hundreds of people to bring the multi-night, multi-location event together. Beginning in January, church members began hosting small groups in their homes, inviting their friends and neighbors to supper, a church social event, or to a Bible study. As November approached the members began inviting those same people to come hear Pastor Rojas, giving him the opportunity to invite those same people to make a decision for Christ.

In all, an estimated 3,000 different people heard Rojas speak. Close to 3,000 people heard that God loves them.

One of the miraculous stories to come out of the nine-day event was that of Ivan.

About three weeks prior to the start of the Caravan of Life meetings, Ivan had a heart attack, putting him into a coma in the ICU of a local hospital. Due to brain swelling, the doctors gave him 72 hours to live. His wife had been attending the Hillsboro Spanish Church and called his family in Mexico, begging them to come say their goodbyes.

Nearly 40 members of Ivan's family arrived from Mexico and were at the hospital when pastors, Harold Altamirano and Rafael Escobar, came to pray with Ivan and his family. A large prayer circle was formed in the waiting room as each person knelt, most non-Christian, much less Adventist. At that moment Pastor Harold finished the last prayer, the doors to the waiting room burst open and a nurse rushed out asking for Ivan's wife. Ivan had just woken up! Ivan was in church a week later and on the Wednesday night of Caravan of Life Ivan, his wife, and their two children were baptized.

In January, the process will begin again as the Adventist Spanish-speaking community prepares for the NET 2012 meetings that will be down-linked to all Spanish-speaking churches in the Oregon Conference in October.

During those twenty-five years, the group has met in a wide variety of settings, most recently in Sunriver, Oregon and Florence, Oregon.

Over half the women attending the retreat responded to a special altar call on Saturday night. Many renewed their walk with God in a deeper, more meaningful way. As a result, several women, including teens, are currently studying for baptism!

Each woman left the retreat challenged to walk with God faithfully, allowing His light to brighten their countenance, and transform their lives to become a reflection of His love to everyone around.

OREGON CONFERENCE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE WRAP-UP

Now that Thanksgiving is over . . .” How often we hear those words being said by those around us as we all look forward to the holiday season beginning with Thanksgiving. This phrase is usually followed by a statement filled with anticipation and excitement as people look forward to the next month of preparation and celebration.

As we celebrate this season, I’d like to suggest that “Thanksgiving” should never be “over.” Thanksgiving is a word that is past tense, present tense, and future tense. We are grateful for all that God has done for us. (Does this ring a bell? ‘We have nothing to fear for the future unless we forget what God has done for us in the past.’) We are filled with gratitude for His daily blessings, and we are asked to continually praise God for His blessings as He bestows them on us. We have so much to be thankful for, both personally and corporately. I want say a special *thank you* to all of you who supported our family this past month as we laid my mother to rest. It meant a lot to know we were being prayed for by so many; the flowers, cards, and notes also assured us of your love.

The Oregon Conference also has so many things to be thankful for. At the end of October, the Executive Committee, along with our Lay Advisory members from around the Conference met to address directions and decisions as well as hear reports of God’s goodness experienced the previous months.

The ongoing results of camp meeting were shared, including the story of an individual who has shared the Sabbath morning message with a number of co-workers and friends. Motorcycle camp meeting, though small, was also talked about, along with the stories coming out of a motorcycle ministry outreach in Prineville. Over 700 pieces of literature were shared from just one of the locations and friendships were created that could go on forever. Our media ministry direction was also discussed, with information being shared about some new opportunities that are opening up some of the obvious media outlets for ministry.

This was the first Executive Committee where our new treasurer, David Freedman, was present and able to give the financial report. Though he gave an excellent report, we are still challenged by the fact that for the past two months tithing in the Conference has dropped slightly from the previous year.

However, we have been successful in lowering our expenses to an amount slightly below the projected budget. This has been a blessing even though the economy continues to impact the work here in the Oregon Conference. Even with the tithe being reduced, we are continually amazed and blessed by the faithfulness of God’s people.

Discussion took place as we looked at some of the expenses that continually rise, seemingly without our control. An area that continues to grow is the medical expense budget. A decision was made to raise the employee contribution rates slightly, starting next July. However, the raise was contingent on a potential salary increase and was also adjusted so the employees that are participating in the Conference’s Wellness Program would not be impacted.

In line with the reports shared at the beginning of the committee, we have formed a media board to oversee a more targeted approach to impact our ministry in/to the large metropolitan areas of our conference. Oregon and SW Washington have very high percentages of individuals who indicate no religious affiliation. This means that some of the traditional methods of reaching out are not as effective as we would like them to be. Without losing the effectiveness of these “tried and true” approaches, the committee elected a group of individuals to find a path to reach the “unreached” with the Good News. This committee will give direction and creative support to our Communication Department as they explore new ways of reaching our communities and cities.

Finally, though not part of the Executive Committee, I want to invite you to two premier ways of experiencing the reason for Christmas. At least two areas in our Conference are involved in reintroducing Christ back into the Christmas season. *Follow the Star* begins this weekend at the Gladstone Conference Center and runs December 3-5 and 9-11. *Journey to Bethlehem* happens December 9-11 in Kelso-Longview. Both are beautiful opportunities for you to share your hope with family and friends. (You can learn more about these events on pages 6-7.) Have a blessed Christmas and remember that Thanksgiving is an ongoing state of the heart.

NORTHWEST MISSION INSTITUTE DIRECTOR SELECTED

The North Pacific Union Conference executive committee, in its Nov. 13 meeting, voted to approve Jason Worf as the director of the newly-formed Northwest Mission Institute. The NPUC-sponsored and funded institute will be located at Walla Walla University to train Bible-worker coordinators. NPUC leaders hope these trained coordinators will be hired to help local church members learn how to facilitate positive and engaging Bible studies within surrounding neighborhoods and communities. Worf, most recently the Amazing Facts publishing director, will begin his new role in January to develop the new institute and its initial phases of operation. Watch for more details on this program in future issues of the *Gleaner*.

HISPANIC SCHOLARSHIPS ADD VALUE TO ADVENTIST EDUCATION

More than 200 Hispanic students are in North Pacific Union Conference Adventist elementary and secondary schools this year because of a new scholarship program sponsored through the NPUC education department. Lanny Hurlbert, NPUC vice president for education, says an estimated \$90,000 in scholarship funding was matched with local school and conference funds targeting needy Hispanic students. These additional funds helped several students in Alaska, Idaho and Montana, but most significantly 72 students in the Oregon Conference, 74 in the Upper Columbia Conference and 53 in the Washington Conference. Hurlbert says the response exceeded expectations, but no legitimate request was turned away. Hispanic scholarships will be available again for the coming school year. TILLAMOOK HOSPITAL TO ADD RURAL HEALTH CLINIC

Tillamook County General Hospital (TCGH) has announced plans to open a new rural health clinic with improved ambulance facilities in Manzanita, Ore., by January 2012. Tillamook Medical Group/Manzanita Primary and Specialty Care will offer obstetrics and gynecology, surgery, podiatry and internal medicine. Urgent care will also be available for extended hours during the week and on weekends at the new location just south of the Seaside/Cannon Beach (Ore.) area. "It's very exciting," says Melody Ayers, TCGH Director of Marketing and Communications, operated by Adventist Health. "There have been requests from the community for quite some time." Generator power will allow the facility to provide urgent services, even during the frequent winter storms.

NAD VOTES TO ALLOW COMMISSIONED AS CONFERENCE PRESIDENTS

Just three weeks after their request for a world church policy variance was turned down during Annual Council meetings, North American Division (NAD) leaders voted on Oct. 31 to reaffirm the division's unique policy allowing ordained or commissioned ministers to serve as presidents of local conferences and missions. The action, voted by nearly a three to one margin, broadens the opportunities for non-ordained leaders, including women, to be elected to the top position in any of the division's 58 conferences. The newly affirmed NAD policy, however, places the division at variance with the constitutional template throughout the world church which states conference leadership can only be held by an ordained pastor. In a related action, NAD committee members approved full participation in the world church's recently launched study of the theology of ordination.

GC DEFINES ORDINATION STUDY TIMELINE

The following timeline has been initiated by world church leaders to formally study the theology of ordination. In November 2013 each division committee will review and recommend their own study material of the topic at the 2013 year-end meetings. From December 2013 to June 2014 a General Conference (GC)-appointed theology of ordination study committee will analyze the materials received from the divisions and prepare a combined report. In June 2014, the report will be reviewed by GC committees. In October 2014, the GC administration will process the report for Annual Council, which will review the report and, if needed, take any appropriate action. Any voted material will be placed on the 2015 General Conference session agenda, where it will be processed accordingly.


POSITIVE LIFE RADIO BUCKS FINANCIAL TRENDS WITH SOLID SUPPORT

Despite hard financial times, Positive Life Radio listeners from all over the urban and rural areas of the Upper Columbia Conference called in during the 2011 Sharathon to share their stories and financial support of \$617,000. By the end of Sharathon, KGTS, in College Place, Wash., was at \$191,000; KPLW, Wenatchee, Wash., raised \$105,000; Yakima netted \$90,000; Spokane's KEEH had \$227,000; and the webcast brought in \$4,000 in promised funds. Kevin Krueger, afternoon host and network general manager, loves hearing the stories shared during these annual events. "It is absolutely incredible to talk with listeners who call in to make a pledge, and hear how God is using Positive Life Radio in their life," he says. "Hearing their stories has changed my life."

NAD ISSUES CAUTION ON TRAVEL TO MEXICO

Because of escalating violence throughout Mexico, the North American Division, in consultation with the General Conference International Crisis Committee, does not recommend that churches, schools and other organizations travel to Mexico until there is a significant reduction in the violence. Groups and individuals are therefore urged to avoid all nonessential travel to Mexico. If a trip becomes necessary, leaders must review and abide by the U.S. State Department travel warnings, which include travel restrictions and security precautions for specific areas of the country and obtain all necessary organizational approvals before committing to any trip.
