

Storyline:

One of the ways we strive to grow in fifth grade is by going outside our comfort zone. Initiating and maintaining relationships with residents of the Christian Home challenges us to grow.





Throughlines:

Throughline #1: Servant Worker

Students' letters, pictures, art work, and visits bring joy to residents of the Christian Home.

Throughline #2: Community Builder

Students engage in relationship building with the residents of the Christian Home across the street from our school.



Formational Learning Experience:

Real Needs: Encouragement and support for isolated aged, ill, and/or ailing persons

Real People: Shut-ins and ill persons we know, and residents of the Christian Home whom we do not know yet

Real work: Writing letters, creating quizzes, drawing pictures, responding to correspondence, entertaining residents by building snowmen, and visiting with residents at their windows



INVITE

We shared our own feelings about Covid, isolation, and quarantine. We talked about our joy in coming together again at school. We identified ways that we could connect with others during this time of isolation.





INVITE

This year has presented a unique invitation for this particular class.

9 of my 16 students have lost a parent, grandparent or greatgrandparent since our school year began. Reaching out to ill and
elderly is near and dear to their hearts this year.

Building snowmen outside the Christian Home to entertain and encourage the residents.



















Students recognize that seemingly small gestures on their part can make a HUGE impact in someone else's life.


Students have identified things they have in common with residents.
