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Deep Hope:



Real needs: encouragement and acknowledgement of persons in our community who use their power in God-honoring ways.


Real people: People with positions of power and influence.


Real work: Writing letters of gratitude and encouragement




INVITE

- We explored the word 'power' from different angles...
 - Asking students to think about times when they've experienced something powerful
 - Asking students to think about a time when they've felt powerless.

 - Mystery Quote Protocol with Power Quotes










NURTURE

We looked to the example of Jesus and studied several stories where Jesus used his power well.

Then students did a think/pair/share in order to build the profile of a great leader, a peculiar powerful person.





EMPOWER

- Writing Letters
 - Started with a template
 - Tuning Protocol
 - Wrote the 'final draft'
 - Addressed the letters and sent them off
- Sharing Circle
 - Students shared who they wrote their letters to and told their classmates about how that person used their power in a peculiar way.





Student Reflections: What have you learned about power?

"Power is a tool God gave us humans. We can use that tool with love and care, or with hate and jealousy."

"Power is not just bad or good--it's how you make it bad or good. If you use power like Jesus did, that will have a good outcome. Power can be connected to lots of different things, but it can bring all together or drive people apart."

"When Rome had good leaders, Rome would prosper. The good emperors had empathy for the poor and just cared for others."



More... Student Reflections: What have you learned about power?

"I have learned that the way you use power has an enormous impact. I have also learned what it means to use power well--to be honest, to do what is right, and to be aware of the people around you."

"Good leaders share power with others, are selfless and listen to the ideas of others. They are encouraging and take responsibility for their actions."

"A person should use their power to always seeks the best interest of others."



Teacher Reflections:

Part of my deep hope is for students to recognize peculiarity and participate in kingdom work. Frankly, there are so many ways power is abused in our world today. My hope is that students will be able to discern how power is being used in the world around them--both positively and negatively. This FLEx invites students to identify someone who uses their position of power and influence in a peculiar way.

It would be wonderful if this activity could plant a seed in the students for what kinds of leaders they want to be as they grow older and take on more responsibility. I hope they can also evaluate power with a different lens.
