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

Reflections by Paul Cooke, France Mission's Director

rench people have been called to polling stations guite a bit since the last issue of France Mission Perspectives: twice for the presidential elections and twice for the legislative elections. The former, of course, returned Emmanuel Macron for a second term of office: but the latter resulted in a very different National Assembly with over half of the victorious députés being new arrivals. Although President Macron's supporters form the biggest single party with 246 seats out of 577, it's still not clear how this can translate into a majority capable of governing the country. At this time of political uncertainty, it's important that we pray for "all those in authority", that our brothers and sisters in France "may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness" (1 Timothy 2.1-2).



This is also a period of change in the world of French Protestantism. As explained later in this issue, our principal mission partner in France (Perspectives) now has a new President and a new-look Directorate. Do please pray for Patrice Niveaux as he takes over from Patrice Alcindor as President and for all those who are entering into new mandates.

But there have also been recent changes in the CNEF (National Council of French



Evangelicals) and in the FPF (French Protestant Federation) Relationships between the two organisations haven't always been easy, but the two new Presidents – Erwan Cloarec for the CNEF and Christian Krieger for the FPF - seem keen to build bridges. Pastor Krieger has pointed to

the FPF's 2022 initiative called Oser lire la Bible ensemble (= "Dare to read the Bible together") as a place where the various strands of French Protestantism can put into practice Paul's words in Ephesians 4.3: "Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace." May the Lord help us all in that endeavour, especially if we too are having

2021 financial review


Paul Cooke provides an overview of how supporters' generous donations were used last year

ompared to the previous year, 2021 saw an increase in total income and a decrease in total expenditure. Income rose from £398k to £425k, while expenditure fell from £399k to £360k (see pie charts for more detail). The increase in total income was largely due to higher than anticipated giving to the general fund – so thank you for this wonderful surprise! Last year, over 81% of total expenditure went directly towards supporting work in France, benefitting 27 churches/institutions and 33 workers. The Trustees have already identified suitable missionaries and projects to support from surplus reserves for the current year.

Legacy revenue rose last year (from £5k in 2020 to £12k in 2021) which added to our higher-than-anticipated income. Legacies are generally unpredictable, so we never include them in our base plans but, if they arrive, they can make a huge difference going forward - a legacy really is the ultimate gift.

With little scope for advertising etc. last year, we were only able to welcome a limited number of new prayer partners in 2021, though there were still 49 new entries in the database. This year, we're investing particularly in exhibiting with a view to attracting new supporters. We're blessed with fantastically faithful long-term supporters but are conscious of the need to recruit new partners.

A huge thank you to all supporters, old and new, whose prayerful generosity is



helping God's kingdom to grow in France. May He continue to enable and prosper the work through the gifts and prayers of His people!

Student ministry in the **Rhône-Alpes region**

GBU worker Lycia Français reports on her first year in post

Paul Cooke writes: growing up, Lycia spent time in the Perspectives church in Châteauroux where FM Trustees Paul & Marjorie Dowling got to know her well. Through supporting Lycia, FM is renewing its connection with the GBU where Dave Brown served as General Secretary for many years.



Hello, I'm Lycia and I live in Lyon. After doing a year's internship with Christian Unions Ireland in Dublin, I started work last September with the Groupes Bibliques Universitaires (GBU). I'm the coordinator for the Rhône-Alpes region around Lyon and I work with 7 student

groups in Clermont Ferrand, Saint-Étienne,

Valence, Grenoble, and Lyon (+ planting

projects in Chambéry and Annecy).

My role is to train and encourage the leaders of the student groups and to organize weekends away for students to encourage a strong regional dynamic. I also meet every other month in Paris with my colleagues from other regions of France to discuss the movement's projects. When my timetable allows, I take part in local meetings with pastors of churches in the cities mentioned above to discuss how we can best shine God's light in our context.

Although it hasn't always been easy to settle into this **new role** and adjust to the various responsibilities and projects in progress, I praise the Lord for my colleagues and other people that He put on my path to serve Him and persevere together. I've also really seen

God working in students' hearts and people coming to Him through reading His word.

Some of the main challenges we face in student ministry in France right now are due to Covid and French law. The pandemic isolated students and threatened their mental health in significant ways. In France, because of the historic separation of Churches and the State, being a religious society at uni means you have no official status (despite the organisation existing on a national level), so there are very few institutions in France where the local GBU group is recognised as a uni society. This means they can't advertise events in the same way as other societies and most groups have to meet in cafés near the campus or in a student house.

GBU vision/mission

GBU was created in 1943 and is part of the International Fellowship of Evangelical Students (IFES); it's the equivalent of Christian Unions in the UK or InterVarsity in the US. There are about 100 groups in France. As a Christian student organization, our main

priority is to spread the good news of Jesus in French universities. Students are often quite open to discussing their worldview and talking about values, priorities, and what life is about. This is a fluid stage of life for many of them as they move around, go through life transitions, choose a career, decide what to do with their free time, and think about integrating into new communities.

In this context, we see the need to give every student the opportunity to open the Bible (maybe for the first time) and discover who Jesus is. Every year, we see about 1000 students taking part in discussions around the Bible. As students study the Bible together, preconceived ideas about Jesus and the world are challenged and young people are enabled to grow by serving other students on campus and in a local church.

Alongside these standard activities, the GBU offers biblical training, organizes conferences, and runs training camps over the summer. Some of our latest projects include developing international student ministry, youth ministry in high schools, and professional Christian groups enabling believers to think biblically about issues that are linked to a specific field (e.g. teaching, business, healthcare). icture the scene. A mass of bodies glides solemnly around a large hall in pairs. One person in each pair has their eyes shut and their hand rests on the hand of their partner, who is guiding them gently around the room, taking great care not to bump into anyone. At the same time, everyone is singing a haunting gospel song in lightly accented English: "It is I, take courage, don't be afraid." This was one of the **most memorable moments** from the recent annual conference for church leaders in the Perspectives denomination, which Marjorie and I had the privilege of taking part in.

This exercise was in the context of a deep and extended exploration of the passage





in Matthew's Gospel where Jesus comes towards the disciples walking on the water. Pastor and Perspectives Board member, Matthieu Koumarianos, led the delegates into the passage in several stages, using a variety of approaches to uncover the hidden depths of the story. We were invited to ask questions beginning "I wonder...", to look at the events of the story from the perspective of the different participants (including the boat!), and to choose a key word from each verse to make a simple summary of the story. But for me personally it was the trust exercise that touched me most. The discovery that, as the person being guided, it was much easier just to relax, let go, and let the guide



do the work led me to reflect how much simpler our lives might be if we trusted Jesus completely and let Him do the worrying, as it were.

For us it was a particular joy to be present at the Conference, as it was the first time we'd been able to get back to France since our retirement in 2020. There were many joyful reunions with friends and colleagues we'd not seen for two years, especially as we managed in the same trip to visit our former church in Châteauroux.

As well as the Bible exploration and an AGM, the Conference included a selection



of workshops on diverse subjects ranging from the practical, such as church administration in the current legislative climate, to the more pastoral, including one entitled "And if suffering were the greatest blessing?". There was an evening of thanksgiving where new colleagues and Board members were welcomed and retiring members were thanked, including, of course, Patrice Alcindor who has retired as President. A video with dozens of short clips of people saying in different ways "Merci, Patrice" was shown - a moment of great emotion.

There was also plenty of time for chatting and catching up with news over meals and

coffee and outside in the beautiful grounds of the Lycée-Collège-Internat d'Île de France where the Conference was held.

Training the next generation of French gospel workers

Missionary Laura Nelson explains the role of 2 Timothée 2,2

Paul Cooke writes: Laura is based at the Église des Ternes in Paris, a Baptist church with strong links to Perspectives. As FM now helps administer Laura's UK support, I invited her to share a little about her ministry, especially as it resonates so strongly with FM's own Training & Education Fund.

ust over 20 years ago, freshly married, my half-French husband and I attended a France Mission meeting in Gloucestershire where Daniel Liechti (part of the Perspectives' Directorate until 2020) was presenting his research on the need for church-planting in France. We barely needed convincing but relished the discussion with other like-minded Francophiles. We left even more committed to praying for the Lord



to use us, however He might choose, in His glorious kingdom project.

Six months later we'd moved into the 17th arrondissement of Paris and ended up church-planting with the Baptist Association (AEEBLF). Edward worked closely with many FM pastors and had the privilege of inheriting Daniel Liechti's seat on the national evangelical council (CNEF) with a particular role in encouraging national church-planting initiatives. We saw a network of Paris church-plants spring up over 10 years, by God's grace, before the Lord called Edward home in August 2020, aged 45, in a climbing accident.

In the aftermath of that **tragedy**, as all kinds of people reached out and reflected on



Edward's humble but enthusiastic contribution to the work of the gospel here, it became clear that there was an opportunity God was giving us. From the very first year of the

Église des Ternes church-plant we had at least one intern every year. And every year Edward ran a preacher's club to train young men who showed potential. He was convinced that training up the next generation of French gospel workers was a vital priority.

Others shared this conviction and so, on the day of Edward's memorial service, **2 Timothée 2,2** was launched: a foundation committed to helping the next generation train for gospel ministry. Many people in the UK, the US, and France gave and continue to give, and we've been thrilled to

support our first 10 interns in 2020–21. The aim is three-fold:

- Generous bursaries to make the idea of a year's internship a financial possibility.
- A community of support and training to complement what the local church offers.
- A raised awareness in churches, so that training interns and looking out for potential gospel workers becomes a normal and expected part of church life.

It's been a great joy to get to know these young men and women and to host the monthly Zoom training sessions. The latter involve someone with ministry experience here addressing an important topic, hopefully laying foundations for long-term faithful gospel ministry. The Lord is raising up workers for this harvest field. And they're desperately needed. The



CNEF calculated recently that 1000 new pastors will be needed just to replace those heading into retirement. And we all know the crying need for new churches in areas where there's no local church witness.

Please pray for this new movement. There are already more than 15 interns applying for 2021–22, and some of them would not have considered that possible without hearing about 2 Timothée 2,2. As with any new initiative, we need to be careful as we grow, to maintain a clear mission and control the quality of the training and the internships. But we also want to be ambitious. Lord, do more than we ask or imagine! For Your glory, raise up a generation of French men and women who love Your word, preach and live Your grace, and urgently and humbly seek the salvation of those around them.

50 years on: time to take stock

Peter & Rachel Calvert reflect on Romorantin's 50th anniversary

In 1971, the main employer of the town of Romorantin, capital of the very rural Sologne region of central France, was the motor manufacturer Matra, famous for its sports cars that would go on to win the Le Mans 24-hour race three years running from 1972. 50 years on, all that remains of Matra in Romorantin is a museum to former glories. But the evangelical church founded in that year by a team of Canadian missionaries is still going.

It's had its ups and downs, but over the weekend of 11–12 June this year we had the privilege of celebrating 50 years of God's faithfulness to our church in the presence of one of those original Canadian church-planters, **Henry Friesen**, who'd crossed the Atlantic especially for the occasion. He recounted to us the early

history of the church, beginning with the first evangelistic meetings, held in a marquee on a patch of waste ground. On the Sunday morning, new Perspectives President Patrice Niveaux joined us, along with several other old friends of the church, for

a thanksgiving service.

Anniversaries are a good opportunity to seek to raise the profile of the church by inviting the mayor (to whom we presented a Bible) and the press. They are also punctuation points that encourage





us to take stock of where we are at. The church leadership team in Romorantin is doing this at the moment by going through an evaluation process, organised by Perspectives, based on a detailed questionnaire covering all aspects of church life. We value your prayers for this: that the Holy Spirit would use it to guide us according to His priorities. 50 years on, the church is still going, but far too many people in this corner of France still live and die without hearing the good news of Jesus communicated to them in a meaningful way.



Missionary Simon Allchin underlines the value of collaboration

arseille is France's second largest city, with a population of 871,000. However, it only has 25 evangelical churches: a ratio of 1 for every 35,000 people – a long way short of the "1pour10,000" aimed at by CNEF (National Council of French Evangelicals). The upside of this is that there are many shared activities done through different networks of Christians in the city.

This first photo comes from our sister Perspectives Church in the **Saint-Just** area of the city. With the help of two American missionary families, they've just opened a sort of **day centre** near one of Marseille's métro stations where people can drop in to



have a coffee, play table tennis, bring their laptops, talk about the Christian faith etc.

This centre is a real blessing for the churches and offers a chance to bring the gospel message into the heart of a very busy city.

The next photo (apologies for the camera wobble!) is of a **prayer meeting** we had in June with other churches from the north of Marseille. We often meet up as a network



of local churches and are currently thinking about inviting an Algerian Christian music group to do a series of outreach events in the area before the end of the year. This is an important prayer subject, as about 60% of the population around us is of North African origin.

Finally, here's the **joint service** we had at Chante-Colline (a Christian centre in the hills above the city) in June, during a day

out with the other Perspectives Churches in the Marseille area. Please do pray for us all as we seek to serve Christ and make Him



known in this spiritually needy city.


