The Cree People loved the Buffalo and the Buffalo loved the Cree.

Today education is our New Buffalo. We now rely on our education to provide our food, clothing and shelter. We are now developing new skills from our education in order to survive and succeed in the modern world. Our educational training and university degrees shall sustain us, our families and our people in the same way the Buffalo sustained us in the days of our Ancestors.

The Onion Lake Education Trust Fund has been established and designed to provide for the present and future generations of the Onion Lake Cree Nation. The Trust Fund has been developed to assist us like the herds of Buffalo did for countless generations.

The Buffalo are our brothers and sisters. They talk to us and if we listen, we can hear them.

The high level of inflation we are experiencing in Canada presently also creates financial hardship on our students struggling to get by.

For the past four years OLETF has done an incredible job in filling this financial gap for our students attending at the trade, college and university levels. I would also like to sincerely thank our many corporate and individual sponsors in providing their support so our students can achieve their highest potential.

OLETF has become an important institution of the OLCN. The Board of Trustees together with Chief and Council are exploring ways that can strengthen the financial position of the Trust so that it will be in a position to assist our students in the decades to come.

MESSAGE FROM CHAIRMAN MATTHEW FOX

As Chairman of the Onion Lake Education Trust Fund, it is my honour to report to the Onion Lake Cree Nation membership on the activities of the Board of Trustees for fiscal year 2021-2022, our fourth year of operation.

To say the past year was challenging is truly an understatement. The COVID-19 pandemic drastically changed all of our lives. I am pleased to report that OLETF was able to carry out its mission to encourage and assist financially, qualifying students at the post-secondary level without interruption.

With our on-line student application process entirely done through the internet and with the support of a comprehensive database, we were able to assist and support a large number of students with scholarships for the 2021-2022 fiscal year. During the fiscal year OLETF Board of Trustees awarded 79 scholarships to qualifying Onion Lake students with a value of \$82,000. Since OLETF began operating in 2018, we have now provided 299 scholarships



with a value of over \$250,000. This entire amount has gone directly to our students through the generous support of our corporate and individual donors and OLETF funds.

Although the OLETF is not endowed with a great deal of trust capital, the Board of Trustees retained an investment management firm to invest our trust funds for the long-term. Our goal is to grow the trust capital so that it can produce trust

income for student scholarships and awards. I am pleased to report that our investment firm Leith Wheeler posted an annual return of 14.7% as at March 31, 2022. The rate of return since inception (2020) is 18.9%.

OLETF is off to a strong start, however much more work is required. In 2022, Trustees met with Chief and Council to discuss proposals that address the long-term sustainability of the OLETF from a financial vantage point.

Chief and Council offered their full support to OLETF and the Board of Trustees will work on this matter throughout the 2022-2023 fiscal year to increase the financial viability of the Trust Fund.

OLETF continues to be a force of positive change and encouragement of postsecondary education for our Nation members. I want to acknowledge our students for all of their hard work, discipline and dedication towards their education in another exceptional and challenging year. I also want to express my sincere gratitude to each OLETF Trustee for their invaluable insight and guidance, and acknowledge the important and early contributions of Pauline Muskego and Delia Harper who retired from our Board in 2021.

Each year the OLETF grows a little stronger which reinforces our commitment to Onion Lake students pursuing their dreams for their education goals. With this focus we know we are creating a Nation that will thrive and prosper

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Onion Lake Education Trust Fund Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees is required to administer the Onion Lake Education Trust Fund in the best interests of the Onion Lake Cree Nation and its members with care, skill and caution. The Trustees must act honestly and in good faith with a view to the best interests of the Trust. keeping in mind the beneficiaries of the Trust are both present and future generations of the Onion Lake Cree Nation.

OLETF Trust Deed. These include the duties and responsibilities to carry out the purpose of the Trust and to encourage, support and provide supplementary financial assistance to qualifying Onion Lake members attending fulltime accredited post-secondary education institutions. The Board is responsible for all financial and administrative aspects of the Trust Fund and operates independently of Chief and Council. Onion Lake Education and the Onion Lake Administration.

The Board is made up of experienced individuals with expertise in education, board governance, policy making, finance, investments and student needs.

In accordance with the Trust Deed, the five (5) Trustees serve a three (3) year term and were appointed by Onion Lake Chief and Council on September 10, 2021.

The Trustees' overall management and administrative functions are defined by the

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

The Onion Lake Education Trust Fund represents a new era for the Onion Lake Cree Nation, a means of ensuring support and supplemental financial assistance for Onion Lake students attending post-secondary studies. The OLETF is a perpetual Trust that is established for both present and future generations of Onion Lake students.


Throughout the 2021-2022 fiscal year the Trustees were very active and carried out the following:

- Board of Trustees meetings were held in March and October 2021 and January and February 2022. Detailed minutes were taken at every meeting and copies are available to any Onion Lake member.
- The Board members discharged their duties and responsibilities as Trustees and focused on strengthening all administrative functions of the Trust. The Board continued its engagement with the experienced management consulting firm Munro & Associates Inc. to assist in the ongoing administration of the Trust with the financial assistance of the Onion Lake Cree Nation.

- During the year the Board reviewed a number of comprehensive written policies to provide clear rules for the management of the Trust Fund.
- The Board of Trustees authorized the establishment of an OLETF database system. The database is an effective and efficient way to keep track of all the information on scholarship applicants and recipients each year. In addition, the database contains information in relation to sponsors, amounts, stipulations and other information. This important tool assists the Board and administrative staff to maintain continuity and consistency in its business and administrative affairs involving the Trust Fund.
- The accounting firm MNP LLP was engaged as independent external auditor for the 2021-2022 financial statements of the Trust.
- The Board of Trustees OLETF's website was updated during the year and allows for students to apply online for scholarships.
 The website provides all types of information about OLETF to Onion Lake members and the public (www.oletf.ca).

Inspiring Today's Students to be Tomorrow's Leaders

- During the fiscal year the Board of Trustees awarded forty-two (42) scholarships for Fall Semester 2021 and thirty-six (36) scholarships for Winter Semester 2022 to qualifying Onion Lake post-secondary students ranging from \$500 to \$2,500 each.
- The Board of Trustees set aside \$50,000 as Trust Capital during the first year of operation. Under the Trust Deed, Trust Capital can never be spent and only Trust Revenue can be used to operate the OLETF. The Board of Trustees retained the well-known investment firm Leith Wheeler Investment Counsel. This was done in order to set the stage to grow Trust Capital and create a revenue stream. During the fiscal year OLETF Trust Capital grew to a total of \$68,706 with a rate of return of 0% for the fiscal year March 31, 2022. The Trustees are hopeful that additional Capital will flow to OLETF in order to grow the Trust to meet the needs of students, keep pace with a fast-growing population and protect the funds from inflation.
- Since the beginning of OLETF, the Board of Trustees have encouraged and financially assisted two hundred and niney-nine (299) Onion Lake Cree Nation students with scholarships with a total value of \$254,000.
- OLETF was most grateful to secure additional funding once again through the Onion Lake Lands Department and their consultation process with third parties. Funds are provided for educational purposes to the Nation by various energy companies doing business on the traditional lands of the Onion Lake Cree Nation.
- Throughout the year the Board continued to develop a program to attract corporations and individuals to donate funds for student scholarships. The Board of Trustees has been able to secure annual and one-time funding from seventeen (17) generous groups totaling over \$53,000.



Linette Fox was hired as OLETF's part-time administrative assistant and bookkeeper in 2019. Linette comes to OLETF with over fifteen years of experience in accounts payable, rent rolls, data entry and a wide variety of administrative matters. She assists the Trustees with student applications, student scholarships, database, bookkeeping and general management of OLETF. She is a very important asset to the organization.

Onion Lake Education Trust Fund

A Year in Review


We entered 2021 optimistic there was good value in our portfolios, but we would not have predicted just how strong a year it turned out to be. North American markets performed extremely well with the S&P/TSX Composite (TSX) up 25.1% and the S&P 500 up 27.8% in Canadian Dollar terms. International markets also had a good year with the MSCI EAFE index increasing 10.5%.

The Trust's Canadian stocks had a very successful year led by companies like Tourmaline Oil, which continued its strong run of performance, ending the vear up 146.5%. In the Materials sector both Nutrien (+49.6%) and First Quantum (+32.3%) performed well, while being out of gold companies also benefitted the Trust's portfolio as the sub-sector was down -9.6% in 2021. In the US, the Trust's investments ended up performing roughly in line with a very robust market, while its international equity portfolio also had a decent year. In fixed income, returns were negative in 2021, but we did see a rebound late in the year. Overall, the Trust's portfolio increased 14.7% in 2021.

Outlook for returns in 2022 continues to be constructive but acknowledge that there is a likely need to temper expectations given the strength in 2021. Across the Trust's equity portfolios, businesses have shown an ability to navigate through the pandemic and are trading at lower valuations than the markets, boding well for performance going forward. Many companies are positioned to handle higher inflation should it continue, due to pricing power and the ability to pass higher costs on to their customers. On the bond side, we expect bond yields to continue to rise slowly as longer-term inflation pressures moderate. Bonds will contribute positive returns to balanced portfolios over the longterm, while providing liquidity (cash) and diversification, particularly during times of elevated market volatility.

OLETF Portfolio Asset Mix

Onion Lake Education Trust Fund's portfolio ended 2021 overweight in stocks relative to its benchmark. This was largely a product of stocks outperforming bonds in the latter half of 2021.

MOST COMMONLY ASKED QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Regarding the Onion Lake Education Trust Fund

WHAT IS THE ONION LAKE EDUCATION TRUST FUND?

A It is an independent Trust Fund established in 2018 by the Onion Lake Cree Nation Chief and Council to assist and recognize qualifying Onion Lake Students financially through incentives, scholarships and award programs at the post-secondary education level. The Trust Fund will provide funding in addition to other financial assistance received by students such as Indigenous Services Canada government funding, student loans, and parental contributions.

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE ONION LAKE EDUCATION TRUST FUND?

A The purpose and mission of the Onion Lake Education Trust is to assist and encourage in the educational development of the human resources of the Onion Lake Cree Nation with the view for members to successfully complete their education at the trades, college and university levels and obtain a profession, occupation or skill that will benefit themselves and in turn Onion Lake Cree Nation as a whole.

HOW ARE THE BOARD OF TRUEES APPOINTED?

A Under the trust deed, the Onion Lake Chief and Council have the authority to appoint individuals to be Trustees of the OLETF to three (3) year terms. The terms of the present trustees expire in 2024. Chief and Council will make new appointments and/or re-appointments for Trustees of OLETF.

WHAT ARE THE RULES THAT GOVERN THE ONION LAKE EDUCATION TRUST FUND?

A First and foremost is the OLETF trust deed which is the primary document that sets out the overall rules for the operation and must be followed at all times by the Board of Trustees. Copy of the trust deed is available to all Onion Lake members and posted on the OLETF website.

In addition to the trust deed, the Board of Trustees has and will develop detailed written policies in all areas of the administration and financial operations of the Trust including student incentives, scholarships and awards.

The Board of Trustees must also publish an annual report each year for distribution to the membership detailing their activity during the year and must include audited financial statements.

HOW MUCH MONEY DOES ONION LAKE EDUCATION TRUST FUND HAVE AND CAN IT BE SPENT?

A No, not all the money can be spent. The Trustees can only expend Trust Revenue generated from the Trust Capital. They can expend funds provided directly through donations for scholarships. The capital base of the Trust Fund, which is presently only \$68,500, is held forever in trust for educational purposes for Onion Lake Cree Nation members and can never be spent. It is hoped that Trust Capital of the OLETF will grow to millions of dollars over time in order to support all post-secondary students and take into account Onion Lake Cree Nation's fast-growing population.

ARE THE INVESTMENTS MADE WITH TRUST FUNDS SAFE?

A The Board of Trustees manages the Trust Fund's investments to earn the best possible rate of return consistent with safety. The trust deed itself sets the strict boundaries and restrictions for the types of investments that can be made. Trust Capital of the OLETF is presently invested in a conservative portfolio of stocks and bonds with the well-known investment firm Leith Wheeler Investment Counsel. Quarterly reports from the investment manager are available to Onion Lake members.

WHICH STUDENTS QUALIFY UNDER ONION LAKE EDUCATION TRUST FUND POLICIES?

A Onion Lake students who are accepted to or attending accredited post-secondary educational institutions on a full-time basis for technical trades, college and university programs. The student's name must also appear on the membership list controlled by the Onion Lake Cree Nation to qualify under the Trust. Restrictions apply since the Onion Lake Trust Fund trust funds are limited, so only scholarships are provided at this time.

DOES THE TRUST FUND PAY FOR TUITION, BOOKS, ACCOMODATION, TRAVEL AND SUPPLIES?

A No. The Trust Fund will only provide general financial support through incentives, scholarships, and awards to qualifying Onion Lake students. The Government of Canada through the Department of Indigenous & Northern Affairs Canada ("INAC") has a first-line Treaty obligation and trust responsibility for the payment of tuition, accommodation, travel, books and supplies for Onion Lake students.

Funding from OLETF is only supplementary to any financial support from INAC through Onion Lake's Post-Secondary Office or elsewhere.

ARE THERE ANY SCHOLARSHIPS CURRENTLY AVAILABLE FOR ONION LAKE STUDENTS?

A Yes. The OLETF has developed a scholarship program for Onion Lake post-secondary students. Through the generous support of its sponsors, the Board of Trustees has now secured funds for numerous scholarships from \$500 to \$2,500 that will be provided to successful applicants attending full-time accredited post-secondary institutions in Canada in the Fall and Winter semesters.

It is hoped that many more scholarships, awards and incentives for Onion Lake students can be offered in the future as the OLETF Scholarship Program grows.

♦ HOW CAN STUDENTS FIND OUT IF THEY QUALIFY?

A Students need to read the policy guidelines and will also need to fill out a scholarship application form online. They may also be required to supply the Onion Lake Education Trust Fund with additional documents such as letter of acceptance, transcripts and other information in accordance with prescribed rules and deadlines.

Students can apply online for scholarships awarded during the Fall and Winter semesters. Application, deadlines, guidelines and policies can be viewed on the OLETF website at www.OLETF.ca

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Members of Onion Lake Cree Nation:

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Onion Lake Education Trust Fund (the "Trust"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2022 and the statements of operations and changes in accumulated trust income and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial statements have been prepared by management of Onion Lake Education Trust Fund in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the Onion Lake Cree Nation Education Trust Deed (the "Trust Deed").

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements of the Trust for the year ended March 31, 2022, are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the Trust Deed.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those

standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Trust in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution and Use

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared to assist the Trust to comply with the financial reporting requirements of the Trust Deed. As a result, the financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose. Our report is intended solely for the Members of Onion Lake Cree Nation and should not be distributed to, or used by, parties other than the Members of Onion Lake Cree Nation. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon, in the 2022 Annual Report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information identified above and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

We obtained the 2022 Annual Report prior to the date of this auditor's report. If, based on the work we have performed on this other information, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact in this auditor's report. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the Trust Deed, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the

economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

Our governance framework serves the interests of Onion Lake members with the highest standards of responsibility, integrity and commitment to promote and enhance the post-secondary education experience of our students now and in the future. These standards are developed and implemented by our Board of Trustees.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended March 31, 2022

1. Nature of the organization

Onion Lake Education Trust Fund (the "Trust") was established by the Onion Lake Cree Nation on January 23, 2018 to provide limited supplementary financial assistance to qualifying Onion Lake Cree Nation members through incentives and scholarships and to assist in other educational endeavours. This assistance is supplementary to the obligations of the Government of Canada. It is the position of the Trust that it is exempt from tax for income tax purposes based on advanced tax rulings for similar entities.

2. Significant accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies set out below to comply with the financial reporting requirements prescribed by the Onion Lake Cree Nation Education Trust Deed. The policies are:

Trust Capital

The Trust Capital is subject to the terms and conditions of the Trust which requires the Trustees to hold and preserve the Trust Capital and to apply Trust Income in accordance with the purpose of the Trust.

Trust Capital is defined in the Trust Deed as "all money and property of every nature and kind donated and conveyed or transferred to the Trustees for the Trust Purpose by Onion Lake Cree Nation Chief and Council, the Onion Lake Cree Nation, or by any other person, entity or government and designated

by them as Trust Capital and includes all capital gains less all capital losses ever accrued or realized upon such Trust Capital."

Revenue recognition

Trust Income "means all income of every nature earned, accrued or realized upon the Trust Capital and all monies and property donated, conveyed or transferred by Onion Lake Cree Nation Chief and Council or by any other person, entity or government and not designated by them as Trust Capital."

Trust Income is recognized on an accrual basis.

Investments

Investments are portfolio investments recorded at fair value. Fair value is determined by published price quotations and adjustments to fair value are immediately recognized in the deficiency of revenue over expenses.

They have been classified as long-term assets in concurrence with the nature of the investment.

3. Investments

The Trust has investments of \$45,038 (2021 - \$40,132) in equities, \$20,486 (2021 - \$20,821) in fixed income and \$2,038 (2021 - \$2,151) in cash and short term investments as at March 31, 2022.
