#### FROM THE CHAIR

#### The Prince and the Potoroo

The recent death of HRH the Duke of Edinburgh jogged my memory of the events leading to the establishment of the Two Peoples Bay Nature Reserve in the 1960s, and to the eventual rediscovery of Gilbert's Potoroo. The WA government was close to approving a townsite at Two Peoples Bay by 1961 when a population of the Noisy Scrub-bird, long presumed extinct, was found on Mt Gardner. Word of this reached Prince Philip, an avid bird watcher, who asked the government to reconsider the townsite development. The intervention was successful & the government abandoned the project. Two Peoples Bay Nature Reserve, covering nearly 5,000 ha, was established in 1966, and the Prince subsequently became president of the Australian Conservation Foundation for 5 years.

This action also unwittingly saved Gilbert's Potoroo from extinction. Had the development gone ahead (and especially without all the environmental safeguards in place today), the only surviving potoroo population would surely have disappeared.

I don't know if Prince Philip ever learned that he had unwittingly helped to save Gilbert's Potoroo from extinction. In 2005, my wife Elizabeth and I were invited to a reception for the Prince of Wales at Government House. Unfortunately we didn't have a chance to talk to him but I had intended to ask him to pass on our thanks to his father for inadvertently helping to save the potoroo in the early 1960s. In 2015 then GPAG Chair, Ron Dorn, contacted Prince Charles prior to his visit to Albany, in the hope of raising awareness of the plight of the potoroo. The Albany Advertiser published a short article about GPAG's Royal

Plea which at the time of publication had not received a response <a href="https://www.albanyadvertiser.com.au/news/wa/">https://www.albanyadvertiser.com.au/news/wa/</a> royal-plea-for-potoroo-ng-ya-394731. A very pleasant and supportive reply was however later received but it was unfortunately not possible to organise a visit to Two Peoples Bay as part of Prince Charles' schedule.

In the Duke of Edinburgh's passing we mourn the loss of a champion of Australian conservation and perhaps the most influential person indirectly involved in the eventual rescue of Gilbert's Potoroo.

#### **UPDATE: REDUCING PYTHON IMPACTS ON GILBERT'S POTOROOS**

GPAG have kindly supported ongoing research on ways to reduce Carpet Python predation of Gilbert's Potoroo with funding to refurbish python transmitters, helping with vehicle hire costs and voluntary assistance during python radio-tracking and searches. Carpet Pythons (photo of a large female in Waychinicup NP above) occur long the South Coast of WA and in some places can be quite abundant. They eat a variety of vertebrates, unfortunately including some endangered species. So, I beg forgiveness on their behalf; they are not savvy about the perils that face these species and are just doing what comes naturally!

Research has focused on understanding which python cohorts are eating potoroos and the best ways we can find and move these pythons so they will not impact on the small and highly localized mainland populations of Gilbert's Potoroo. Alan Danks, Leigh Whisson, Dylan Lehmann, Mark True and I along with GPAG volunteers searched on foot and along tracks in a 4WD both during the day and at night and radiotracked male pythons in the spring breeding season to locate adult females and other males. We relocated two adult females and one juvenile female away from the enclosure in December and work is continuing. The adult females have proven to be the major (only?) python culprits in eating potoroos as the males are too small to swallow a sizeable potoroo. Along the way, we have also collected interesting information about python ecology, especially habitat preferences, movements, reproductive behaviour and diet.

#### **VOLUNTEERING**

#### \*IMPORTANT REMINDER ABOUT VOLUNTEERING\*

#### All volunteers require a DBCA Dieback Green Card

To comply with DBCA requirements, all volunteers working with GPAG on our various field projects are required to complete Dieback Green Card training. The training can be done at home and takes about an hour to complete. The card can then be either posted out or collected at the DBCA office in Albany. If you think that you might be interested in volunteering sometime in the future, even if you are not planning to immediately, it is a good idea to complete your training and get your Green Card as soon as possible so that you are able to participate at short notice when opportunities arise or you are available. #### Fourth (and final) Quarterly Fungi Survey

Our fourth, and final, quarterly fungi survey was completed on November 26 by fungi specialist Katie Syme assisted by volunteers Linda Matthews, Robin Budden, Leigh Whisson and Jackie Courtenay. As it was the final survey for the project, all the tags and marker posts were removed at the same time as completing the surveys. Unfortunately after the extremely dry October, and despite having a team of 5 people searching, no truffle-like fungi or even above ground fungi were found during this final survey. This was both disappointing and a bit concerning although we can be sure that Potoroos will be much better at finding truffle-like fungi than we are!! Katie Syme is continuing to work on previous samples that were collected during the earlier surveys, including looking for and identifying fungal spores found in a Potoroo scat collected in July 2020 that DBCA provided to her to analyse. Samples of the fungi that Katie collected in earlier surveys have been sent to A/Prof Parwinder Kaur at UWA/DNAZoo for genetic analysis and we look forward to reporting on the results of that work by the end of the year.

Thanks again to Katie Syme, all our volunteers throughout the four surveys & DBCA staff, especially Grantly Morton, Senior Ranger at Two Peoples Bay, for their help, and to State NRM for funding the project.

#### Feral predator monitoring

Our first field trip replacing camera batteries and SD cards was completed with DBCA staff on December 23, 2020 and DBCA are now in the process of setting up an online system to enable people to check and identify the photos on the retrieved SD cards. This analysis work will also require the help of volunteers and we already have a number of people who have expressed interest in being involved when the system is up and running. We are hoping this will be ready for analysis to start in the next couple of months. Both the old and new cameras will continue running side by side until the first photos are analysed to determine that the images obtained from the new cameras (which are a newer model with different specifications) are comparable with the old cameras to ensure continuity in the data.

Thanks to GPAG volunteers Georgina Steytler and David Wettenhall for their hard work helping Sarah Comer and Abby Thomas from DBCA with servicing the cameras. This project is funded by our Large State NRM Community Stewardship grant.

#### **Vegetation Surveys at Two Peoples Bay**

Work still needs to be completed on the vegetation surveys at Two Peoples Bay. Seven of the sixteen required transects have been completed so there are still nine to go to finish the data collection phase of this project. Unfortunately botanist Dr Ellen Hickman is no longer available for this project and the surveys are now being led by Leigh Whisson with help from other botanists as they are available. As noted in the previous newsletter, results of the surveys will enable us to compare the vegetation as it is now, 5 years

since the catastrophic 2015 fire at Two Peoples Bay, with how it was in August 1996 to see how the vegetation structure or species composition has changed. This will provide some information on the recovery of the habitat since the fire. The results may also be compared with data collected by Sarah Vetten on the habitat use of the Potoroos to see how the current

vegetation structure compares with that which the Potoroos were using in 1996. #### **Chasing Pythons and Checking Cameras**

On 9 December, 2020, my husband Chris and I joined David Pearson to monitor the carpet pythons in the Waychinicup enclosure. We spent a wonderful morning searching through the scrub looking for carpet pythons who proved to be most cryptic! It was so fascinating to know that a python was in a small clump of vegetation that for all intents and purposes looked devoid of wildlife! A careful parting of vegetation by David revealed an extremely large female about to slough (see photos below left "We know you're in there somewhere" and below centre "There you are!". All photos in this piece by Georgina Steytler).

Our second python for the day was a male (David pointed out that the males only grow to about half the size of the females) who was found in dense scrub climbing through the branches. I felt extremely privileged when, whilst waiting for David to record the data, the male slid onto the ground and around my shoes before disappearing stealthily into the bush again (see photo below right "Well hello...").







My next excursion was in late December to help DBCA swap out camera batteries and cards for remote cameras in Two Peoples Bay. Sarah Comer drew the short straw and had me for 4-5 hours during which time not even fighting our way through some dense scrub managed to stop me from asking the 5 million questions I had always wanted to ask an expert! Getting out into these special reserves and experiencing them as a ranger might is such a privilege. Knowing that you are doing your bit to help to save a critically endangered animal is the cherry on top.


#### **Awareness Raising**


