#### **Happy Birthday GPAG!!**


There has been an enormous amount of activity since the last newsletter, as you will see on the following pages. The South Coast Threatened Species Forum in early December, organised by Jackie Courtenay, was a highlight of the year — an outstanding success. Scientists and volunteers from around WA and interstate came together to present and discuss their work in the conservation of many endangered species over the course of a weekend and many useful inter-group contacts were made. I had the joy of a reunion with a former fellow postgraduate student I hadn't seen for more than forty years, and who now chairs the Friends of the Western Ground Parrot group. Participants also really enjoyed the dinner to celebrate the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of GPAG on the Saturday evening and the conservation-themed harbour cruise on the Sunday afternoon.

There is always a danger that single-species action groups like GPAG may lose sight of what else is happening in threatened species conservation. There is so much to do, and so much focus is needed on the task of preventing just one species going extinct, that we risk losing contact with other groups with similar aims. This is the benefit of such forums - we can learn from each other what works in fundraising, public awareness and volunteering programmes, and what doesn't. There is plenty of scope for cooperation and coordination if groups like ours take more interest in each other – something I want to pursue.

This was the second such forum that we have organised, and I really hope that we can repeat it in 2023 and that it will become a biennial fixture in the south coast threatened species community. The feedback we received from attendees indicated a strong desire for this. My thanks to the organising committee: Jackie, Leigh and Jen, for a superb effort.

And now we are 20 years old! Happy birthday GPAG.

#### **UPDATE: WAYCHINICUP POTOROO SURVEY: DECEMBER 2021**

The Gilbert's potoroo enclosure in Waychinicup National Park was completed in 2008 and potoroos first released there in March 2010, following an intensive baiting and trapping campaign to ensure that no foxes or cats remained inside. Funding of close to \$750,000, for the construction of an enclosure to support a new potoroo colony, was provided in 2006 by the WA State Government under a new scheme entitled the Biodiversity Conservation Initiative. The 8.2-km fence surrounds an area of 380 hectares of diverse vegetation, including an 80-hectare patch of the *Melaleuca striata* heathland on granite soils so favoured by potoroos at Two Peoples Bay.

The most important outcome of the enclosure project has been the establishment of a stable new population of Gilbert's potoroos, at a time when the species existed only at Two Peoples Bay and on Bald Island. The Waychinicup potoroos took on even more significance after the loss of the Two Peoples Bay population due the catastrophic 2015 fire. In recent times, however, there has been concern about the impact of python predation at the Waychinicup site: approval was subsequently given for the removal of large pythons inside the fence to distant parts of the National Park. Another significant outcome has been the demonstration that potoroos can live in a range of vegetation types present in the enclosure.

A new monitoring round in the Waychinicup potoroo enclosure commenced in the week beginning 13<sup>th</sup> December. This round, requiring four weeks' trapping throughout the enclosure, will be the first systematic trapping there since March 2020. The first week's trapping was carried out by Tony Friend, assisted on different days by GPAG members Ken Bushell, David Wettenhall and Kathryn Greenop. Thirty cage traps on three traplines at the western end of the enclosure were set on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> and checked each morning for four days.

The trapping team needs to arrive at the first trapline at first light so that all animals are released as early in the day as possible. We met at 4 am each day to head out to the enclosure. The results of the week's exercise made these early starts worthwhile, with 12 individual potoroos recorded, comprising five males and seven females. Six were new animals, all bred and born on site and not previously trapped. An old male captured this week was first trapped as

a subadult in August 2012, so he is aged over 10 years, around the maximum age of any Gilbert's potoroo recorded in the wild so far!

One of the females was carrying a medium-sized pouch young, while another had evidence of recent weaning. A variety of other species was seen in traps during the week, including good numbers of quenda. A large male ringtail possum was an unusual capture, while reptiles caught included bobtails, a King's skink and a Rosenberg's monitor. #### **VOLUNTEERING**

#### \*IMPORTANT REMINDER ABOUT VOLUNTEERING\*

#### All volunteers require a DBCA Dieback Green Card

Sorry to keep reiterating this but to comply with DBCA requirements, all volunteers working with GPAG on our various field projects are required to complete Dieback Green Card training. The training can be done at home and takes about an hour to complete. The card can then be either posted out or collected at the DBCA office in Albany. If you think that you might be interested in volunteering sometime in the future, even if you are not planning to immediately, it is a good idea to complete your training and get your Green Card as soon as possible so that you are able to participate at short notice when opportunities arise or you are available. #### **Feral predator monitoring**

The third field trip replacing batteries and SD cards in the cameras for feral predator monitoring at Two Peoples Bay was completed on December 15 with Abby Thomas and Mark Blythman from DBCA. For various reasons the field work unfortunately had to be organised at quite short notice so no GPAG volunteers were available to help out. One university student volunteer, Kathy Nikos, did however participate along with two rangers from the Southern Aboriginal Corporation, Brian Colbung and Jyrin Woods. As of next year, it is intended that camera servicing will be undertaken three times per year and it is hoped that the Zooniverse system for image analysis will be up and running in the next few months ready for volunteers all over the world to help with sorting through and analysing the images.

Thank you everyone for your hard work. The cameras for this project were funded by GPAG's Large State NRM Community Stewardship grant. The next service is expected in autumn and we will notify members by email to organise volunteers as soon as dates are confirmed with DBCA.



#### Perth Launch of One Potoroo: A Story of Survival: October 23

This second book launch of *One Potoroo* for interested people in Perth was held in the Carnaby Room at Moerlina School, Mt Claremont on Saturday October 23 from 2:30pm. It was attended by a small but very engaged group of 23 adults and children. Similar to the launch in Albany on October 2 the event involved a reading of the book, this time by GPAG Chair Alan Needham, followed by a talk by Dr Tony Friend, Research Associate at DBCA about his experiences of the catastrophic 2015



#### South Coast Threatened Species Forum 2021: December 4 - 5

Our peak event for 2021, the South Coast Threatened Species Forum, was held at the Dog Rock Convention Centre on December 4-5 to celebrate both the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the creation of GPAG at a public meeting in November 2001 and 60 years since the rediscovery of the Noisy Scrub-bird that led to the protection of Two Peoples Bay as a Nature Reserve and inadvertently to the protection of Gilbert's Potoroo. In line with the celebration of 20 years of GPAG, the theme of the 1.5 day Forum was Volunteering in Conservation to showcase the many and varied ways that community members and volunteers can be and are involved in conservation work.

The Forum began on Saturday morning with Menang Elder Vernice Gillies giving a beautiful Welcome to Country and talk about Indigenous conservation and

the importance of reading Boodja (Country). It was then officially opened via video presentation by Dr Fiona Fraser, the Acting Threatened Species Commissioner.

The Forum itself was attended by nearly 70 people on both the Saturday and Sunday and 26 speakers presented their work. Most of the speakers attended in person but we also had six video presentations from people in Melbourne, Adelaide, Perth and Esperance who were unable to make it to Albany for various reasons. Several of the video speakers did, however, make themselves

Saturday's Forum was followed by a truffle themed dinner held at the historic Albany Club to celebrate GPAG's 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary. GPAG Secretary Jen Merritt created beautiful watercolours of threatened species from the Albany region to decorate the tables. Everyone was so relaxed that, other than Jen who took a photograph of the table settings, we all forgot to take any photos of the dinner! Thanks particularly to the Albany Club volunteers for all their help both organising the logistics of the dinner and helping us get the tables set up ready on Friday night so we didn't have to rush arranging tables on Saturday. Tony Friend gave two informal presentations during the cruise talking about the challenges of finding suitable locations for safe havens for Gilbert's Potoroo and, as we cruised past Michaelmas Island, explaining the different habitat types on the island, and which the Potoroos had preferred during their short stay there in 2016 following the catastrophic 2015 Two Peoples Bay fire. We were extremely lucky with the weather which, although it looked a bit threatening at times, allowed us to get out to Michaelmas Island and to enjoy a generally calm cruise.


