## Florida SNAPshot **May 2022**

The Florida SNAPshot provides an overview of Florida SNAP including key facts about who participates in SNAP, their benefits, and the importance of the program to the state's economy.



12.8% of Floridians (roughly 2.8 million persons) participate in SNAP, including children, seniors, and people with disabilities.\*

> 35% of households have children. Children make up 40% of all participants.






40% of households have a member who is a senior.

> 316,000 SNAP participants have disabilities, including 255,000 non-senior participants and 62,000 children.

107,606 veterans participate in SNAP— 7.6% of all Florida veterans.

Households are from all races and ethnicities: 25.5% Black, 31.0% Hispanic, 1.9% Other Race, and 33.4% white.

The average SNAP household size is 2 persons.

> 80.3% of households have at least one member who worked in the past year.





SNAP reaches those most in need. 77.1% of households have incomes at or below the federal poverty level (FPL) and 29.4% live below half of the FPL which is \$18,130 in 2022 for a family of 2, the size of the average SNAP household.

> **SNAP lifted 121,760 families** out of poverty in 2019.





The average monthly SNAP allotment per person is \$126.91 (or \$1.30) per meal) provided through Electronic Benefit Transfer cards.

SNAP is a boon to Florida's economy. Every dollar of SNAP generates at least \$1.50 in total economic activity, even in a weak economy.





14,727 of Florida's retail stores accept SNAP. Stores that accept SNAP can be found here.

> In the past year, the number of Florida households participating in SNAP has decreased by 18.1 percent.





Floridians can apply in several ways. They can apply electronically from a computer or by completing a paper application that can be mailed, faxed, or returned in person to the **Department of Children and Families.**
