Major challenges to operating a transit system that meets the needs of the community

#### **JOB ACCESS**

Only 22.5% of jobs on average in our region are accessible by a 90-min. bus commute

#### UNSUSTAINABLE

\$165M deficit over the next 10 years due to their unsustainable funding model

#### **HUB AND SPOKE**

SORTA's hub-and-spoke model means long trip times and transfers downtown

### The State of Local Infrastructure

Our local infrastructure is in desperate need of investment

#### **CRUMBLING BRIDGES**

38 functionally obsolete or structurally deficient bridges in Hamilton County, including the Western Hills Viaduct

#### **NEEDED ROAD REPAIRS**

Nearly 1000 lane miles in Cincinnati and half of County-maintained roads rated fair or worse

#### **INCREASING COSTS**

The cost to resurface streets has increased by more than 60% in the last four years







# The Opportunity

Two elections, the first to repeal the City's earnings tax dedicated to transit, contingent on the second, to replace it with a 0.8% sales tax in Hamilton County to reinvest in our transportation system.









- <u>Late evening</u>: Order signed by health director to close polling locations

#### March 25:

 General Assembly passes legislation to extend voting by mail through April 28th

#### May 19:

Election results must be finalized


