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Survey Methodology

These are the results of an online survey conducted between September 10th 2021 and September 12th, 2021, consisting of two samples merged together.

Method: The main sample was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. All of INNOVATIVE's core tracking questions were asked of the main sample. The secondary sample was conducted with sample from Lucid. Respondents in this sample, were asked a portion of the core tracking survey, including vote intention, and then received a series of questions on additional, separate topics. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=1,831 Adult Canadians, 18 years or older are in the core sample and 1,372 are in the secondary sample. The combined results are weighted to n=2,400 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: September 10th 2021 to September 12th 2021.

Weighting: Results in both samples are weighted by age, gender, region, and education to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Additionally, both samples are weighted by the distribution of reported 2019 vote to match previous samples in the 2021 election to ensure that the tracking on vote intention is not influenced by a change in online panel providers. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported below.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.

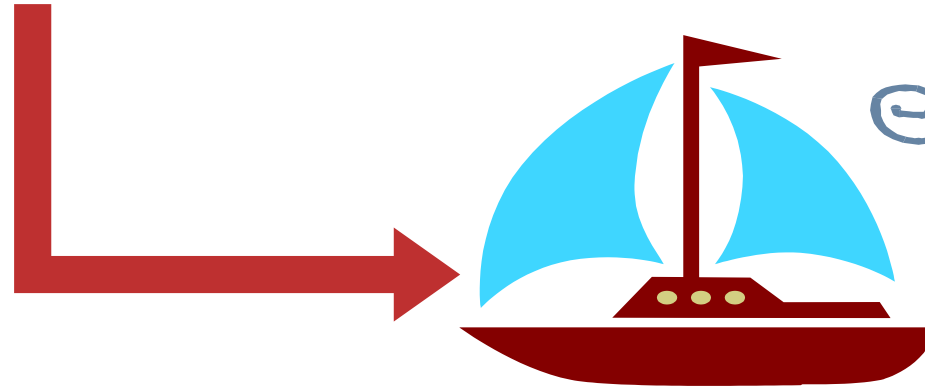

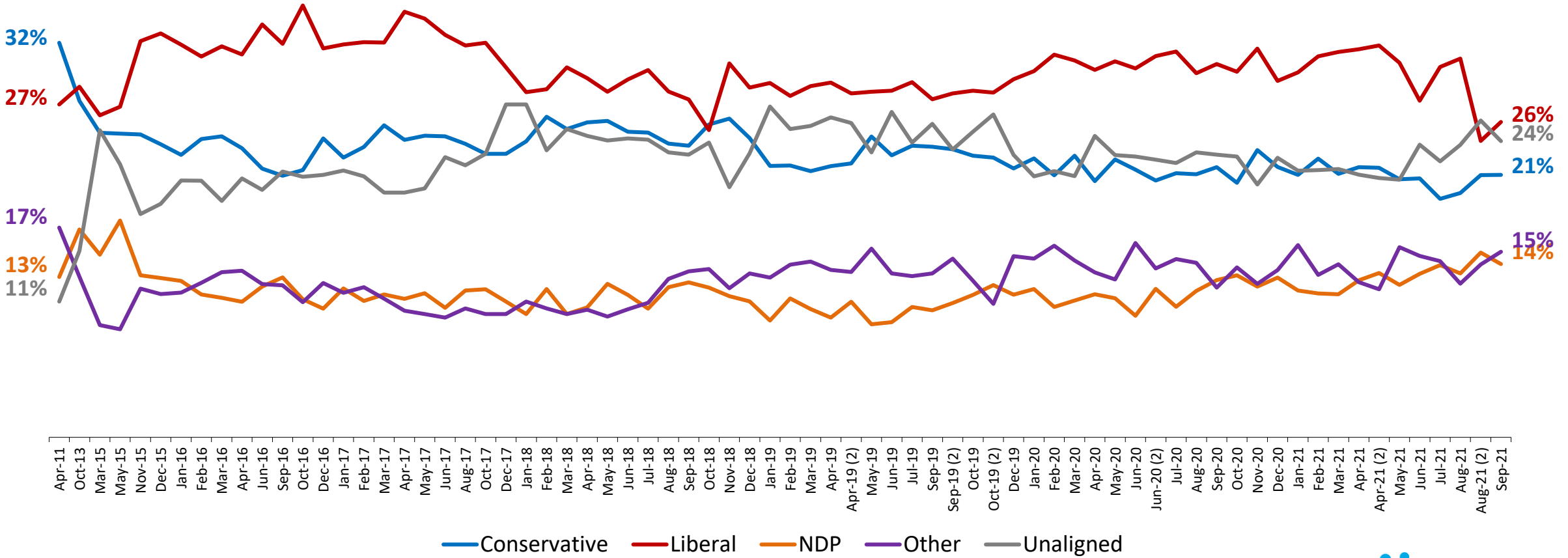


Attitudinal Anchors: Party ID

Federal Party ID Tracking: The Liberals still maintain their lead among partisanship; 1-in-4 (24%) Canadians are unaligned



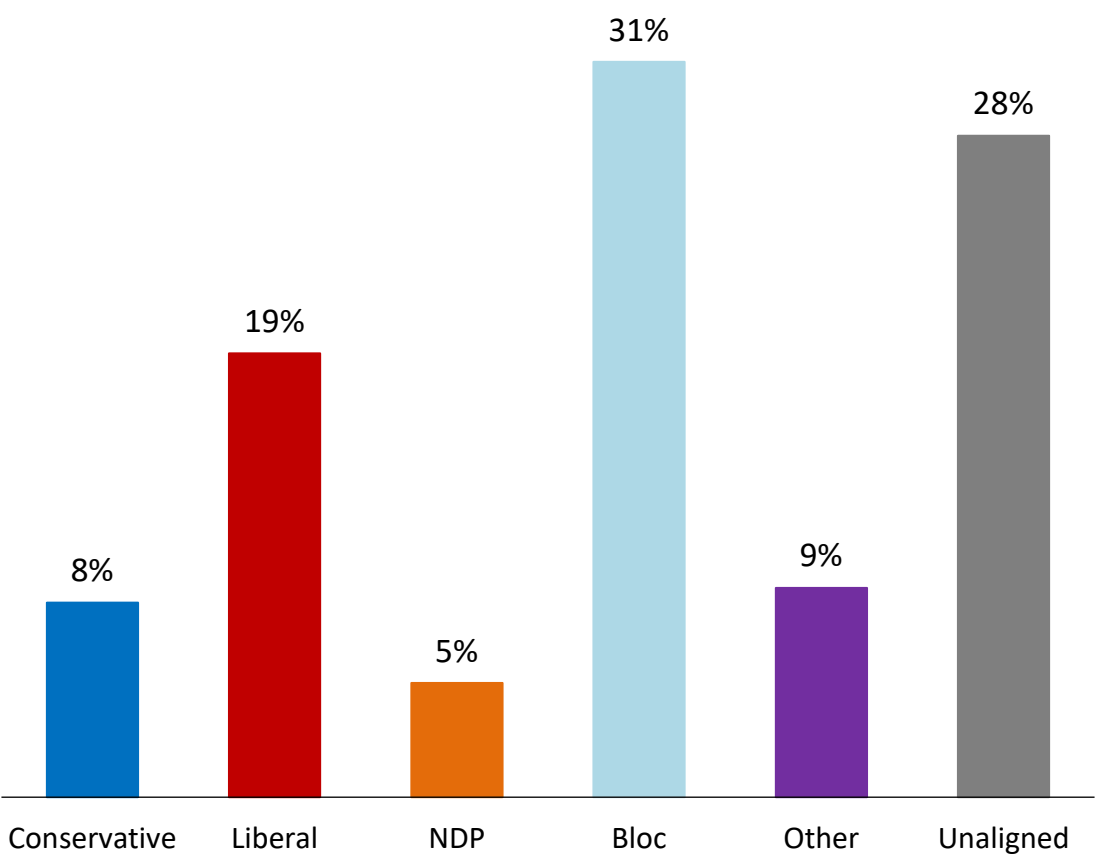
Thinking about politics in Canada, generally speaking, do you usually think of yourself as a...

Federal Party ID (Quebec vs. ROC): In Quebec, the Liberals are second on Party ID after the Bloc

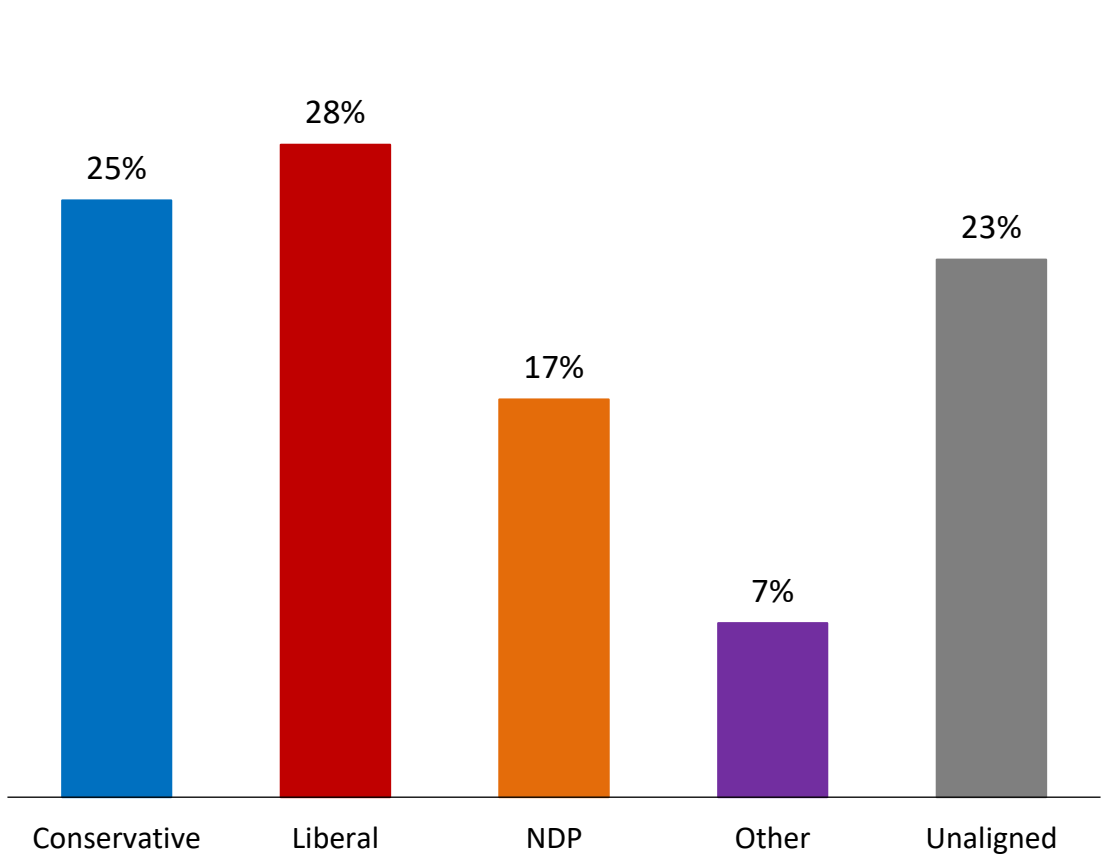

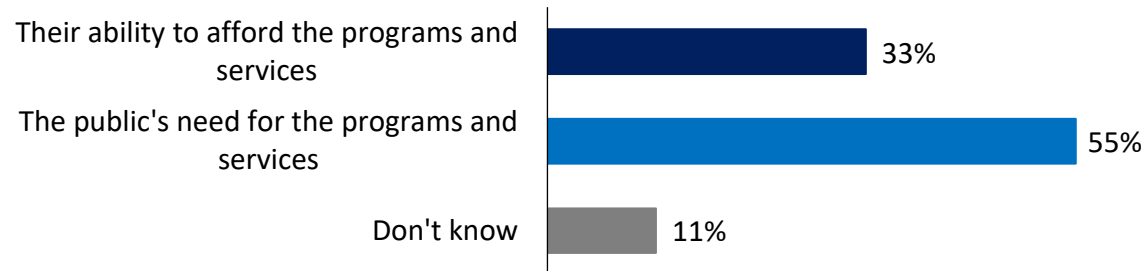

Core Political Values: Over half (55%) believe that the government should make their decisions based on the public's needs

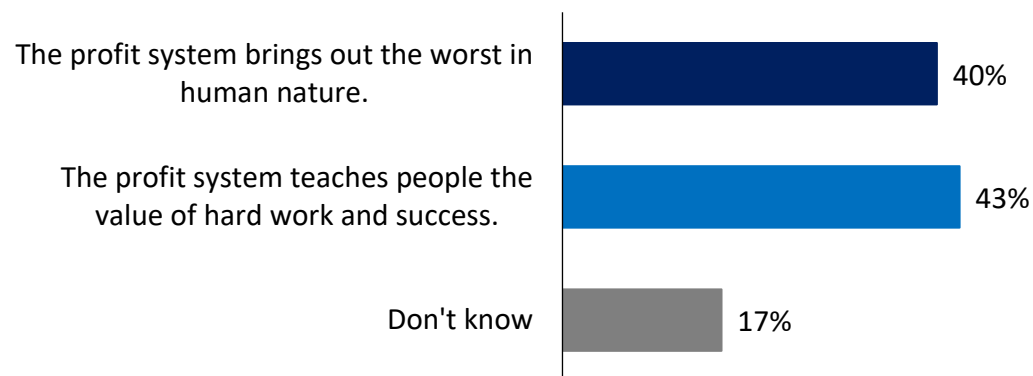

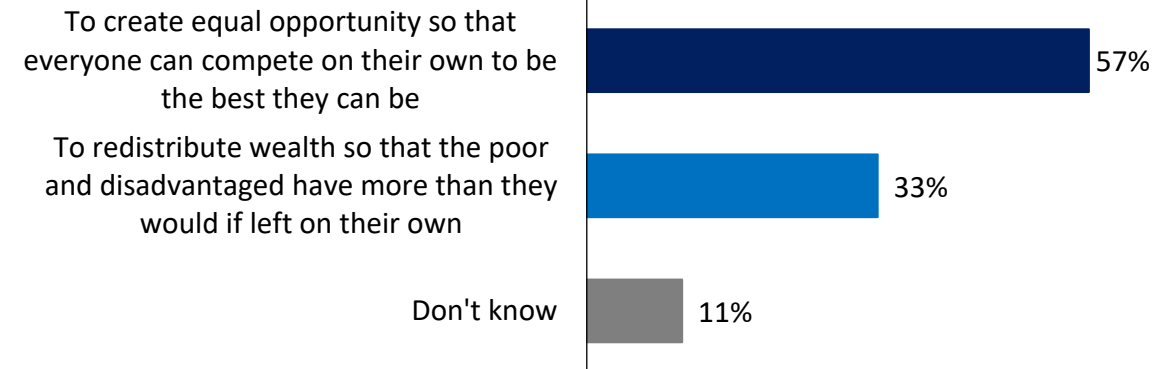

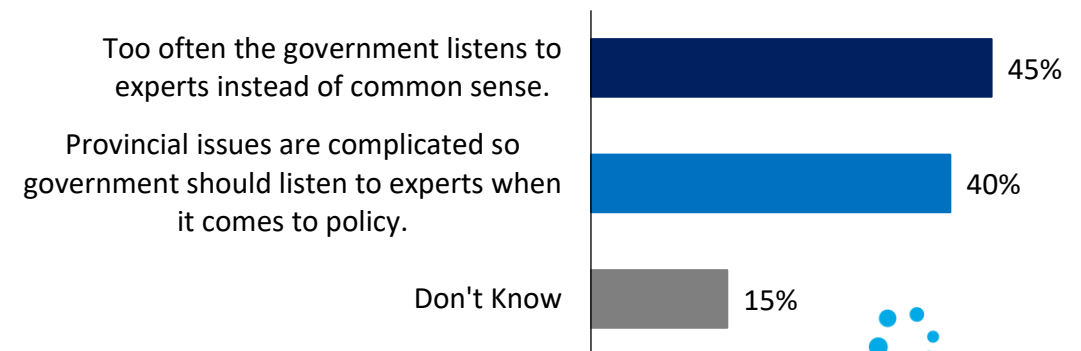

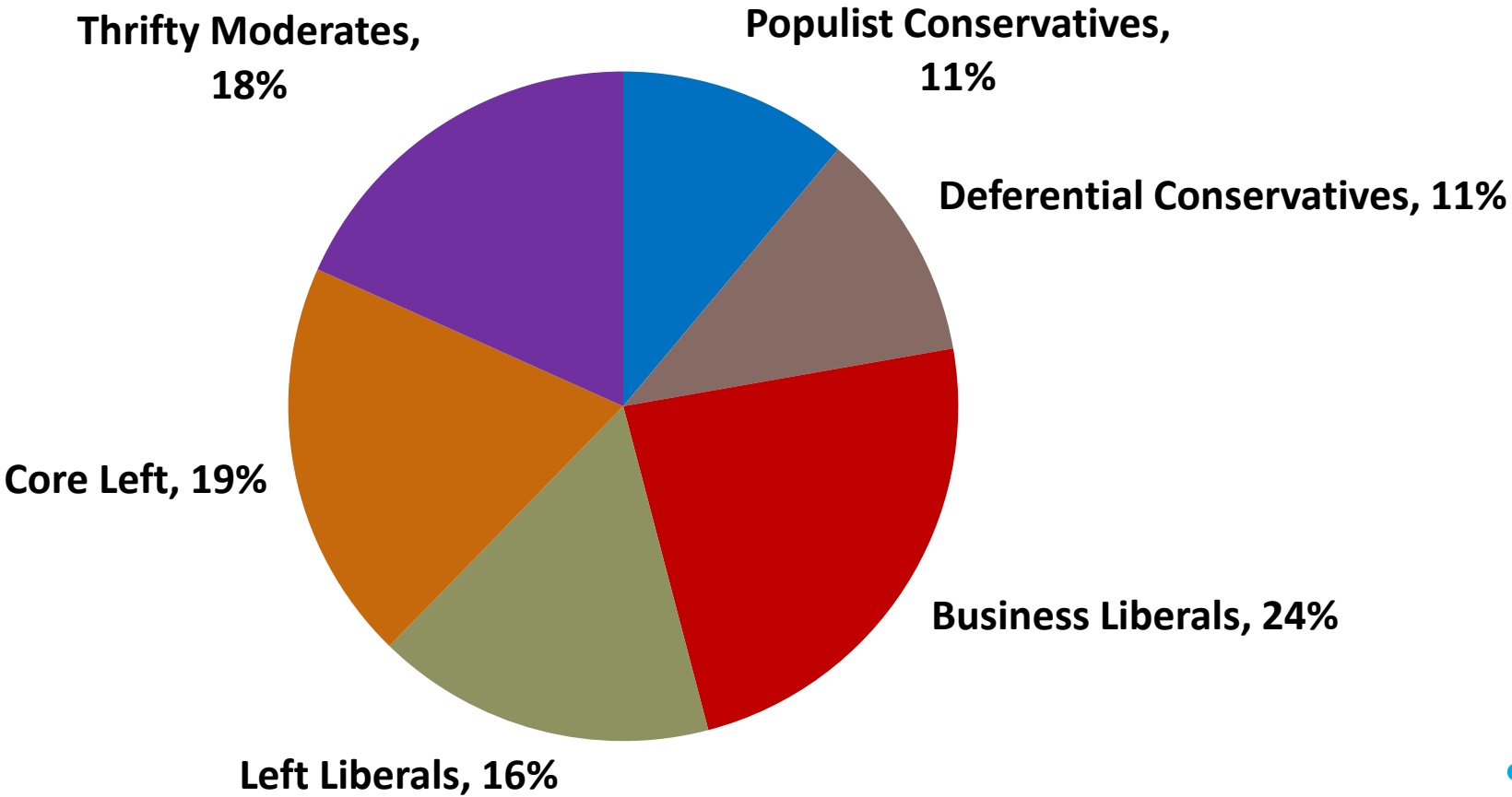


Value Clusters: 1-in-4 (24%) Canadians are Business Liberals, followed by Core Left (19%)

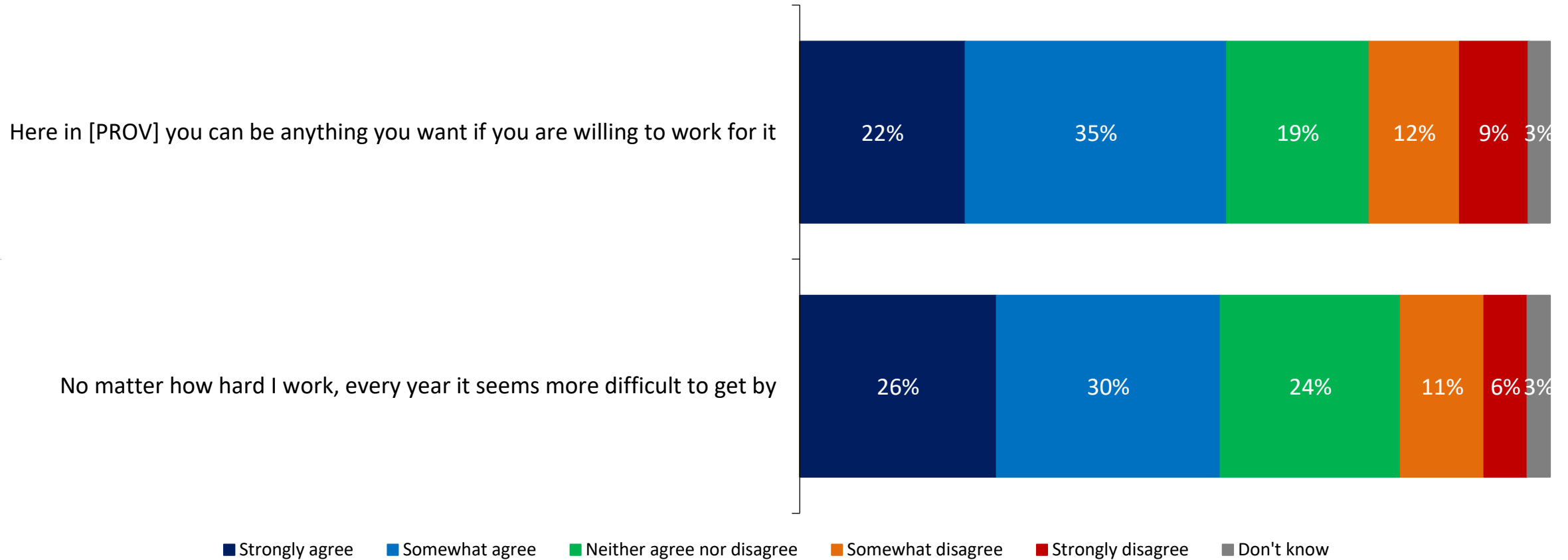

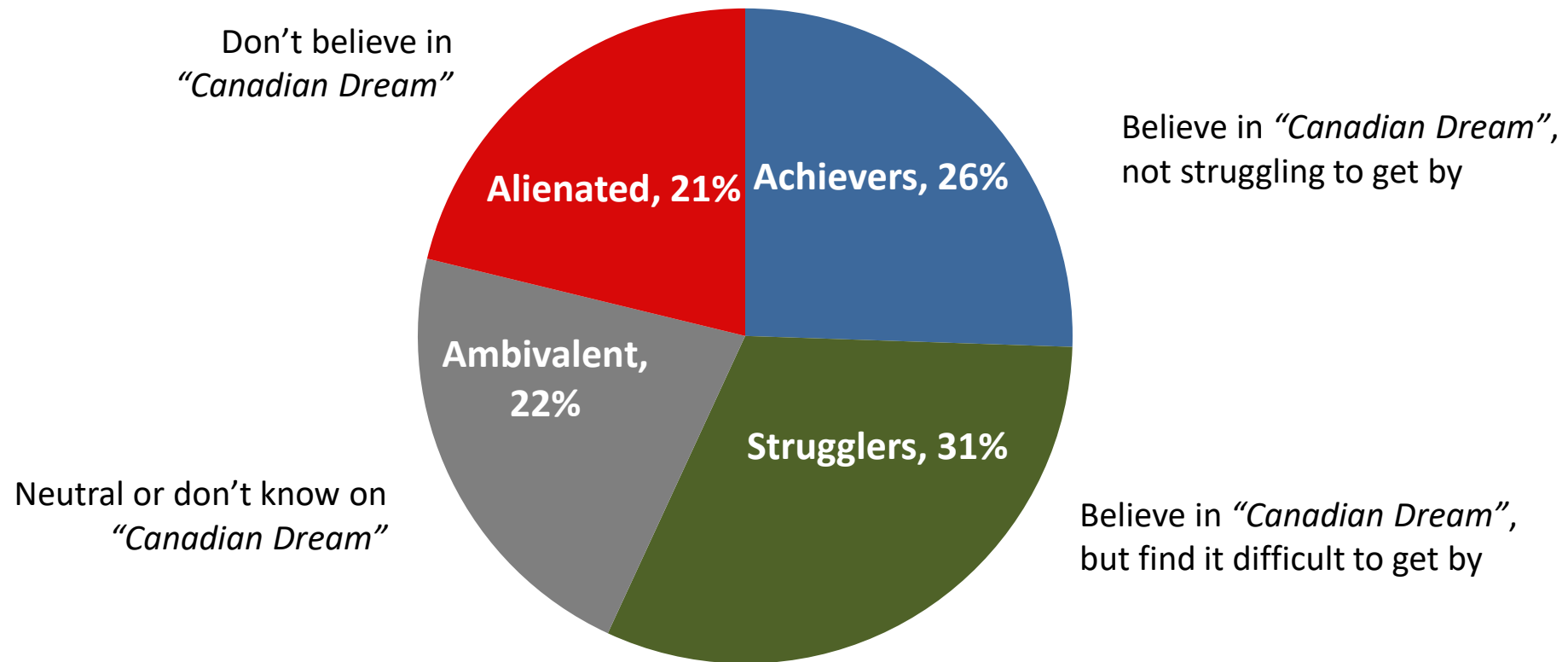


Economic Gap Segmentation: Most Canadians are Strugglers (31%), followed by Achievers (26%)

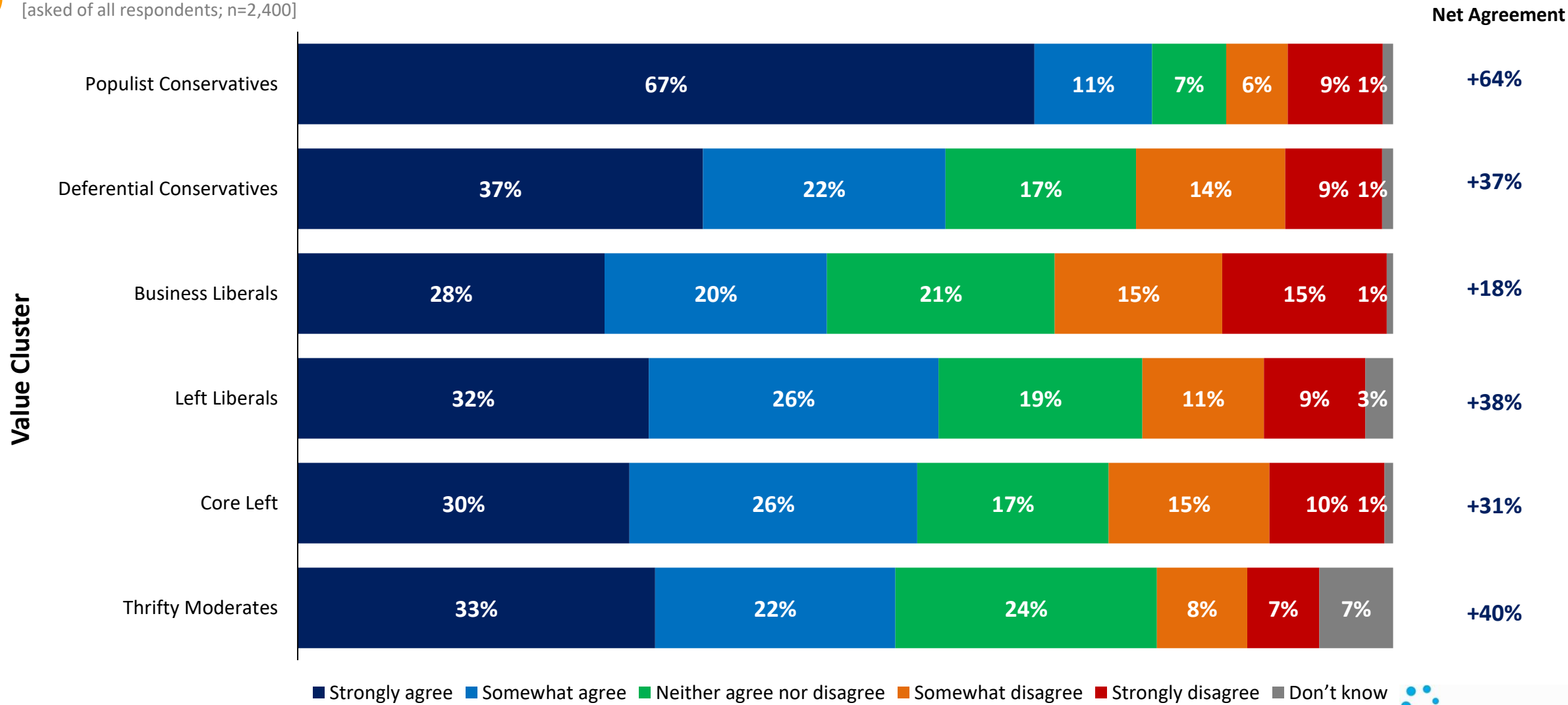

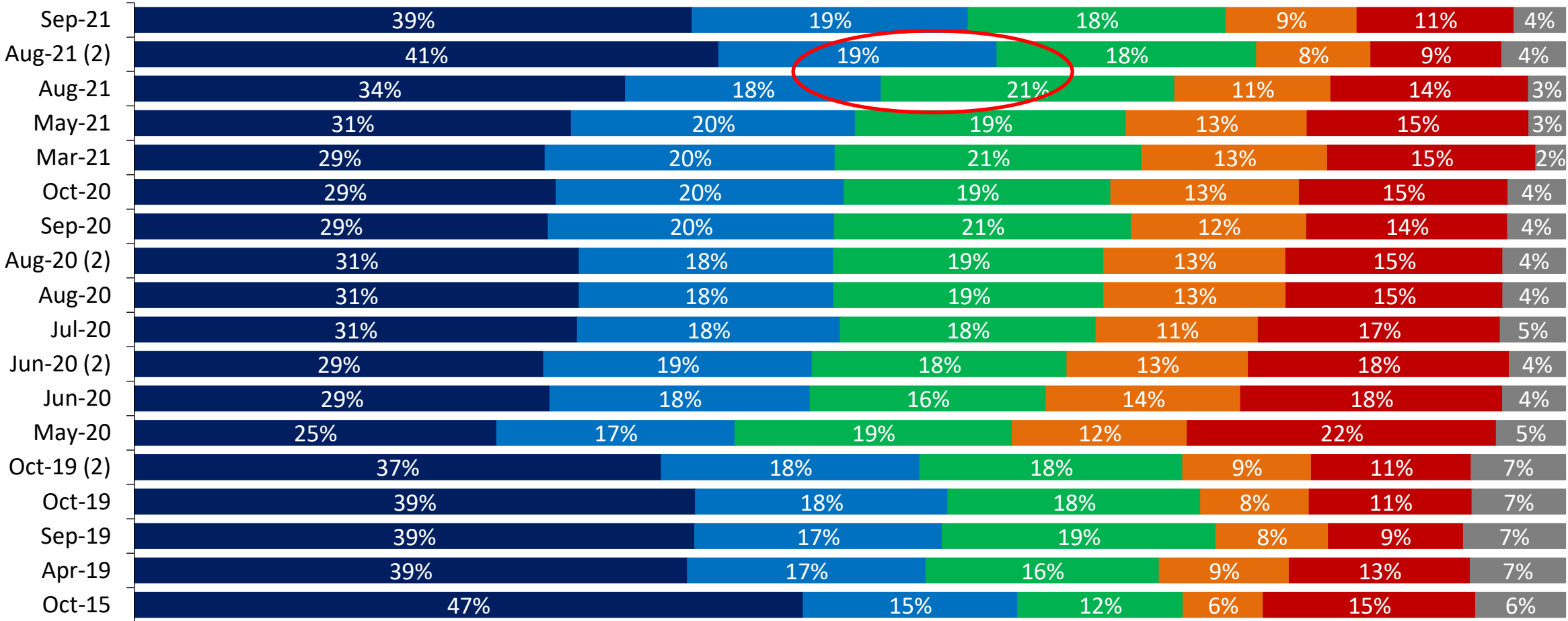

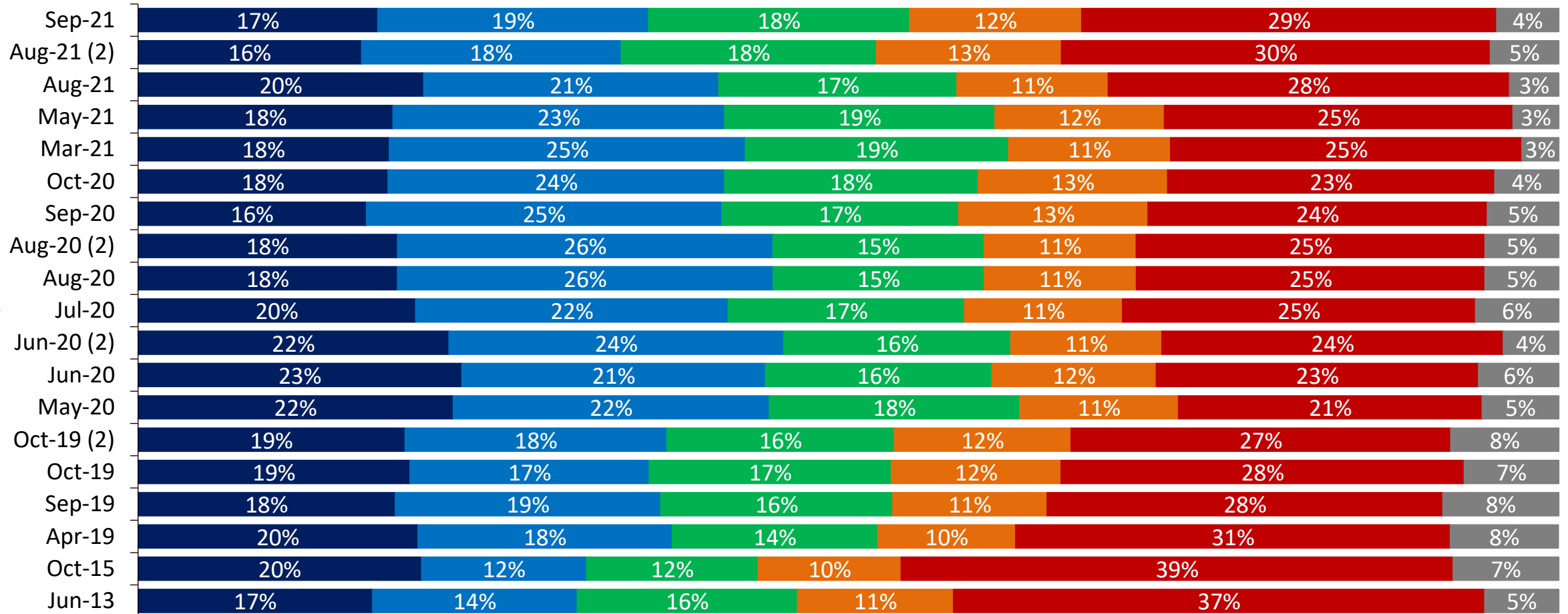


Time for Change Tracking: 36% of Canadians agree that the Liberals are the best party to form government, up 2-points

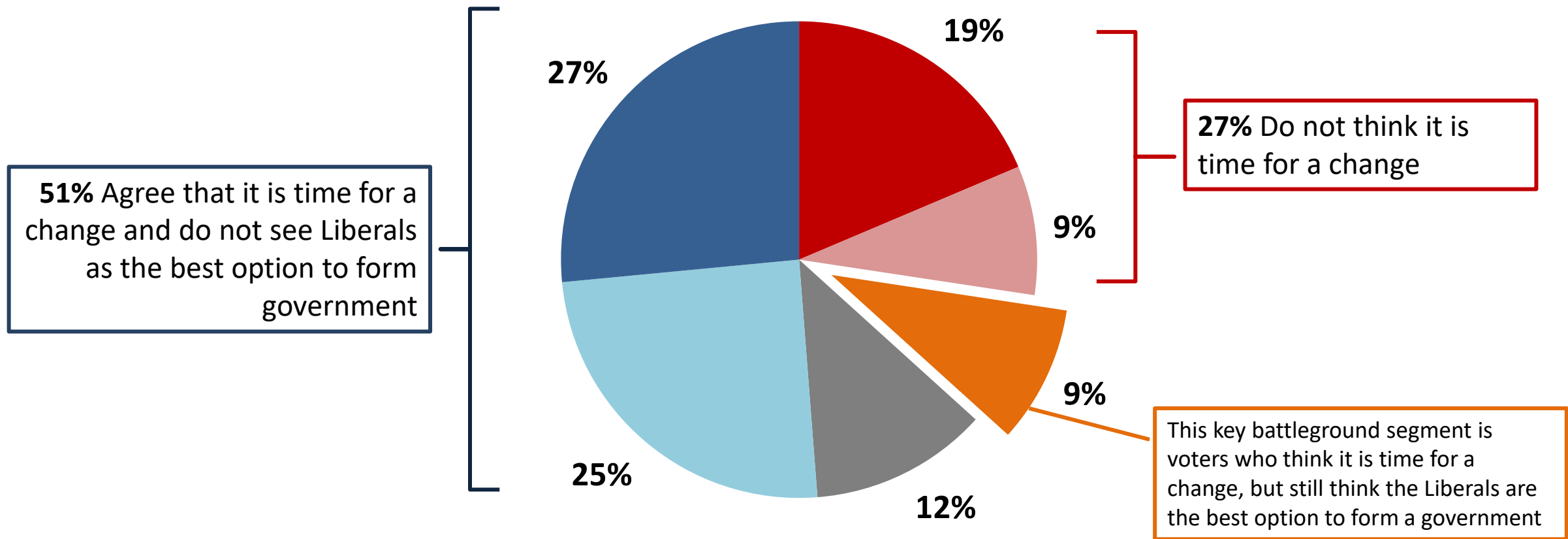

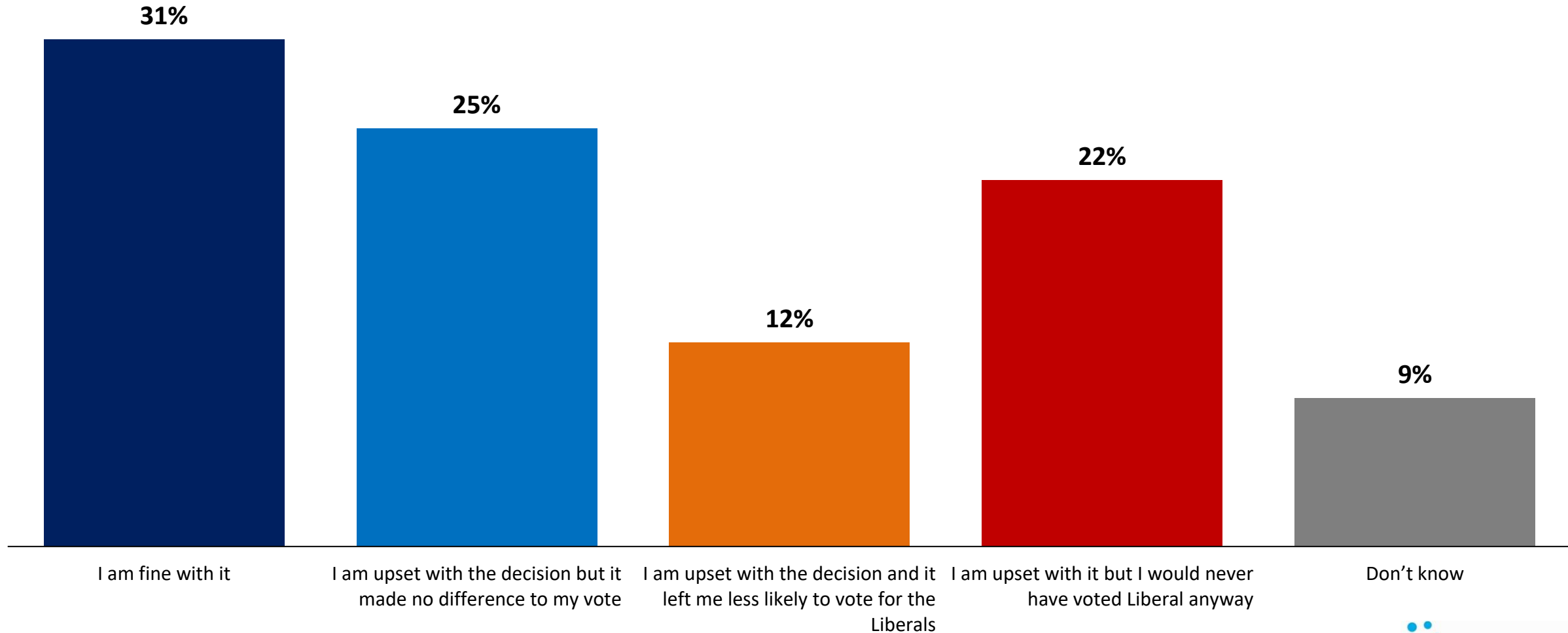

Thinking about the decision by Justin Trudeau and the Liberal Party to call the current election early, which of the following comes closest to your point of view?

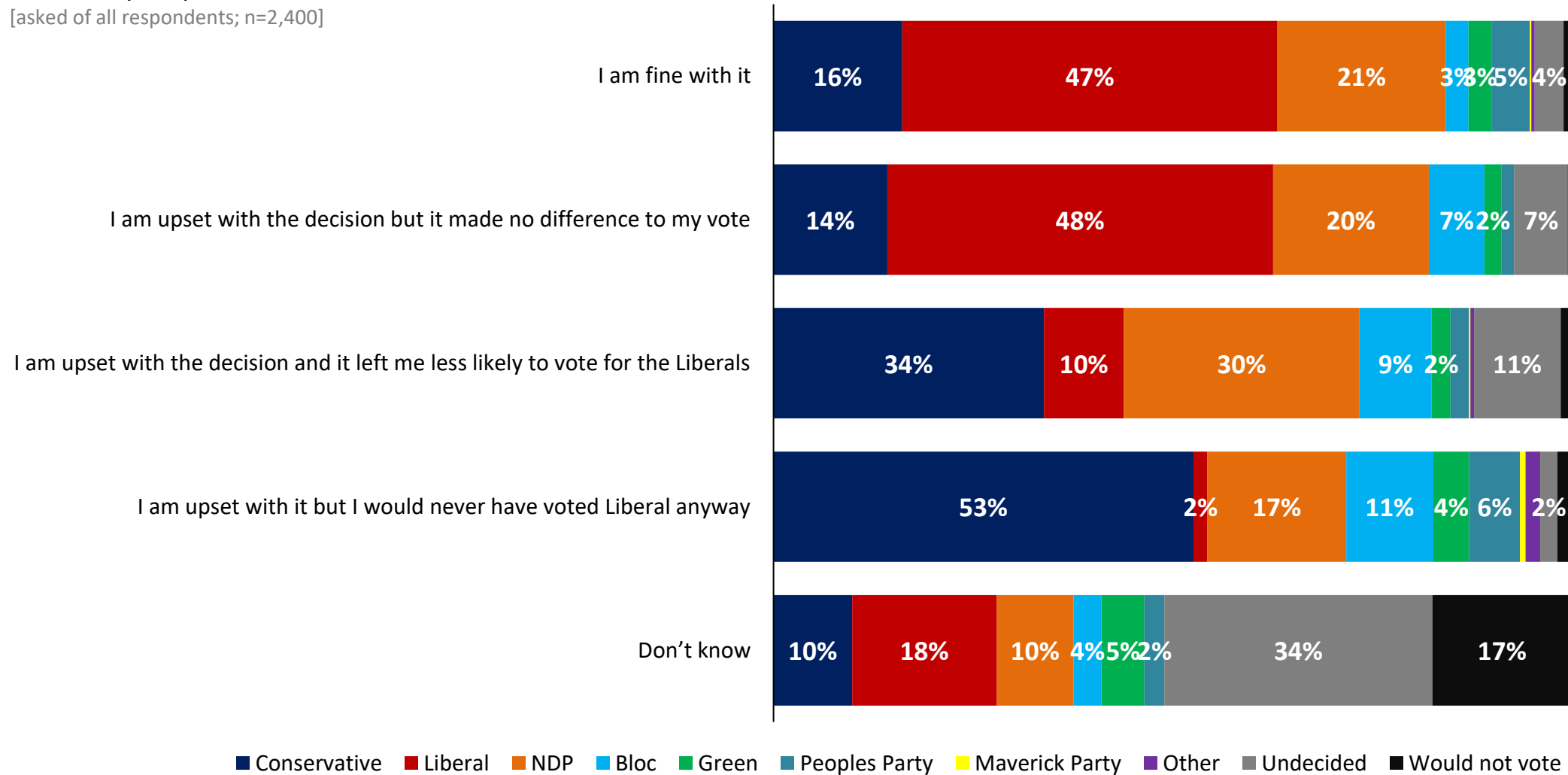

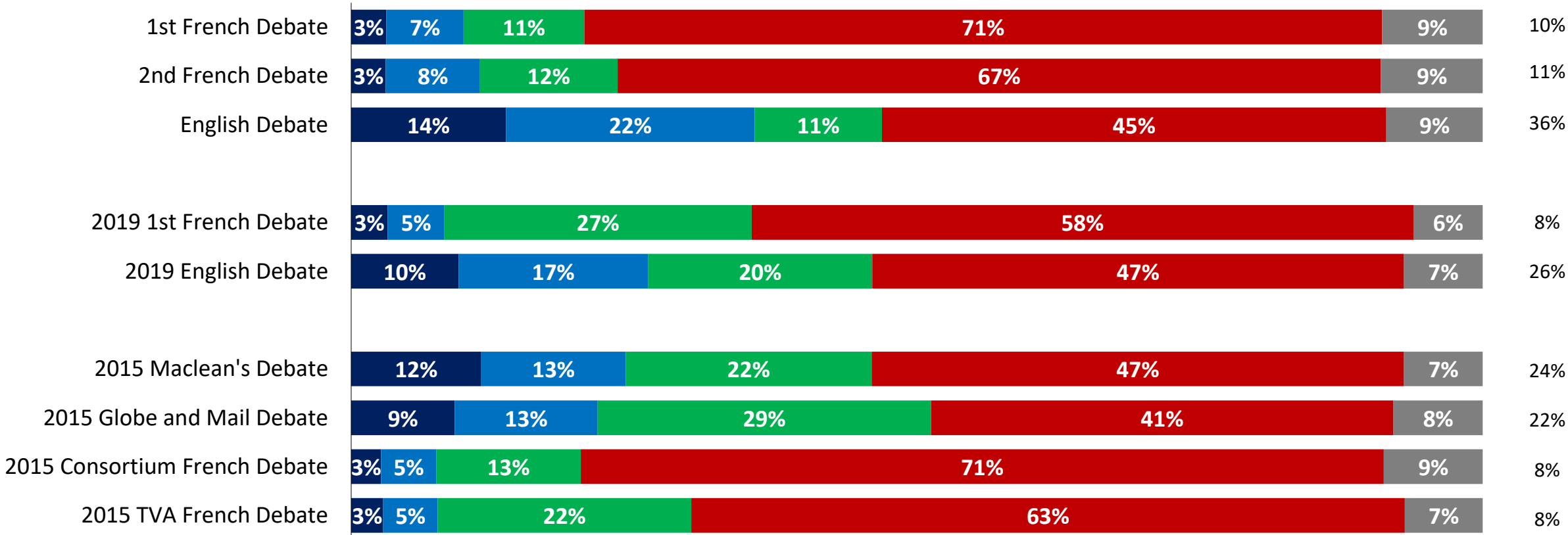

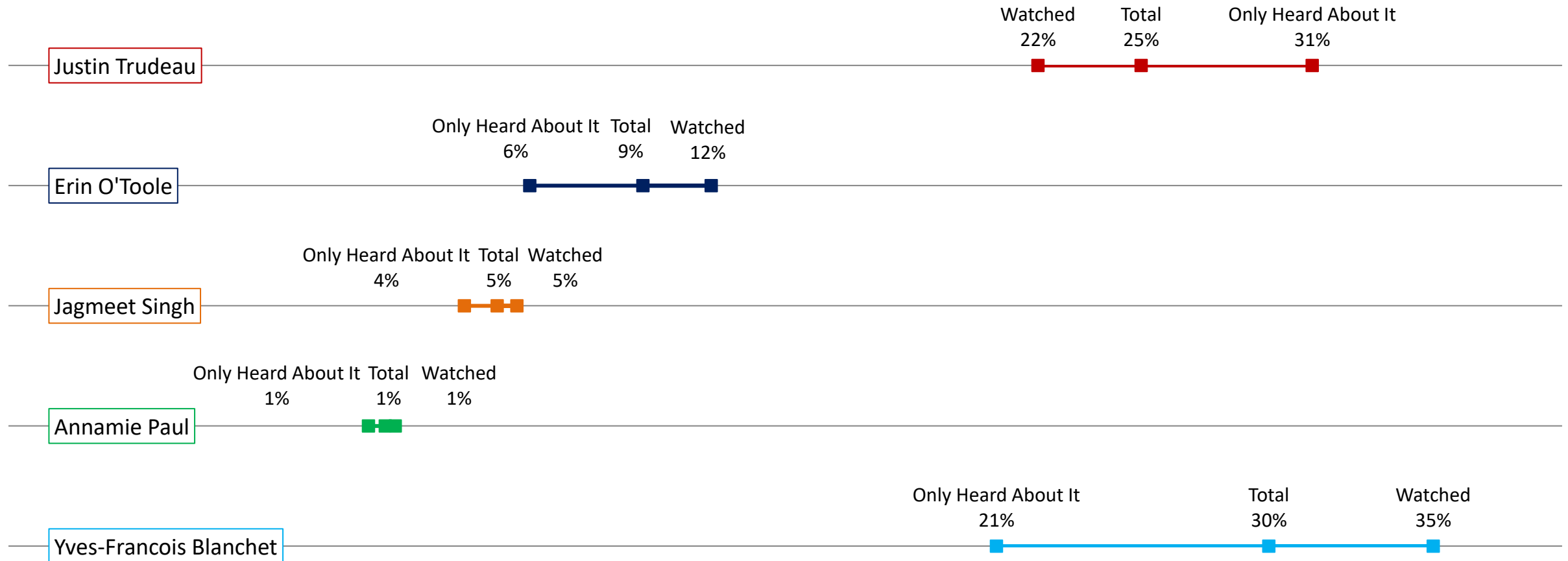

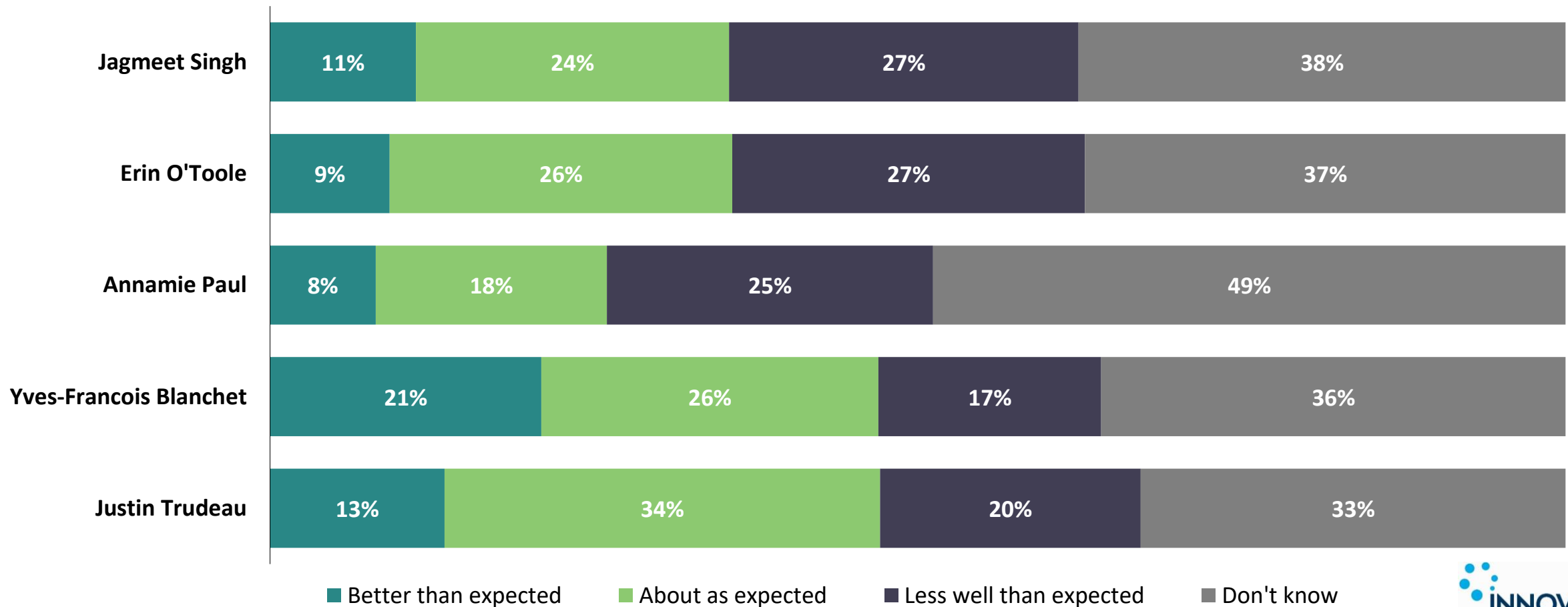
Leader Performance: Within Quebec, Blanchet's performance was better than expected, followed by Trudeau

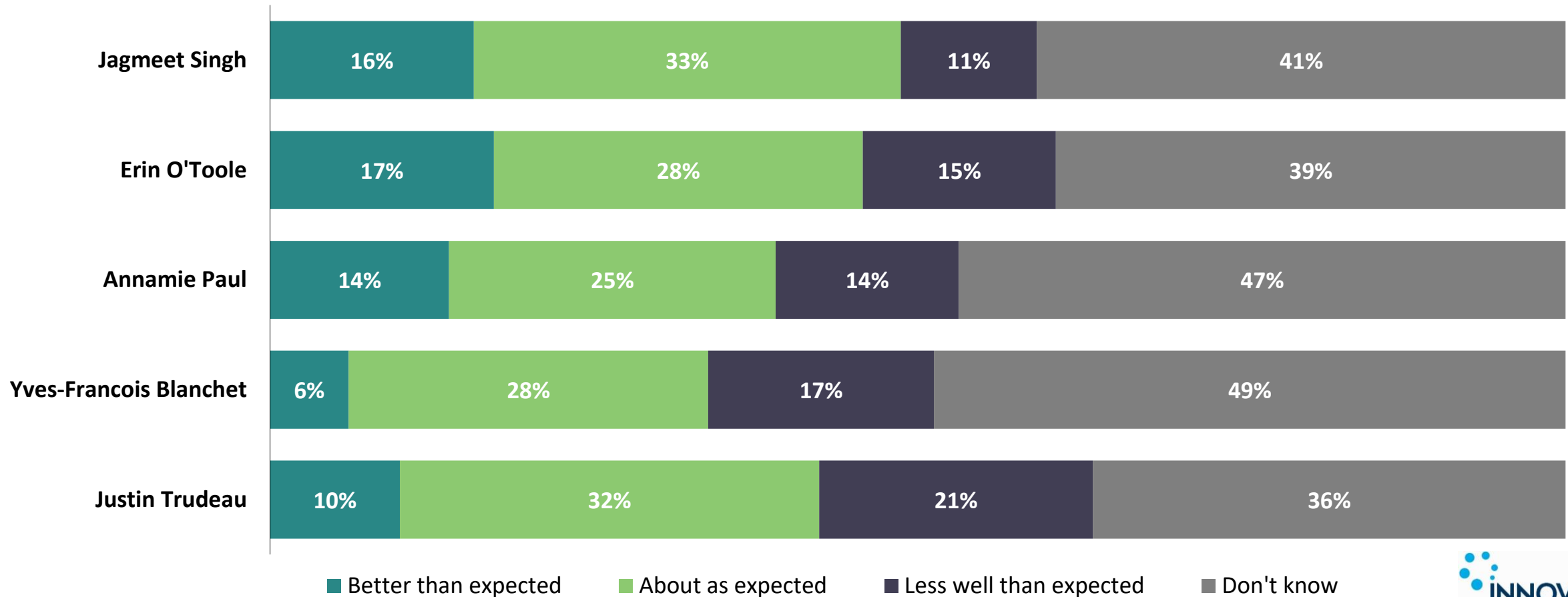
Leader Performance: Singh & O'Toole's performance were better than expected while Trudeau's performance was less than expected

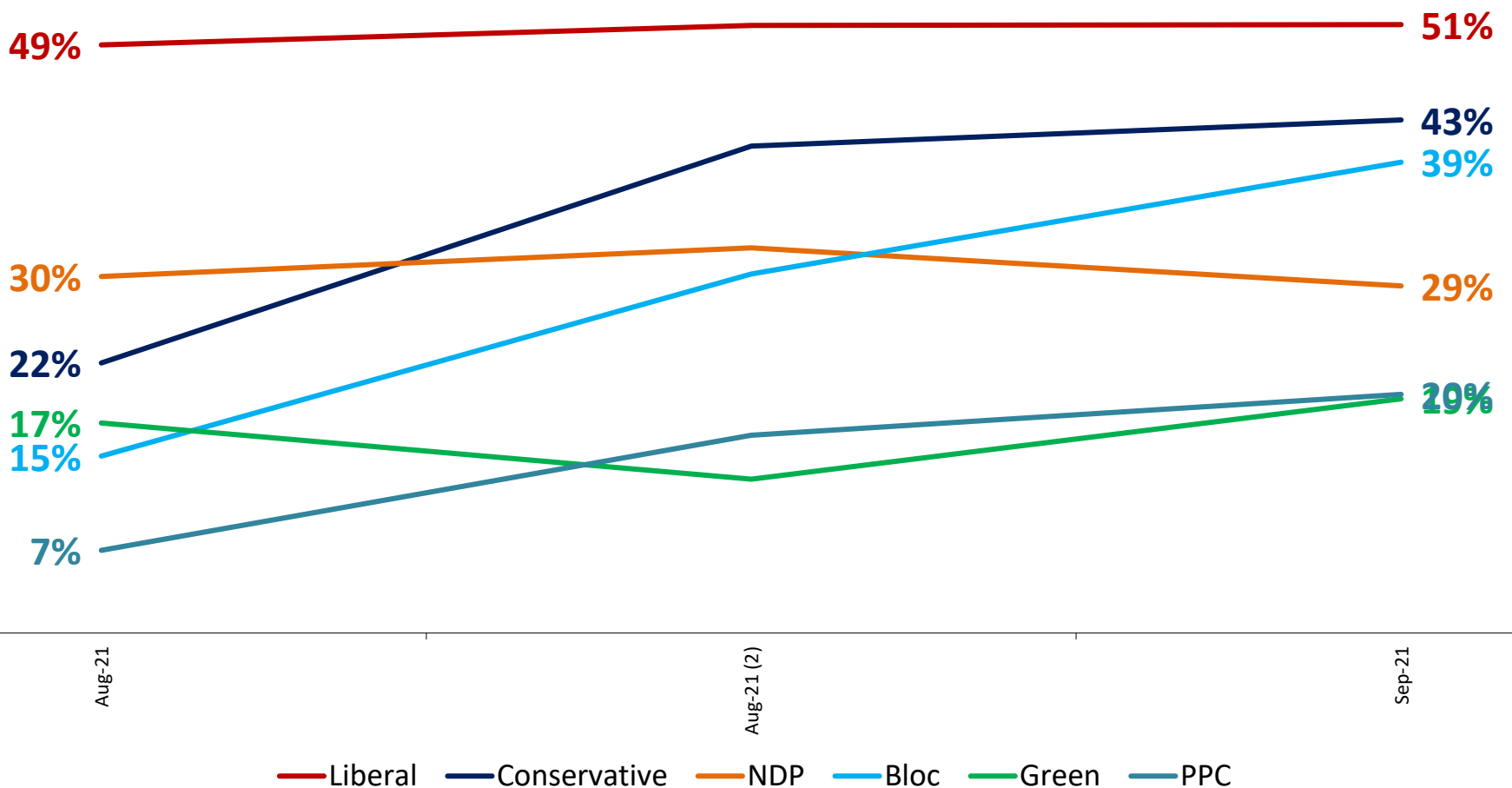


The Winds of Public Debate

Awareness Tracking: Attention to the main parties is steady, while attention to smaller parties is up



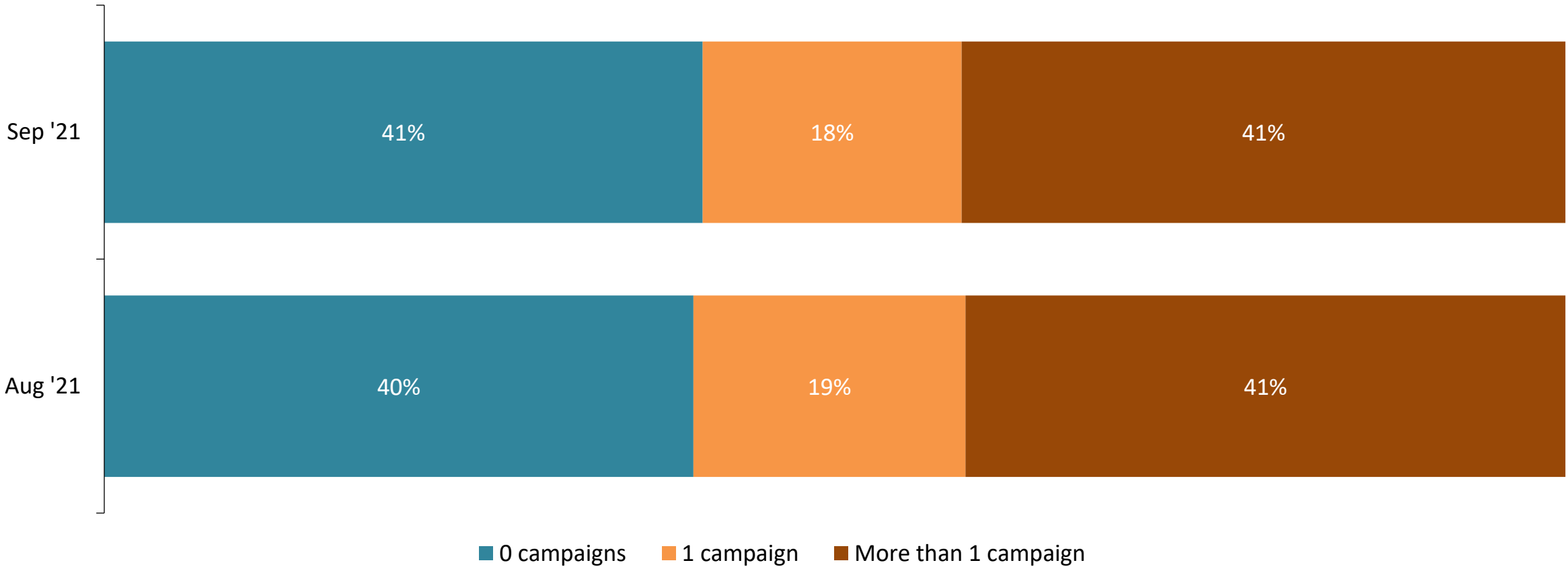
Have you read, seen or heard anything about [PARTY] in the last few days? Showing % who have read, seen, or heard about each party.

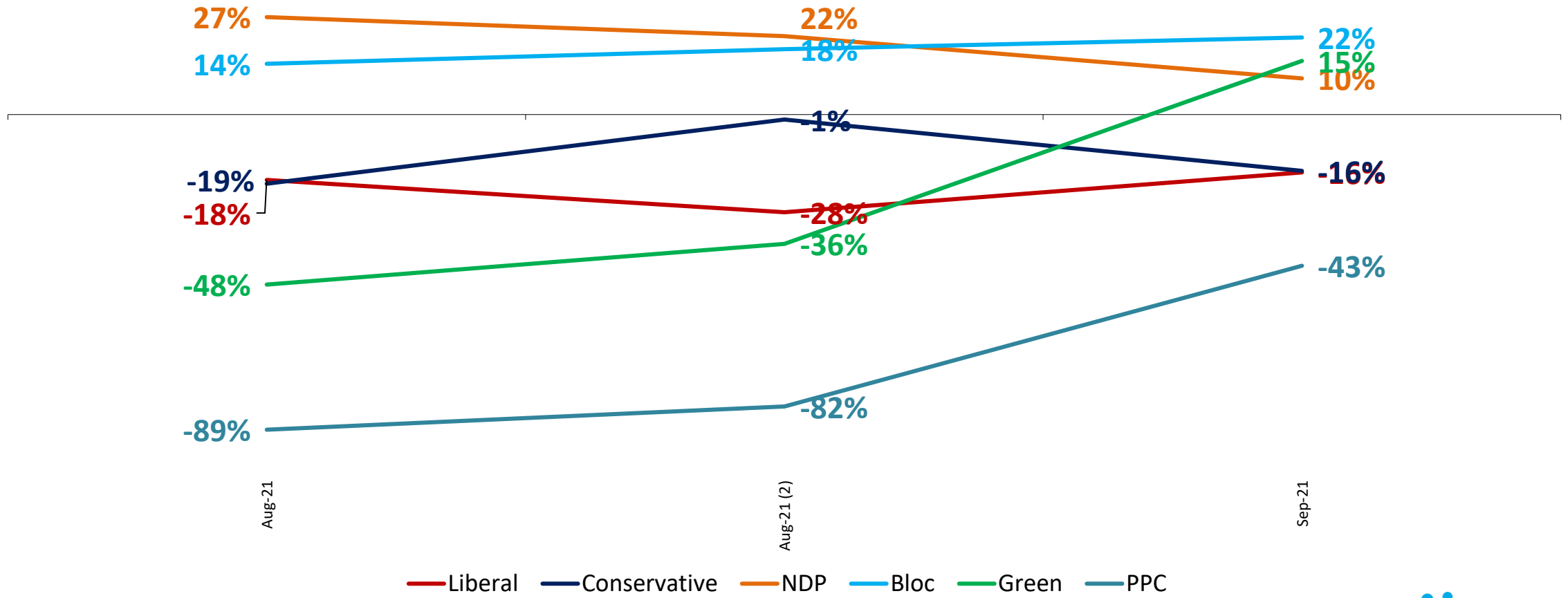


Net Impact Tracking: The Green and the PPC are showing the strongest improvement in the net impact of campaign awareness

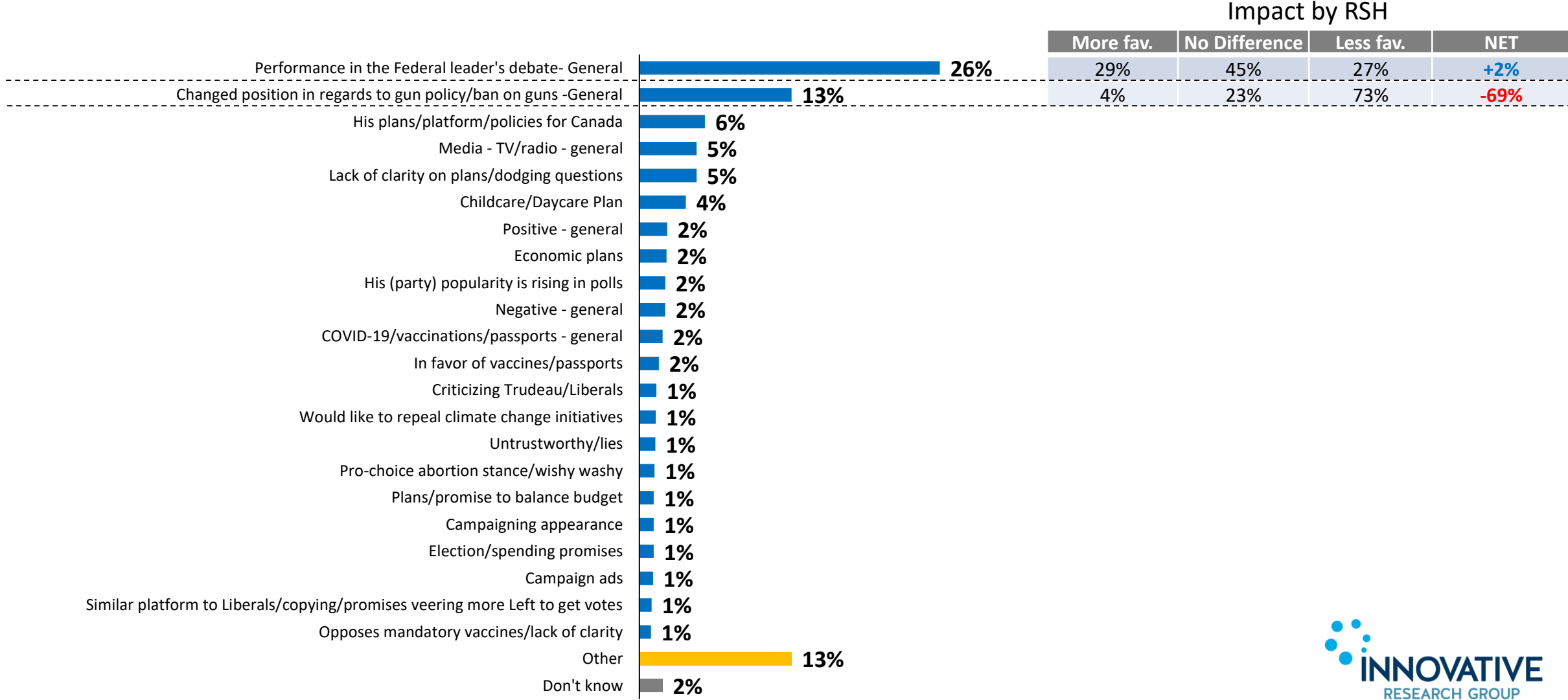


RSH O'Toole: O'Toole's performance in the debate is the top mention (26%) with a positive net impact of 2% but guns are very negative

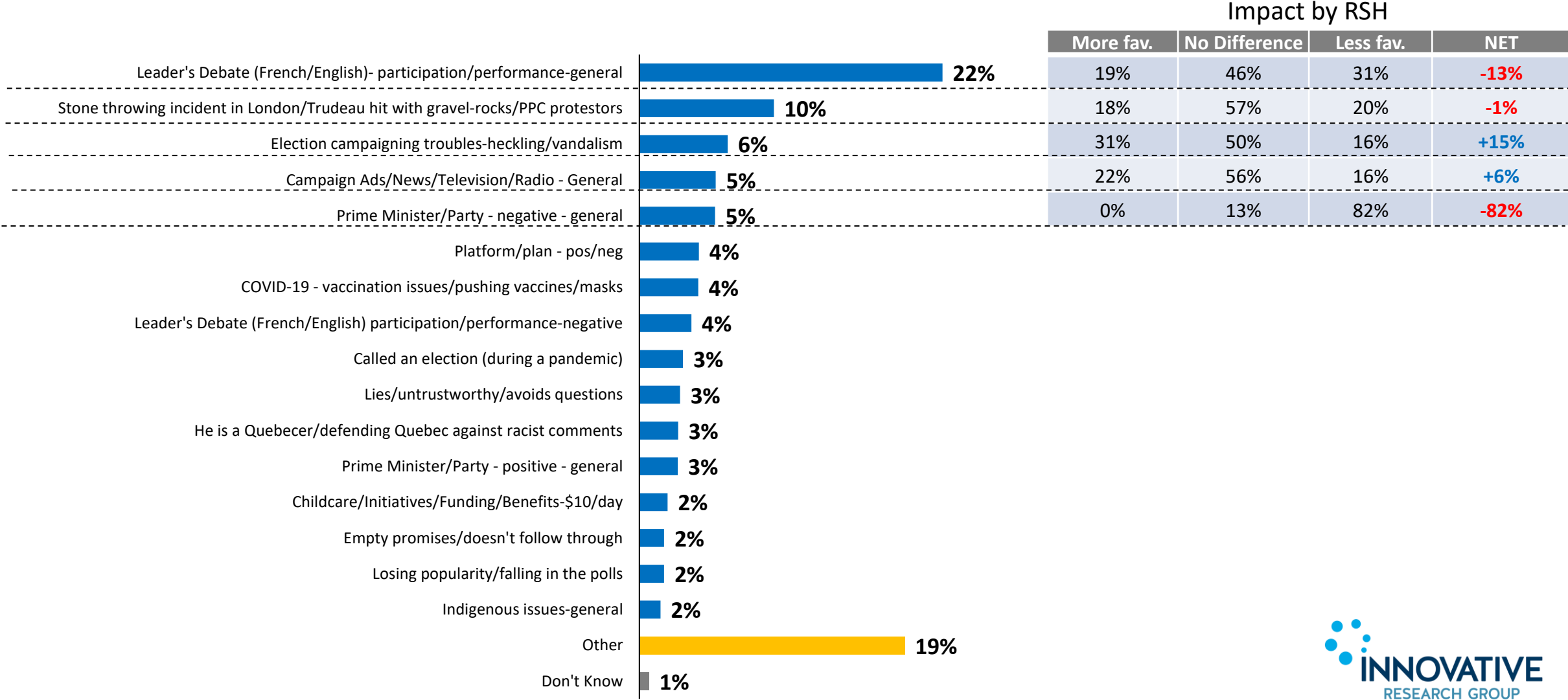

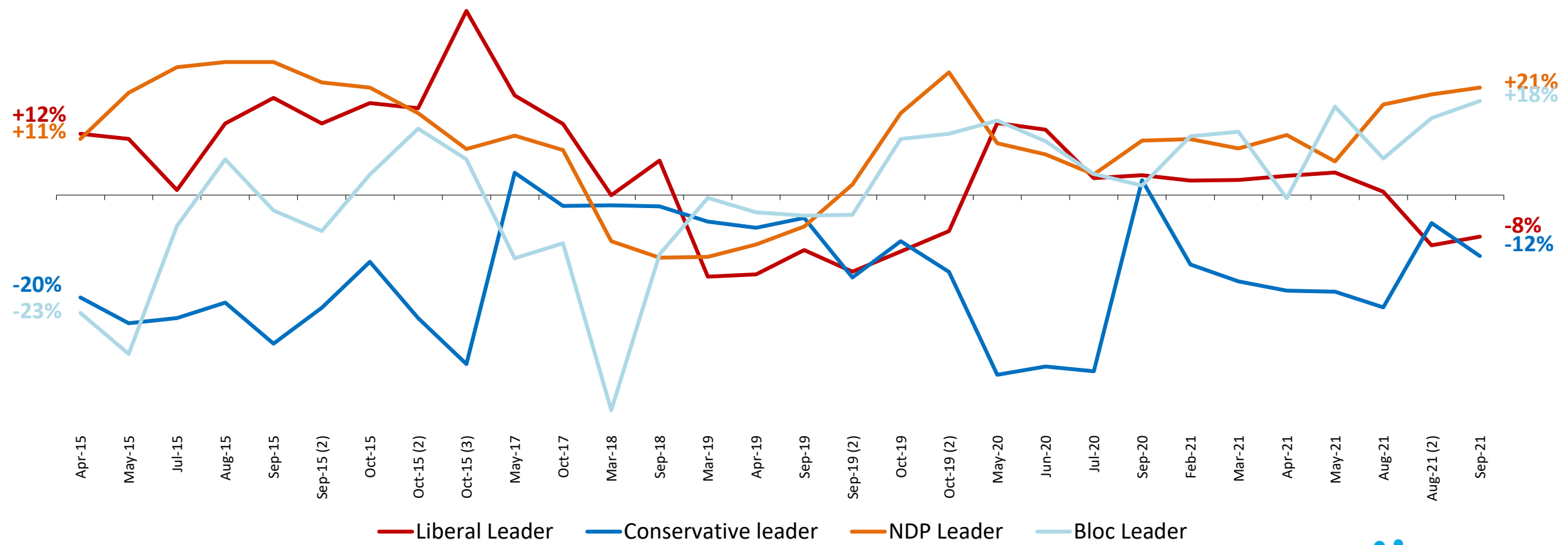

Party Leader NET Favourables Tracking: The gap between the unfavourable views of O'Toole and the favourable views are wider

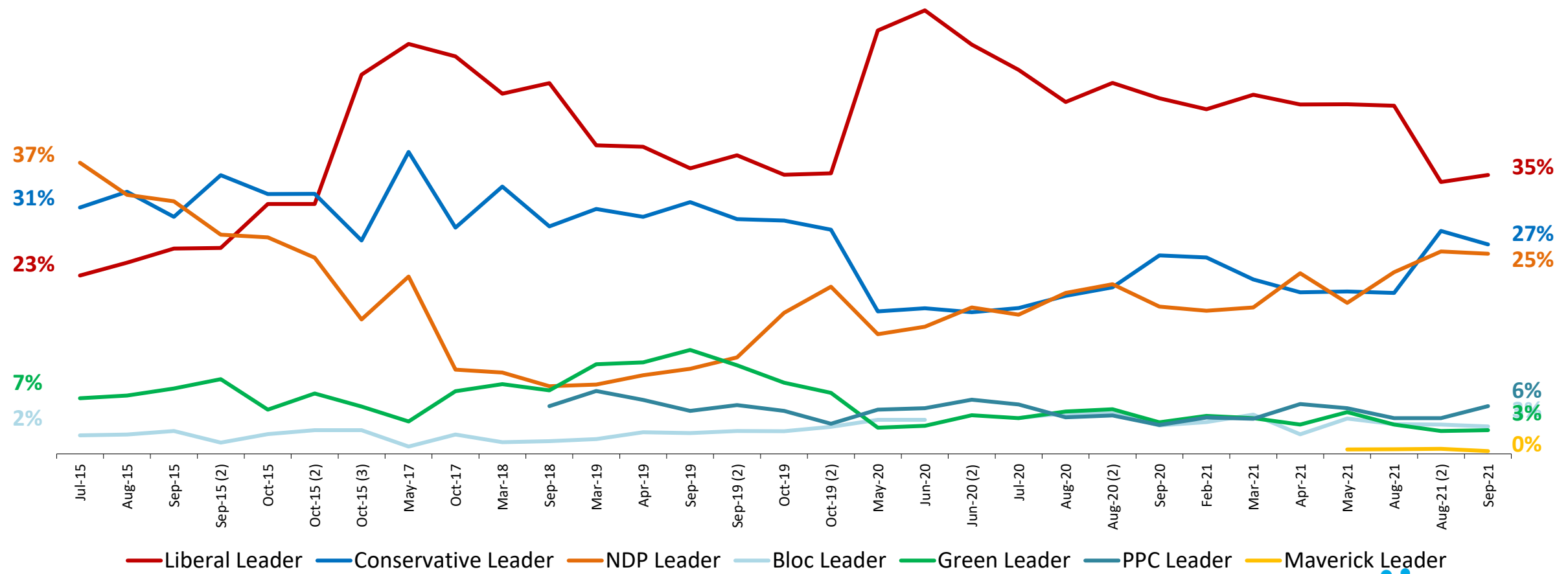

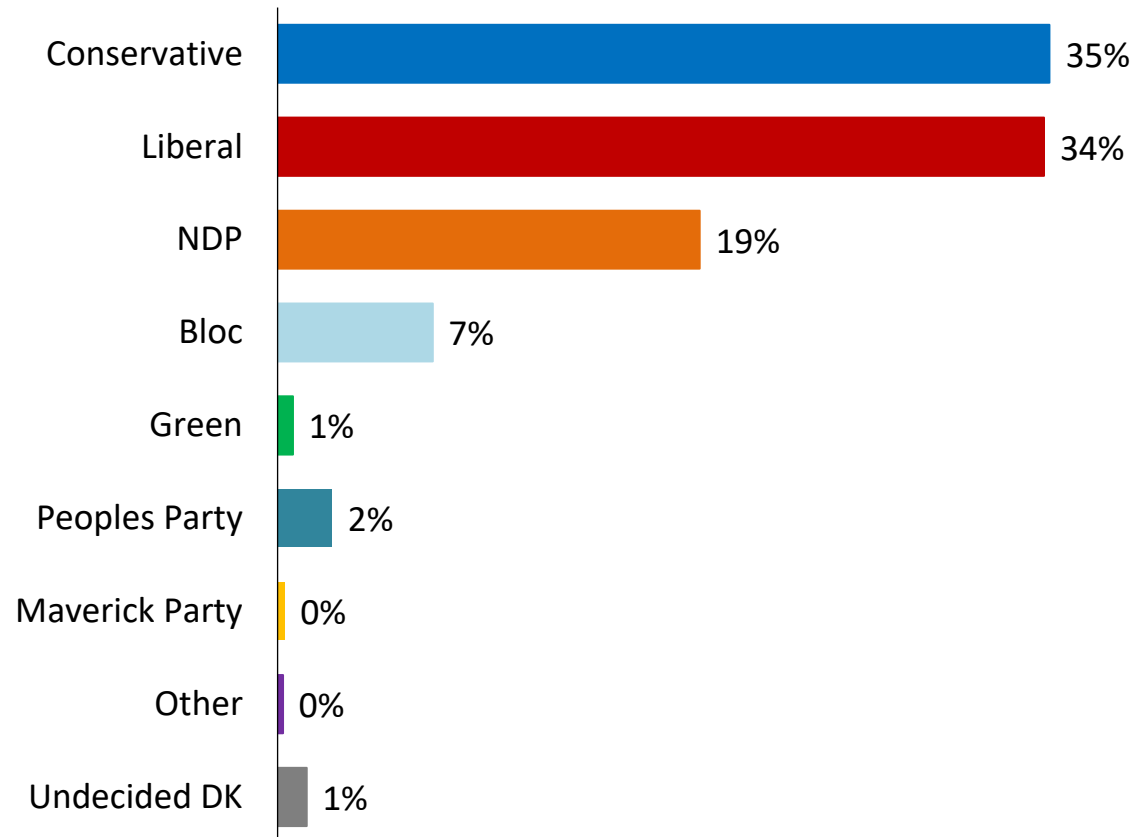

Federal Combined Vote: Among those who have already voted, the Liberals and Conservatives nearly are tied



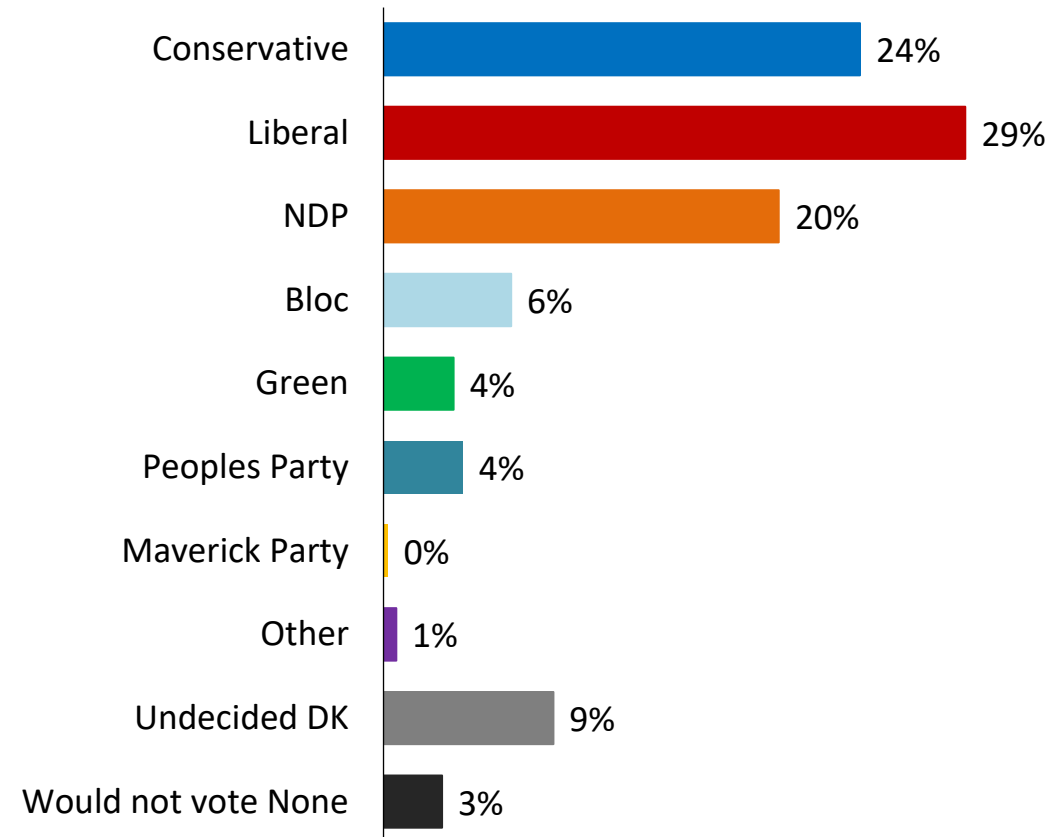

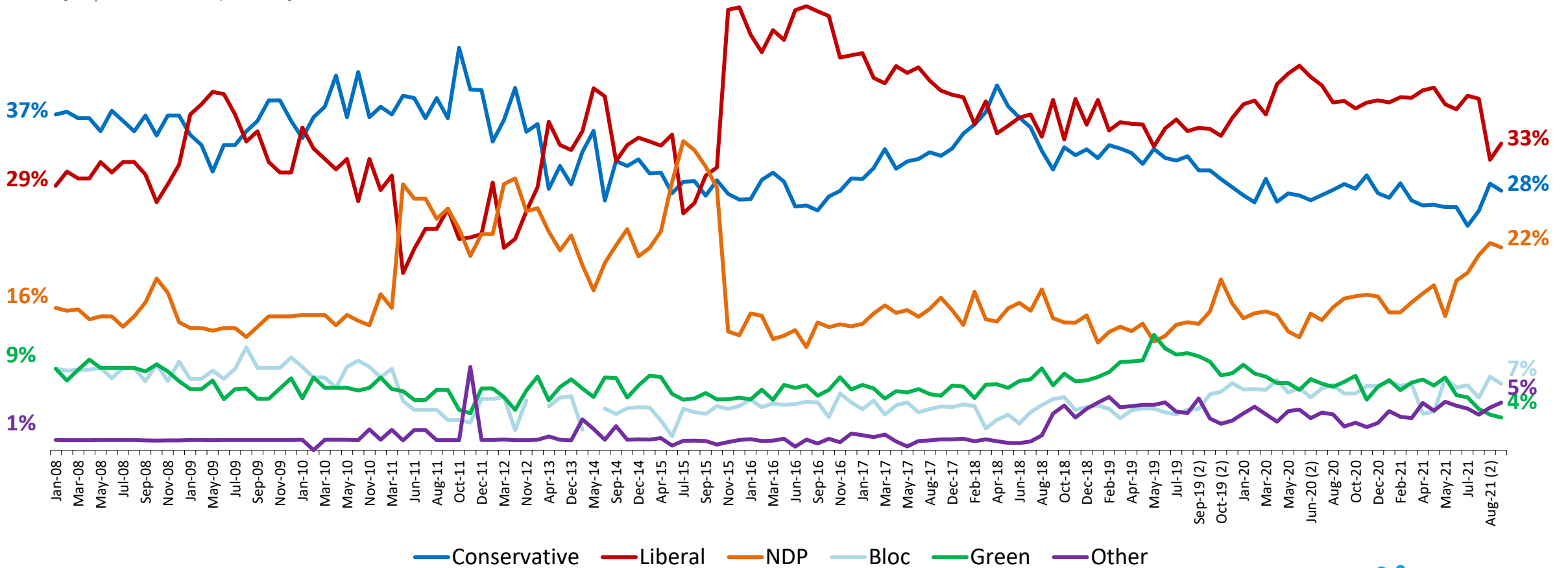
Federal Decided Vote Tracking: The Liberals still lead (33%), while the Conservatives (28%) and NDP (22%) continue to trail

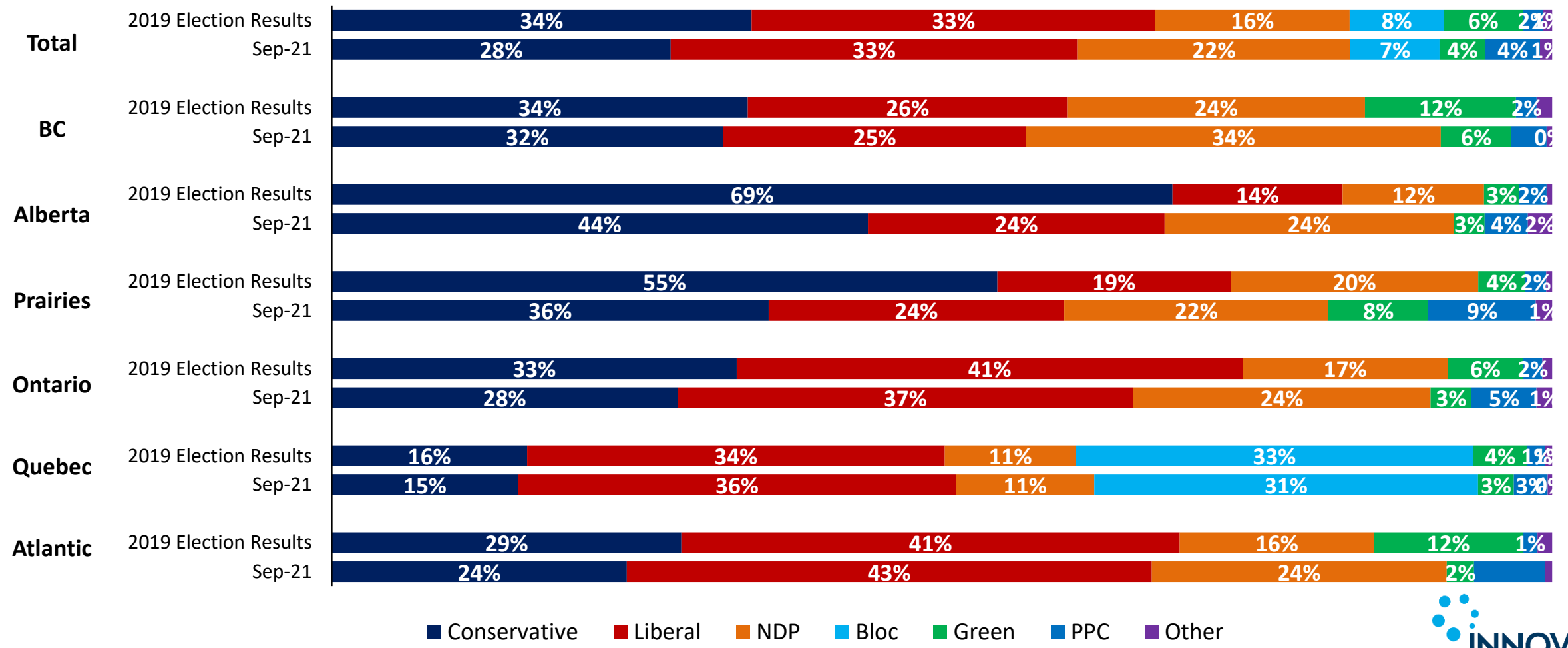


Decided Federal Vote by Region: Conservatives down from 2019 in most regions, NDP gains in BC, AB, ON and Atlantic

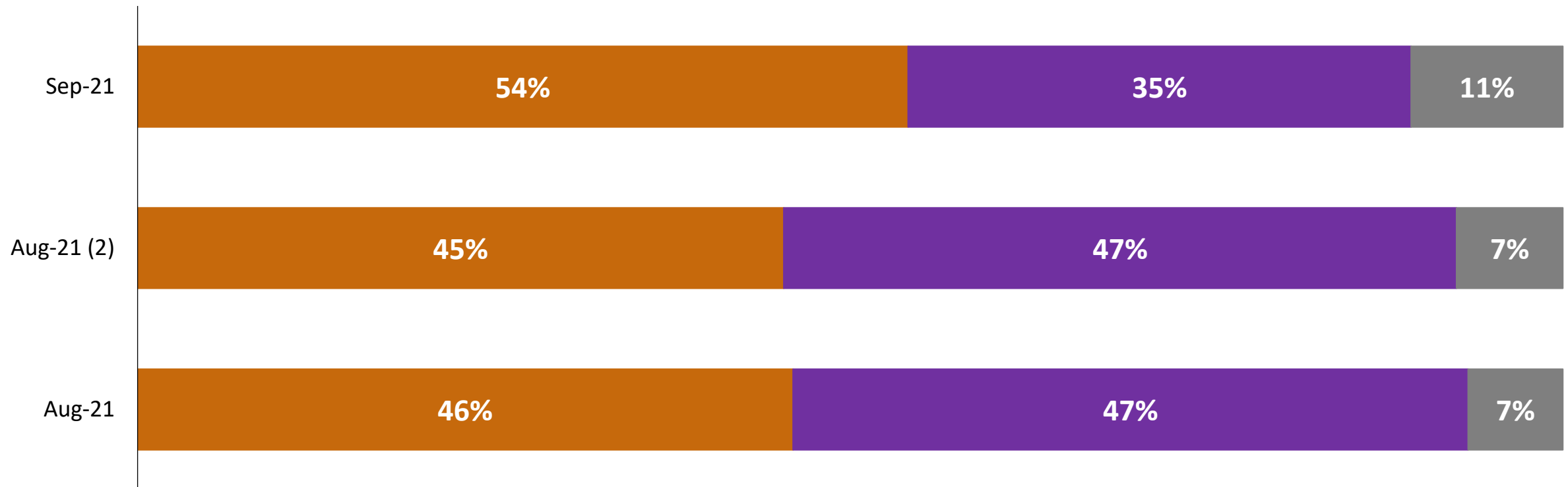

Measuring the Impact of Turnout on the Election Results

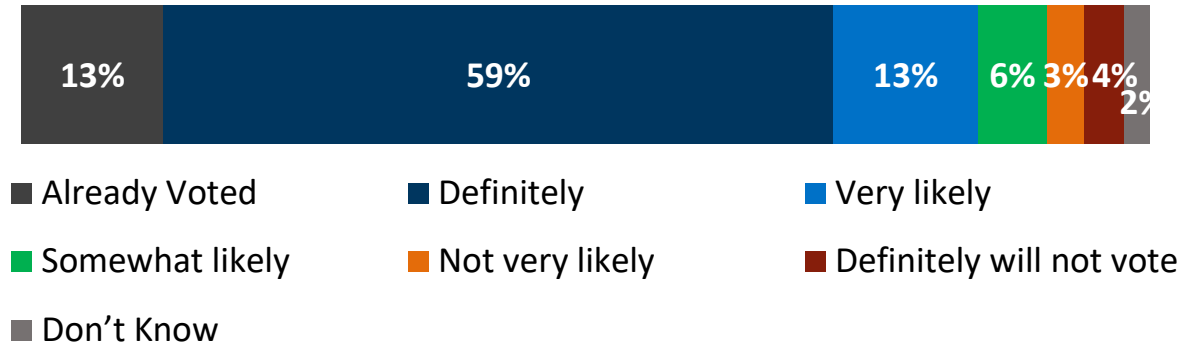
- Because turnout can impact the final election results, we also look at voting intention within groups of people that are more likely to turn up at the polling stations.
- The factors we use to measure likelihood to turn out are: 1) Their stated likelihood to vote; 2) Whether they've made up their mind; and 3) Whether they voted in 2019.

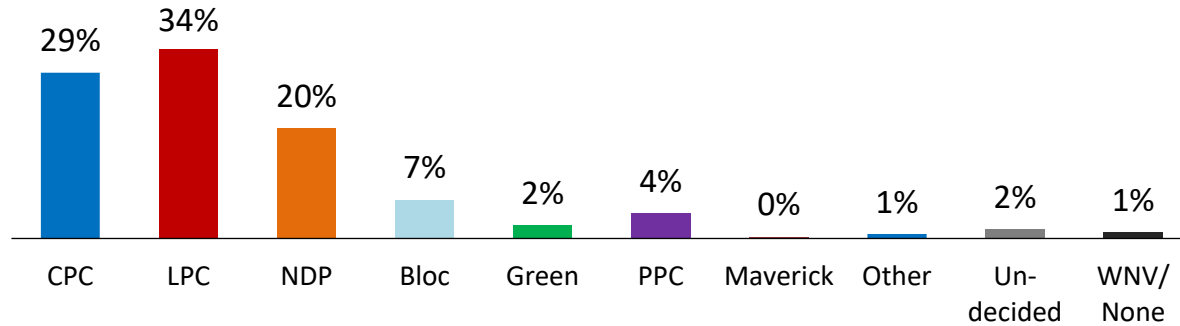

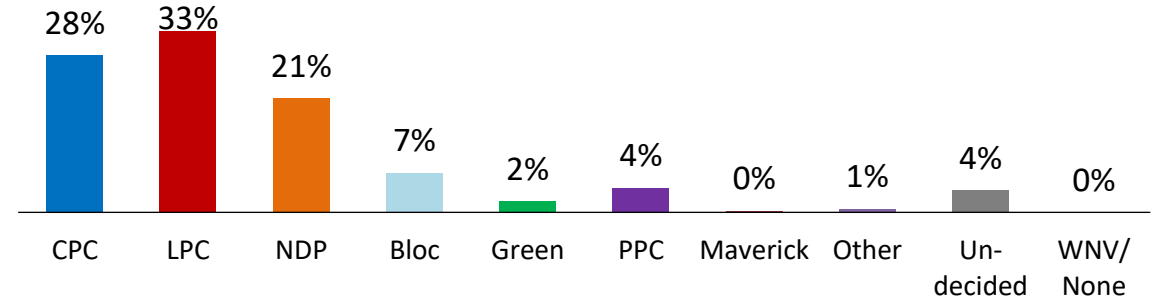

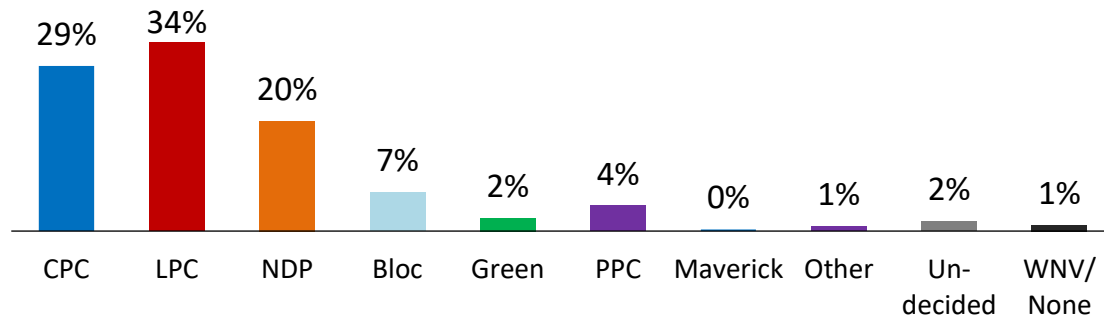
Combined vote: Definitely going to vote or already voted

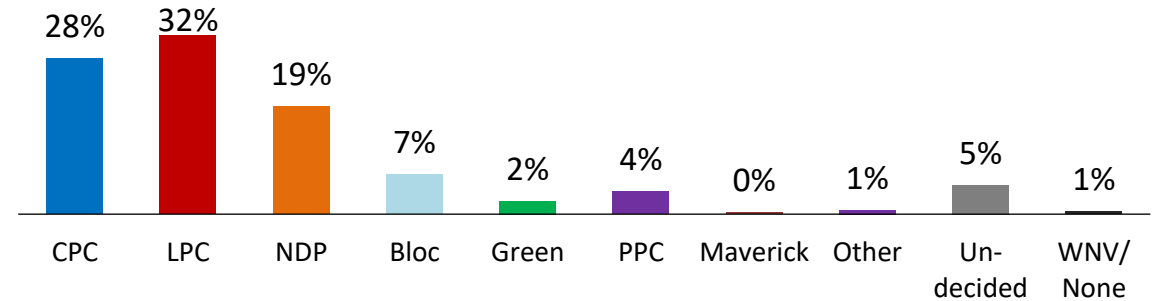

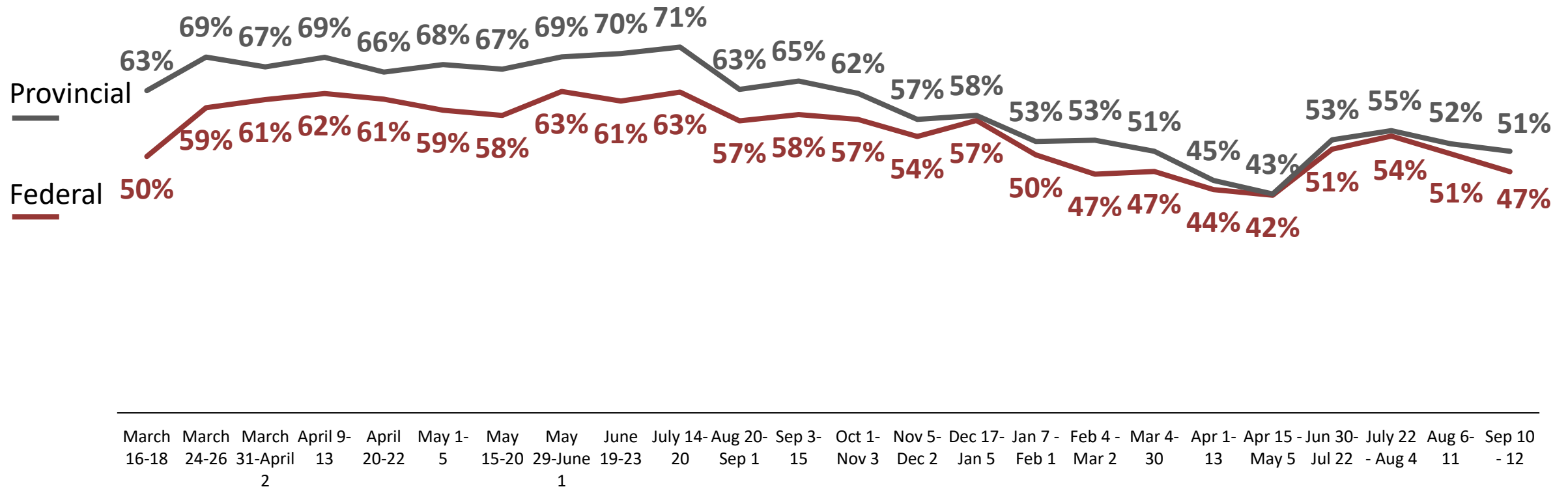

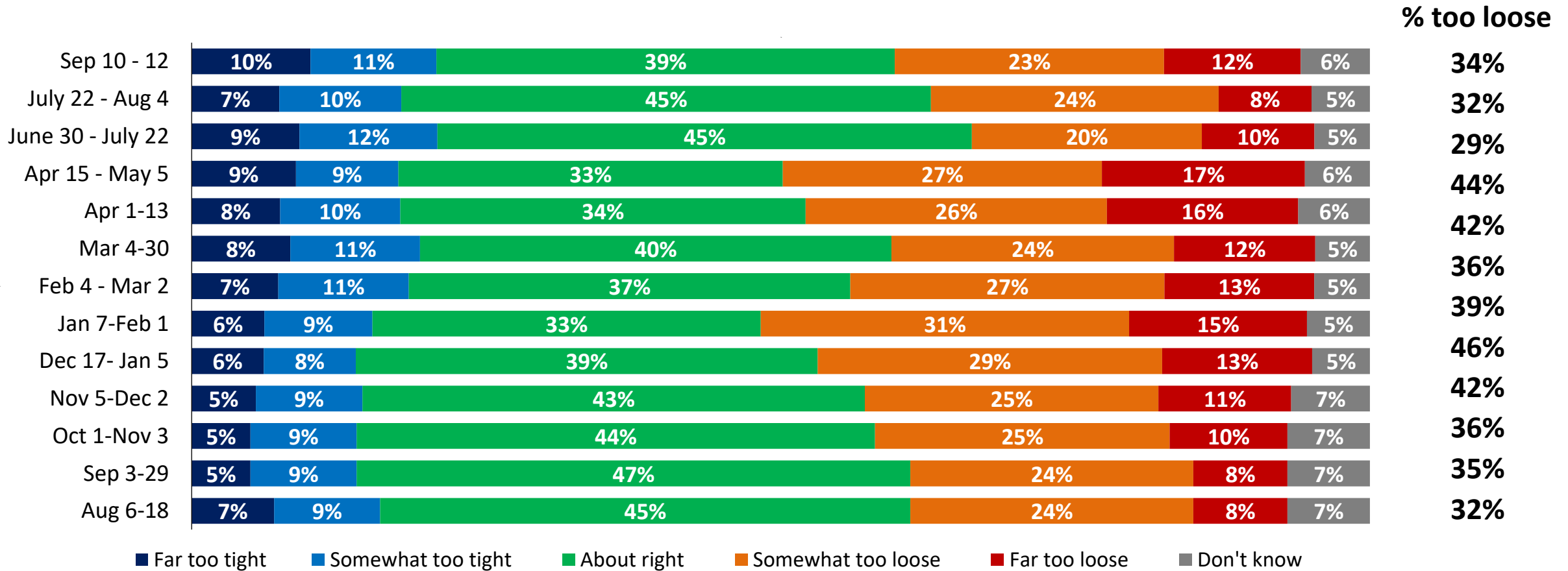


Federal Restrictions: Nearly 2-in-5 (39%) think federal restrictions are “about right”; 34% think “too loose”

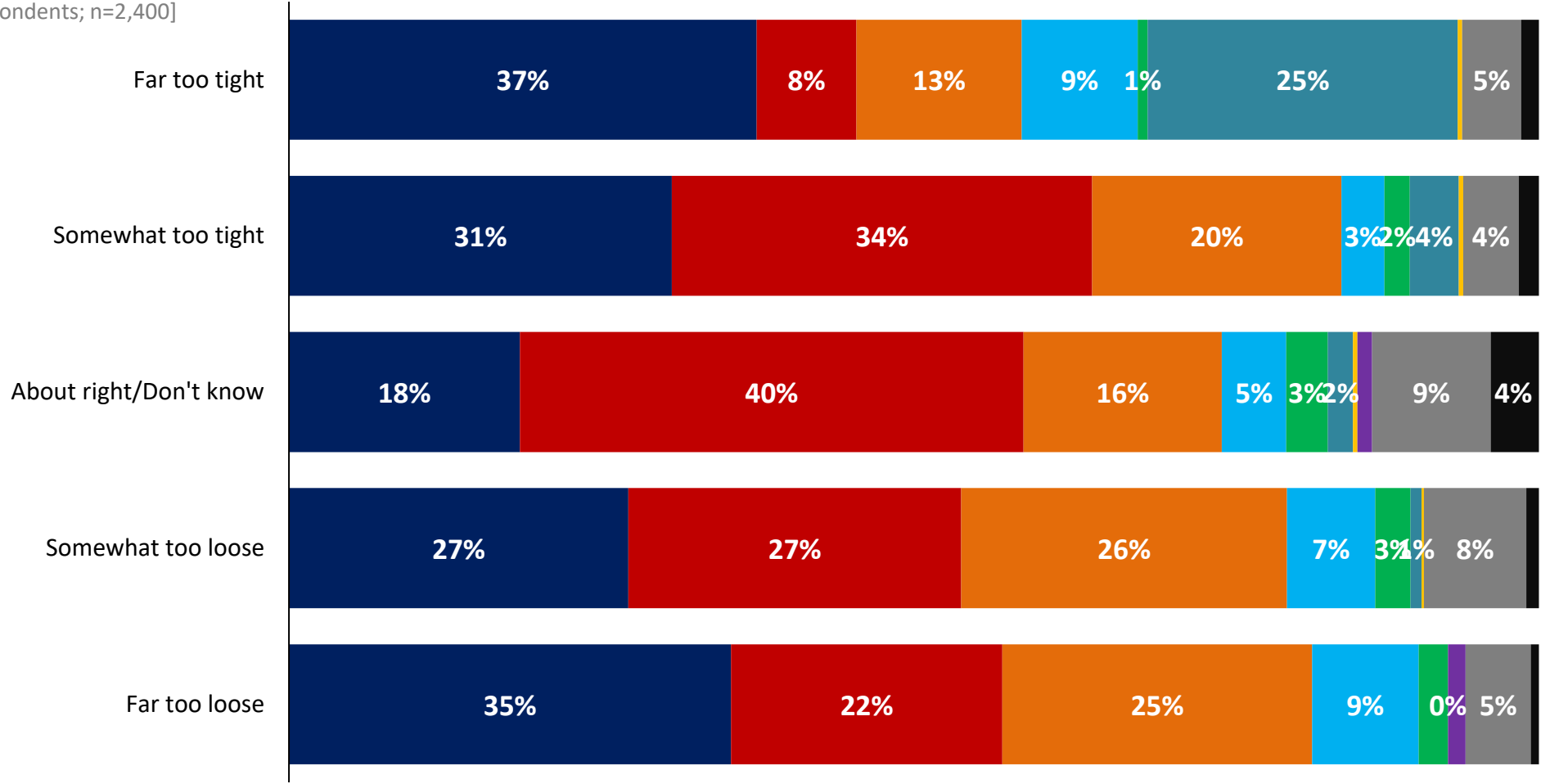

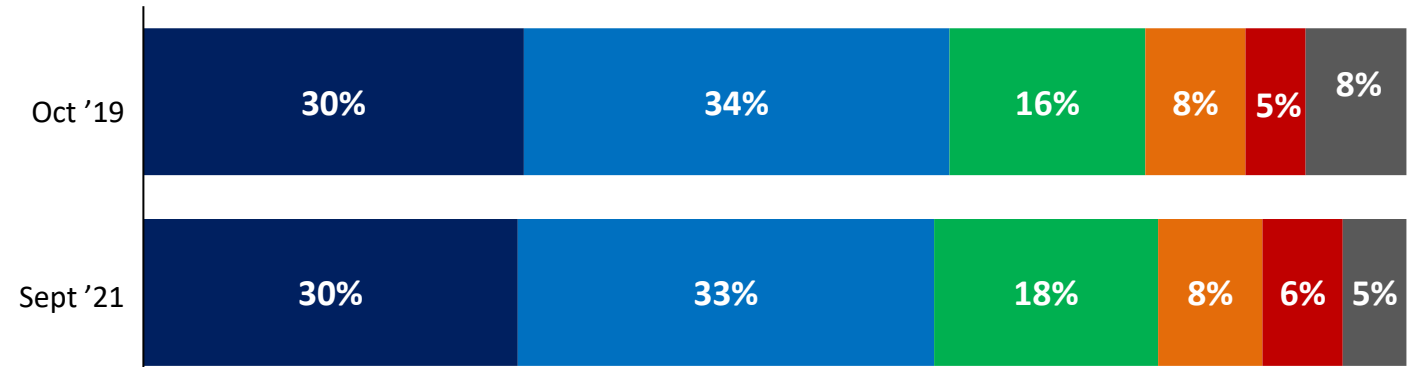

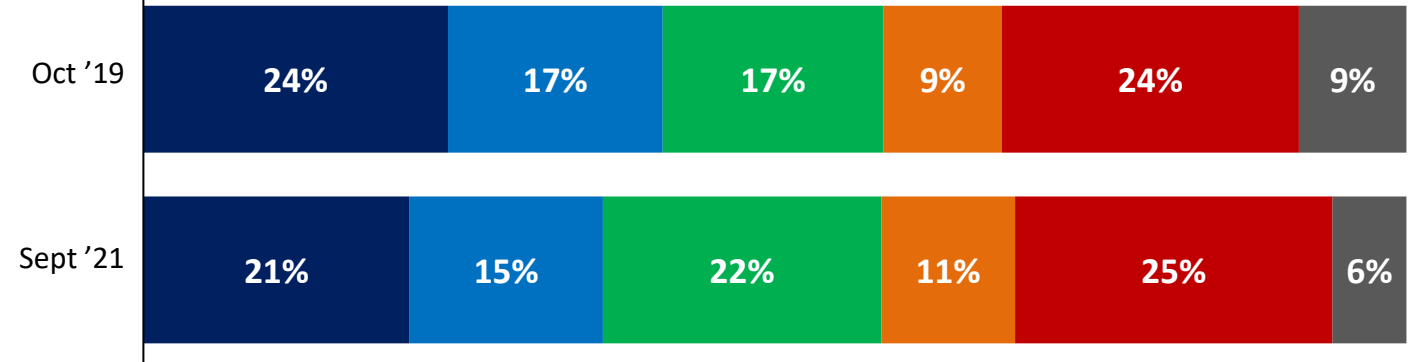

The most important thing in this election is to keep the Conservatives out of government

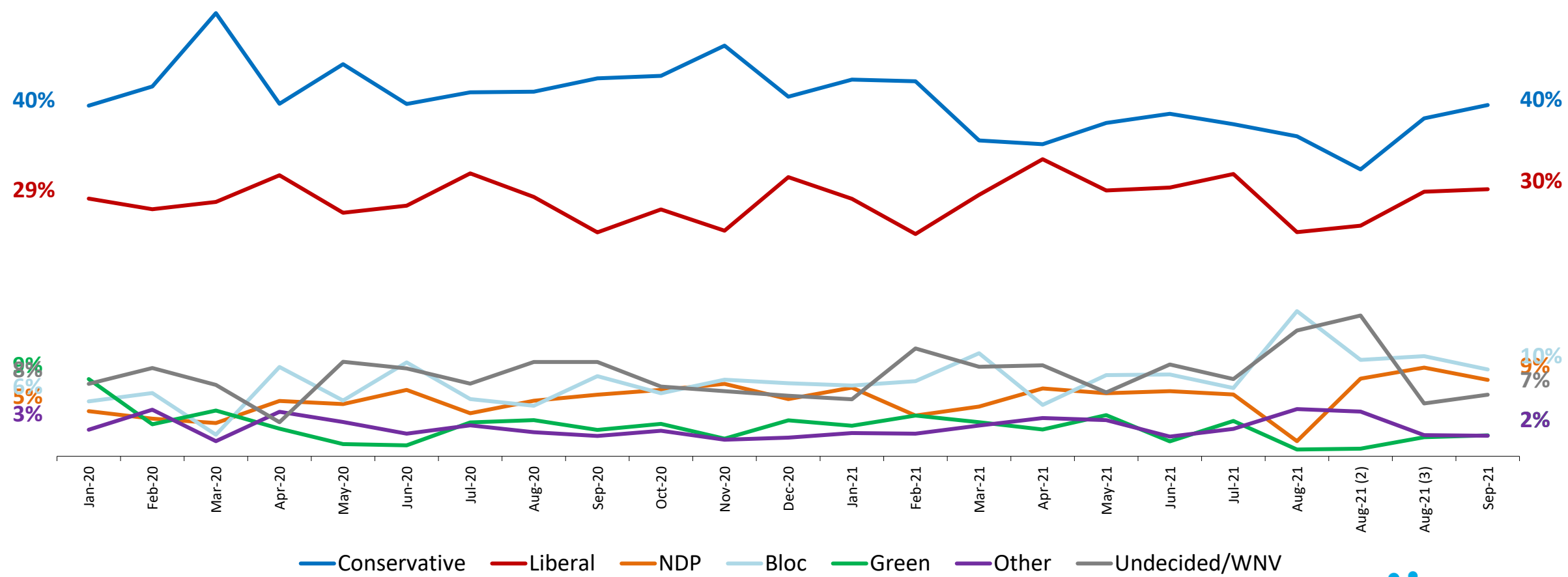

Deferral Conservative Vote: CPC holds gains among Deferral Conservative voters



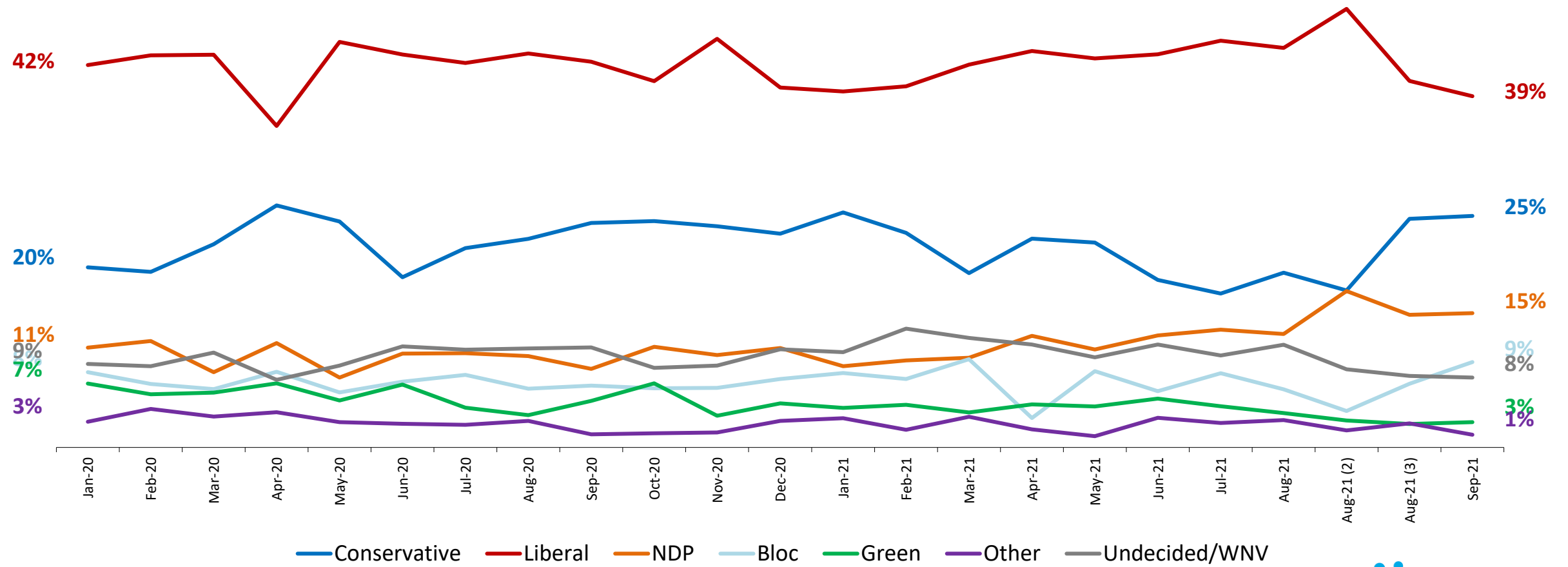
If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean]

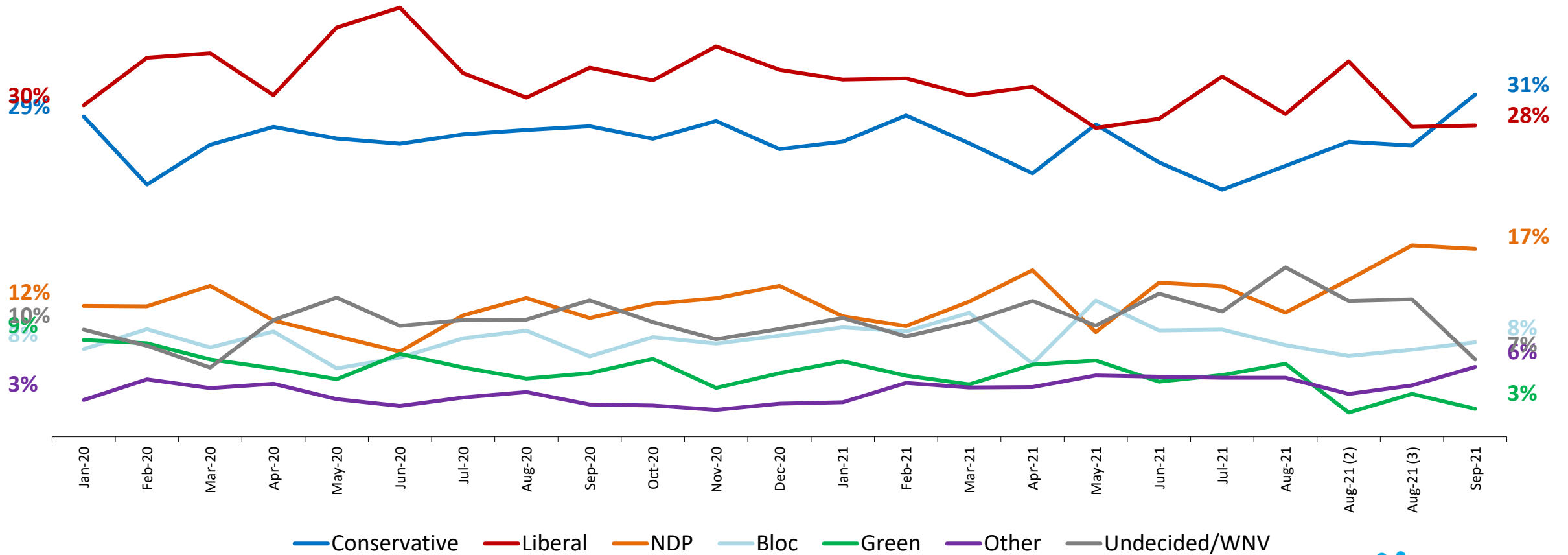

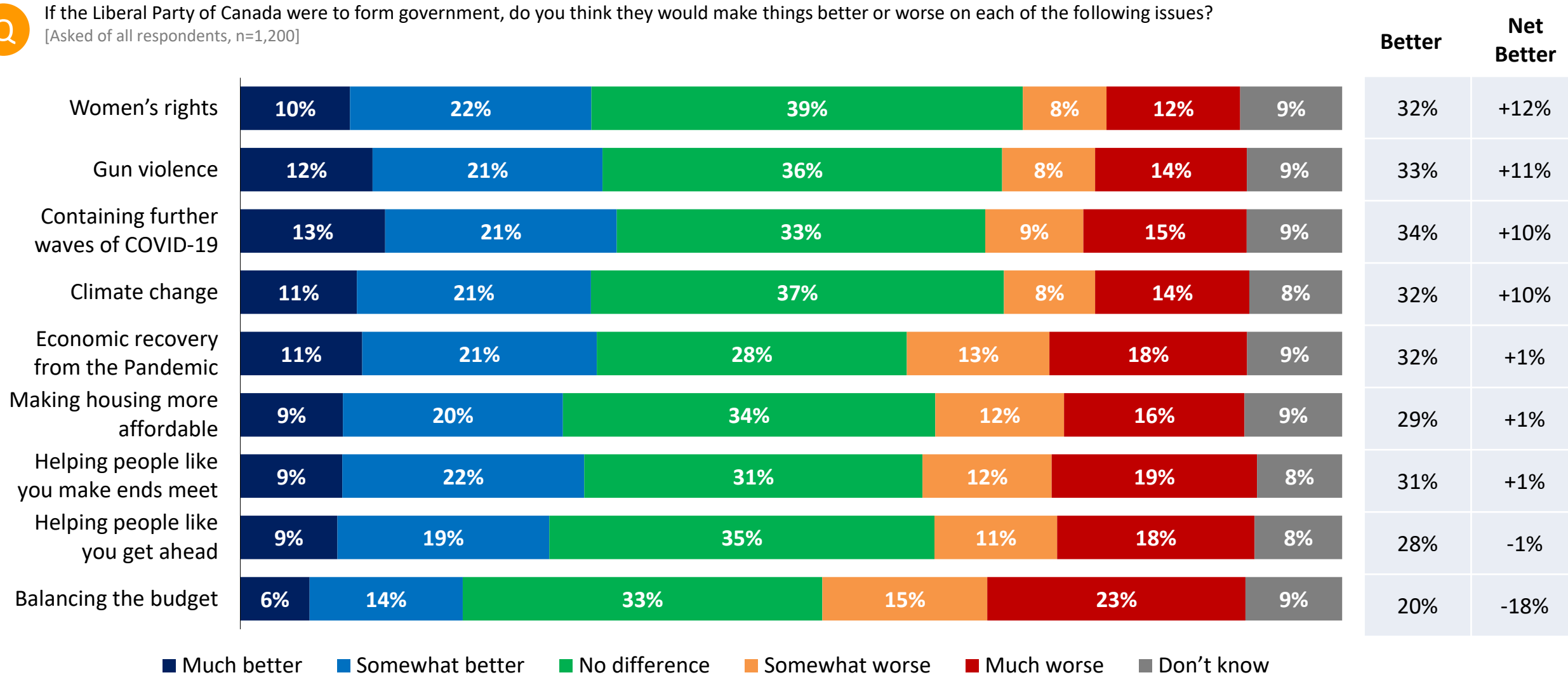


A LPC Government: The Liberals stand out on women's rights, gun violence, COVID-19 and climate change



If the Liberal Party of Canada were to form government, do you think they would make things better or worse on each of the following issues?

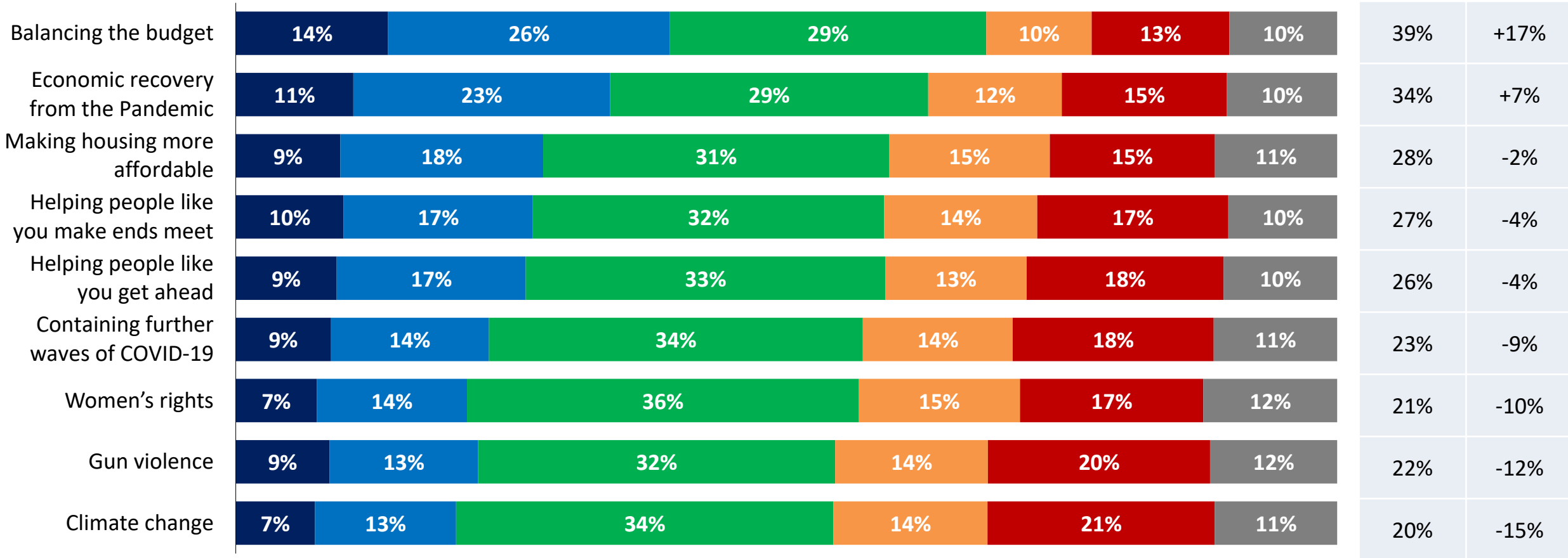

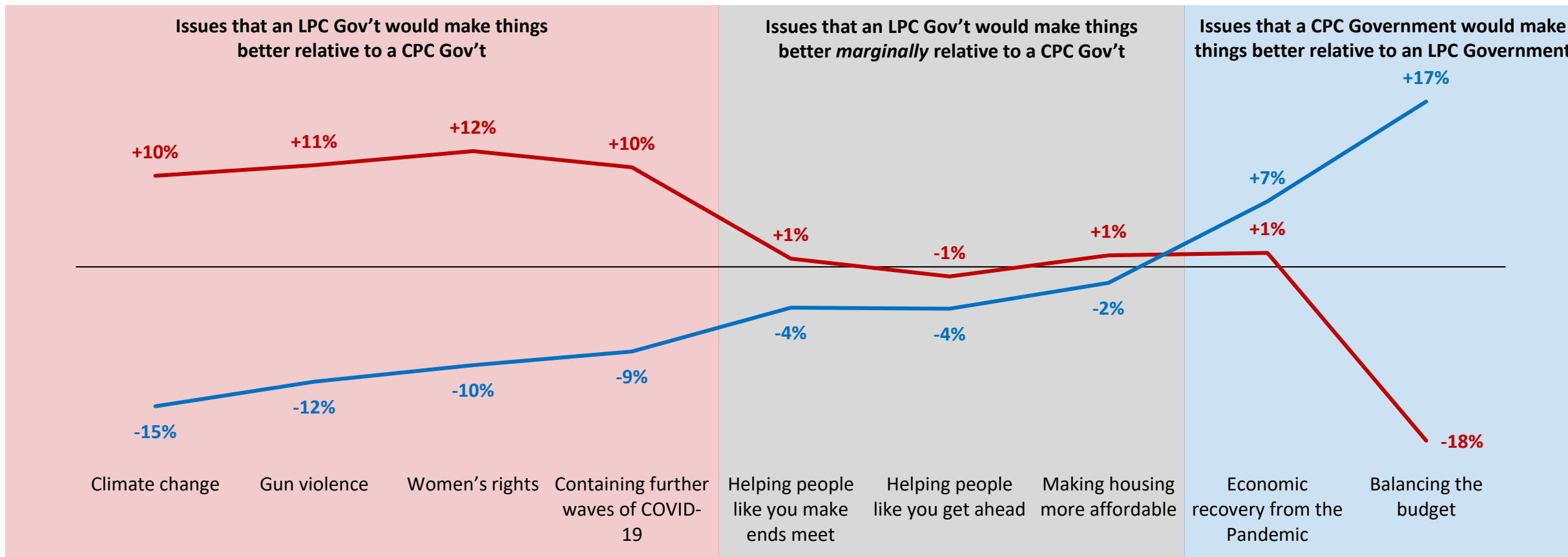
LPC vs CPC Gov't: A LPC Gov't would make things better on climate change, gun violence, women's rights, and containing COVID
