ITEM A7(1) NOTICE OF MOTION – NATIVE TIMBER HARVESTING ENDING

I, Councillor Malcolm Hole, hereby give notice of my intention to move the following motion at the Ordinary Meeting of Council on 19 November 2019.

In relation to the State Government's recent announcement that native timber harvesting will be phased out by 2030, with an immediate end to old growth logging, that:

1. the Mayor write to the Premier of Victoria, expressing this Council's profound disappointment with this surprise decision. It is particularly vexing that mill operators, Councils, the directly affected communities and other key industry stakeholders were given no opportunity for input or comment into a critical decision that was taken unilaterally and in an apparent shroud of government secrecy. This decision is at odds with the Government's publicly stated aim of establishing community engagement platforms like Regional Partnerships to recognise that "... local communities are in the best position to understand the challenges and opportunities faced by their region".

Further, that Council seeks specific comments from the Premier regarding:

- a. In the interests of transparency, the Government must make public the scientific and peer reviewed evidence that it used on which to base its decision and conclude that existing forestry practices are unsustainable;
- b. The impact this decision will have on regional employment. By way of example, Australian Sustainable Hardwoods in Heyfield employs 170 local Gippsland workers, around 114 of these in their rapidly growing advanced manufacturing as the domestic demand for quality hardwood continues to grow. Ironically, the Government owns 49% of this business that also supports approximately 10,000

downstream jobs located throughout Victoria. What assurance and evidence can the Government provide that all these jobs will be secured?

While the Government has moved to retain employment security at Australian Paper in the Latrobe Valley, there seems scant regard for the hundreds of timber workers who will be impacted elsewhere. The announcement of \$120m to assist two 'Community Transition Leaders' work with affected workers, communities and businesses comes with no detail and no strategy other than a vague assurance that the Government will 'help us work through this'. Will the Government guarantee that there will be no net job losses in these communities as a result of this decision?

There are no details for any support packages, which we understand will not become available until 2024. Why won't they be made available immediately?

c. Council has already heard many bushfire experts advising that with these announced changes to forestry practices, the potential for bushfire emergency will become catastrophic. Specifically, the decision will lead to large capacity machines like bulldozers, excavators and graders being removed from fire prone forests, including the local knowledge of the machine operators, that are invaluable in the event of a large-scale fire.

Further, existing access roads will be closed or fall into disrepair, with many of these roads normally being used as a 'Plan B' or secondary route in the event of a large-scale fire. What is the Government's plan to fund the upkeep of these roads, and who will fill the gap left by Forest Fire Management Victoria after their departure?

In short, what specific plans does the Government have to ensure our local communities are not subjected to increased risk?

COUNCILLOR MAHER

There are currently signs warning of footpath hazards around the Alberton township. Can the CEO inform the Council about whether there are proposed works to be undertaken to address the footpath hazards, what is the proposed timeline to complete these works and have Alberton residents been notified?

The following information is supplied in response:

Defect inspections for footpaths are undertaken routinely in line with Council's Road Management Plan requirements. During previous inspections, a number of footpath defects were identified along the shared path in the Alberton township. As a result, yellow hazard signs have been installed at key locations to assist in highlighting the defects, alerting the public to the hazards and indicating that renewal works are programmed for the path.

Council awarded contract 2020-004 Footpath Renewal Works at its ordinary meeting of 6 November 2019. Works under this contract include renewal of the Alberton shared path, from Thomson Street to north of Rankin Street. On site works are programmed to occur between December 2019 and February 2020. Hazard signage related to path defects will be removed once path renewal works have been undertaken.

Residents abutting this path will be notified when specific on-site construction timing has been determined prior to the commencement of works.
