Mulligan Room Kitchen Expansion Update

In 2022, the Board approved a one-time special assessment of \$19 per property for the purpose of expanding the Mulligan Room kitchen. The Mulligan Room kitchen, originally designed to serve hot dogs and sandwiches to golfers, has become a full-service restaurant, open seven days a week, with full menus for breakfast, lunch and dinner. The kitchen expansion will allow increased volume of food preparation and faster food service. Once approved, the goal was to submit plans to Kern County Building Department for permits and order the new appliances and supplies in time for construction to start in February to be ready for our seasons of high customer volume in spring and summer.

As it stands, to-date plans have not yet been approved by Kern County Building Department and the new appliances and supplies are currently back ordered, which would mean that construction would not begin until we are already in the busiest season. The BVSA Board and staff have made the decision that rather than ask residents and staff to navigate around a construction project in the months with traditionally the highest use of this amenity, we will postpone construction to January 2024. This will ensure ample time to make

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Spring cleaning and home projects

The first day of spring is March 19. Many of us will begin "spring cleaning" and make future plans for outdoor projects this time of year. Below are a few reminders for residents as you consider projects:

• As you are cleaning the interior of your home, please remember that no garbage, trash, junk, debris, interior furnishings or household appliances may be kept or stored where it is visible from neighboring lots or streets, roads, or common areas. All garbage/trash needs to be in appropriate covered containers and are not to be viewed from neighboring lots, or the streets, roads or common areas. A contributing factor to the recent increase in bear and wildlife activity is due


to residents storing trash outside. ECC Rules, Sec. 112 & 114

- If you are utilizing tarps to cover wood piles, barbecues, yard furniture, etc., please remember that the tarps must be black, brown, tan, or dark green in color. No white, blue, shiny, reflective silver or other brightly colored tarps may be used. ECC Rules, Sec. 109
- Be aware of mistletoe overtaking your oak trees! Mistletoe can rob trees of their nutrients through absorbing water and minerals. While you do need approval from the ECC to trim major branches or remove an oak tree, you do NOT need a permit if you are solely removing mistletoe. If you are using a contractor, please make sure that you check that they are licensed and bonded with worker's compensation insurance so that you are not responsible for any injury that could happen on your property. Any other

type of trees with the exception of oak trees may be trimmed or removed without ECC approval. Please plan to remove any dead trees on your property that could pose a fire hazard. ECC Rules, Sec. 106

- With spring's arrival, mustard and other weeds multiply like, well, weeds! Each lot must be maintained in good condition and repair, and in such a manner as not to create a fire hazard, all at the Owner's expense. Maintenance includes weed and dead shrub removal as needed to improve appearance as much as possible. Although Kern County has particular weed abatement deadlines, the ECC Rules are to be complied with throughout the year. Let's work together to keep the valley safe from fire hazards and keep the appearance and beauty for all of us to enjoy! ECC Rules, Sec. 102.E & 118
- In acknowledgment that one household's junk could be another person's treasure, you may desire to have a yard/garage sale this spring or summer! Please plan ahead as permit requests must be submitted a full week prior to your sale. Each lot may have three garage/yard sales per calendar year and may not have sales on two consecutive weekends or on BVSA recognized holidays. Each permit grants the resident up to three yard sale signs for up to three days in a row. The permit costs \$50 - (\$25 of which is refundable upon return of the signs in cleaned and satisfactory condition). Please plan to pay with two \$25 checks or cash only. ECC Rules, Sec. 103.B.
- Remember that property owners need to complete a submittal form for approval before any construction or alterations

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The Adventures of Mistletoe and Company: Part 1

As many of you hopefully know, the Lake Quality Advisory Committee (LQAC) once again collected Christmas trees for aquatic fish habitat this year. In all, 86 trees were donated and this is where the story of Mistletoe begins.

Mistletoe started out as one of 140 very small unnamed seeds contained within a pinecone, growing in the branches of a mature Noble Fir. The seed cone that contained Mistletoe's seed was likely harvested around Labor Day and the seeds prepared for planting into the ground the following spring. Once planted, Mistletoe's journey to adulthood began. He would spend the next 12 years growing on a tree farm among other Christmas trees. On that farm, Mistletoe provided homes and shelter to birds, insects, squirrels and possibly, even the occasional tree frog. Mistletoe grew tall and once he reached a height of seven feet, he was cut down and transferred to a Christmas tree market in the city of Tehachapi. This is where Mistletoe would meet his true family.

In early December, Bo and Jensen Krempien finally con-

vinced their parents it was time for a real Christmas tree. Like all parents, they have too much to do and not enough time. So, one Saturday morning with their schedules adjusted, and the dog, Remington walked, it was time to load everyone into the truck and go pick a tree. The family visited several tree markets looking for the perfect tree. They were a little dismayed and disappointed over their lack of luck, but there was time for one last stop. As the kids unloaded out of the vehicle and began to run through their favorite tree market, Brite Creek Farms, it was like Santa reached out and touched them. Bo and Jensen had merely rounded the first corner among the maze of trees, when, as if by magic they both stopped dead in their tracks and stood in awe at the magnificence of the tree before them. There was for once instant agreement between brother and sister - this was their tree. The parents agreed and after an expensive price tag, the tree was theirs. Mom suggested donating the tree to Bear Valley so it could be recycled and used as fish habitat. As the family arrived to their home in BVS, the decorating could begin and the tree naming game that had so recently distracted the kids was quickly forgotten. That evening after dinner Bo, Remington the dog, and Jensen sat on the couch admiring their tree and dreaming of the presents that would soon be underneath him, when they realized they still hadn't named him. At that moment the kids looked up and saw mom and dad underneath the mistletoe. Bo instantly said, "I want to call the tree Mistletoe!" Jensen re-

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Canine Companions at Tailwaggers meeting



Have you ever wondered what it takes to raise a Canine Companion dog? Or, have you been interested in what it takes for a dog to become that trusted companion who can help make life easier for someone with a disability? Canine Companions shared that and more at the most recent Tailwaggers meeting.

Canine Companions explained that the journey begins at eight weeks when you receive a fluffy adorable puppy. Puppy raisers then socialize and train the puppy with about 40 commands and basic tasks over the course of 18 months, which prepares the puppy for advanced training. During this time, you attend

two puppy classes a month and take your pups all over town, introducing them to different sounds and environments. After 18 months, turn-in day arrives and your puppy enters Advanced Training. Next, they are paired with a trainer and you will receive a monthly update on progress. In about 6 months, these dogs may become Hearing Dogs, Facility Dogs, PTSD Dogs, Service Dogs or Skilled Companions. They are then paired with someone who has a disability, where they will perform life changing work.

Canine Companions is a nonprofit organization that provides highly trained service dogs to people with a disability, free of charge. The Kern County Chapter of Canine Companions was formed in 2011 by Chapter Leader Melissa Billingsley. Our Chapter alone has raised 34 puppies for Canine

Companions.

On April 15, at 9 a.m. in the Whiting Center Green Room, join Fred Hicks, our resident fishing expert. In addition to working on the lakes within Bear Valley, Fred is also a professional fishing guide. This seminar will teach you all that is necessary to take a child to the lakes within Bear Valley and be successful while you're on the water. The seminar will be hands-on and Fred will cover the following topics: how to select the right rod and reel, tackle selection, knots,

equipment set up, casting, fish identification, fish handling, fish release, and participant questions.

We will be offering two different signup options, the seminar is for adults only, and space is limited to 12 participants. If necessary, we will consider adding additional sections. Prepayment is required and refunds will not be available for no-shows. No-shows will still receive the equipment from either option they signed up for. 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Water in the Moon?



The Moon has been perceived in modern times as an exceptionally dry body with no atmosphere to support surface water. The temperatures in sunlit areas of the surface would melt ice and, lacking an atmosphere, the vacuum would cause water to vaporize and dissipate into space. So, no flowing water – probably ever.

But, the enigmatic Moon has long held a secret.

The experimental Clementine probe of 1994 returned data strongly suggestive of ice at the permanently shadowed polar regions of the Moon, not warmed by sunlight. Clearly the Moon does not have polar ice caps like the Earth and Mars. The expectation was that ice lay below the surface. This was cause to particularly search for water ice in subsequent probes analyzing the



lunar surface. And, evidence continued to build up.

The most direct (literally) observation was the 2019 Lunar





Crater Observation and Sensing Satellite that fired a projectile into a crater suspected of containing water ice particles and then flew through the debris cloud. Water ice particles were detected in the collected material! Even more recently data from the airborne observatory SOFIA, operated from Palmdale, returned evidence of water locked in minerals even in sunlit portions of craters across the lunar surface. So, it may be more widespread than originally suspected and potentially equivalent to a 12-ounce bottle of water within a cubic meter of soil.

How did water get there? It may have been present since the moon was formed, deposited by comet and meteorite impacts, or carried from Earth's atmosphere via solar winds. Regardless, the presence of water ice holds promise for long-duration lunar habita-

tion if the water can be mined. This will surely be explored in peopled missions to the Moon over the coming decade. So, stay tuned!


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Easements vs. Rights-of-Way

We're often asked what the difference is between an easement and a Right-of-Way (ROW). Additionally, some property owners may not even realize that they have an easement on their property and what that means for them.

Easement

An easement is "a right to cross or otherwise use someone else's land for a specified purpose." An easement is a "nonpossessory" property interest that allows the holder of the easement to use property they do not own or possess. An easement doesn't allow the easement holder to occupy the land or exclude

others from the land unless they interfere with the easement holder's use. In contrast, the land possessor may continue to use the easement and exclude everyone except the land's easement holder.

Land affected or "burdened" by an easement is called a "servient estate," while the land or person benefited by the easement is known as the "dominant estate." If the easement benefits a particular piece of land, it's said to be "appurtenant" to the land. If the easement only benefits an individual personally, not as an owner of a particular piece of land, the easement is termed "in gross."

As a rule, an easement holder has a right to do whatever is reasonably convenient or necessary to enjoy fully the purposes for which the easement was granted so long as they do not place an unreasonable burden on the servient land. Conversely, the owner of the servient land may make any use of that land that does not interfere with the easement holder's use of the easement.

An easement may give a utility company the right to erect power lines or bury a gas pipeline across a land tract. The property owner still has a right to use the land through which the easement passes; however, they must take care not to impede the granted easement's original intention. For example, building a permanent structure on an easement would not be allowed. Understanding the permitted land usage will help landowners avoid frustrations and unnecessary expense to remove structures that impede the use of an easement.

A common issue here in Bear Valley Springs is the building of fences on an easement. Some of these easements have drainage structures on them, which could be anything from an earthen ditch to a concrete v-drain or covered pipe. Fences catch leaves and debris, creating blockages that increase the potential for flooding on the property. Fences also make it difficult for personnel or equipment to access the easement for maintenance activities.

Right-of-Way

A Right-of-Way (ROW) is "the legal right, established by usage or grant, to pass along a specific route through grounds or property belonging to another." A great example of ROW here in the District is our roads. Some may not realize that the ROW is

much broader than the pavement in the roadway. While a typical street in the District may have pavement that is 27' wide (Deertrail Drive, for example), the ROW is much wider – in some cases up to 15' more on each side (depending upon the location and designation of the road: Arterial, Collector, Residential)

Road ROWs measure from the center of the roadway. However, sometimes center-points may not line up with the center striping we see on the pavement – a point to consider when planning structures, permanent landscaping, or other domestic property uses. Residents must be careful not to install any items, including mirrors for sight distance, reflectors, non-authorized signs, etc., within the right-of-way.

Within Bear Valley Springs' boundaries, the District is responsible for maintenance work and other authorized use of the rights-of-way. We respond to the best of our abilities to requests for signs, striping, reflectors, and other traffic control devices. We take great pride in understanding how to maintain our roadways properly. We will also do our best to explain why we do what we do as far as maintenance in the roadway and work with our residents to solve any issues that may arise while using District roads.

Dressage is the French word for training: training the horse and rider from the very basics to the highest capabilities of both. According to dressage master Charles de Kunffy, it is "the systematic, gradual, and knowledgeable development of the horse's inherent athletic potential."

Dressage training will benefit any rider, because it addresses the very basics of horse and rider training. Dressage studies the development of the horse and uses the horse's natural abilities and movements to form the rider/horse partnership. The dressage rider learns how their aids (seat, weight, hands, and legs) affect the focus and movement of the horse.

The Pyramid of Training offers riders a system through which to develop the horse over time (USDF.) It starts with the horse's rhythm in each gate and progresses to relaxation, the suppleness and looseness of the horse's muscles. Next it focuses on the connection: the acceptance of the bit and the ability of the rider to direct the energy of the horse through their aids.

Once the rider has achieved those basics, they consider the horse's impulsion to assure that the horse has developed pushing power, achieved balance, and is pushing forward from his hindquarters. After that, the rider concentrates on the horse's straightness, the horse's alignment, and balance.



The highest level of training for both the rider and the horse is collection, "increased engagement, lightness of the forehand, and self-carriage." This is epitomized by the beauty of "dancing horses" at the Olympic level.

Dressage benefits all riders and horses, so If you're an English rider, this training program can be achieved using

Water Wise - Home leak diagnosis

Identifying water leaks saves you money and conserves our water supply. Follow these easy steps to determine if you have a leak in your household system.

Step 1. Turn all water-using appliances off so that no water is running. This means turning off all water inside and outside the home, including showers, sinks, washing machines, and any appliance that uses water. If you have a sprinkler irrigation

system, turn off the controller and manually shut off the two valves at the double check valve assembly to isolate the irrigation system.

Step 2. Take the lid off of your water meter box and lift the protective cover. For most homes in the valley, the water meter is located near the roadway.

Watch the meter. The meter will have a triangular red or silver and black disc commonly called a "leak indicator."

• If the leak indicator is spinning or there is no leak indicator, but the meter's dial hand moves, water is running. This indicates that you have a leak see Step 3.

• If the leak indicator is not moving, note the hand's position and check again after a 10-minute wait. If the needle has moved, there is a slow leak - see Step 3.

Step 3. Locate the main shutoff valve to the home. This is the point where your water enters your home, often in a garage. Turn this valve off and turn a faucet on inside the house to confirm that the valve

is working. The faucet may run for a few seconds as your pipes drain, but your shut-off valve is broken if water continues to flow. Once the water has been shut off to the home, return to the water meter.

• If the leak indicator or dial hand is still moving, water is flowing between the meter and the shut-off valve. This indicates that there is an underground leak on your property.

• If the leak indicator or dial hand are not moving, the leak is somewhere in the home.

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
Candy hunt on Saturday, April 8, at Beaubien Fields

SMALL STEPS TOWARD BEING PREPARED FOR AN EMERGENCY

Sheltering



THE GOAL: Know how to respond safely when instructions are given to evacuate or take shelter

In a disaster you may be asked to either evacuate or shelter-inplace. In the excitement of an emergency, it can be difficult to focus on what you are doing. Know what to do to keep your family safe. Practice your tornado and fire safety plans. If your family has practiced, they will be more comfortable doing it when the emergency actually happens.

DD CHOOSE ONE OF THE FOLLOWING THINGS TO DO THIS MONTH TO BECOME BETTER PREPARED:

Identify the best storm shelter in your home and practice getting to the shelter with your family.

Choosing the best place in your home or workplace to shelter from a tornado isn't always easy. Many newer buildings don't have a really good shelter area. Use these rules of thumb to find the best tornado shelter possible:

- Stay away from windows and skylights
- Shelter "down and in"—Put as many walls between yourself and the outside as you can (think of the ceiling as a wall)
- Avoid rooms with large ceiling expanses
- Find an area large enough for everyone to stay comfortably for at least 45 minutes

If you live in an area prone to hurricanes, be prepared to protect your family and your property. Cover windows with plywood or hurricane shutters when a hurricane warning is issued—don't use tape. If you are advised to evacuate, do so. Otherwise, stay inside and away from windows until the storm has completely passed.

Underground leaks between the meter and home can be challenging to diagnose and often require a professional's services. If you need information to help you locate the water lines on your property, the Kern County Building Department will have plumbing plans for all properties in the valley. If your home was built after 2000, the Bear Valley Springs Association might have construction plans on file.

The Bear Valley CSD staff are happy to be of assistance if you have any questions. We are here to serve our community, and we'll work hard to maintain the quality of life that can only be found in our beautiful valley. You can contact us at 661-821-4428, Monday through Friday, between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.



Learn how to safely shelter in place.

In an emergency like a chemical spill, you may be told to "shelter in place". This means to make the place where you are a safe place to stay until the danger has passed. Shelter in place orders are given when it would be dangerous for you to go outside.

Notification—Warning sirens may be used to warn people that it is not safe to be outside. Emergency responders may go door to door in the affected area. They may also use loudspeakers from police or fire vehicles to give instructions. Information will also be given over television and radio using the Emergency Alert System.

What to do in a hazardous materials incident—The first thing to do when a chemical spill or similar event occurs is to get information. Turn on the television or radio to find out if your area is affected and what steps to take. Never call 911 to get information about an emergency. Only call 911 if you are injured or need assistance.

If you are told to shelter in place you should close all doors and windows and shut off fans and air conditioners. Take your family to a room with as few doors and windows as possible. You may be told to put towels or tape around the cracks of the windows and doors. Follow emergency instructions carefully. Make sure you take a battery-powered radio with you so that you will know when the danger has passed. Power in your area may be shut off during the incident.

\square Make a Go Bag for emergency sheltering.

Emergency shelters will be opened when people are displaced from their homes. In most areas emergency shelters are operated by the American Red Cross. At the Red Cross Shelter:

RED CROSS WILL PROVIDE

- · A cot to sleep on
- · Meals and bottled water
- A nurse for basic medical care
- Information about the disaster from public officials

YOU MAY NEED TO BRING

- Pillow and blanket
- Identification
- · Change of clothes
- · Cards or magazines
- · Comfort items
- Your medication and medical supplies (or a list of what you are taking, dosage, and Dr's names)

NOT ALLOWED AT THE SHELTER

- · Weapons or alcohol
- Pets (except for service animals)

The Red Cross will never provide information about you to anyone without your permission. There is never any charge for emergency sheltering.


