2020 Project 3 - TIMES SQUARE KISS: Draw What Matters - A Vintage Scene from start to finish

One of the most recognizable war photos portrays a U.S. Navy sailor grabbing and kissing a nurse—on Victory over Japan Day ("V-J Day") in New York City's Times Square on August 14, 1945. The photograph was published the next day in the New York Times.

As with many vintage photos, there are elements that are hard to see....often the face or hands are not clear in their transition to clothing or between subjects. Because of the low resolution, the fine details are lost. But we can re-capture them with our own interpretation of this great picture. Darrel will walk us through how to define those unclear elements and create a wonderful drawing that will be both challenging and rewarding. In this 8-part collection he will teach:

- How to overcome the unique challenges presented by a vintage reference image (and not be distracted by imperfections in the picture)
- How to depend on the strong principles we have learned
- To draw what we see, and creatively expound on that to clarify the important transitions
- Exactly how to capture the distinct angles and characteristics that best tell the story of the subjects
- How to draw the "soft," out of focus textures in a reference image that can be hard to interpret, but add a sense of drama to your work
- How to draw hair and clothing textures with just five pencils, an eraser, and a soft-bristled brush (no blending stump needed)

2020 Project 4 - SINGING IN THE RAIN - Triad White Pencil on Black Paper

IMPORTANT!...We will not be using the normal pencils and paper so please make sure you have the needed materials for this project. See below.

It's time to do another "Drawing in Reverse" project. It has been several years and we have had many requests to tackle another one. Some great subjects have been chosen for this collection!

We have selected three elements from this fun, well-loved 1950's musical. So.....Why fight it? Let's just go with it. Our feet are already having a good time. Let them take us where they want to go. Let's just dance and sing in the rain. Throw away your inhibitions. Be brave. What a unique experience this will be. Let's see if we can capture the joy or the theme and purpose of this special moment. After all, as Vivian Greene once said, "Life isn't about waiting for the storm to pass. It's about learning how to dance in the rain."

It will be a fun challenge to capture the mood in this dramatic project. Some elements are subtle, but we can still isolate and express them. You will find what you want the focus to be, and create an environment to reinforce that.

Darrel will guide you through each step:

- Even though some of the photos will be dark, he will help you to establish light direction, find depth and be able to separate dimensions.
- You will learn the valuable technique of taking value off and adding it on
- How to manage your values, clean edges to value, contrast, and keep all those elements balanced

DRAWING TOOLS AND MATERIALS NEEDED:

- PENCILS You will need ALL THREE of these white pencils. Each pencil varies in intensity and wax content and serves a different purpose.
 - 1. PRISMACOLOR COL-ERASE WHITE 20055: This is a must have if you can find it! This pencil is the best Darrel has found for laying down a base that can be easily removed when necessary
 - 2. PRISMACOLOR VERITHIN WHITE 734: A softer white pencil for adding that next level of intensity.
 - 3. PRISMACOLOR PREMIER WHITE PC938: The softest of the three pencils, the premier pencil contains the most wax and can be used for increasing intensity and finishing. *Option 2 -- Derwent Studio Chinese White No.72: On par with the Prismacolor Premier. Softer, more intense, and difficult to remove from your paper.
- DRAWINGBOARD Since this is a triad, smaller paper can be used depending on the size you want your finished project to be. There are three specific types of black drawing board that will work well for the upcoming project:
 - 1. Canson Art Board—Black Drawing 16" x 20" 199-7130
 - 2. Crescent 9944 black Matboard
 - Black foamboard: Often used for school presentations and projects. Black and solid on both sides but soft foam in the center. Be careful not to squish it.
- You will need all the other items we use in each project straightedge/ruler, kneaded eraser, brush, Tombow Mono Zero Eraser, q-tips, cotton balls
