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About the EXPOSED Wildlife Conservancy

HISTORY

The EXPOSED Wildlife Conservancy (EWC) began as a web series devoted to informing large online audiences about pressing wildlife conservation issues in Canada and the need to protect our apex predators. Since then, the organization has evolved rapidly to promote conservation efforts.

EWC is now a recognized non-profit organization with an environmental focus that is dedicated to creating visual content that informs, educates, and inspires change in how our wildlife and wilderness is managed and protected. We are currently in the process of obtaining charitable status and developing charitable activities.

To continue down this path of effective conservation efforts combined with continued growth in scope, it is imperative that we position ourselves for success by way of achievable goals and strategies — and, more importantly, measurables through which to achieve those goals.

MISSION

The EXPOSED Wildlife Conservancy is a Canadian not-for-profit environmental organization dedicated to protecting the environment for the benefit of the public by conserving ecosystems through saving, supporting, protecting, and/or assisting stressed or endangered forms of animal life, with a major focus on apex predators such as bears, wolves, and cougars and their habitats.

VISION

Our vision is for the EXPOSED Wildlife Conservancy to become a recognized leader in wildlife advocacy for apex predators in Western Canada. We want the public, government, business, and media to seek out EWC as an expert advisor on all issues related to apex predators.

We also want Canada to become a country that celebrates its apex predators—a nation that honours and appreciates bears, wolves, and cougars for their natural beauty and intrinsic value to our ecosystems. We envision a future where visitors travel from around the world to Canada for the unique opportunity to see these impressive predators in the wild and to learn how Canadians coexist with them.



More broadly, we envision a Canada that entrusts its wildlife and biodiversity with a balanced approach including both Western Science and traditional indigenous ecological knowledge, resulting in an overhauled wildlife management system that better represents public values. A Canada that lives in a harmonious relationship with nature, not an adversarial one.

MISSION AND VISION OUTCOMES

Part of the EWC's Mission and Vision outcomes will see people from around the world visit Canada for the adventure and pleasure of learning about these incredible animals and to witness first-hand how Canadians coexist with the natural world. It is our goal for Canada to be recognized as a country that actively appreciates our unique ecosystem, with healthy soil, vegetation, water, and myriad wildlife species working symbiotically in manners clear and unclear to humans.

Apex predators can be intimidating but through education, Canadians can better understand how to live side-by-side with these powerful animals and we will continue to tell their stories so the rest of the world can enjoy them as well. We also endeavor to make two-eyed seeing part of our process and ensure it becomes part of how our wildlife is managed. One eye is on western science the other looking at traditional ecological knowledge as well as indigenous perspectives, concerns, and concepts.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

The EWC co-founders and staff follow a set of guiding principles in all organization efforts:

- Seek science-based research and evidence to guide our projects and campaigns.
- Remain politically unbiased.
- Pursue legislation to uphold ethical and scientifically sound trapping and hunting practices.
- Conduct ourselves in a socially responsible and ethical manner.
- Be positive stewards of the environment.
- Pursue diversity and inclusivity in our team.

PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

EWC's current programs and services currently fall into 4 primary areas of focus:

- 1. Establishing Carnivore Conservation Areas to protect ecosystems as well conserve and project the wildlife and biodiversity therein
- 2. Developing human-wildlife coexistence management programs
- 3. Developing and delivering educational training, courses, seminars, workshops and conferences that promote the conservation of apex predators
- 4. Sharing our research and findings through videography, photography, and storytelling

While distinctly separate in nature and execution, these four focus areas work together towards the EWC's overall goals, feeding into one another and creating a system of ongoing betterment for the organization, its practices, and through the EWC's services and offerings.

The purpose of these activities is to:

- 1. Deepen the general public's awareness, appreciation, and understanding of apex predators and other wildlife by sharing documented, science-based research and indigenous perspectives on core topics, including, but not limited to:
 - 1.1. Population management
 - 1.2. The role of hunting and trapping
 - 1.3. Animal welfare and disease
 - 1.4. Human-wildlife coexistence
- 2. To create meaningful and impactful change at the government level in relation to the treatment and management of apex predators
- 3. Creating humane, science and indigenous-based solutions that will allow humans and wildlife to coexist, working with a coalition of animal welfare groups, biologists, indigenous consultants, and environmentalists.
- 4. Establishing wild spaces where apex predators can live freely and safely away from human interference

John E. Marriott is one of Canada's premier professional wildlife and nature photographers, with images published worldwide by National Geographic, BBC Wildlife, Canadian Geographic, McLean's, and Reader's Digest. He is a CANON Ambassador, an Associate Fellow with the International League of Conservation Photographers, a former contributing editor for Outdoor Photography Canada magazine and the host of the original popular web series EXPOSED with John E. Marriott.

John has produced six coffee table books and one guidebook, including three Canadian bestsellers: Banff & Lake Louise: Images of Banff National Park (2007); Wildlife of the Canadian Rockies: A Glimpse at Life on the Wild Side (2008); and, The Canadian Rockies: Banff, Jasper & Beyond (2009). He most recently released The Pipestones: The Rise and Fall of a Wolf Family in August 2016 and Tall Tales, Long Lenses: My Adventures in Photography in November 2017.

John is the owner/operator of <u>Canadian Wildlife Photography Tours</u>, featuring wildlife photo adventures, workshops, and expeditions to out-of-the-way Canadian locales. He prides himself on being a conservation photographer known for photographing wilderness scenes and wild, free-roaming animals in their natural habitats.
