

ArtWeek Berkshires 2023 Invites Registrations



County-Wide Event Announces Call for Artists in All Disciplines

Berkshire County's five Cultural Districts are partnering again on ArtWeek Berkshires 2023, to be held October 14-22.

The coalition <u>posted its call for artists</u>, and encourages submissions before the end of September. The non-juried event is free, and submissions from all artistic and creative disciplines are welcome and encouraged. **Over 60 events are registered already!**

Funds pooled by the five cultural districts from Mass Cultural Council will bring greater exposure to this year's event. Promotions include billboards within Berkshire County, thanks to support from LAMAR Outdoor; print and digital ads in Berkshire Magazine; print and digital ads on the Berkshire Eagle's website; advertising on WAMC; a rack card and a web-based map to help people easily find events on a landing page hosted by 1Berkshire, the primary promotional partner of ArtWeek Berkshires.

Great Barrington Public Theater



"Theater is currently going through a bit of an existential crisis," says Jim Frangione, Artistic Director of <u>Great Barrington Public Theater (GBPT)</u>. He's talking about COVID and its aftermath—audiences retreating from live performance and the threat that still poses, especially to theaters like GBPT focused on developing new works. Many of the developmental theaters across the US are facing monumental challenges. The Lark in New York City recently closed; the Humana Festival of New American Plays in Louisville is on an extended hiatus; and the Oregon Shakespeare Festival has had staff lay-offs. The list goes on.

Yet Frangione remains optimistic about the future of theater and is so encouraged by the welcome GBPT has already received. "We're a theater focused on small casts and new plays, with a focus on local talent. This year, GBPT's third season has seen rave reviews and audience responses for new shows like *The Stones*, *Off Peak*, *Just Another Day*, and in collaboration with The Mount, *Representation and How to Get It*.

An actor in New York City for many years on and off Broadway and in films and TV, Frangione met his wife, Anne O'Dwyer, 20 years ago while she was in NYC for a sabbatical, and she introduced him to the Berkshires. O'Dwyer is a longtime psychology

professor at Bard College at Simon's Rock, where Great Barrington Public Theater makes its summer home. The theater's office is located at Saint James Place, where it presents developmental readings of new plays and events all year long. Frangione observes, "We're beholden to our friends Fred and Sally Harris for their vision and for creating Saint James Place and to Simon's Rock for the support of their superb staff."

Frangione first got started here in the Berkshires co-leading Berkshire Playwrights Lab with colleagues Joe Cacaci, Bob Jaffe, and Matthew Penn. "We presented a summer season of readings from 2006 to 2016 at The Mahaiwe, bringing in actors and directors for three to four days to rehearse and then performing the new plays, script in hand, on Wednesday nights, but the scale of the space wasn't exactly right for staged readings."

He started GBPT in 2019, along with Executive Director Deann Simmons Halper, with a production of Frangione's new play, *Breakwater*, before COVID hit in 2020. The company tiptoed back in 2021 with three plays before going full tilt in 2022 with a slate of six. This year's season featured four new works, including the co-production with The Mount.

We talked to Jim about what it's like helming a small, startup, local, theater company devoted to keeping ticket prices affordable in a post-pandemic world.

What does it mean to be a theater company in the Berkshires now surrounded by so many other equally passionate companies like Shakespeare & Co., Barrington Stage, Berkshire Theater Festival, etc.? It's a good question. I guess you could look at it two ways. We're all nonprofits, all creating theater in one region, and you could think that this would mean competition. But I see it differently, the more a region supports and is known for theater, that makes opportunities for more theater. People come to this region for theater in the summer. It's a real selling point, and I only hope that GBPT can continue to contribute to the region's theater offerings.

There's already a Public Theater that's well-known in New York City. Why call yourselves the Great Barrington Public Theater? Essentially, as we first started envisioning GBPT, one of our strongest commitments was to keep our company financially lean, thus allowing us to keep prices down. We genuinely hope that lower ticket prices means our theater events are accessible to more members of the public. We also hope that by developing a theater company located right here in Great Barrington, we can be an economic support to downtown businesses and restaurants.

In addition to ensuring new audiences and donors, what else does GBPT need to stay vibrant? We're doing the things that, I believe, will serve us for years to come. We plan to continue to offer new plays that resonate with audiences and convey meaningful stories about relationships; we want to continue to foster young, mid and even late-career emerging playwrights, providing them with directors and actors at the top of their craft to help shepherd their work, and we hope to provide resources to local area playwrights to help them tell their stories in new and innovative ways. Of course, I'm always looking for community support from folks who'd like to help and get involved—either longtime residents or new additions to our region who love theater and are interested in helping support the development of new plays. I'm always on the lookout for new board members and would encourage anyone interested to reach out to me personally at greatbarringtonpublic@gmail.com.

And when you're not reading or writing plays or directing productions, what are your favorite things to do or places to go in GB? Well, 20 years ago, when my wife brought me here for the first time to the place we live now, Housatonic, I was like Housawhat? But now... I love this little village. It's a real community. The Simon's Rock

community has also been a great source of friendships and colleagues. You can find me on most days at the Kilpatrick Athletic Center, a great facility. I also ride a motorcycle and love to get out on the beautiful country roads of Northern CT, upstate NY, and Southern VT. I'm not a speed demon by any means, I cruise slowly, taking in the scents of the flowers and our natural world—a unique experience on a bike. I'm deeply grateful to my wife, Anne, who makes me laugh every day... and for our two cats, Mookie and Jackpot, who constantly remind us that cats don't have bosses—only staff.


