As we come to the final months of our ministry at St. John's, we wanted to give you an update and the details for the months ahead. We are so blessed to have had the opportunity to be your priests and pastors over these many years and look forward to these final months serving you.

Our last regular Sunday will be August 28. Starting September 1, we will begin vacation, sabbatical and study leave through the end of January 2023. We will return for one final Sunday, November 20, the Feast of Christ the King and the end of the liturgical year. It seems fitting that we formally end our ministry on that day and celebrate the service of leave-taking from a congregation.

While we remain officially the Co-Deans of the Cathedral during this time, we have arranged for Bishop Frank Brookhart to be the interim Bishop in Charge until the end of January. Many of you know Bishop Brookhart from his visits to the Cathedral, he has taught some classes here and was the bishop who confirmed and received our 2020/21

confirmation class as we moved out of the pandemic. He has been a member of our neighboring congregation, St. James in the City since his retirement as Bishop of Montana. We believe he is an excellent choice to guide St. John's during this initial period of transition.

While some initial work towards visioning for the future will take place through the end of the year, the Vestry will engage with all of you in the work of discerning who will come as your new Dean and Rector in the new year. This will be a time of transition and change. Change is always uncomfortable, but this will also be a time of hope and looking forward. We are confident God will lead you into a bright future.

#### A STATEMENT FROM THE WARDENS

While periods of transition are scary they are also opportunities to listen to the Holy Spirit, and deepen our commitments to each other and to our community. # The Word of Life and Love: Abiding with Jesus in the Gospel of John

Each Summer, for the past several years we have spent several weeks touring through a biblical book in a focused way. We have spent some time surveying the general landscape, and other times doing a focused visit through particular places in the text. We can describe these expeditions as time travel as well, since

we have to place ourselves in the ancient world of the biblical writers and their first readers, and by doing so gain new spiritual insight for our own.

While previous years have brought us to books we were reading in the course of the summer lectionary -- sometimes a Gospel, sometimes an Epistle of Paul, sometimes a book of the Old Testament -- this year we journey through the Gospel of John. We don't read it in the lectionary for this year, but it is my favorite Gospel and since this will be my last time to be your guide through a biblical book at St. John's, I thought it a good idea to allow our cathedral's patron to lead us on our summer travels.


The first words Jesus speaks in John are these: "What are you looking for?" That's a question we all should hear Jesus asking us. As the Gospel continues, Jesus invites us to come and see where he is abiding, to go more deeply into meeting Jesus, to listen to him as our "rabbouni," our beloved teacher, as Mary Magdalene will refer to him later in the story.

You may know that John's Gospel is different from the other three. While the basic story is similar, John focuses on particular encounters Jesus has. His teaching seems to shuttle between telling a story in the life of Jesus and the reflection of the risen Jesus on the meaning of this event for the post-Easter Church. Many of the stories recounted only appear in John and not in the other Gospels.

I began by saying that these Adult Vacation Bible classes have been "tours." I hope they have been much more. On a tour you often drive through a place. You don't mix with the locals as much. You stay superficial. Instead let's go together on pilgrimage into the Gospel of John walking along with Jesus, hearing his invitation to come and see where he abides.

Adult Vacation Bible School begins Sunday July 10, through Sunday August 14 at 11:30 am. You can participate in person, or digitally on Zoom.

# A MESSAGE FROM DR. CHRISTOPHER GRAVIS

This is a time of transition at St. John's Cathedral. As you no doubt have heard and read, Fr. Mark and Fr. Dan are retiring after 17 years of co-leadership in this place. This is remarkable for a number of reasons, but perhaps mostly because the longevity of their tenure speaks to each of their steadiness and faithfulness amid a dynamically changing society and national church. Largely gone are the days when a parish priest might serve his or her flock for 20 or more years. The average length of a rectorship in the Episcopal Church is around 5-7 years. Anyone who has worked within institutions understands that when it comes to leadership - whether those leaders be major orchestral conductors, university deans and chancellors, professional sports coaches, or even diocesan bishops, the "bloom is off the rose" rather quickly. Leaders, even great ones, are simply human beings after all. And institutions are complex

organisms, with internally competing interests, with sometimes external pressures that make leadership very challenging – let alone long-lasting leadership.

In the Episcopal Church the dean or rector is responsible not just for the spiritual health and sacramental life of a community, but also staffing, the faithful stewardship of the budget, and the very physical fabric of the building itself (in our case a building of historical significance). They partner with wardens and vestry to ensure that all of these important interests are maintained and hopefully left in better state than when they arrived.

In this way, Fr. Mark and Fr. Dan have truly been transformational leaders at St. John's, from our time as an historic parish church, to our decade-long elevated status as the Pro-Cathedral, to being named the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Los Angeles. And all the while living into what others might consider to be competing interests at odds with one another: celebrating the rich and beautiful cultural diversity of our community, the responsibilities that come with serving as the mother church to one of the largest diocese in the national church, ministering to one of the most economically underserved areas in Los Angeles, yet in the shadow of a wealthy major research institution. And to say nothing of the trials of various development projects, major political shifts, a global pandemic...the only constant in life seems to be change itself.

I have had the pleasure of serving as a church musician for 20 years now, in various parishes, serving many different clergy. Some of them had special affinities for music and liturgy; while for a few other of them, music seemed more like something to be tolerated – an inconvenient distraction from the things they felt were more important to ministry. Admittedly, some of those years were more happy than others. But in the five years since I

came to St. John's, I have had no greater, more symbiotic, more fulfilling working relationship between priest and musician than with Fr. Dan and Fr. Mark. They have been deeply supportive, gentle in their guidance, warm in their praise, and always deeply respectful of the unique role of the lay musician in liturgical leadership. At their core, they have understood that our first and foremost role is to worship God in the beauty of holiness. And that, within our Anglican ethos, music has the potential to draw us into the great mysteries of our faith. It has been the true honor and pleasure of a lifetime to serve God and their combined ministries in this place, and I will miss them very much, both professionally and personally. Fr. Mark and Fr. Dan, from everyone in music ministry at St. John's, we thank you and wish you a very happy retirement. Thank you.

To the people of St. John's, know that I will be working closely with our wonderful wardens, our vestry, and Bishop Brookhart (for whom I have the utmost admiration), as we continue to live into our Christian mission during this time of transition. The music of our tradition, much like the taste of the wine, the whiff of incense, or the poetry of the Prayer Book, is one of the ways in which we hold on to our faith, both ever ancient and ever new. Our sacramental life together will continue to flourish with music and liturgy as the bedrock of what we do at St. John's Cathedral. I am already looking forward to an excellent program year of beautiful music in praise and worship to Almighty God.

I look forward to walking this journey together, as we embark on this exciting new chapter in the life of St. John's Cathedral.
