Spotlight: Mental Health Stigma Campaign

Reaching Out For Help



Each year millions of Americans face the reality of living with a mental illness. And this year, more people than ever before are dealing with emotional challenges associated with the pandemic. These stressors have amplified the need for public awareness and discussion of mental health as a key component of overall health. In May 2021, VCBH launched a countywide campaign, "I'm Talking About My Mental Health."

Resource: Challenging Providers to Look Within Themselves

Reducing Bias in Maternity Care

A new training tool launched to help perinatal providers advance health equity and reproductive justice for their patients. The course, developed in response to a new California law, teaches health care professionals that all humans are biased in some way while also offering historical context for modern-day inequities in maternal health.

The California Dignity in Pregnancy and Childbirth Act passed in 2019. SB 464 aims to reduce pregnancy-related preventable deaths, severe illness, and associated health disparities by addressing bias in the health care system head-on.

This law is the first of its kind in the nation, and its potential impact is huge. The California Health Care Foundation set out to support implementation.

The California Health Care Foundation is dedicated to advancing meaningful, measurable improvements in the way the health care delivery system provides care to the people of California, particularly those with low incomes and those whose needs are not well served by the status quo.

Snapshot: Minority Health Social Vulnerability Index (SVI)

Systemic socioeconomic inequities like poverty, poor housing conditions, and lack of access to quality health care,



lead to worse health outcomes among racial and ethnic minority populations in the United States. Such factors also increase risk for the ability of racial and ethnic minority populations to anticipate, confront, repair, and recover from the effects of a disaster or public health emergency. These factors combine to form the concept known as social vulnerability.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the HHS Office of Minority Health developed the Minority Health Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) to enhance existing resources to support the identification of racial and ethnic minority communities at the greatest risk for disproportionate impact and adverse outcomes due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In the News: California Budget to Train Teachers on LGBTQ+ Issues

Supporting Students

California Gov. Gavin Newsom approved a final state budget that includes \$3 million for LGBTQ+ cultural competency training for public school teachers. That makes the state the first in the country to allocate funding in this specific way, according to Equality California, an LGBTQ+ advocacy group that has pushed for the training for years. The funding will allow the California Department of Education to develop a curriculum aimed at helping teachers support LGBTQ+ students.

"There's no doubt that our schools must be a safe, supportive and welcoming for all students," Rick Chavez Zbur, executive director of Equality California, said in a statement. "At a time when states across the country are attacking transgender kids, we are elated that California has taken this momentous step toward ensuring that public school teachers and staff have the tools and training they need to support LGBTQ+ students."

The training will include topics such as school anti-bullying and harassment policies and complaint procedures; how to identify LGBTQ+ youth who are subjected to, or may be at risk of, bullying and lack of acceptance at home or in their communities; and how to find targeted support services for LGBTQ+ students, including counseling services, among other topics, according to Equality California.

Ventura County Behavioral Health, Substance Use Services - Prevention works upstream to reduce alcohol and drug-related problems in our community. Initiatives are aimed at limiting harms related to impaired driving; underage and binge drinking; marijuana and vaping, especially as it relates to harms to youth; prescription drug abuse; and addressing health disparities among vulnerable populations.

A primary goal is to delay the onset of first use of alcohol and or other drugs by youth. We collaborate with schools, parent groups, government agencies, medical partners, law enforcement, community-based organizations and more.
