The Business Model

.....who we are and what we do

The Technical Training Group (TTG) is a not-for-profit corporation with a 12-member volunteer Board of Directors. The Board is comprised of area stakeholders from industry, business, education, City of Stratford and the Four County Labor Market Planning Board. Organized in 2002, TTG's goal is to offer technical and trades' training that is identified as 'in-need' by the area's business community. The primary target population for training or re-training is age 18+, employed, unemployed or underemployed. The Welder Apprenticeship training is funded by the Ministry of Training, Colleges and University on a per diem seat plan basis. Basic Skills and Youth programs are structured on a fee-based cost recovery model. TTG's instructors are highly competent, qualified tradespersons who work in their occupational field full-time. Training takes place at secondary school technical facilities in Stratford during evening hours and on Saturdays.

Core Programming



TTG is a *Ministry authorized Training Delivery Agent* for the Welder Metal Fabricator trade common core year 1 and Welder trade apprenticeship year 2 and 3.

This trades' program has garnered recognition from industry leaders and unions as an efficient and competent training program that consistently graduates top quality welders.

Welder Apprenticeship

Welder training takes place during evening hours from Monday to Thursday, 6:00 – 10:00 p.m., from September to June at Stratford Northwestern Secondary School technical facilities (Site 1). Up to 45 welder apprentices train between the three levels during for a total of 720 training hours per year [Level 1–300; Level 2–180; Level 3–240.].

June 2008 Ten [10] trainees graduated from each of the three levels of welder training. Level 3 graduates of the three-year apprenticeship program have the option to move on to the next level - trade certification by an approved testing agency such as the Canadian Welding Bureau.

September 2008 A total of 48 welder apprentices from across South Western Ontario were enrolled in the three [3] levels during evening hours. Many Level 1 and 2 graduates from the previous year enrolled to continue the training process.

Welding is a challenging and rewarding career choice. For those getting into the trade, many will have the opportunity of steady employment for as long as they want to work in their chosen trade.

The TTG welder facility is an accredited test site for the Canadian Welding Bureau (CWB). Employers/employees can receive specialized training to meet company's specific CWB needs.

Custom Welding Training

Interest in customized training programs to meet specific employer needs, such as new equipment or processing, is growing. TTG can provide focused instruction on an as need basis. Customized packages can be designed for individuals interested in weld quality improvement, job entry or retention or the basics on how to use their cutting torch or home welder. TTG can offer TIG welding and pipe welding training for experienced individuals seeking specialized employment. In **March 2009**, plans were put in place to provide welding training to members of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local 804. The 54 hour customized training course will take place Saturday mornings from May 2 through July 25, 2009.

Basic Trades Training

ELECTRICAL Pre-Apprentice Prep

TTG received funding from the Ministry of Training, Colleges & Universities to create an electrical training lab and buy equipment at St. Michael Catholic Secondary School in 2008. The lab, constructed by St. Michael, Tech Head, Mark Flanagan, is a series of wood-frame cubicles that look like the walls of a house under construction or renovation. The set up simulates over a dozen residential electrical applications. With the infrastructure in place, the curriculum and logistics for a pilot 10 week program was prepared.

The 10-week basic course gives an overview of what the electrical field can offer and the steps to becoming an electrician. Topics range from understanding electricity and materials used in the field, safe work practices and good workmanship skills to wiring outlets, switches and tying in panels. Upon successful completion, trainees receive a letter of completion and a certificate.

In **August 2008**, a 10-week electrical pre-apprentice prep course was advertised with a targeted enrolment of 15 trainees. The course was filled to capacity and a waiting list drawn up for a future program.

December 2008 – In the first electrical training course, 14 completed the certificate program. A second program was offered over the winter months and in **April 2009**, 15 graduated. Trainee evaluations indicated high satisfaction with the training program, tech facilities and the instruction. Based on trainee feedback, a second level electrical prep program will be introduced in Fall 2009.

PLUMBING Pre-Apprentice Prep

A 10-week basic plumbing course was piloted in **March 2009** with 13 individuals registering for the April – June course. Trainees will get hands-on experience using industry grade tools, materials and techniques and learn various piping applications and construction methods applicable to the plumbing trade.

Certification Training

Workers need safe work environments and up-to-date training to stay current with industry trends and meet health and safety legislative requirements. Good safety policies and practices, coupled with good worker training, contribute to greater output, better quality and worker satisfaction directly impacting the profit margins of any company.

TTG worked with local employers FGC Ltd., ACCUMETAL Inc. and Walsh Bros., to coordinate the Overhead Crane Certification for 11 employees in **February 2009**. Gambit Industrial Health & Safety Consultants Inc., Guelph provided the certification training and assessment and issued certificates. Over the next year, TTG will look to expand its role as a broker to coordinate certification programs for small local companies.

Training Facilities

TTG partners with Stratford Northwestern (Site 1) and St. Michael Catholic (Site 2) Secondary Schools for adult evening programming. This is a win-win situation allowing existing secondary school tech facilities to be used to capacity and upgrades or enhancements to benefit both day and evening programming.

Skills Training Educational Partnership Tech Camp




