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A Resurrection Body!



As we come to the month of May, it seems like a good time to think about what we can look forward to. The darkness of Holy Week has passed. We have gathered to celebrate Jesus' resurrection. One of the key points about that resurrection is realising that this new life is not the same as the one before. Jesus himself tells his disciples that his body bears the marks of the crucifixion. He has suffered and his body is scarred. He tells Thomas to 'stop doubting and believe', pointing to his hands and feet. This resurrection body is not perfect, blemish-free, past-denying. It is a body that bears the scars of the past. And so it is with us.

As we move on into more freedom, more social contact, more of everything, it seems, we bear the scars of all that we have lived through

in past lockdowns. We are not the same. Our lives will forever be marked by what we have gone through, and our experiences, negative as well as positive, will become part of who we are. And it is the same for the church. We cannot ignore the past – we don't want to. But we are not waiting around at an empty tomb. We are learning from our experiences. We will need to look different in future. And our diocese is helping us re-imagine how that can be. We are listening to our communities (you might have done the poll on Facebook) and trying to make sense of the challenges we face together.

But we have to remember that Jesus didn't stay physically present with his disciples. He left – that's what we remember on Ascension Day. And at Pentecost, the great birthday celebration of the Church, we remember the Holy Spirit came in order that we could share the message of Jesus in every language and with every person in a way they can understand. The mission of the church hasn't changed. We need to take our responsibility to talk about Jesus in this generation seriously.

So as we share more of our lives with others, maybe some of the good habits developed in lockdown are worth keeping. Stillness, noticing our surroundings, helping our neighbours, connecting with nature – maybe even being more spiritual.....let's acknowledge the people we have become and let God keep transforming us.

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Bearded Tits at Stanford Reservoir

Friday 13th November 2020 saw me following a familiar pre-work routine of checking the reedbed on the Leicestershire side of the reservoir in the hope of finding a Bearded Tit or Bittern. This is



something I have done periodically between Mid-October and the end of November for the last 3 years and is based on that gut feeling that certain habitat, weather or time of year should attract certain birds. Early that morning the gut feel came off as I discovered a male and female Bearded Tit in the Leicestershire reedbed.

I knew there hadn't been a record at Stanford for a considerable length of time and on checking the records, the last were a group of 11 on the Northants side of the reservoir back in 1980!

I made contact with three regular Stanford birders but only my father-in-law made it down before we saw them flew up vertically (this behaviour is often observed at this time of year as birds migrate / relocate to wintering areas) and seemingly head off east just after 9 am. So that was that. Some great views of this rare visitor to the site but all over in around an hour.

There was no further sign over the weekend so naturally, I thought they had gone. However, back to my routine of checking the reedbed on Monday and they were back–calling and showing well in the same area as Friday. The Stanford Ringing Group has been active at the site for over 40 years, and often ring in the Leicestershire reedbed, managed to ring both birds. The male is a particularly colourful and stunning bird as can be seen from the images taken during their stay. These were the first ever ringed at the site by the group.

Previous sightings at Stanford Reservoir are as follows:

1965 October, 2 birds

1967 November, 2 birds

1971 October, 2 birds

1980 November, 11 birds



Living locally, I have been able to monitor this pair on a regular basis:

• On the 18th November, Mick Townsend (SRG) and I fitted grit trays in the two reedbeds. Having reviewed the research on this subject, grit trays are best deployed and stocked with



a mix of oyster shell grit and sharp sand from October onwards. Grit is key as Bearded Tits alter their gut morphology in the autumn (they move from eating insects to seeds), and by eating large amounts of grit particles it helps to grind down the tough seed fibres.

- In the first few weeks of their stay, they were very vocal and frequently showing often at the top of the reeds. As time progressed, calling became less frequent and whilst there was the occasional "ping" type call the majority appeared to be for contact only.
- The male and female were almost inseparable. If they were separated in the dense cover of the reedbed, the contact call soon kicked in and they were back together again very quickly. It is likely that these were a pair that bred elsewhere and dispersed together.
- In the early part of their stay, I observed both birds flying out of the reedbed, across the feeder stream and up into the field

opposite – this happened on at least 6 occasions. The only conclusion I can draw is that they were visiting and feeding in a small area of set-aside which contained an ample supply of seed. This would also provide a rationale as to why on certain days they were not heard or seen other than early morning.

- From mid-December the birds spent much more time foraging low down and not always in the denser areas of reeds, favouring a more open area of the reedbed making viewing much easier than normal.
- On Wednesday 3rd February I located both birds actively feeding on the seed head of one specific reedmace, set back in the bed but visible from 2 different points on the path. Both birds gorged on this single head each morning for four days, with observed feeding time of well over 3 hours over this period on this one single head. Occasionally they would drop towards the ground and I suspect they may have been taking grit to help their digestion.

Summary

The best time of year to find Bearded Tits in the county is during October and November. I have been able to monitor this pair on a very regular basis which is not always possible at other sites due to time and access. They are still very scarce in the county and this record is the only one for Leicestershire and Rutland in 2020.

They provided me with some great moments over the time they were present and I know many other birders and non-birders have enjoyed the sight and sound of the birds. Both birds survived the cold spell in February but departed on the 26th of that month, having completed a 15 week stay at reservoir. **Chris Hubbard**

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Silver Jubilee in South Kilworth 1977



These photographs were taken from the church tower in 1977, during the Silver Jubilee celebrations, and show how the centre of the village has changed.

In the picture above, note the post office / shop, run by Phil and Marjorie Brown. Phil was in the process of building an extension [behind the bus shelter]. The foundation hardcore was removed from the Rectory Well which had been filled in. Maylands bungalow, behind the shop, was the home of Kay and John Richards who for a time were joint churchwardens.

In the NW corner of the picture can be seen Rev Dr William Pearson's Observatory before restoration. The red brick cottage in the SE corner was the home of Lilian Simpson, a Lay Canon of Leicester cathedral - her pancake day parties were enjoyed as one of the social highlights of the village!

In the picture on the next page, and at the top of Welford Road [on right] were cottages and a disused shop, where Church Mews now stands. The Congregational church was in regular use as was the Reading Room as the village hall, the green corrugated iron building. Trenadove Terrace had yet to restored and re-thatched. The grey cottage behind them had no indoor kitchen – cooking was done in a shed across the yard. St Hilary was the home of George Archer, who would cycle each day up the North Road to look after Charles Hall, a retired solicitor who had fought during the First World at both Gallipoli and The Somme.

Further down the Welford road are the large buildings of Les Hutt's agricultural engineering works which gave employment to many local people. His Kilworth farm machinery is still in use on many farms today. He and Nell built Monte Bello.

5.0 TO CONFIRM MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING OF COUNCIL, HELD ON 16TH Feb'21

The minutes of this meeting, as circulated, were confirmed to be a true record of matters discussed, and decisions reached, by the Parish Council.

8.1 The PC approved the following payments:

8.2 KB reported on the cash balances held by the Parish Council at 28/02/21 - PC approved.

9.0 PARISH COUNCIL PROCEDURES

9.1 PC agreed to request the current internal auditor to carry out the necessary internal audit regarding the upcoming financial year end, 31/03/21, and the preparation of the Annual Governance & Accountability Return (AGAR).

10.0 HIGHWAYS AND FOOTPATHS

- **10.1** Further resurfacing of Church Lane pathway Work due to be carried out on 26th Mar'21, so no update at this stage. KB to monitor.
- 10.2 Kissing gates accessibility, and removal of the necessary hoops within these gates to aid access for pushchairs etc. In Jan'21, KC reported that, contrary to the instructions that LCC had been given, all hoops had now been removed, instead of just a few, now leaving a wide gap between the remaining gate and the hedgerow. KB reported that she had contacted LCC and they are going to inspect the site. Case ref FS169444437. KB to monitor.
- 10.3 Hole opened up on grass verge, Welford Road, Oct'20 This is currently still protected by barriers and it doesn't appear that the repair work has been started. KB to try and get an update from LCC on completion date.
- **10.4** Following on from complaints received from the Neighbourhood Plan group re the poor tarmacking of the layby outside the village school KB to contact LCC.
- 10.5 Re the proposed removal of planters situated on verge opposite the school (originally placed there to prevent hazardous parking on the area) PA will consult with the school and NP group re the best option to solve the problem.

11.0 VILLAGE IMPROVEMENTS

11.1 Maintenance, weed killing etc on village hall car park – KB reported that she had contacted LCC re the possibility of them providing this service, and was waiting for a response. Pending

- 11.2 Aspects donation to the village re their using of the car park during the building period KB reported that she had contacted the builders and was waiting for a response. Pending.
- 11.3 SKN 'Parish Council Questions' received via the Nov'21 edition of the SKN several resident's concerns had been raised around the poor maintenance/condition of the village litter bins, and suggestions made that there is a need for additional bins to be placed in three further locations After inspection the PC's view is that the current bins, whilst not particularly attractive, do seem to be doing their intended job. There is an issue with them getting full to overflowing occasionally, no doubt exacerbated by the increased numbers of people out walking during lockdown. The two least attractive bins are probably the concrete ones with the pebble dash finish, and the one on the green does appear to be lop sided. The PC will explore with LCC options for replacing these bins and endeavour to see if they can be emptied more frequently.
- 11.4 TW confirmed that he had contacted a potential supplier re the updating and possible replacement of the playing field notice board, to emphasise the 'no dogs on the field' rule, and hi-light the possible penalties for misuse of the field. Action: TW to monitor.

12.0 RECREATION

- Proposed 'Zip Wire' installation in children's play area PC agreed that the project could potentially be financed from CIC (pending a successful application) and S106 funds. PC agreed to submit a draft S106 application to HDC by the end of Mar'21 to part fund the project. Action: It was agreed for members of the PC to meet at the children's play area, once covid restrictions allow, to discuss in detail. TW to obtain a further two estimates and PA to forward a copy of the previous village consultation (endorsing the addition of a Zip Wire to the village amenities) to KB, to facilitate the S106 application from the children's play area allocation.
- 12.2 Re the proposed Petanque Court to be built on the site, adjacent to the existing bowling green the PC reiterated that this proposal had been agreed in principle previously however, before they could make a decision to apply for planning permission from HDC, they would need to see the detailed plans. Action: KB to ask GB to forward for discussion at the next meeting.

13.0 VILLAGE WEBSITE

13.1 The upgrading of the Village website – KC reported that progress is continuing with the new website. Action: KC to monitor.

14.0 FUNDING FROM S106 FUND

14.1 As agreed at the previous meeting, the PC will prepare an article for the next SKN edition, May'21, to publicise the availability of this fund. Action: PA to prepare the article. KB to forward to Cllrs, updated figures received from HDC, re the values held on behalf of South Kilworth.

15.0 FUNDING FROM THE CIC (EIGHT PARISHES)

15.1 PA confirmed the balance within this fund, after the 2021 allocation had been added. KB confirmed that reimbursement of the latest youth club costs had now been received in to the PC's bank account.

16.0 FUNDING FROM LCC COMMUNITIES FUND – ROUND 3

16.1 Re an application to this fund to help finance the setting up of a Village Community Café to be held in the village hall – KB reported that a grant offer had been received, and accepted, to the value of £1500. As this was considerably lower than the requested amount, £4.5k approx., the group would be looking at additional funding for the project. Resolved.

17.0 SOUTH KILWORTH NEWS

PC agreed that PA would prepare a response to the 'Parish Council Questions' published in the Mar'21 edition, for approval at the next PC meeting.

18.0 VILLAGE MEMORIAL CLOCK

Refurbishing the Village Hall

The South Kilworth Village Hall was built in 2000 and is now 21 years old. At the time it was built on a limited budget, and many of the facilities now need repair or refurbishment to accommodate the future needs of the village. The planned upgrades to the Village Hall facilities will benefit everyone who uses this important village facility, both local villagers and potential hirers.



The hall is managed by the Village Hall Committee, an independent trust whose elected members are Trustees. The Parish Council owns the land on which the hall sits.

Since 2018 the Village Hall Committee, with some help from the Parish Council and community grants, has already spent £33,000, to provide:

- access external to the disabled toilet for sports use
- bar and kitchen improvements
- car park upgrade
- football floodlights /bowling green improvements etc.
- new equipment for the children's playground

With the arrival of new houses/the new estate, Section 106 money has become available (see box on next page) enabling the committee to bid for this money to help further refurbishment. At the beginning of last year, £7,500 of the 106-community facilities fund, was secured via the council bidding process, which has paid for:

- o a new floor in the hall, corridors and foyer
- o upgrading of the fire alarm and security systems.

An additional £10,931 was successfully bid for in March, also from the remaining 106 Community Facilities fund. This will go towards:

- electrical systems
- o bar refurbishment
- kitchen upgrade.

A further £21,156 has also been secured from the 106 Sports fund to:

- o upgrade the two changing rooms /showers
- o improve the Bowls Club office

improve security in relation to sports access

As there is quite a lot to do, we will also be using some of the committee's financial reserves from previous funding raising events. We have had to look for further additional funding, and were delighted that a bid for £19,976 was accepted from ACRE (Association of Rural Communities – see box). These funds help cover the rest of the internal refurbishment of the hall, and provides

- a new boiler system
- window replacements
- · toilet area upgrade
- repairs to the outside of the hall
- better insulation
- re-decoration inside and out

WHAT IS SECTION 106 MONEY?

Section 106 money is allocated to the village as a result of the new housing development at Mill Field opposite Leys Crescent. The local council levies the developers (Aspect) so it can provide grants to support the growth of facilities due to the increased in population that the estate brings in.

South Kilworth was awarded the following (based on the number of houses being built):

Community Facilities £18,431
Sports facilities £50,516
Children's Playgrounds £2,631
Allotments £1,424
Cemeteries £5,058
Greenways (and footpaths) £8,466

Anyone can bid for this money, but there is a process for bid applications via Harborough District Council, which should be supported by our Parish Council and our local councillor (Amanda Nunn)

Ray Dorman - A Massive Thank You!

Over recent months Ray Dorman has stepped down from his roles on both the Village Hall Committee and the Parish Council, but we can't let this go without expressing our massive gratitude for the monumental contribution that Ray has made over decades – it is not exaggerating to say that Ray has left a permanent imprint on the village of South Kilworth as we know it today.

Ray took over from the late Jim Pick and steered through the land purchase that created both the Sports Field and the Children's Play Area, and this of course created the site to build the new Village Hall and the adjoining Bowls Green. None of this was simple – after finalising the purchase of the land there was the sale of the old village hall (The Reading Room) which involved difficult negotiations with the Charities Commission because many records were incomplete or missing. Then raising the funds and getting planning permission for the new village hall – after this, actually building it must have been the easy bit!

Once the Village Hall was complete Ray played an active part in running it with his good friend Michael Murphy, acting in many capacities from caretaker to barman through to fund raiser with the annual fireworks night – we'll skip over his role as pantomime dame!!



The Village Hall isn't Ray's only achievement. In the early 1990's the Village School was in real danger of closing, and Ray played an important role in the campaign that not only prevented the closure but laid a foundation from which the school has grown and prospered.

As a Parish Councillor Ray played an important role both in terms of practical responsibilities, such as making sure the

Church Clock or Street Lights were repaired and maintained when required, but crucially also providing a link between today's villagers and South Kilworth's agricultural heritage - Ray was pivotal in creating the allotments opposite the pub.

In fact, it's fair to say if you look around the village today, from the School, the Village Hall, the sports field, the bowls green, the children's play area, the church, the streetlights, and to the allotments – Ray Dorman is everywhere.

History of South Kilworth Bowls Club

The club was formed in 1934 and the then Rector of St. Nicholas Church, Reverend Thomas Walton was a big supporter and even allowed the games to be played on the Rectory lawn. He also kindly provided bowls for 3 rinks to be used by the members.



The annual subscriptions were initially one shilling but it had steadily increased to three shillings until the start of WW2 in 1940 when it dropped down to two shillings & six pence. The age limit was then lowered to 14, to encourage more members.

The owner of Kilworth House, John Entwistle, generously supplied a large silver cup for the clubs to play for, which mysteriously went missing for 12 years. It was later found in Cheltenham in 1970 and it was reinstated as the winners' cup that year.

The Old Reading Room on Welford Rd was used as a clubhouse with four bowls rinks on the land behind it. In 1958 the club tried to propose a new green on the same site but this failed to materialise.

In 1976, the club decided to allow both men and women to join and as a result, a ladies' team was created.

In 1995, the Harborough District Council provided land for a new green next to the village hall and the club acquired two large terrapin-type buildings. One was used for storing the bowls equipment and the other was used as a changing room. There was a grand opening in July of that year with a friendly game between North & South.

The Old Reading Room was sold after planning permission was granted to build one house, now called The Readings. The funds from this sale went to build the current Village Hall with a bar and equipment store. The grand opening was in 2003. The Village Hall is available for the benefit of our community social events or private hire.

At present the club is affiliated with EBA, LBA, LLCBA with 30 members and play fixtures are as far away as Leamington Spa, Hastings and Medbourne. A big thank you to Steve Tallis and Andrew Bott for maintaining the green all year round and to all of the current and future members helping to keep this age-old game alive for many more generations to come.

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Shaped by centuries and rooted in community: St Nicholas' Church




The common ground between people that comes from a host of emotions such as love, care, endeavor, tragedy, joy, sadness and optimism is what connects us to a place, populates our history and cements our community.

In these difficult times, it is worth remembering that over the more than eight centuries of its existence, the edifices of St Nicholas Church have provided solace and joy for many during the tumultuous events of the past.

The church's origins appear to date from the late Norman period, with its list of rectors dating back to 1186.

There is a legend that when Cromwell rode through South Kilworth after the Battle of Naseby in 1645, he asked why the statue of St Nicholas over the church door had not been destroyed. One of the troopers replied, "It's only Old Nick sir, so we left him!"

The Church was an acknowledged landmark for travellers before the rise of motor transport.



St. Nicholas' church has been restored a number of times and was largely rebuilt in 1868-69 by G.F. Bodley.

White's 1846 Directory of Leicester records that the north and south aisles had been rebuilt in 1741

and the north aisle again in 1836.



This 1792 illustration shows that at that time, despite the 1741 rebuild, the north aisle had entirely disappeared and the Norman arches were clearly visible in the northern wall of the nave. The weathercock appears to be severely bent and the whole church had fallen into a state of considerable dilapidation.

In 1799 the chancel was shortened, and that was how The Revd. Dr. William Pearson, LLD., F.R.S. (co-founder of the Royal Astronomical Society) found the church in 1821 on

taking-up his incumbency. In 1836, he had the north aisle reconstructed at his own expense.

In 1868 his successor, The Revd. Assheton Pownall, M.A. (later Archdeacon of Leicester) briefed G.F. Bodley to undertake the restoration of the whole church to much as it appears today. The work took two years to complete and cost the sum of £1850, raised by public subscription. During that period, services were held in the churchyard, on the site of the present south aisle.

The clock on the spire is a memorial to the villagers who gave their lives in the Great War of 1914-1918 and whose names are recorded on the church porch

Since that time, the church has enjoyed regular maintenance. This follows the quinquennial cycle, under which the electrical installation has been renovated to conform with present regulations. The only major change to church fabric is the installation of toilet and serving facilities at the west end of the north aisle. Today, the church is listed as a Grade II building. It is a testament to the efforts of the special people who are motivated to care for old places and preserve our heritage.

Thanks to Ian Eperon, Jacky Harrison, and Sam Lloyd for their help and sources. In future editions we will explore the church and its history in greater detail. There are so many stories that are evident from the architecture and its surrounds, and it would be good to hear some relevant personal anecdotes. 



ACRE had a project to support small village halls, and South Kilworth village hall was successful in bidding for money. The money was granted on the basis that it paid for 20% or the total project costs.




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
