





#### Leicestershire National Garden Scheme



Spring arrives and we have blossoms and blooms everywhere. It is a lovely time to get out and enjoy gardens. The National Garden Scheme opens gardens to raise funds for charity, and also promotes gardens and gardening as therapy. Leicestershire National Garden Scheme welcomes visitors to two local gardens in April. Opening on the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> April, from 10 am to 4.30

pm, is Oak Cottage in Blackfordby, Swadlincote, DE11 8AG. It is a stunning spring garden with Hellebores, Snakes Head Fritillaries, Magnolia, and more spring colour. Altogether the garden is over 3 acres including several ponds, a waterfall, and paddock areas planted with more than 450 native trees under the National Forest Freewoods scheme. Tea and delicious cakes will be on sale. Later in the month on Sunday the 24<sup>th</sup> April from 11 am – 4 pm Tresillian in Melton Mowbray LE13 0BQ opens for visitors to roam around ¾ acre of spring colour. In April

#### What to do in the Garden in March and April

At last, the garden is warming up, and it's great to get out and active in the garden. Some gardening ideas and tasks for this time of year:

**Pruning:** March is pruning time for Roses, Buddleia, Lavatera, Hydrangea (paniculata,) winter flowering Jasmine, Pyracantha, Euonymus and to coppice Cornus. Early March is also the last opportunity to prune Group 2 & 3 Clematis, and Wisteria. **Planning ahead for summer colour:** If you have gaps in the border, and want to have easy colour, March and April is time to plant summer bulbs such as Dahlia, Lilies, Freesia to add colour and scent to summer borders. Plant either directly in the border, or in containers to brighten up the patio.

**Bedding plants:** Don't be tempted to plant out bedding plants. They are not hardy and a late frost can be a garden disaster. To save money buying smaller plug plants, keep them frost free in a porch, greenhouse or even indoors. Only plant outside when the risk of frost has passed. You can sow sweet peas because they are hardy annuals.

**Growing your own veg:** If you are keen to get started with your veg, in March sow hardier veg such as Broad beans, beetroot, carrots, Swiss chard, cauliflower, kohlrabi, lettuce, leeks, radish, turnip, peas and perpetual spinach, either under cover or in a sheltered garden. To sow the same veg outside wait until April when it's a little warmer.

Tender vegetables, such as courgettes, squash, peppers, tomatoes, cucumbers, aubergines, French beans, and sweetcorn all need to be kept warm under glass and not planted out until the risk of frost has passed.

April is the traditional time to plant onions and garlic and also early potatoes but protect the top growth, (Haulms) from frost.





#### MINUTES OF A PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR SOUTH KILWORTH PARISH COUNCIL

#### 1.0 To Confirm Members Present

#### 3.0 Disclosure of any Member's Interest/s

PA declared an interest in planning application 22/00105/FUL, due to the proximity to his own address, and stated that therefore, he would not take part in any discussion re this application.

#### 4.0 To Confirm Other Attendees

One member of the public was in attendance.

#### 5.0 To Confirm Minutes of Previous Meeting of Council, held on 18th Jan'22

These minutes were confirmed to be a true record of matters discussed, and decisions reached, by the Parish Council.

#### 8.0 Planning Matters

#### **8.1** New Applications:

22/00045/FUL, Chevel House, The Belt, South Kilworth, change of use of agricultural land to equestrian and erection of horse arena. The PC agreed they had no comment.

22/00105/FUL, (received after agenda issued) Land adj to St Keverne, Welford Road, South Kilworth, construction of a manege, two stable blocks and one storage building. The PC agreed that KB should submit the following comment to HDC:

"The Parish Council have received five representations from parishioners objecting to this development and would ask HDC to consider their concerns.

In summary these concerns relate to:

- (a) the nuisance that will be caused by the manege & floodlighting so close to neighbours
- (b) the excessive size, the footprint and positioning of the buildings planned which seem excessive for genuine requirements
- (c) concerns that much of the Supporting Information provided with the Application is misleading or incorrect
- (d) concerns about plans for the existing buildings that have already been sited on the land and are not mentioned in this Application.
- (e) Parishioners also claim that the longer term declared objective of the applicants is to build a house on this land.
- SKPC would ask HDC to consider if conditions can be sought to assuage these fears. We also repeat the comment we sent to HDC when this land was the subject of a 'change of use' application last year. At the time we expressed concern that the approval of this planning application could be a 'steppingstone' to a future application for a development that is not compliant with the Neighbourhood Plan as it stands currently."
- 8.2 Planning decision/s rec'd: None


#### 12.0 Recreation

**12.1** Servicing of Play Area Zip wire equipment – TW reported that Wicksteed had been out to inspect the zip wire and that the equipment required to be tightened and lubricated. The PC agreed that TW would contact Wicksteed to inform them that,

- due to the short time having elapsed since the play equipment had been installed, the PC would hope that this maintenance be carried out free of charge. Pending.
- **12.2** Holiday Club Proposal The PC agreed to go ahead with this proposal on the condition that National Lottery funding was granted. KB to contact Finding Fitness to proceed with an application. Pending.

  - 13.1 New Village website Both KB and KC agreed that the website was running smoothly, and developing well.
- 14.0 S106 Fund
  - 14.1 Re the formulation of a village consultation regarding future S106 funding PC agreed to prepare an article to be included in the March edition of the SKN, giving notice that a public meeting would be held in the village hall on Tuesday, 12<sup>th</sup> April at 6.00 pm (prior to the PC meeting at 7.15pm) to inform, receive feedback and ideas, around future spending of the remaining available funds. #### **Bird Watching - Stanford Reservoir**

The start of a new year always brings a level of optimism for birders. January means Spring migration is within touching distance and also lists can be refreshed or restarted. Most birders keep lists - whether it's a list of birds seen in a particular year, your county, Britain, the world, or even your garden. The list can provide important trend information on different species, offers a point of comparison over the years, create friendly competition, or simply motivation to get out and find something new.

At Stanford Reservoir we maintain a species list each year and an overall list of all birds ever recorded. Of course, January 1<sup>st</sup> means that everything you see is new for the year – even the first Robin, Blackbird, or Song Thrush. We have made a reasonable start to 2022 with a total of 92 species recorded so far (up to 16<sup>th</sup> February). As we move into March and April this number will jump significantly as the first summer migrants start to return.

#### A visitor from Siberia



On December 31<sup>st</sup>, I found 3 White-fronted Geese at the reservoir. These have now been in the area for nearly 50 days, spending a lot of time in and around Stanford Hall. These birds are most likely from the Baltic/North Sea population which breed in European Arctic Russia and northwest Siberia. They winter predominantly in the Netherlands, Germany, and Belgium with small numbers visiting the UK. They are a relatively scarce

bird in Leicestershire and Northamptonshire with only a small number of records each year. They are noticeably smaller and daintier than the Greylag Geese we are used

to seeing locally. Adults have a white blaze around the bill and black lines/markings on the belly (see images).



#### **RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch**

This took place on the weekend of 28<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> January. It's open to everyone and is aimed at providing a snapshot of how our garden birds are faring across the country. **We have lost a staggering 38 million birds** from the UK over the past 50 years so surveys like this really help organisations such as the RSPB track and understand what is happening. I managed to record 23 species in the hour I spent watching – the best birds being Stock Dove and House Sparrow, both of which are surprisingly rare at my end of the village. Did anyone else take part and what did you see? Perhaps you could include something yourself in the next edition of the SK News.

#### **Easter Walk around Stanford Reservoir**

I am planning to do a guided spring walk around the reservoir on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> April. If you are interested in seeing and hearing some of the birdlife on your doorstep then why not join me – all welcome. The plan is to meet at the Welford Road car park at 8 am and complete a full circuit which is around 3.5 miles. #### Dr. Simon Vincent



Last November, our resident GP, Dr. Simon Vincent, ran two very successful free training courses to teach villagers how to use the defibrillators that are sited around the village, one in the red phone box on Welford Rd and one outside the Village Hall. Impressed with his altruism, we thought that we find out a bit more about Simon and his family.

Simon and his wife, Emma, have lived in the village for nearly 25 years. They initially moved into Wits End on Welford Road, before renting the bungalow Greystones whilst renovating and then extending their current home, Amner House on Walcote Road. They have three children, Sam, Ruth, and Anna. Only Anna is left in the village

#### Walk for fun and exercise in South Kilworth

Like a lot of people in the UK, we found ourselves working from home a lot more over the last couple of years and exercising more and more by walking. And like a lot of families, we thought we might as well get a dog to get us out walking even more. Getting a dog has meant spending more time exploring the public footpaths and bridleways in and around the village and at one of the Pop-up Café sessions in the village hall (you really must go if you have not tried it, the cakes are amazing) some people were talking about how they had published routes for walking in and around one of the other local villages, so we thought it would be good to do the same for non-dog walkers and dog walkers alike. We will be describing walks here regularly, all starting and finishing at the Village Hall, some out and back, and some round routes.

This first short walk is an out and back, but it can be made into a round route if you are comfortable walking along roads with no pavements.



Route 1 Village Hall to Rugby Road (1km) and back to Village Hall (2kms total)

Starting in the Village Hall car park, head out of the car park along the footpath with the bowls club on your right.



Cross over the private driveway through the two gates and carry on for another 100m

and take the fork to the right. This will take you down an alley with the church on your left and you will come out onto Church Lane with Morris Butchers over the green on your right.

At the bottom of Church Lane, you will see a gate opposite you leading onto the fields. Go through the gate or climb over the stile and through the next gate into the field. Please be careful

in this field as there are often young bulls there and sheep in fields on either side. So it's best to keep dogs on a lead.



The path hugs the right side of the field and in early

Spring you can see the snowdrops coming through and if you are early enough, the sun rising to your left can be spectacular.

Keep following the path down the hill and cross the stream using the wooden bridge.

Once over the bridge, the path then hugs the left side of this field. You walk along the tree line to the corner of the field where the path turns a sharp **right** 

and you head up the hill

- this can be quite
slippy if it has been
raining: wellies or

walking boots are recommended.

Head up the hill, again keeping the hedgerow and trees on your left, and just before you get to the corner, there is a stile to climb over into the next field.





Once over the stile, turn right and head to the lone tree, for those with good eyesight, there is a post with a yellow footpath marker by the tree, but you should not miss it, it is the only tree in the middle of the field!

On reaching the tree, you turn left towards the road, and then you aim towards the gap in the hedgerow with the road on the other side of the hedge.

Once there, you have lovely views looking back over the village and the choice is either then to retrace your footsteps, or going onto the road, turn left and down the hill, up the other side to the White Hart pub, which will be on your

right. Carry on past Monte Bello and back into Leys Crescent to the Village Hall.

Please enjoy this walk and make sure others can enjoy it too by not dropping litter and if you do have a dog, please clear up after it.

#### **Spring Skin**

What can you do for your skin at this time of year? As the weather changes, your skin changes too. Gone are the heat/cold/heat drying influences of winter as we move to more clement times! Heavy creams are a thing of the past and your skin starts to feel different: more tolerant and less reactive. Now is the perfect time to have a good look at what you are using and whether it is hitting the mark. You can't stop ageing, but you can help your skin to look fabulous. There is also no "one size fits all" advice, if you're struggling with conditions such as acne or rosacea, but you can help your skin get what it needs.



#### As a brief guide:

Cleanser: This should be light and water-soluble. Anything oily or too rich can leave residue in the pores, making the skin dull and prone to bacteria build-up. Anything too stripping can remove the healthy bacteria your skin needs!

Toners: Don't go for anything that leaves your skin feeling tight. Rather than a stripping toner, opt for a splash of water. Ingredients like glycolic should be avoided as they can really strip the skin. If it says it closes pores: remember pores are not doors!!!

**Serums**: Many cheaper serums are very low on active ingredients. Vitamin C serums should be clear, not brown, in glass that withstands light. If you are opting for a retinol, don't be fooled by percentages. They can be very misleading. Most of us need a combination of vitamins and peptides to effect change and improvement in our skin, so single-ingredient serums can be an expensive option with little effect. Look instead for moisturisers or serums that can penetrate the skin.

**Moisturisers**: What else can they do? Some contain your forms of vitamin A in a more fat-soluble form of retinyl (from the retinol family) and some just contain oils and creams that feel nice, and often smell nice. Remember, smells won't change cells. Perfumes can also add unnecessary stress to the skin.

SPF: Use it all year round – think of it as UV protection, not just sun protection. UVA is around us all the time and has a more ageing effect on the skin than UVB! Opt for a face-specific one and don't rely on SPF in your make up or moisturizer. UV protection should be reapplied and effective! Happy Spring Skin! Vicki



## John Brooks: Family Man, Dog Lover and Premier League Football Referee

Since its inception in the 1992/93 season, the English Premier League and its clubs have established a strong

global reputation with a worldwide audience of over 3,6 billion (43 million in the UK alone). Die-hard and knowledgeable supporters can just as easily be found in the classrooms of Soweto, Bangkok, the Faroe Islands and the suburbs of Auckland, Nairobi and Buenos Aires as in Old Trafford, Aigburth, and Epsom.

A recent report by Ernst & Young showed that the League supported 94000 jobs, added £7.6 billion value to the UK economy, and made a £3.6 billion tax contribution in 2019/20.

With prodigious talents from every corner of the globe, multinational corporates, billionaires, oligarchs and pop stars; with galactic egos, quantum level scrutiny and commentary from every person who has a voice; with seething crowds armed with melodic malevolence: what person dreams of being the referee at this level? Turns out, you can be a down-to-earth, level-headed, family man like John Brooks, a recent resident and continuing friend of South Kilworth (the family relocated in 2021).



John got into refereeing at school at age 14 when he took it up as a skill for the Duke of Edinburgh award. Some 17 years later he finds it quite surreal that he is now applying his skills at the Premier League level.

A little more serendipitous was his meeting up with his partner, Erica, at the University of Liverpool in 2009. Erica was from a sleepy village near the Lake District in Lancashire and John from north Leicestershire near Melton Mowbray.

In 2017, with Erica working as a buyer for a luxury motor manufacturer based in Leamington Spa, and John still having a day job in Leicester as well as refereeing in League 1& 2 at the time, they found and bought a lovely home in South Kilworth together. Their daughter, Amelia, was a happy addition in 2021.

John partially 'blames' Ralph, his friendly dog, for getting to know so many people in South Kilworth on his daily walks across the golf course, down The Belt and along the old railway track.

In August 2021, John's dedication was rewarded when he was offered a role as a Premier League referee. To date, he has refereed 3 Premier League matches as well as having officiated at many Championship League matches and acting as 4th official and VAR (video assistant referee) every week in the Premier League.



Premiership referees are intensely scrutinised: from their physical conditioning to each and every one of the hundreds of on-field decisions that they make. One of the most recent 'innovations' has been the introduction of the VAR (video assistant referee) in the Premier League.

### We asked John if he thought that VAR has helped?

"As a referee in an important match, you don't want to be in the headlines. So, with VAR key decision accuracy has increased

from approximately 86% to 98%. VAR has helped to eliminate errors. Of course, there will always be some subjective judgments which create debate given the nature of football".

#### We also asked John: What skills are needed to be a top-level referee?

"You need to be patient, confident and have a natural authority along with good communication skills. We have to interact with a lot of people depending on the circumstances. Not only the players and coaching staff but also the groundsman when conducting pitch inspections as well as the safety officer and chief executive, if there have been issues. The ability to communicate and manage situations in a fast-paced environment is a must."

#### And then: Which are the best players you have refereed?

"I have been fortunate to travel abroad to officiate in the Champions League, so have seen some of the great European players. Messi at Barcelona, Ronaldo at Real Madrid in Champions League games. All of the Premier League's big names have all been involved in games where I have been an official. I have some way to go yet, so I would be better placed to answer that question in a few decades  $\mathfrak{C}$ "

#### And finally, for now: Where is the best place to referee?

"I still enjoy refereeing at some of England's older more traditional grounds. Villa Park, Goodison Park and the City Ground can have special atmospheres. Some of the newer grounds are of course tremendous from a facility perspective. I recently refereed Tottenham v Morecambe in the FA Cup and the stadium at Tottenham really is spectacular."

Incidentally, John doesn't referee Leicester City matches, for obvious reasons.









