

#### **Breathe**

I had heard that Jessie was re-starting her yoga class in the South Kilworth village hall. I was keen to join, but my downward dog had a new owner and I was not sure my uncoordinated limbs and achy shoulder joints would cooperate. Encouraged by other ladies from the village who were great advocates of Jessie's class, I made the first step and bought a yoga mat... followed by the more important step of attending my first class.

My focus was on having a relaxing, de-stressing experience and hopefully improving my physical state with the only exercise I was going to get due to a very sedentary work routine! I was very encouraged (and relieved) when Jessie assured me that yoga is about focussing on 'self' and our own abilities, not on any external standard or competitive comparison. Fast forward 10 months.

It seems our world has shifted with some highs and lows. .... Rob and I had ticked off a major bucket list item with a 100km walk to Santiago de Compostela and we are now finding our new equilibrium after our move from our lovely first home in the UK in South Kilworth, to our new home in Market Harborough. Like everyone, we feel bombarded with the pain of events that we hear on the news and in our case, from our former homeland. Life just feels generally more complicated. It was in this context that Rob and I sat down with Jessie to talk about yoga. And we got far more than we expected. As Jessie spoke about her experience of yoga, the world around us melted away almost hypnotically.

'In the world today, it is so easy to lose contact with one's body and self.' Jess spoke earnestly about the emphasis on external things in modern life to the detriment of knowing one's self. While the food we eat undoubtedly has an impact on one's health and our genetics also play a role, stress in all its facets seems a universal threat. Stress has both an emotional and physical dimension. As we hold stress within our bodies, it's important to know the limits of what stress we can bear. When we are not able to balance the internal and the external, things can go wrong.



This is where yoga can play a role. Starting with the consciousness of breathing, yoga has helped Jessie to understand herself and her limitations. She focuses on her strengths and is not frustrated by her weaknesses. As we all know, thinking about something can trigger emotions in us – and this can affect the functioning of our organs. The physical movements or positions in yoga stimulate a chemical reaction in our organs and glands and can help to balance our hormones. So, in yoga, mind and body work together.

Of course, this may not resonate with everyone. We are overstimulated by the external world, our devices, day-to-day responsibilities, and worries. Jessie is very conscious of the fact that it can be very difficult to 'be still and focus on our breath.' She shared a lovely analogy of our lives being like a bottle of silty water. If you continue to jiggle it around, it remains sullied, but just by waiting and being patient, the dirt will settle on the bottom, and the water clear.

Jessie ever enthusiastic, helpful, and friendly, has many interests but her passion is yoga. A work opportunity took her, in her youth, from her home in China to Singapore, but once there, it was yoga that grabbed her interest. Jessie was first introduced to yoga at the age of 24 in Singapore. The key focus of her first classes was on the physical benefits. It was a year or so later that Jessie was invited to a different class which added the philosophical dimension and the two halves fell into place.

Jessie related a compelling story of an incident when she was in a subway in Singapore. The surroundings were incredibly crowded and noisy. She felt overwhelmed and hemmed in on all sides. With her internal emotions rising, she decided to put into practice the breathing she had been learning in yoga even though she was not convinced it would help. With the focus on her breath, a calm protective 'bubble' came over her and she was no longer disturbed by the external world. Jessie was in contact with herself and in control of herself. It marked a turning point in her yoga experience.

Jessie went on to do a yoga teacher's course. She has been practicing yoga and giving classes for over 20 years, starting in Singapore. She met her husband Julian through yoga (a yoga student's introduction). In 2014, Jessie moved to South Kilworth with Julian and she has been giving yoga classes off and on (either



side of the pandemic). Through her yoga lessons, Jessie's motivation is to help people 'where they are'. This may mean a focus on the many physical health benefits or in addition, to explore its physiological and emotional rewards.

When Jessie is not practicing yoga, she is doing all she can to live life to the fullest – she enjoys sports, including skiing, snowboarding, climbing, horse riding, table tennis, gym, walking, and more recently golf. She loves cooking and travelling too and has just got back from visiting her parents (who are in their 90s) in China.

#### PLAYGROUND VANDALISM

Your Parish Council was appalled to learn that the children's playground at the Village Hall had been vandalised in August. Over 100 square feet of the rubberised safety surface underneath the multi-play climbing frame had been ripped up and scattered around the park.

disheartening that over £2000 will now have to be found to repair the damage. That's over £10 per household in South Kilworth.

The cabinet is being refurbished and repainted courtesy of our newest village residents, the Wood family moving soon into The Old Rectory. Welcome and Thank you!












#### Birds at Stanford Reservoir

#### Wing-tagged Marsh Harriers at Stanford Reservoir

Once a local scarcity, appearances of Marsh Harriers have come on in leaps and bounds in recent years. Reduced to just one breeding pair nationally in 1971, it's believed there are now some six hundred breeding pairs in the UK.



In early September, two Marsh Harriers appeared at Stanford Reservoir. Initially, the birds were guite distant, often feeding over arable farmland and the bordering hedgerows but on the 7<sup>th</sup>, one came close enough to see that it was fitted with orange wing tags – at that point no code was read due to the distance.

On Saturday 9th September the number of Marsh Harriers had increased to an unprecedented three birds and I was able to obtain close views of them and to my surprise, two of the birds had orange tags and the other was untagged - the first time ever we have had tagged birds at the site! With patience, I was able to obtain the codes on both birds. I found this much easier to do when the birds rested in the trees bordering the reservoir - they were much more difficult to read when in flight.

#### Marsh Harrier 'ZC'

'ZC' was the first to be read. This bird was ringed and tagged on the 19th June 2023 at Breydon Water, near Great Yarmouth. The bird was sexed as a female and she had two siblings, both were males. This was the first time the bird had been observed since being ringed/tagged.

#### Marsh Harrier '6A'

Whilst watching 'ZC' along the Leicestershire reedbed, a second bird flew in and settled in a nearby tree and was immediately read as '6A'.

This bird was ringed and tagged on the 2<sup>nd</sup> July 2023 at Welney WWT. This bird was also sexed as a female. This was the first time the bird had been observed since being ringed/tagged.

#### **Ongoing Observations**

Like many sites in the county, Marsh Harriers are often short stayers or fly-throughs but both '6A' and 'ZC' had extended stavs.

'6A' was observed up to the 13th and 'ZC' up to the 19th September. As at the 21st, I thought that both birds had departed. However, 'ZC' was then picked up again on the 29th September and was still present on the 23<sup>rd</sup> October.

#### **Background to The Project**

The project was started in 2011 and is run by the North West Norfolk Ringing Group, with the objective of finding out more

about how or if juvenile Marsh Harriers disperse from their natal area. It is now in its 12th year and some

interesting and in some cases unexpected results have already been obtained. In 2011 the tags had an individual identifying combination of two letters or one letter and one number in White. From 2012 a combination of two letters or one letter and one number in Black on a lime green tag were used. In 2018 after all the lime green codes had been used, orange tags with Black numbers or letters were used. More information can be found at www.nwnrg.co.uk.

#### **Broadminded Broadband**

I've been a consultant in the world of information technology for over 30 years. That makes me both old and hopefully wise, at least within my field.

In this issue, I've decided to look at how we access the internet, both generally and more importantly the options available in our own village.



#### The Dim & (not so) Distant Past

When we think about internet access, that usually means a broadband service, from one of the usual suspects like BT, Vodafone, Sky, Virgin Media, and the like. The term broadband has become shorthand for the most common type of home internet connection, but its origins within the world of data communications are a matter of history rather than technology. Back when I started learning about computer networks, the idea that every home would one day have cheap, fast internet connectivity was like science fiction. These were the days when 'getting

online' meant plugging your computer in to the phone line and dialling up (with all the associated beeps, chirps and squawks) via modem – which, for anyone reading this who is younger than about 30, was a device that sent and received data over the phone line as sounds. Speeds were slow, around 56 kilobits per second, so patience was a virtue.

Today when we measure our internet speeds in megabits per second and sometimes gigabits per second, this seems like the dark ages. To put it into context, 56 kilobits per second is around less than 1/16<sup>th</sup> of 1 megabit per second, most home broadband will offer at least 10 megabits per second, often much more. Enough of the maths lesson, let's put it in real-world terms; it's like taking a nice slow country stroll to the pub or popping down using your Lamborghini. This old-world technology was often referred to as 'narrowband' due to the speed limitations – often expressed as a measurement of 'bandwidth' (the amount of data you can squeeze down a wire in a given time period) and so as things got faster, so the terminology changed. Narrowband became broadband and so here we are in the 21<sup>st</sup> century living in an age of unparalleled connectivity and speed.

#### Superfast and Not so Superfast

Today, with dialup modems now museum pieces, the choice for connectivity is wide and varied, though much of that depends on where you are and what you need. In South Kilworth, we're quite fortunate for a rural location. We have the choice of two fast (or relatively fast) services, more than many of our near neighbours, so what are they and what's the difference between them.


First, let's look at standard broadband, often called 'Superfast' (which may or may not be the case depending on your location) When you buy broadband from BT or any of the other usual suspects, the connection is provided to your home across a pair of copper telephone wires. The wires are owned not by BT or any other broadband company but by a separate business called Openreach. Openreach exists to ensure that other companies (outside of BT from which Openreach was separated many years ago) can access those telephone wires to deliver your broadband service. So, no matter who you buy from, those wires are how the service gets to your house and those wires are the main reason you may have a fast or a slow service, and the reason is all about distance. Today, the vast majority of broadband services are delivered using a method called 'Fibre to the Cabinet' or FTTC. This means that our friends at Openreach have connected a very fast internet link (using fibre optic cable, which is seriously fast) to a cabinet in the street. In urban areas there will be many cabinets. In our village there is just one (it's on the corner of Welford Road and Rugby Road if you're interested). It is from this cabinet that all the copper phone wires connect to your home, which is all well and good, but the problem with using copper wire is that the electrical signal it carries gets weaker the longer the wire is. If you're using that wire just for a phone call, you probably wouldn't have too much of a problem maybe you need to speak up a bit, but when it's trying to carry high-speed digital information then signal quality is key, and that quality can't be maintained over long distances. The bottom line is that the further from the cabinet the slower your broadband will be. It's just physics and that's why when you order a broadband connection the first thing any provider will do is give you an estimate of the speed they can deliver – which will be all about the distance your home is from the nearest green box.

#### <u>Ultrafast and Beyond!</u>

So what's the alternative? As it's the copper wire that's the problem, the only solution is to not use it, which is where things become more interesting. There are broadband providers who have their own cables, so they don't use the Openreach wires or the green boxes. We're quite fortunate in South Kilworth that we have such

a provider called Gigaclear. You may even already be aware of them seeing as they have been digging up the streets both here and in neighbouring North Kilworth (and Husbands Bosworth) for months. The type of service they provide is called 'Fibre to the Premises' or FTTP - note the subtle difference here, unlike FTTC (Fibre To The Cabinet) the 'P' is the critical factor. What that means is that this provider will connect your house directly to their service with their own fibre optic cable. Fibre cable is the equivalent of the Lamborghini in communications speed, it's not electrical, it uses light to carry the internet data and it doesn't give two hoots how far away you are from the other end, the signal stays strong. The result being that as long as you are in an area where you can be connected to the fibre network (as we now are) you can get this service and the speeds available will be mind-blowingly fast because by using fibre optics, the 'bottleneck' caused by using copper has been removed.

Eventually, getting an FTTP connection will be the standard. Many companies are out there digging up the road and Openreach are also getting in on the action - you will see such services branded as 'Ultrafast'. Of course, the service you choose is up to you – are you streaming films in 4K? Do you work from home? Or are you just sending the occasional email? Whatever you need, the main thing is to do your price comparison homework. It could be the faster connections are better value than the slower ones, even if you don't need the speed, so balance out what you need with what you are prepared to pay. And also remember that providers like Gigaclear who offer localised services aren't always on the comparison sites so check them separately. When it comes to buying broadband, it pays to be broadminded!



I hope that's been informative and not too technical (otherwise known as boring). I'll be back next issue tacking the other big issue about internet access – when your Wi-Fi is playing up!

## Help solve a mystery in South Kilworth – do you know this man?

Thomas William Metcalf (1914-1973) pictured right, was born in Atherstone, Warwickshire and sent to live with Mrs Annie E Hipwell (nee Houghton) in South Kilworth for a period of time. His father had died in 1917 of bullet wounds sustained in France and Flanders and his mother died in 1918 of influenza. There is evidence that his father's pension money was sent to Mrs Hipwell in 1918, presumably for his keep. Thomas married Mavis Welbourne in Rugby in 1959 and they had no children.

Thomas' great niece, Melanie, who now lives in New Zealand, made contact via our South Kilworth website (and our intrepid web admin, Kevin Coyne, took up the challenge) and is trying to solve this family mystery, interestingly linked to South Kilworth.

Does anyone know the Welbourne/ Hipwell/Houghton families? What connection did Thomas have to Mrs Hipwell? Where in South Kilworth did they live? If you have any information please make contact via sknews@southkilworth.co.uk so we, together with John Keal, our resident historian, can help Melanie in her quest. We hope to share the story in our next SK News edition.

- 8.3 PC reviewed and approved the quarterly comparison of 'actual spend' to 'budget' figures at 30th Sept'23 as provided by KB.

#### 9.0 Highways and Footpaths

- 9.1 Damaged road name sign on The Belt: PC confirmed that the broken sign had now been replaced. Resolved.
- 9.2 ED reported that she had been asked by a resident whether or not any measures could be taken to reduce the congestion caused by parked cars at the junction of Rugby Road and Welford Road. It was noted that this issue had been raised many times in the past, but LCC had declined to take any action due to, in their opinion, there being no significant safety hazard. Action: KB to resurrect previous correspondence from LCC for review at the next meeting. Pending.

#### 10.0 Grounds and General Outside Maintenance

- 10.1 Refurbishment of the Parish Noticeboard with provision of a section within, for residents to use for any local updates: The PC gratefully accepted the very generous offer from one of the attending parishioners to cover the cost of the refurbishment, for the quoted sum of £350. When renovation has been completed, KC will place a notice within one section of the Notice Board, inviting parishioners to use it for any community updates that may be useful to village residents. Action: KC to instruct the contractor to go ahead. Pending
- 10.2 Agreement between PC and the Village Hall regarding maintenance of the solar panels: The PC resolved that a formal agreement would be put in place confirming the following:

The solar panels installed on the roof of the South Kilworth Village Hall are in the ownership of South Kilworth Parish Council. The South Kilworth Village Hall will derive the income from the solar panels in return for undertaking the responsibility for the maintenance, upkeep, and insurance of the panels. Action: KB to create the document and forward for signatures. Resolved.

#### 11.0 Recreation

- 11.1 Regular Play Area Safety Inspections: Following the recent ROSPA report received after their inspection in August'23, KC and TW agreed to do a 'walk round' the play area the following morning with the contractor, to confirm any action to be taken. Pending.
- Vandalised surface in play area: Councillors again expressed their outrage at the mindless vandalism that resulted in severe damage to the safety surfacing in the playground. If any member of the community has information about this incident or that might assist in preventing anti-social behaviour, please report it to the Police on 101 or anonymously by phoning Crimestoppers on 0800 555111. Meanwhile, to meet playground safety regulations, a N. Kilworth contractor has been engaged to urgently repair the rubberised safety surface at a cost to our community of £2400. The work is expected to be completed on 12th & 13th October. The PC will look for alternative funding to offset this cost which might otherwise result in an increase of £10 per household on next year's rates.
- Summer Holiday Sports Club for 2023: The PC discussed the feedback from the club provider regarding the allocation of places. Disappointment was expressed at the number of places that had been granted to families outside of the Kilworth Villages area This despite the stipulation having been made by the PC that priority was to be given to Kilworth families. However, overall, it was agreed that the club had been run very professionally and successfully. Resolved.
- 11.4 The PC agreed to accept the Terms of Service issued by HCYC to continue running the weekly youth club sessions for the following academic year, Aug'23 to July'24. The session cost being increased to £149.70 from £138.92. Note these costs are reimbursed from the CIC Windfarm Fund. It was agreed that a request would be made for a representative of HCYC to attend the PC meeting in Feb'24, and to provide a data report covering the recent term for the PC to evaluate. Action: KB to sign the Terms of Service and forward to HCYC. Resolved.

#### 12.0 S106 and CIC Funding

- 12.1 Community feedback re the spending of these funds: Item pending until the PC have an outcome regarding the MUGA proposal.
- 12.2 CIC re-imbursement of latest claim re HCYC costs, £1639.20: No update.

Action: KC agreed to complete the required S50 licence application to be submitted to LCC. Pending.

16.1 Maintenance measures required as reported by GB at June's meeting: The PC confirmed that the repairs have now been carried out. Resolved.

#### Report back - South Kilworth Community Café



As a result of feedback in the Village Neighbourhood Plan, South Kilworth residents decided in 2020 to set up a Community Café once per month, in the village hall. A grant of £1,500 was obtained from Leicestershire County Council to pump prime the Café. The start was delayed due to Covid until September 2021

Since then 15 Cafés have been run and attendance has been around 1042 people (including helpers) since we started – a lot of cups of tea!! Some people have

attended more than once, with an average number of 35 - 55 per café. This figure excludes village events run by the Village Hall Committee like the Queen's Jubilee Café when 155 cream teas were served, sponsored in part by the Parish Council.

Originally the Café was set up in part to replace the previous luncheon club for older people. The Café has enabled villagers, especially those who are isolated, in need of support post-covid, or new to the community, to meet regularly, for friendship and support. A trial was undertaken to open the Café at lunchtime and afternoon for 3 months. The Café attendance dropped although more mums and kids attended. However as the Café targeted the older generation, it was decided to revert to the morning.

Recently the Café has also included local village groups who have demonstrated or shared information, such as table tennis, bowls club, weavers, South Kilworth school and crafting.

The Café has been a success due to the fact we have a strong team of up to 13 volunteers on our committee, who are willing to make sure the café runs once per month and share the load. In addition, other villagers have volunteered cakes and other help such as with our survey, delivering leaflets, providing live music etc. not to mention borrowing the Bowls Club's large teapots! With limited funding,



we were nervous about expenditure, but felt if the village wanted the Café they would support it – and requesting donations has enabled this. We wanted to make it sustainable, not relying on grants in the future. Thanks to everyone who has supported the Community Café in any way. **Tina Morley** 


