## Be a BC Community Scientist!

The BC Parks Foundation is asking British Columbians to FIND IT, SNAP IT, and SHARE IT, as part of our drive to reach 25 million observations of nature by 2025. You can make an important contribution to biodiversity data collection in BC, by simply sharing your nature observations on community science platforms such as iNaturalist and eBird.

### How to get started

#### Download the iNat or eBird App

Download the iNaturalist and eBird apps (they're free!). Find them on Google Play or the App Store

## • Find it, Snap it!

Take photos or record sounds of plants, animals and other organisms you observe. These all contribute to our iNaturalist project. Record bird sightings on eBird

#### Share it!

Upload your sightings and sounds to the apps to increase the observation counts and get IDs from community identifiers

#### CONTRIBUTE TO SCIENTIFIC KNOWLEDGE

Your data help with documenting the biodiversity of BC's wild areas, such as determining records of rare and threatened species and mapping the spread of invasive species. In a province as vast and habitat-diverse as BC, data reporting by community scientists is critical for filling knowledge gaps for biodiversity conservation and management, especially in remote areas. For example, observations of migratory birds tell us about when various species arrive in BC and where important stopover locations are.
