

# Joseph's New Life

#### Commentary overheard in a Happiness Seminar at imaginary Quest Bible College

#### Dr. Quest (on the key linking (L) question)

Who wouldn't be happy about being released from prison and named prime minister? What a tremendous change! The closest biblical parallel may be Mordecai in the book of Esther, but is there anyone like Joseph among us today? Who in this group is a future prime minister?

#### Indy (on Joseph as an ideal manager)

Not me! Joseph was not just powerful, he was also an ideal manager who knew the future, knew exactly what needed to be done, and had years of experience working well with others. There are plenty of independent guys like me around, but probably nobody like Joseph.

#### Dr. Quest (on believers today as God's managers)

You may be right in a way. Yet, every believer is a manager or steward of God's gifts. Through the Scriptures, we know a lot about the future, and God has told us what to do. Best of all, as the Lord was with Joseph, he will be with us as well. What a great commission WE have!

Like: what is the passage like?	Key points for us, Knowing what to do
Like what else in Genesis?  - like 47:13-26  which expands upon 41:53-56 (famine yrs.)  - unlike Joseph's past affliction Pharaoh welcomed, brothers rejected not in prison, traveling around Egypt  - unlike most marriages in Genesis no polygamy or competition in 41:45-52 no scandal like with Judah (38:12-30) no struggle with barrenness (41:50, 48:9) Silence may indicate the lack of problems.  Like what in other Scriptures?  - Joseph was like and unlike DANIEL. both were leaders in foreign lands but Joseph's position was higher with no competition, plot, lion's den but Joseph was not a prophet but Joseph married and had children  - Joseph was more like MORDECAI. both were leaders in foreign lands both became 2nd in command (Esth. 10:3) both helped their people greatly	AS MANAGERS LIKE JOSEPH, WE CAN BE HAPPY  1.) Commentary from various perspectives as overheard in a Happiness Seminar at imaginary Quest Bible College

#### Dr. Quest (on happiness, change, and patience)

What do we need in order to be happy? Verses like 1 Tim. 6:6-8, show that we must be content. Yet, the life of Joseph shows that it was some really big changes that led to his greatest happiness. Of course, Joseph had to wait for years before those changes came, but they did come. So happiness involves both patience and change. What else?

#### Hugh (on the greatness of the changes)

Being released from prison and suddenly made the prime minister over all Egypt, wasn't just 'some really big changes,' it was like being resurrected from the dead! So the joy must have been humungous, sort of like what the disciples felt in Luke 24:52. The bigger the change the bigger the joy can be, and God does things that are bigger than big!

#### Cal (on things that did not change)

Changes? Not really, the Lord had been preparing Joseph all along, in line with HIS eternal plan! The young Hebrew had not been sitting in a cell all by himself for 13 years, because God had led the keeper of the prison to put Joseph in charge of all the other prisoners (Gen. 39:21-22). So Joseph was ready to be set over all the land of Egypt when God's time came. Happiness is based on continuity in God plan more than change.

## Wes (on happiness and the will)

Oh, come on, Cal. Happiness involves the will and work. Joseph was willing to work long hours to get ready for the seven years of famine. Can you imagine what it would have been like for the Egyptians and others if Joseph had stayed home with his lovely wife and sons most of the time? (She was probably beautiful!) When the people cried out in hunger (41:58), he was ready because he had been willing to work all along.

#### Socie (on happiness and marriage)

What about Asenath? I don't know if she was beautiful or not, but since Pharaoh and all his servants held Joseph in high moral and spiritual regard (41:37-38), the king would not have introduced Asenath unless she was a woman of character. As for her being a pagan, since the king of Egypt himself seemed at least somewhat open to Joseph's God, she as his wife would have been even more so. Therefore I believe she became a true believer in the Lord and that was one of the keys to Joseph's happiness.

## Dr. Quest (on the scarcity of happy homes in Genesis)

Are there many happy homes in the Book of Genesis? No! Jacob's family was one of the worse because of polygamy and competition among the wives and children. Joseph's wife, Asenath, however, was his only wife, and I too believe that she became a true believer. The naming of the children (41:51–52) shows Joseph's faith and probably hers as well. Above all, she helped Joseph forget the painful home in which he was raised, which probably involved forgiving his brothers (41:51). That was another key to his happiness.
