(Continued from page 1) Beryl had been in the hospital due to a blood clot in her leg, bleeding in her right hip, and a Baker cyst behind her knee. She received excellent care at Juravinski Hospital but would need further treatment as she could not stand up or walk. So she was transferred to the St. Peter's Hospital Restorative Care program.

A 44-bed adult inpatient unit, Restorative Care provides low-intensity, longer-stay treatment and rehabilitation therapy to patients with multiple medical and/or functionally complex conditions who require additional hospital care, for example, patients recovering from a stroke, surgery or an injury. Patients typically stay for 45 to 60 days. The program team includes doctors, registered nurses, registered practical nurses, nurse case managers, health care aides, a nurse practitioner, social workers, physiotherapists, occupational therapy and physiotherapy assistants,

a speech-language pathologist, a registered dietician, a respiratory therapist, and business clerks.

"I can't believe the difference they made. When I was leaving, I said 'Thank you from the bottom of my heart. I am going home because of your hard work," says Beryl, who can now walk with the help of a walker and is continuing her rehab with an at-home program.

Jana Cochrane is proud to be part of the Restorative Care Team. "It is just a wonderful group of people who really want to make a difference in people's lives," says Jana, Clinical Manager, Restorative Care Unit.

"It's amazing to help people restore their function to resume their daily activities and continue with what makes their lives meaningful. We are so lucky to be able to offer this program in Hamilton."

Going Above and Beyond to Support Children's Hospitals

Each year, Costco Canada recognizes its Top 20 Fundraisers nationwide for their month-long campaign, which raises money for children's hospitals, including McMaster Children's Hospital. "I wanted to push even further last year, so I set my goal at \$1,000 to dye my hair and beard pink! I ended up reaching that goal too."

Chris and his family also have many personal ties with McMaster Children's Hospital, encouraging him to support the campaign.

"When my son was a month old, he needed to stay at McMaster Children's Hospital for a short while," explains Chris. "Throughout the years, he has made a few more visits from a concussion to an appendix burst. But, each time we visited, the staff were there for us when we needed them most, and now I want to pay it forward."

Every dollar raised from Rachel, Chris and other Costco employees in our region goes directly to

"Our community would not be what it is without health care facilities like McMaster Children's Hospital," says Chris. "They support the wellbeing of our future generations, and we need to do more to help them provide that care."

Angelina Strong is Paying it Forward

Just one week after turning 14, Angelina was rushed in the middle of the night on Aug. 12, 2021, to McMaster Children's Hospital's Pediatric Intensive Care Unit due to a rare arteriovenous malformation (AVM) rupture – bleeding due to a tangle of blood vessels connecting arteries and veins in the brain.

"We didn't know what was going to happen," recalls Angelina's mom, Sandra. "The odds were against her."

The cause of brain AVMs isn't clear; most people are born with them but they can form later in life. Due to the severity of Angelina's condition, the hospital staff worked quickly to get her into emergency surgery for a craniotomy.

"From the doctors, surgeons, nurses to staff, there was just an army of people ready and willing to help from the moment we entered the hospital," says Sandra. "It's an overwhelming experience when your child is in that condition, but I knew we had the best care for her by the way they supported us and communicated her diagnosis and procedures in a way we could understand."

With the overwhelming support of Angelina's family, friends and community, the Angelina Strong T-shirt Fundraiser was created to raise money to help fund her recovery. The t-shirts represented what Angelina loved most: puppy paws, rowing and teal – Angelina's favourite colour.

The fundraiser raised a total of \$6,160. It was created to support the purchase of medical equipment Angelina may have needed during her recovery; however, she did not need it. Knowing what McMaster Children's Hospital did for her and her family, Angelina decided to pay it forward and donate the money back to the hospital.

"I don't remember much from the time I entered the hospital, but I do remember the doctors, nurses and staff were always amazing to me," says Angelina. "They went through everything with me; I was never alone – they are like a family to me now."

Now, two years into her recovery, Angelina is thriving and doing what she loves most, like being back on the water with her rowing club.

"After this experience, I try to live every day like it's my last. And, I know that sounds a bit cliché, but I've lived a day I thought may be my last. But, luckily, I had a compassionate team at McMaster Children's Hospital who turned that around for me."

The Watering Can, a long-time retail partner of CosMic Plants, immediately offered to support the campaign. The Niagara local flower market offered to donate proceeds from the sale of each orchid at

its store in support of CosMic Plants' efforts. In 2022, CosMic Plants and The Watering Can raised \$7,000 for the CIBC Breast Assessment Centre.

"We couldn't be more grateful for our partners, like The Watering Can, who support this initiative," says Marc. "This year, we expect to bring more amazing partners to support such a great initiative. We look to expand this program throughout Ontario and hopefully have news of a national retail partner in the coming months!"

Cancer has affected Shannon Revill in more ways than one.

Although Shannon has never been diagnosed with cancer, she has felt the devastating impact the disease has had on loved ones.

"My grandmother passed away with cervical cancer when I was 16," recalls Shannon. "And my mother was diagnosed with breast cancer, but thanks to the great care she received at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, her cancer is in remission."

In 2011, with the help of close friends, Shannon formed a fundraising team – The Jersey Girls – which champions and supports cancer-related charities.

"The Jersey Girls are determined to make a difference in the lives of patients and families embarking on their own cancer journeys," says Shannon. "We hope to inspire others to participate and fundraise as well."

The group's Annual Spaghetti Dinner was created to honour her grandmother's memory and support cancer

care in south-central Ontario, which, along with other fundraising initiatives, has raised over \$60,000.

After a few years of hiatus due to COVID-19, this past month, The Jersey Girls' 9th Annual Spaghetti Dinner, including a silent auction, aimed to raise more than \$12,000 with proceeds supporting Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre.

Celebrating the Vital Roles that Nurses Play

Maureen Casey, who is being treated for cancer at the Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, says she read all she could find about her illness when she was diagnosed.

"I don't think you can launch an effective fight without having some measure of your opponent. Knowledge is power," she says, adding that it is also important to have hope and a strong sense of humour.

Another factor that she says has helped her cope with her illness has been the staff at the Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre. "Everyone is so professional and knowledgeable and they are so enjoyable to talk to," Maureen says.

In addition to check-ups, chemotherapy treatment and bloodwork, Maureen has visited the Rapid Evaluation and Symptom Support Cancer Unit (RESSCU), a nurse practitioner-led unit where patients receive help to manage symptoms and side effects such as pain, nausea and vomiting.

"The entire RESSCU team is exceptional. They are so concerned for you and right there when you need them," Maureen says. "Of particular note are nurse practitioners Leah and Noelle. My doctor, Dr. Richard Tozer, and his nurse, Jodi, are marvellous. And the nurses in the chemo suite are all amazing, with special mention to Rebecca and Cathy."

Maureen especially wants to give these nurses a shoutout in honour of National Nursing Week, May 8-14, which increases awareness of the vital role nurses play in a person's health care journey. Maureen is so moved by the care she received that she will be dedicating her future donations to support cancer-related equipment, research and technology to benefit the Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre.

Another way to honour nurses, as well as other staff members and volunteers, is through #VITAL2HHS. Patients and family members can show gratitude by making a donation in honour of any staff member, health care team or volunteer who are informed of the gift and receive a commemorative lapel pin.

Joshua's NICU Fundraiser Hopes to Raise \$70,000

Born on Dec. 8, 2021, Joshua spent 77 days at McMaster Children's Hospital.

Due to a traumatic delivery, Joshua was rushed from West Lincoln Memorial Hospital to McMaster Children's Hospital. He spent five days in a donor-funded CritiCool Blanket to monitor and regulate his body temperature. Luckily, Joshua showed no signs of brain damage; however, he could not breathe properly on his own.

"My husband and I were so thankful for the immediate care of Joshua, but we learned that his health concerns were more complicated than first anticipated," recalls Joshua's mother, Sarah. "We heard how incredible the doctors and staff were at McMaster Children's Hospital, and we were granted peace knowing he was receiving the best care possible."

For the next 45 days, Joshua remained in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), relying on vital sign monitors, ventilators, incubators and feeding pumps to maintain his condition.

"Through this journey, our family learned that almost all the equipment used to save Joshua's life was provided through the generosity of donor support to the hospital," says Sarah. "We are so thankful for our community." After spending four more weeks in the NICU, where a dedicated staff continued to give him extraordinary care, Joshua finally went home.

"We are so grateful for Joshua's care," says Sarah. "We know there is a great need for critical equipment so other families can receive the same outstanding care we did. That is why we created Joshua's NICU Fundraiser with a few other families we met along the way".

Joshua's NICU Fundraiser hopes to raise \$70,000 to support McMaster Children's Hospital, with all proceeds directly supporting the purchase of vital equipment in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

Colours for a Cause

15-year-old philanthropists are crafting beautiful bracelets to raise funds and awareness for Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre.

Best friends from a young age, Sofia and Bianca, began designing bracelets three years ago to honour people they cherished most who were affected by cancer.

"Our close friend's mother passed away from cancer, and we wanted to create something to show our support," says Sofia. "We thought selling these bracelets would be a creative way to give back to the community in honour of her."

The girls had no expectations when they started their mission – only that it was the 'right thing to do.'

"We did not have a goal in mind when we first started," recalls Bianca. "We knew that no matter if we sold three or 300, we were still making a difference somehow."

Three years later, the bracelets created in various intricate designs such as Spiral, Diamond and Diagonal have raised more than \$1,473 to support Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre.

"We hope to continue that success and raise up to \$2,000 this year with new collections of patterns and colours," says Sofia.

Donor-Funded Equipment Enhances Patient Care

New vital equipment at Hamilton General Hospital will tremendously impact patient care.

Fiberoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing (FEES) is a procedure used to identify the presence of dysphagia. Dysphagia is difficulty swallowing – taking more time and effort to move food or liquid from the mouth to the stomach.

Donor-funded equipment is used for the FEES procedure to evaluate patients who have experienced a stroke or brain aneurysm and are experiencing swallowing issues and must re-learn this basic bodily function.

Hamilton General Hospital is the only site in the region with this procedure, tools and trained staff. However, teams at The General

However, teams at The General have highlighted the widespread use across the hospital and continual wear and tear on these critical tools – only one functional device used for FEES remains.

Thanks to the support of a generous donor, health care teams at Hamilton General Hospital can now purchase equipment such as a high-definition distal chip endoscope used for FEES. This gift is another example of how our donors enhance patient care.
