Why do we have Catholic schools?

Catholic schools are central to the **Church's mission** in education, to place Christ and the teaching of the Catholic Church at the centre of people's lives.

Education is integral to the mission of the Church to proclaim the Good News. All Catholic schools share something in common: they are **rooted in Christ**. As a result, the ethos of Catholic schools is fundamental and incarnate in all aspects of school life, so that they may be effective instruments of the Church's mission.

Schools are, therefore, a key element in the life of the Diocese, to which much weight is given in Canon Law and at a national level, through the Catholic Education Service. The aim of the Diocese is to ensure a place is provided for **every Catholic child** in a Catholic school.

Our Catholic Schools are Excellent

Through an excellent Catholic education, with Christ at the centre and founded on the principle of partnership and community, **each individual's God-given potential** is drawn out. Catholic schools in the Diocese are indeed excellent. They excel and pride themselves in the moral, spiritual and academic development of all students.

Our Catholic Schools are Free

The majority of the Catholic schools in Surrey are state-funded. These schools (listed later in this booklet) are free and do not require fees.

APPLYING TO CATHOLIC SECONDARY SCHOOLS

A Summary of the Process

For Parents/Carers seeking a place at a Catholic secondary school, the steps below will help to optimise the chances of success:

1. Be informed

Visit the Catholic schools in your area and **read each school's prospectus** in detail (available online or from the schools). Also look at each school's Ofsted and Catholic School Inspection reports. Finally get to know each school's Admissions Policy, Oversubscription Criteria and Supplementary Information Form.

2. CHOOSE UP TO SIX SCHOOLS

After your research, choose six schools that will be suitable for your child. Decide in which preference order to list the schools, having read their Oversubscription Criteria. **Note that Criteria can change annually and from school to school.** Ensure you list all the Catholic schools you like as the first preferences. This will maximise your chances of a place at a Catholic school. Ensure too that you have one realistic choice (a school where you are very likely to be offered a place) as one of the six schools.

3. FILL IN A COMMON APPLICATION FORM

Fill in a Common Application Form (CAF) from the Local Authority (LA) in which you live. You **MUST** complete a LA application form listing and ranking up to six schools that you prefer your child to go to in the following September. You must use the CAF of the LA in whose area you live. Without this form, your application will NOT be valid. For all of the preferences listed on the CAF, your child will be considered against the admission criteria of the schools concerned.

The order you list schools should indicate your genuine order of preference for the schools. Some parents are worried that where they place a school in their order of preference will affect their chances of getting a place. **This is not true. The school will not know which position you ranked them on the CAF and is not allowed to ask**. You are strongly advised to name all six schools on the CAF, in case your higher preferences are unsuccessful. Most applicants complete the CAF online. Keep a copy of the CAF for reference.

4. FILL IN A SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION FORM

Fill in a Supplementary Information Form (SIF) for every Catholic school you apply to. You MUST complete a SIF for every Catholic school to which you apply. The SIF will ask you questions such as whether your child is a baptised Catholic and in which parish you live. Catholic schools will generally require a Baptismal Certificate as evidence. Some schools' Criteria need your priest's signature. If the latter, it is a good idea to get hold of the SIFs for all of the schools you have chosen before seeking your priest's signature. This way you will only need to visit the priest once. Keep a copy of the SIF for reference.

5. Return the CAF and SIF by 31st October

Return the CAF to the LA (usually online) by the **closing date of 31st October** (10 months prior to admission). The closing date for SIFs and accompanying baptism certificates etc. is also 31st October. Each SIF should be returned to each applicable school, not the LA. **Do not miss the closing date**. If forms are late, your application will be processed after everyone else has been offered a place.

6. What happens next?

On 1st March (or the next working day), the LA (on behalf of the governors) will inform you whether you have an offer of a place. You will have a short time to accept the offer. If you are one of the very few who have not been offered a place, the LA may allocate a place in a school which you have not chosen. If you have applied to and not been offered a place at a school, you have a right of appeal to an independent Appeal Panel. Details are available from each school.


