
There are five weeks of this Invited season, to coincide with Lent, and these resources will help you to pray and reflect on what the speakers say to us in the films.


To make the most of these resources, we recommend you use a journal to make notes on what you hear, and what these things make you think and feel. Use this journal to help you pray, speak to God about your reactions and how you might be challenged by them. Ask Him to pour out His unending grace upon you, that you might experience His love ever more deeply, and that you will grow in love for Him in return.



Each week the resources will be divided into five sections:

Prepare – these films are not a regular TV programme; they are an opportunity to encounter the Lord, so we offer some advice each week on how to be ready for that encounter.





Listen – Allow your heart and mind to be lifted towards heaven with our music recommendations. You may want to find the track before you start. You have a choice this season, to suit your music preference.

The first half of Fr Toby's talk is incredibly thought provoking. Exploring the meaning behind our relationship with Jesus, helping us to see the glory and primacy of Christ our King. Fr Toby brings so

many points for us to take to prayer and reflection through the week ahead.

It creates a glorious opportunity for us to see Christ by looking at ourselves, by looking at ourselves with honest and also loving eyes. Fr Toby helps us to comprehend the differences between what we believe is important versus what is truly important in our lives and our faith. Fr Toby encourages us to overcome the challenges and the deceptions of worldliness and to embrace an experience built on truth and love.

It can lead us to wonder, what does freedom mean to us and what role does Christ play in bringing true freedom into our lives? We are continuously faced with choices every moment of our lives and Fr Toby brings us a beautiful and challenging framework to make those choices within, the framework that is Jesus - in all His humanity, in all His divine glory and in His love and service of all.

Here are the questions posed during the first half of the film that you might want to spend some time considering:

- 1. What do I worship, what do I love, what do I give my freedom to?
- 2. If someone looked at my life, my conversations, my thoughts, what would they think I worship?
- 3. What does God know I worship?



Reflect 2

What a beautiful second half! Fr Toby continued to remind us so prophetically about the glamour and distraction of the modern world and the reality that we have choices to make in our lives.

It is certainly an eye opener when Fr Toby reminds us that we risk becoming addicted to mobile phones, social media, emails, and the magpie-like shiny attractions of "stuff" that is all around us. All of which is battling for our attention, our children and our grandchildren's attention and potentially our soul's. We might find ourselves wondering how much time we give to things through the day, the amount of time invested in trivial things versus the amount of time we spend with our Lord – a very humbling experience.

One particular phrase that might have struck you was "Living as a Christian, and loving as a Christian, helps us to see things differently", perhaps this is something that we can all take to prayer through the week ahead.

Here are the remaining questions for you to ponder:

- 1. What in my life distracts me from worship? Do I need to offer these distractions to the Lord, or should I try to remove them from my life?
- 2. When and where might I try rejection therapy?

With huge thanks to Fr Toby Lees who is a Dominican Friar and Priest. He was a lawyer for seven years before ditching the city suit for the white habit. Since joining the Dominicans he has studied in Cambridge, Oxford, and Rome, and more recently worked as a university chaplain at KCL, a hospital chaplain during COVID, and now works full-time as Priest Director

In part one, Fr Kieron invites us to reflect on the Gospel story of Jesus **Reflect 1** clearing the temple and to consider it as a parable for our Church today. As a Church, we have to face the challenges of a post-Christendom and secularised society with radical and

innovative ways of renewal. Can we 'sing a new song' that chimes with the past, but offers a new melody for our present and future?

During this time of Lenten reflection and renewal:

1. Do I recognise that the Church must 'Sing a new song'?

2. What do I think needs to be cleared out of the 'temple,' in my own life and in the

way we are Church?



In the second part, Fr Kieron **Reflect 2** shares his experiences of ministry in different settings and how he has faced change

in the way people engage in the Church. Some of

our assumptions in the way people live their faith need to be challenged and new ways of engagement developed. Fr Kieron reminds us that we have to bear in mind the 'complexity and fragility of people's lives and faith journeys.' We are challenged to embrace a new way of 'being' Church, moving away from a consumerist model to a body of intentional disciples where all are welcome end everybody brings their gifts for the benefit of the community.

Here are the remaining questions from the film:

- 1. Are we guilty of making assumptions as a Church community?
- 2. How can we become a community where all are welcome to 'join in the dance'?
- 3. Fr Kieron's talk reflects many of the themes we find in the recently launched Pastoral Plan. How do you feel called to contribute to the new Diocesan vision?

"I therefore take this opportunity to invite everyone in the Diocese – lay faithful and religious, deacons and priests – to join with me in forging our parishes into communities of saints, into strong, lively and welcoming schools of discipleship. May they be communities where the Lord is known and loved; where the liturgy is experienced as an encounter with the wonder of heaven; where daily prayer is a natural part of life; communities of healing, where all are welcomed, their dignity as children of God always recognised; where young people grow in deep love for the Gospel, for the sacramental life of the Church and for prayer; where all know the riches of the Faith and seek to share it with others"

EPISODE 3: COMMUNITY

What is the Church and how do we fit in?



Pause for a moment, contemplating that fact that you are always in God's presence.

In episode 3 Fr Thomas skilfully guides us **Watch** through his reflections on Ecclesiology, what it means to be Church. He describes the fundamental unity that binds us

together as a Church – that membership given to us at the moment of our Baptism and he reminds us that this can never be undone. He highlights the importance of our Church community as a family where each is known, loved and has value. He asks us to consider the issue of our relationship with Church – how do we see ourselves in this body, what do we bring and offers us the challenge of taking our responsibility to enable the Church to grow, mature and develop,

Fr Thomas asked us some challenging questions - As Tertullian says; **Reflect 1** are we known – visible in the world – because of the love we show each other? How does that manifest itself in our everyday lives. How do we demonstrate that love for each other and God's world.

How do we use the different gifts that we have been given to benefit the mystical body of Christ- His Church?

Fr Thomas describes the necessity of all gifts, not just the loud showy ones but the small quiet ones too. Do we know what our gifts are? Take a moment to consider your gift? Is it possible you have overlooked it? How can you nourish it for the benefit of the Church.

Here are the questions Fr Thomas poses for us to reflect on this Lent:

- 1. How does the Church help me to be a disciple of Jesus?
- 2. How do I help the Church in her mission to make disciples of all people?
- 3. Is there more that I could do to reach out to grow your Church?



In the second session Fr Thomas draws our attention to the physical Reflect 2 structures of the Church and primarily the place of the Pope and the Clergy. He reminds us that Christ is the only head of the Church – he

rules it invisibly but the place of the Pope is vital as he guides it and us as its manifestation, visibly. He offers us some documents to consider which may help our understanding of these structures: Lumen Gentium Lumen gentium (vatican.va) and Mystici Corporis Christi. Mystici Corporis Christi (June 29, 1943) | PIUS XII (vatican.va)

He asks us to consider the statement from the Gospel of St John: "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. What does remaining in Him mean? What fruit can we bring?

Fr Thomas suggested the following questions to think about:

- 1. How does God want us to behave as his people?
- 2. How will I help people come to understand and love the Church more?
- 3. How do I speak about the Church in my daily life?

Reflect 1 In this part Fr Kevin explores the background of the sacrament of confession, showing the very important link with the sacrament of baptism, where our sins are forgiven initially. Fr Kevin examines the biblical roots of sin and shows us the cure is Jesus, who gives us the great gift of forgiveness.

- 1. Does Fr Kevin's description of sin, as dis-ease, resonate with you?
- 2. Pope Francis encourages us to be always merciful. Are there ways we can be more merciful as a community within our locality?



Fr Kevin clearly explains how the Church is a place of healing, as the **Reflect 2** sacrament of reconciliation always brings us healing. In the gospels, Jesus knows our need for the healing of the wounds in our lives and Jesus, as our divine healer and doctor, always accompanies

physical healing with the forgiveness of sins. Fr Kevin reminds us the beautiful truth that Jesus looks into our hearts and sees our deepest needs and the wounds of sin in our lives. He reminds us never to doubt the amazing reality of God's love for us. Fr Kevin reminds us that our role is to respond to this great love and move away from sin to new life in lesus

- 1. What is my response to God's love for me?
- 2. What struck you about the story of the young man's experience of the Sacrament?



Reflect 3 In the final part Fr Kevin encourages us to come and speak to Jesus through the ministry of the priest in the sacrament of reconciliation. As he points out in this beautiful sacrament, God is inviting us to

receive His healing and peace and the strength to change our lives. It doesn't matter how long it has been since our last confession, Fr Kevin reminds us each day is a new opportunity to come to the sacrament of reconciliation and receive the healing of our hearts and souls. As he points out, we receive such joy and freedom in this life - giving sacrament.

- 1. Has your attitude to sin, an examination of conscience and confession been changed today?
- 2. Is there someone you wish could experience God's merciful love through Reconciliation? How would you explain the beauty of the Sacrament to them?

In this section we reflect on Lent being a time of Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving. We focus on what happened on Palm Sunday and on Spy Wednesday. This is followed by the anointing of Jesus' feet at Bethany. Then we hear about the betrayal of Jesus by Judas. We hear

how Peter says 'I will never betray you' yet goes on to do just that. We are encouraged to make Holy Week a time of quietness and preparation. We explore the Holy Week Liturgies including the Chrism Mass where the oils that we use in our sacraments are blessed by Bishop Richard. At this Mass all the priests renew their priestly promises

- 1. What memories do you have of Holy Weeks you have attended?
- 2. In what ways do I honour Jesus in my daily life?
- 3. Could I arrange to attend the Chrism Mass in Arundel this year? Who could I Invite to come with me?



Reflect 2 In this section we focus on the Easter Triduum which is one celebration spread over three days. It starts with Holy Thursday with the Lord's Supper and is celebrated in the evening.

It is a celebration which remembers the Passover Meal - the meal which Jesus celebrated with His disciples. We also celebrate the institution of the Holy Eucharist. At The Lord's Supper we also celebrate Jesus washing the feet of His disciples. This Mass does not end in the usual way – the Blessed Sacrament is transferred to a place of repose, mirroring the movement of the apostles and Jesus to the Garden of Gethsemane. On Easter Saturday we celebrate with renewed appreciation and joy that Jesus is alive and that we are alive in Him.

At this Liturgy there is the lighting of the Paschal Candle and a blessing of the water in the font for Baptisms. All the people gathered are invited to renew their Baptismal promises.

All those who are being baptised have water poured on their head are anointed with the oil of chrism.

- 1. Has this exploration of the Triduum lead you to a greater understanding of the beauty of the Triduum as one event and does it change how you will approach it this year?
- 2. How might you explain the Triduum to a newcomer?
