The Word Who is Life: The Call to Mission (2024)

The following glossary aims to explain some of the words and phrases used in Bishop Richard Moth's third Pastoral Plan for the Diocese: 'The Word Who is Life: The Call to Mission'.

Term	Definition
Acolyte	Although often used to refer to an altar server, in the context of the Pastoral Plan 'acolyte' refers to the stable ministry that was reserved to those preparing for ordination until 2021 when Pope Francis extended it to all the lay faithful. Acolytes can be male or female; they assist the priest at Mass by carrying the missal, cross or candles; they are also entrusted to distribute Holy Communion during Mass and to take Holy Communion to the sick outside of the celebration. Ascent programme	The Ascent is a three-year discipleship formation programme for Catholics in school years 10-12 who want to embrace and enrich their faith and learn how to share it with others. See www.theascentuk.co.uk for further details.
Catechism of the Catholic Church	The Catechism of the Catholic Church is the Church's teaching document. See the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales (CBCEW) website for further details.
Catechist	In the context of the 2024 Pastoral Plan, 'catechist' refers to a new stable ministry introduced by Pope Francis. The catechist is called to be expert in the pastoral service of transmitting the faith from the initial proclamation, through to the preparation for the sacraments and ongoing formation. Catholic Education Trusts	The decision to create Catholic Education Trusts (CETs) was taken by Bishop Richard Moth and the diocesan Board of Trustees in 2015. Xavier CET (Surrey) was established in 2016, with Bosco (Sussex) established in 2017. By 2030 all diocesan schools will have joined a trust or be on the journey towards academy status. 	church includes all formal public acts of worship in church, the
	celebration of the Mass and the sacraments and the daily prayer.
Liturgy of the Hours	Also known as the Divine Office or Prayer of the Church: Morning
67	Prayer, Evening Prayer, Night Prayer, and the smaller Offices in
	between. Clergy are required to pray the Liturgy of the Hours daily and
	lay people are encouraged to pray any part of it that is appropriate in
	the circumstances of their lives.
Magisterium	The teaching authority of the Pope and the bishops.
Ministry	Service to God and others, in particular roles, within the Church.

Mission	The Mission of the Church is "to proclaim and to spread among all
