NEW EXPRESSIONS!

May I ask

“May” is a modal verb used here instead of Can. They have almost the same meaning in questions, but May sounds more polite

May you help me?

May I ask for a favor?

Well

A word that's a great way to give you time to think of what you're going to say. It's a great strategy whenever you need to think before saying something and you're also gonna sound natural.

Well, I was wondering if I could ask you something.

Well, I'm not sure

That sounds great

Used to describe something that seems appealing to the ears. The same structure can be used for other senses, and they all have “seem” as a synonym.

It sounds like a terrible idea.

That seems like a good plan.



Would you like

A modal verb “would” combined with “like”, to create the structure “você gostaria”.

Would you like to go out this weekend?

Would you like me to cook for you?
