Voter ID and local elections

This May, parish, town and borough council elections will be taking place across Bracknell Forest. These happen every four years.

This year will mark the first time that voter ID will be needed at polling stations. Those without ID will not be able to vote in any elections in the borough.

This is a change being introduced by the UK Government and will apply to all local elections, referendums, recall petitions and Police and Crime Commissioner elections from May 2023 and all UK Parliamentary General Elections from October 2023.

What this means for voters in Bracknell Forest

Anyone voting at a polling station in Bracknell Forest will need to show an accepted form of photo ID before they can be given their ballot papers.

Accepted forms of photo ID

Voters are being asked to check in good time, whether they have an accepted form of ID.

Accepted forms of ID include a driving licence, passport, as well as some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass or a blue badge.

The council's e+ card does not meet the government's required standard for Voter ID unless it falls into one of the categories listed above. i.e a concessionary



travel pass or PASS card.

You can find the full list on the Electoral Commission website: www.electoralcommission.org. uk/

Voters will also be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo.

Voter Authority Certificate

Those without an accepted form of ID can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate on the Electoral Commission website.

Voters will need their name, address, date of birth and national insurance number in order to progress their application. They will also need to provide a photograph.

Postal voting

You don't need photo ID to vote by post, so you don't need to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate if you choose to vote this way.

To apply for a postal vote, you will need to download the application form from the Electoral Commission's website.

Voting on the day

To vote in person, you will need to visit your designated polling station between 7am and 10pm on Thursday, 4 May. Once there, residents must tell polling staff their name. You do not need your poll card but bringing it with you can speed up the process.

To be eligible to vote, you must must show your photo ID to the poll clerk. You do not have to show ID to enter the polling station or to anyone outside the polling station. Those requiring additional support can request a private area to show their ID.

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

If you have any questions about voter ID, I recommend visiting the Electoral Commission's website (www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID). There you will find out exactly what you need to do so you don't miss your chance to vote.

Take care and here's hoping the warmer, spring weather is soon here.

Updates from our climate change action plan



Air quality monitoring at schools

We are consistently monitoring the air quality in our schools. After successfully procuring a supplier for further monitoring, we are now able to track the levels of PM2.5 particles, these are small pollutants that are hard to track. 42 schools across three local authorities, including Bracknell Forest, are benefiting from this technology. All 28 schools that have so far been monitored are reported to be compliant with DEFRA's air quality objectives.

Anti-idling training in Bracknell Forest

Staff from the council's civil enforcement team have recently had anti-idling training. The training focused on collecting information about the location and occurrence of idling vehicles in Bracknell Forest when civil enforcement officers are out conducting their duties. The aim is to encourage drivers to change their habits and switch off their engines when they can, instead of leaving their vehicle running. Leaflets have been produced with information to explain the dangers of idling, and to help dispel some common myths about the topic. Data collected from the initiative will help the council to better understand the problem and take steps to encourage people to change their habits. For example, it will help identify the best location to put up signs to remind people to switch off their engine while waiting.



Demand for Forestcare services



Forestcare is the council's year-round 24/7 emergency response control centre based at Waterside Park in Bracknell. The dedicated team offers a range of telecare solutions providing support and assistance to both individuals and organisations every day of the year.

In December, Forestcare continued to provide services to the wider community, whilst many other local authorities and housing associations closed for the Christmas break. This included navigating one month of housing repair calls in just one weekend.

During December Forestcare staff:

- answered a total of 25,487 calls
- made 297 referrals to the ambulance service
- made 52 referrals to the fire service
- dealt with 292 referrals for installations of assistive technology

The team was on hand during the Christmas break and between 23 December to 3 January, Forestcare answered:

- 5,500 emergency contacts from local residents
- 1,500 out of hours repair, domestic violence, highways, environmental health and other similar calls

Many of the calls taken by Forestcare allow early action which helps prevent many of our most vulnerable residents needing hospitalisation.

The Lexicon Bracknell Half Marathon

The Lexicon Bracknell Half Marathon will be back on Sunday, 14 May.

Last year, over 800 competitors crossed the finish line in Braccan Walk. This longstanding race, which marks its 39th anniversary this year, is expected to attract more than 1,000 runners.

Managed by Everyone Active on behalf of Bracknell Forest Council and The Lexicon, it remains the biggest running event in the borough.

The event is a fast and flat half marathon taking in the views of Bracknell Forest. Spectators are encouraged to line the route and cheer on the runners as they pass, to help them reach the finish line.

All entrants will be expected to finish within three and a half hours. Free parking is available for entrants in a designated town centre car park, entrants just need to show proof of entry between 7am and 8.30am.

There is still time to sign up and train for this demanding, though exhilarating run, simply search The Lexicon Bracknell Half Marathon online.



Budget position 2023 - 2024

The council's budget proposals, including the agreed level of council tax for 2023 – 2024, were approved at the meeting of full council on Wednesday, 22 February.

The council is facing an unprecedented level of cost pressures from high inflation and demand for services. For the first time in over 20 years, the council will make an unplanned withdrawal from its reserves to supplement funding agreed in its approved budget.

The additional costs of inflation, rising demand for statutory services and income losses due to economic conditions will total £17m in 2023/24.

How your £1 is spent



To balance the budget, the council will make £7.5m of cost savings and will use £3.6m from its one-off reserves. An increase in council tax of 4.99 per cent will be used to bridge the remaining

gap of £3.9m. The increase will equate to around a £1.41 increase per week for a band D council taxpayer and will ensure Bracknell Forest remains in the bottom 10 per cent of all unitary authorities, over £180 per year below the average level.

Financial support

Balancing the budget

For 2023/24, the council is providing a £75 reduction to council tax bills for working age households eligible for council tax support. This is a local scheme and complements government funded discounts of £25 for all council tax support claimants, including pensioner households.

Help is available to households who are experiencing cost-of-living increases, particularly the most vulnerable residents. A range of schemes are available both locally and nationally, including help with energy and food bills or council tax support and further information and advice on the support available can be found on the council's dedicated cost-of-living webpage.

Cllr Peter Heydon, executive member for transformation and finance, said:

"Every year the council faces financial pressures and challenges, but we have never before experienced the current levels. Inevitably, the current wider economic crisis is impacting us, like it is all households and businesses.

"As always, we have worked incredibly hard to identify £7.5m of savings without impacting on essential frontline services. The alternative would be to cut these vital services, which is simply not an option, particularly at a time when more people with increasingly complex needs are dependent on these services. It is vital we ensure both adult and children's social care can continue to support the borough's most vulnerable residents now and in the future.

"We understand an increase in council tax is never welcomed, particularly at a time when many residents are facing further financial challenges. However, it is the only permanent income source that helps us sustain the essential services that our residents depend on. We have always had in place a wide range of measures to help financially vulnerable households and I would strongly encourage residents to take a look at all the schemes available to see where they may be eligible for financial support if needed."

The financial pressures that households are currently experiencing due to the increased cost of living, has led to many people looking for additional support, or ways to save money.

The council works with several community organisations to create a wrap-around support network to cover all areas that may be affected. Community organisations such as The Cowshed, First Days, Clothes Bank, Baby Bank and Storehouse can help with clothing (including school uniforms) or furniture. Citizens Advice East Berkshire can support with money management or debt. Details of all of these organisations are listed

The community learning team, based at Bracknell Open Learning Centre, offers a range of drop-in sessions to help support adults. They can help those who are experiencing IT difficulties or may be struggling with their digital devices at home. A free IT support session runs on Fridays during term-time, 10am to 2pm. If getting to the centre is a problem, then the session can also be accessed online or over the telephone by arrangement.

For jobseekers, the weekly job club is on Thursdays at Bracknell Open Learning Centre, 9.30am to 4pm. Jobseekers can use computers to search for vacancies, update their CV or access the internet for free. There is also free job-seeking advice and an opportunity to book courses too, which

includes a range of IT courses in Word, Excel and more.



Mood-boosting places




In 2022, we challenged amateur photographers to capture Bracknell Forest's mood-boosting places, as part of our annual, free-to-enter photo competition.


The theme was chosen to reflect the abundance of amazing local places, which makes Bracknell Forest a special place in which to live, work and play.


Cllr John Harrison, executive member for culture, delivery and public protection, said: "Thanks to all residents who took part, and to our fellow competition organisers who provided the prizes.



Bracknell Forest local plan moves towards adoption

Government planning inspectors provided feedback on the draft local plan in January, positively stating it is legally compliant and will set out a sound approach to development with some straightforward modifications.

The plan sets out where new homes, businesses and facilities could be located in the next 15 years.

The main modification the inspectors have set out is the removal of the proposed garden village at Jealott's Hill. This part of the plan looked to provide around 2,000 new homes, a neighbourhood centre, primary school, a new Science and Innovation Park and publicly accessible greenspace, including sports pitches, play areas and country parks, supporting the Agri-Tech research hub that already exists in this location.

They also suggested that small sites opposite Pope's Meadow in Binfield and Lower Church Road in Sandhurst should be removed – these accounted for about 50 homes.

Inspectors confirmed that removing the garden village and smaller sites in Binfield and Sandhurst would not undermine the plan and the borough would still have a suitable strategy for meeting housing and planning needs up to 2037.

They supported the proposal in the plan to have 35 per cent of all new housing allocated as affordable housing.

They concluded that the council has worked hard and in a professional manner to produce the plan and that with the recommended modifications it could be adopted. This is not a unique situation – nearly all councils are asked to make modifications by planning inspectors prior to adoption.

The council is working with the planning inspectors to agree the wording of the modifications. A consultation on the modifications is due to take place later this spring to allow the public to comment on the changes suggested.

Once adopted, the plan will have up-to-date policies to enable planning decisions that promote sustainable and high-quality development in the right locations.

Cllr Chris Turrell, executive member for planning and transport, said:

"Naturally, it is disappointing that the plan is not able to be adopted as it stands, especially as there were extremely important economic reasons why the Jealott's Hill development was put forward.

"However, we are grateful to planning inspectors for their invaluable comments and the recognition that we have worked hard to create a plan that meets the future needs of our residents and businesses.

"We're pleased they recognise it is legally compliant and could be adopted subject to some straightforward modifications. We are now working through all the recommendations and will soon consult on the changes to capture residents' feedback.

"I'd like to thank everyone who has taken the time to comment on the plan so far and want to assure our residents and businesses that we are working as quickly as possible to get the right plan adopted for our borough.

Gritting season



Our winter weather teams have been very busy since the winter season started in October. The mild start to the season was followed by a very wet new year, an extremely cold end to January, with another cold spell in February.

Our gritting trucks treated primary roads 50 times, along with three secondary route runs. 727 tons of salt were used. Our trucks often go out in the middle of the night to ensure conditions are as good as they can be by the time traffic peaks in the morning.

Rock salt is most effective on road surface temperatures up to minus six degrees Celsius. When temperatures fall below that, water on the roads may still freeze, especially where leaks occur, or private ditches have not been maintained and overspill onto the road.

During extreme weather conditions, all road users should adapt their driving to the hazardous conditions, following the principles of the Highway Code: www.gov.uk/guidance/the-highway-code.

We're not at the end of the gritting season just yet and often gritters will go out well into April.

You can find more information about gritting, including interactive route maps and advice on how you can help yourself and others during bad weather, by visiting: www.bracknell-forest.gov.uk and searching 'gritting'.

Check your journey with **One.Network**

Travelling around the borough is easier with One.Network (https://one.network), the council's live roadworks map that allows residents to plan ahead by searching a postcode to view the current and planned roadworks in that area.

One.Network is free to use and does not require a log in. Users can find out the reason for local roadworks, how long they will last and what measures are in place to control traffic, for example traffic lights or road closures.

Ukraine news

Last year saw the opening of the Vzi Razom Community Hub in Princess Square. The hub was designed as a place where all displaced residents can visit, gain valuable skills and meet other people in the borough.

Since then, the hub has recognised many landmark events, including:

- traditional and orthodox Christmas celebrations
- the anniversary of the invasion
- multiple lunch and learn events

The council marked the anniversary of the invasion with a one-minute silence, chosen because one minute is the traditional mark of respect in Ukraine.

The council has also hosted separate events for guests and hosts. These drop-in sessions offered information and guidance on local financial support, health and wellbeing, and charitable organisations keen to help.

There are more planned over the summer months.

Currently, over 500 guests have arrived in Bracknell Forest on the Homes for Ukraine scheme, with many more coming privately.

Although retention rates for guests remaining

Your most asked food waste questions answered!



Q: Which foods can be frozen?

A: Most foods can be frozen. We're talking eggs, cheese, milk, cream, bread, cake, nuts, pulses, meat, fish, herbs, fruit, veg - the list goes on and on! Freezing food is a brilliant way to press pause and stop it going to waste.



Q: How often can you reheat meat?

A: Once - you can reheat meat, but only once in the oven or microwave, just make sure it's steaming hot all the way through.

Q: Can rice be reheated?

A: Yes, but only once. And only if it's homemade and not from a takeaway. Rice must be cooled within one hour and can be kept in the fridge for up to 24 hours. Reheat until piping hot.

Q: What is the difference between 'use by' and 'best before' date labels?

A: These labels can help stop your food from going to waste. 'Best before' = quality 'Use by' = safety And you can freeze your food up to and including the 'use by' date so it will stay safe for another time.

Q: How can I make potatoes last longer?

A: The fridge is the best place to store potatoes. They could last up to three times longer than if stored in a cupboard. Cooked potatoes can be frozen. If potatoes have sprouts, green or bad bits, just remove them before cooking.

Q: Can meat be defrosted at room temperature?

A: No. Meat should be defrosted fully in the fridge, not at room temperature. Once it's been defrosted, eat within 24 hours. Defrosted meat should only be reheated once.

In a rush? You can defrost meat in the microwave on 'defrost' mode.

neighbourhood. I realised that my time would be better spent having a go at collecting some of the litter that I saw. So, I bought a grabber from Poundland and began. I talked to Tricia Brown, a councillor, and we got together, and two years later we are still picking every Sunday morning."

Mike Cox, 1st Easthampstead Scout
Assistant Leader: "On 22 October, a group of
14 volunteers from 1st Easthampstead Scout
Troop took part in the Take Pride scheme. We
arranged a weekend litter pick at Lily Hill Park
for a few hours. This is part of a leaders Queen
Scout Award to make a difference in the local
environment but also, to get the scouts outside
and take ownership of the local area."

Gemma Robertson, Taker Prider since August 2022: "I regularly go out litter-picking around Martins Heron and whilst it can be frustrating to see how much litter is collected within only a short distance, I am pleasantly





surprised at the amount of people that stop and thank me for doing so. It's incredibly rewarding to feel appreciated by the residents. Keep up the good work Take Pride volunteers!"
