The fight against fly-tipping

Buckinghamshire Council has a zero-tolerance approach to fly-tipping and we clamp down hard on anyone caught in the act. Last year (2022/23) we successfully fined 59 people for illegally dumping everything from furniture and household rubbish to building materials and garden waste, a total bill to the dumpers of just under £84,000.

Fly-tipping is a criminal offence; it blights our countryside and costs the council and tax-payers thousands of pounds every year to clean up.

In our fight against fly-tippers, we make use of a variety of techniques, from hi-tech cameras, to sifting through dumped waste by hand to gather evidence to catch the culprits. We also urge residents not to pay cash for anyone to take their rubbish away for them. It's not always the case, but if you pay cash, it is more likely that your waste will be dumped illegally, and this can result in you also being prosecuted.

We are grateful to everyone who passes on information regarding fly-tipping to us so we can clear it up quickly and investigate. If you see fly-tipped waste anywhere in Buckinghamshire please report it – buckinghamshire.gov.uk/fixmystreet

Most waste items can be taken to a local household recycling centre (HRC) where they can be disposed of for free.



Addressing the need for affordable housing in Bucks

Our commitment to delivering affordable homes drives us to proactively identify and promote suitable sites. This bold approach is designed to make sure that more people – particularly younger residents – can access affordable homes in Buckinghamshire.

Through our planning system we aim to maximise affordable homes on all development sites, which can account for up to 48% of new houses, depending on the location. This strategy has led to the construction of around 640 new affordable homes annually.

An example of this is the recent sale of unused council land at Horns Lane in High Wycombe. This sale paves the way for 50 affordable homes managed by social housing provider Sovereign – addressing the urgent need for affordable housing in the local area.

The Horns Lane development is just one example of our proactive approach. Building on this momentum, another project at Bellfield in

High Wycombe will see 68 affordable homes constructed on council land, while further affordable housing developments have been recently completed at sites in Aylesbury, Buckingham and Waddesdon.

By significantly increasing the availability of affordable housing options, we're creating a more inclusive and accessible housing market. Our efforts are focused on making a meaningful difference for all Buckinghamshire residents, as we work tirelessly to improve our community.



We're with you every step of the way, as you do something amazing!

We're launching a fresh appeal for more people to sponsor our Ukrainian guests in Buckinghamshire, becoming 'Rematching Sponsors' to provide a temporary home for local Ukrainian individuals and families who are moving out of their initial accommodation.

Before Fiona came forward to help us we thought we would have to be split up to find suitable housing, but now we are able to stay together. Fiona is very supportive and gives us all kinds of practical advice. I am so grateful to everybody who helps and supports Ukrainians in these hard times and I admire the generosity of your hearts."

Photo ID needed to vote

From now on whenever you go to your polling station to vote, you need to show a valid form of photo ID or a Voter Authority Certificate.

Our next scheduled elections are on 2 May 2024 to elect a Police and Crime Commissioner. In the meantime, by-elections and neighbourhood plan referendums will be held when required.

From June we'll be contacting electors and households to check the electoral register is up to date. Please follow the instructions to ensure you remain registered to vote.

A flourishing future for Bucks

Buckinghamshire is a county with a clear plan for the future, being driven by the new Buckinghamshire Growth Board. This alliance of key public and private sector partners is committed to positively shaping the county's future.

The Growth Board ensures coherence across economic, environmental, health, wellbeing, and infrastructure initiatives. It serves as a single point of engagement with the Government on local and regional matters and has been instrumental in crafting Buckinghamshire's 2050 strategic vision.

This vision aims to create a resilient county, bolstered by successful businesses, vibrant communities, and a rich, cultural, heritage and natural landscape.

A prime example of investment in Buckinghamshire is the recently approved Wycombe Film Studios.

These state-of-the-art facilities will become a creative hub, fostering economic growth by generating approximately 750 direct jobs, 450 indirect jobs, as well as offering exciting new opportunities for education and training. It reflects Buckinghamshire's status as a global destination for the film industry, also being home to the world-famous Pinewood studios.

The council has set up a dedicated film office to build on the success in attracting productions to film on location and maximise the economic and social benefits of filming in the form of employment opportunities, increased spend with local businesses and 'screen tourism'.

HS2 and East West Rail update



We all know of the massive impact these projects are having across the county. We are constantly monitoring HS2 and East West Rail (EWR) activity, responding to concerns from residents and taking these up with both companies.

These cover many issues, from mud on the road, damage to the road network and the huge environmental impacts of both projects.

Councillors in the impacted areas work tirelessly, fighting these causes on residents' behalf and within the council we have a HS2 and EWR Engagement Team made up of two Community Liaison Officers and two HS2 and EWR Marshals who also monitor the projects and respond to concerns on a day-to-day basis.

The HS2 Act 2017 gives the project sweeping powers so the council is limited in what we can influence, particularly in terms of planning and

the necessary traffic management arrangements to support construction activities.

However, we do as much as we can to respond to concerns and issues arising and resolve or take mitigating action to minimise the disruption and inconvenience caused by the HS2 and East West Rail projects.


In recent months we've secured commitment from both EWR and HS2 to fund some targeted roads repairs given the impact the construction traffic is having in some parts of the county. Following our interjection, this list of specific repair works on their lorry routes will now be funded by HS2 and EWR accordingly, including twelve impacted roads damaged by EWR traffic in the north of the county. Some of the repairs have already happened and some are coming through this year. Details are on the council's website.

In early spring Buckinghamshire Council became aware of HS2 cutting back trees in Sheephouse Wood near Charndon. This is a Site of Special Scientific Interest with ancient oak trees and other important habitats.

Therefore we have served HS2 Ltd with a Tree Protection Order prohibiting destruction of these trees, allowing us more time to discuss with HS2 as to why they are taking this action.





The future of planning

in Buckinghamshire

In Buckinghamshire we are dedicated to using thoughtful planning and development to create places that serve those who live, work, and visit our beautiful county.

To help create these places, we're working on two long-term plans: The Local Plan for Buckinghamshire and the Local Transport Plan.

Our Local Plan will establish policies for development, covering:

- Building the right number and size of homes.
- Creating pleasant living spaces with shops and recreational areas.
- Contributing to essential infrastructure like roads, schools, and health facilities.
- Protecting the environment by supporting wildlife, scenic landscapes, historic places, and managing flood risks.

We've listened to your feedback from an online survey between November 2021 and February 2022 and a public consultation that took place this spring. Many of you expressed appreciation for the wildlife and countryside as cherished aspects of our county. However, concerns were raised about the need for suitable housing especially for workers in vital sectors like health,

education, and emergency services. High house prices make housing availability and affordability a significant challenge, which our Local Plan aims to address while prioritising nature and countryside protection.

Our new Local Plan will carefully identify development areas and protect those needing sensitive management. It will set out key requirements for new developments, ensuring an appropriate mix of housing, land allocation for job opportunities, and vibrant living spaces with shops and public areas. Environmental protection is a top priority, and the plan will nurture wildlife, preserve scenic landscapes and historical sites, and help to address climate change.

We also recognise the close link between planning and transport. New homes, shops, and workplaces must be accessible, well-connected to roads and public transport networks, and easy to walk, wheel and cycle around. That's why we're committed to well-planned transport schemes from the start of any development, as part of our Local Transport Plan.

We look forward to continuing our collaboration to build a better future for Buckinghamshire as we further develop these plans.

Bucks Climate Challenge

Working together for a greener future



Buckinghamshire Council is committed to reducing our carbon footprint and protecting the planet for future generations. Our goal is to achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2050 at the latest, and we're making great progress towards this aim.

One of the ways we're making Bucks greener is by planting more trees!

Our Bucks Tree Mission includes a commitment to plant over half a million new trees, one for every resident. This is part of our Climate Change and Air Quality Strategy.

We're making significant progress towards our tree-planting goal, with over 145,000 trees planted since October 2022. This includes:

- Grange Farm 14,700 trees and shrubs planted at this site to create a new woodland in Hazlemere. Volunteers, including 60 school children, attended a planting day run by Chiltern Rangers.
- Bury Farm 14,300 trees and shrubs planted at this site in Amersham, creating a new woodland.
- Platinum Way 4,038 trees planted along this walking, wheeling and cycling route with volunteer planting co-ordinated by Chiltern Rangers.

We're also working with Forestry England to create a new woodland near Wing, where 132,000 trees will be planted over the next 12 months. During April, Forestry England has already planted over 109,000 trees at the new Wing Woods.

Of course, our Bucks Climate Challenge initiative involves more than just tree planting. Take a look at some of the other actions we've been taking:

- Introduced new e-bike and e-scooter rental initiatives.
- Delivered energy performance improvements to hundreds of homes.
- Extended and improved active travel walking, wheeling and cycling routes in Aylesbury, Wendover and Marlow.
- Installed additional EV charging points and added more electric vehicles to our fleet.
- Encouraged the use of low and ultra-low emission taxis and private hire vehicles via a new licensing policy.

We've delivered the Buckinghamshire Solar Together scheme to help residents and small businesses install solar PV and battery storage. We've also secured funding for projects such as air quality sensor trials and waste vehicle upcycling.

Continuing to offer a Helping Hand to residents

Our Helping Hand service continues to offer support to those who need it most. We have been allocated £4.8m of the Household Support Fund from the Department for Work and Pensions, which we are using between now and March 2024 to:



- Help residents pay for bills, food and other essentials
- Provide digital food vouchers for eligible children during school holidays
- Support voluntary and community groups in their efforts to help local residents
- Provide assistance to other vulnerable groups including pensioners, those with disabilities and care leavers.

HAF (Holiday Activities and Food) programme

Our HAF programme will run through the summer school holidays, providing free, high quality holiday activities and clubs for children and young people in Reception to Year 11 inclusive, who receive benefits-related free school meals. A hot meal is provided at every session.

Repairing our roads

Over recent months our highways teams have been out all across the county, working hard to make repairs and improvements to our roads. This year we have allocated £34 million to spend on roads as part of our £105 million, four-year investment.

Over the winter our roads took a real pounding, with a combination of heavy, persistent rain and freezing temperatures. This has resulted in an increased number of potholes and other damage to road surfaces.

We know this has been a problem across the whole country, not just in Buckinghamshire. It's why the Government has committed a pot of £200 million specifically to dealing with potholes and in Bucks we have been given £2.3 million from this to help towards repairing as much of the damage as we can – plus we are lobbying for more.

We're working on it

Repairing this damage as quickly as we can is a top priority for the council and under our new Buckinghamshire Highways contract we're doing the following:

- We expect to have repaired around 4,500 potholes by the start of June, subject to weather conditions
 we're completing around 700 repairs every week
- We've increased the number of crews repairing potholes from six to fifteen and they're working seven days a week
- We're working overnight on some schemes to complete high priority works as quickly as possible
- We're making use of our emergency powers to fast-track essential repairs
- We've introduced our time-saving three-in-one Pothole Pro machine – more on that opposite!
- Our extended plane and patch programme and wider maintenance and improvements programme have begun in earnest
- We've fixed nearly 500 streetlights so far in 2023/24
- We are continuing to clean and fix 85,000 gullies and the grass cutting programme has also started

New partnerships

Earlier this year we began our new Buckinghamshire Highways partnership with two specialist companies working with us to carry out repairs, maintenance and major highways projects across the county. We're excited to be working with Balfour Beatty Living Places and Atkins, who bring with them much expertise and experience. Crews are

responsible for everything from street lighting to winter gritting and gulley cleansing as well as road maintenance.



Making permanent repairs across Bucks

We aim to make our road repairs permanent and lasting but if the weather is wet unfortunately, we can't do this. During the winter months we face more wet weather and even in the summer there can be long spells of rainy weather so sometimes we have to make temporary repairs until the weather improves and we can go back and make a permanent fix.


With works needed throughout the county, we liaise with ward members, town and parish councils and Community Boards when planning and delivering our programme of repairs. We have dedicated teams who co-ordinate direct with local communities to keep everyone informed.



How to report a road issue

The easiest way to tell us about any issue with roads or pavements is via our online FixMyStreet portal. It's quick and easy to log any issue and you can also upload pictures.

We then assess all reports and arrange appropriate action based on priority. buckinghamshire.gov.uk/fix-my-street



Introducing the Pothole Pro

We have added a new tool in our fight against road damage in the form of the Pothole Pro. This specialist piece of machinery is designed to make pothole repairs faster. It is being put to good use making permanent repairs to many problem potholes around the county.

The machine cuts into the road surface where a pothole has appeared. It neatly cuts around the edge of the hole to allow a watertight repair. It then brushes away and collects up the waste materials afterwards. Highways teams can then lay and compact the new asphalt surface to complete the repair quickly and effectively.

Plane and Patch

Sometimes where damage is more widespread, or a number of potholes have formed in an area, it is more practical to repair a larger section of road than individual potholes. In this instance we make regular use of our Plane and Patch technique. The damaged road surface patch is cut out and completely resurfaced with new material. This work can be used to cover sites as small as a standard hotel room and some as big as around six tennis courts.

Coordinating roadworks by other companies

In addition to the works we carry out as a council, there are often separate works being undertaken by utility companies dealing with gas, water, electricity and broadband networks. These are essential works that need to be carried out and as a council we have limited ability to stop them. We have a team that co-ordinates these works to limit the impact on local communities as much as possible. We work closely with companies to ensure they comply with any restrictions that are put in place and complete the works on time. We have powers to issue fines for non-compliance and will use them if needed.

We have around sixty patrollers in Buckinghamshire. These are paid positions and we currently have vacancies in our team.





Funded childcare for two-year-olds

Greener transport options in Bucks



We're committed to promoting eco-friendly transport options to improve air quality and reach net-zero carbon emissions by 2050.

Our five-year EV Action Plan aims to deliver sufficient charge points to provide 1,000 publicly-accessible EV charging parking bays by 2027. As of January 2023, we've already reached 210 EV charging units and are in the process of creating 64 more in our car parks, which will add a further 128 bays.

Active travel, including walking, cycling and using scooters, is the greenest way to get around.

Thanks to a £397,000 government grant, we're making active travel more accessible and enjoyable for you by:

- Creating new safe and inviting green travel spaces.
- Offering an alternative to driving by delivering new walking, wheeling and cycling routes in Bucks.
- Developing fun and engaging materials to inspire students to walk, cycle, or use scooters to get to school. (In a recent league of local authorities, we came top with the highest percentage of schools with a sustainable travel plan.)

E-scooter trials in Aylesbury, High Wycombe and Princes Risborough have been extended until May 2024. Learn more: buckinghamshire.gov.uk/escooters



High Wycombe's **PickMeUp** ride-sharing service, offering ondemand minibuses from 500+ virtual stops and carrying an average of 270 passengers per day, has proven so popular that we're planning a similar scheme for Aylesbury – which we hope to have up and running later this year.



More of us are recycling our food waste

When recycled, food waste can be turned into something useful.

Your food waste is taken to a special processing plant near Aylesbury where it is used to generate electricity to power the local community. It also produces a nutrient-rich organic fertiliser used in farming. This can only happen by recycling your food separately. When food is put in the rubbish bin, it is sent to be incinerated to create energy. However, food waste is composed of about 70% water, requiring lots more energy to burn it, making it less efficient than recycling.

What if I don't produce any food waste?

No amount is too small, it all makes a difference. Some waste like teabags, banana skins, coffee grounds or plate scrapings are hard to avoid, but they can all be recycled.

Should I use liners for my caddy?

You can use compostable liners, paper liners, or even kitchen roll. However, if you don't want to use liners you can put your food in the caddy loose, it will just need a clean more often.
