

Colourful Character Worksheet

TEACHER GUIDANCE SHEET

Required Material:

- ▶ The supplementary colouring sheets
- ▶ Colouring pens or pencils

L.O:

- ▶ To be able match colours with different personalities.
- ▶ To be able to match colours with different moods.

STARTING ACTIVITY (5mins)

GROUP DISCUSSION – Discuss how different colours could represent different moods and personalities, why this might be and if colours could possibly change the way someone feels.

MAIN TEACHING (10mins)

Tell the class that we will be analysing the two characters that we have recently met and colouring them in not based on their actual colours, but based on what we think they should look like when thinking about their personalities.

Before performing the main task however, we will be thinking about the colours that represent us and matching those colours to our personality traits.

Ask for volunteers to share with the class what colours they think represent them and why they think this is.

MAIN TASK - Colourful Character (15mins)

For this task we will be looking at the Beasties Ratal and Opper and colouring in their pictures using the colours we feel best represent their personalities.

To refresh the class's memories read out the below descriptions.

▶ **Ratal** does not like being centre of attention and gets really anxious in social situations. The more nervous he gets the more he trembles and the louder he rattles attracting even more attention to himself.

▶ **Opper:** Always feeling sluggish, deflated and simply has no bounce, Opper finds it hard to find the motivation to do anything. But if he gets himself moving, breathing deep and filling himself with fresh air he can bounce as high as the sky.

PLENARY (2mins)

GROUP DISCUSSION – Together discuss what else could represent certain characteristics, such as sound or smell.

DID YOU KNOW!

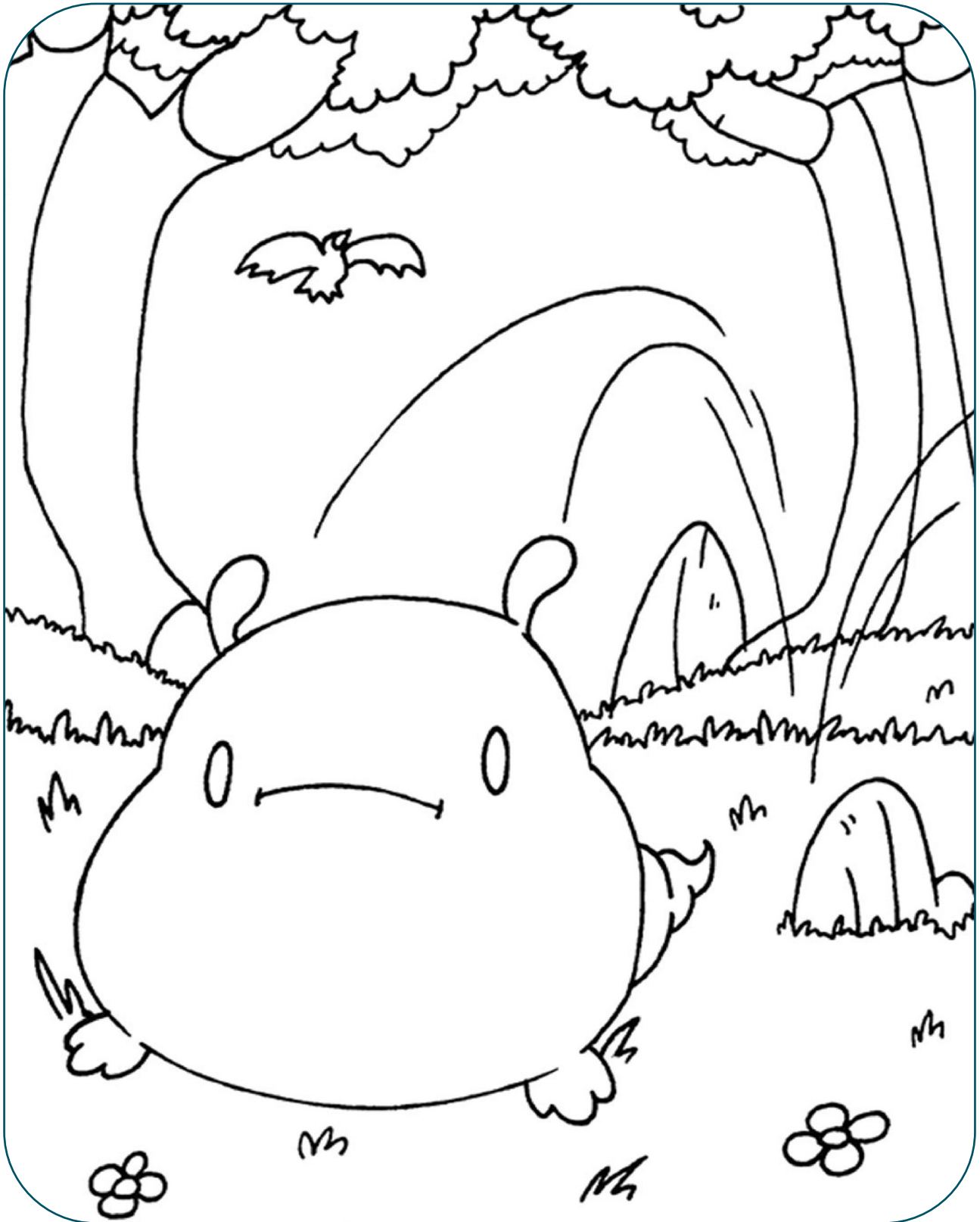
Some of the earliest known toys were from more than 6,000 years ago and consisted of small clay balls, that we assume were used as marbles.

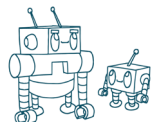
You can find out a more recent history of toys in our history lesson flip charts.
