Tools for searching for long-lost relatives

Ancestry.com.au: www.ancestry.com.au

Ancestry.com.au offers members access to one billion searchable Australian, New Zealand and United Kingdom family history records. On Ancestry you can search for your family's history using local and international records. Records include convict and free settler lists, passenger lists, Australian and New Zealand electoral rolls and military records, English, Welsh and Scottish censuses, birth, marriage and death records as well as user-contributed family trees. If you need to search in countries other than Australia, New Zealand or the United Kingdom try Ancestry.com (www.ancestry.com) which covers the rest of the world.

Don't want to pay for a subscription? Visit the NSW State Library (in-person) for free access.

You might also want to consider a DNA test through Ancestry which may link you to biological family members.

Australian Electoral Roll: Ph: 13 23 26

Search the Australian Electoral Roll for your relative/s. You need to visit your local ER office in person to search. For the address of your closest ER office visit the above link or phone the Australian Electoral Roll Commission. You can then go to "check enrolment" on the AEC website to verify found information.

NSW Registry of Births, Deaths & Marriages:

Conduct a Family History Search through NSW BDM which offers free access to records of:

- Births over 100 years ago
- Deaths over 30 years ago
- Marriages over 50 years ago

If you need to locate BDM records for other Australian states/territories, you will need to search via google for the applicable state / territory as each one has its own registry.

The Ryerson Index:

The Ryerson Index is a free online index to death notices appearing in Australia newspapers. The date range covered extends from 1803 up to newspapers published within the last week or so. The Index also includes many funeral notices, and some probate notices and obituaries.

Keep in mind that the Ryerson Index is an ongoing project run by a team of volunteers that transcribe records from newspapers into the online index. The Index does not cover every single death, funeral or probate notice in Australia but is in a constant state of being updated.

If you find a record relating to your relative you can then search for the full notice by visiting Trove or the specific newspaper's online website.

Cemindex is a volunteer run website with an Index to Australian Cemeteries including headstone and plaque inscription records (some with photos).

Obituaries Australia is a digital repository for Australian Funeral, Death notices and Obituaries.

The library also runs regular face-to-face sessions on how to search for family.

The NSW State Library has an onsite subscription to both Ancestry.com and Find my Past. Visit the library in person to access these websites for free.

If you cannot visit the library, the library website has an 'Ask a Librarian' feature where you can submit an online enquiry and a librarian will spend up to an hour (max 5 times per year) conducting research for you.

The Australian National Library's Trove website has holdings from many libraries in Australia including digitised newspapers up to 1954 (with a few newspapers even going up to 1990's).

The Trove database is freely available online and is very useful for finding Australian family notices such as obituaries and wedding announcements. It is recommended to use the 'Advanced Search' option on Trove for a more accurate search.
