## NEW SERVO OWNERS, OLD-FASHIONED CUSTOMER SERVICE

The latest family group we welcome to Lancefield is Prashanth Thera, his wife Lavanya and baby Agasthya (named after an Indian sage), who have just taken over the local servo on the corner of Main Road and Kilmore Road. Prashanth's parents are also coming to care for their new grandson.

Prash was born in Hyderabad in SE India, came to Australia to do his Masters in IT - specialising in networking - at the Melbourne campus of Central Qld University, moved to warehouse operations, and then to Metro Trains level crossing upgrades and removals. Having always wanted to live in the regions, and being very interested in having community involvement which is much less possible in the city, he and Lavanya looked around for a business to buy in a small town. They wanted to work for themselves, and to be involved in helping the local community, so they looked around for a suitable business to purchase in a town that offered something special.

Prash came to see the servo business on Lancefield Market Day one Saturday, and was immediately reminded of his childhood, when he was taken shopping for local produce sold by people from the surrounding communities. No wonder he felt at home!

Prash and Lavanya were married in 2017 – the first time he saw her was on their wedding day, not unusual in their Hindu culture – their parents arranged the marriage. Prash describes Lavanya, who has a Bachelor of Electronics and Communications, as "damn wonderful, my backbone".

In early January 2023, the servo will be transformed into a Liberty service station, with an accompanying adjustment in the price of fuel – good news for us consumers. The building will be expanded to double the size, to include hot-food preparation, some seating, and an expanded food choice. So: burgers, hot chips, dim sum, kransky and spicy chicken wings are coming in the near future. I must say, I am looking forward to a few Indian snacks and delicacies being included, so keep a lookout for samosas and those lovely Indian sweets on offer for special holidays like Diwali. For the changeover period during the build, business will continue as usual from containers onsite, so it'll be like a picnic on the corner of the Main and Kilmore Roads when you stop to top up your fuel!

Prash is keen to be involved in community events, offering petrol vouchers, for example, as fund-raisers for organisations. Whilst I was chatting with him on a busy Friday morning, the flow of people was non-stop – he says he meets, or re-meets, 300 people a day! The strong sense of community that comes with the Theras' cultural background is a bonus for Lancefield – drop in and say hello, if you haven't already. You'll get a warm welcome.

# NEW KINDERGARTEN AND MCH CENTRE IN LANCEFIELD A STEP CLOSER

Council is delighted that its advocacy project for the building of a two-room kindergarten with Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Centre in Lancefield will come to fruition following very welcome funding announcement of \$1.8 million from the Victorian Government.

In 2021, Council identified that early years services in Lancefield were likely to be strained in the future due to higher levels of demand for services. Community feedback gathered in the development of the Municipal Early Years plan CREATE 2021-2025 also strongly emphasised the need for additional early years infrastructure in the area to accommodate the growing community.

It is anticipated that the new centre will be completed and operational for the 2024 school year.

# HAS DEEP CREEK REACHED A TURNING POINT?

In my August article, I outlined the reasons for the Maribyrnong River and its tributaries to be given a "voice" along the lines of the Yarra River Keeper Association and the Werribee Riverkeeper Association. The events of recent weeks further highlight the need to remedy centuries of exploitation and abuse of the waterway.

During July, the first Community Forum to establish a strong voice for the Maribyrnong and its waterways was held. This was followed by the second forum during October, at which Deep Creek Landcare was once again represented. At the forum the next steps in establishing a representative organization were taken. These involved: agreeing on a name, a logo, a governance structure, the focus for the next three years and associated strategies and the setting up of a Fundraising Working Group. Since then a Facebook page has been set up and some significant funding has been gained. The rapid progress is exciting, and it is a matter of "watch this space". We will endeavour to give periodic updates on our Facebook page.

Two days after the second forum, the Maribyrnong River flooded, with water levels the highest in decades. Upstream the impact was greatest in Deep Creek. Months of rain and saturated farmland meant that the heavy rain on Thursday 11 October flushed straight into the creek, causing it to flood and cause significant damage to everything in its path. Our projects at sites, such as Forbes Crossing and Gallagher's Crossing, were not spared.

The Maribyrnong Officer for the Yarra Riverkeeper Association, Nicole Kowalczyk summed it up in her report on the second forum with "The impacts of these recent floods have been damaging and far-ranging. In the lower Maribyrnong alone, power supplies were cut off, transport networks were stopped, businesses were forced to shut down, hundreds of homes were evacuated, and overall the community took a massive hit. Our thoughts go out to all those who have been affected". She also added that "At the same time, the floods have provided an added impetus to restore and protect the river and surrounding parklands and floodplain. As put forward by Glaser (1997), a fundamentally overlooked value of rivers is the natural flood control they provide when left with some of their natural environment

intact. Given enough floodplain, rivers have a remarkable capacity to absorb rainfall and runoff. But stripped of those, they inevitably flood. The Yarra Riverkeeper Association's position is that rather than build higher flood protection works and prevent floodwater from moving onto floodplains, we should look for opportunities to encourage floodwaters to move into areas that would benefit from the inundation, enabling the myriad of ecosystem services floods offer. And it's usually significantly cheaper to preserve a river's natural course, to give it room to move, and to absorb flood waters than to build huge monuments to protect what cannot be protected and to pay astronomical damage costs caused by the inevitable flood".

Climate change and population growth has added to the necessity to make long term decisions that protect the environment and add to our quality of life. Another consequence of the heavy rainfall in recent months has been the inability of the Romsey waste water treatment plant to cope, as it is expected that the plant will continue to discharge into Deep Creek until late November.

We have written to the relevant ministers and local candidates at the State Election outlining our displeasure and disappointment that "On approximately 22/09/22, GWW discharged waste water from the Romsey waste water treatment plant directly into Deep Creek above Daly's Bridge. This discharge is unlicensed, will continue for an undefined period and is subject to investigation by the EPA". We also noted that "A report by Western Water, back in 2019,

found that the Romsey Recycled Water Plant was at risk of uncontrolled spills in years of average rainfall. No wonder, this year, GWW has had to resort to trucking waste water out of the facility to other plants and to discharging the water into Deep Creek during the current wet period". We have also encouraged our members to become active on the issue and I issue the same invitation to you. We cannot simply ignore the situation and stress that "The water quality of Deep Creek and the other Maribyrnong River tributaries is of great importance. Farming and agricultural pursuits along the waterways require clean water. Likewise, the flora and fauna of the catchment also rely on clean water; the survival of the endangered Yarra Pigmy Perch and local Platypus population are at stake. Also, the Maribyrnong is a prime recreational facility for fishing, canoeing and rowing".

We believe that "The discharge of waste water into our waterways may be a cheap and easy solution to the problems faced by GWW but it is not a solution that is acceptable to us or the general population. Discharging of water into the natural waterway is not only environmentally irresponsible, but also wastes a significant opportunity to utilize this water. The focus needs to change from seeing this water as a waste product, to seeing it as resource to be managed for its potential benefits".

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$25. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. - for water leaks now. Read the numbers on your meter, then re-check after a period when you haven't used any water. If the numbers have changed, you may have a leak.
- 5. Adopt a hydrant. Help to clear grass and soil from fire hydrants or let us know if you spot one that needs attention - you'll be helping the CFA when they need to fight fires and keep property and people safe.
- 6. The three Ps. Remember only flush pee, poo and (toilet) paper down the loo and avoid a costly (and smelly) plumbing fix. Look out for the new flushable symbol on products too. You'll be helping to keep our sewers operating at their best.
- Shorten your shower. Save water by keeping your shower to four minutes.
- 8. Can you claim a concession? Shrink your bills with a concession - pensioners, healthcare card holders and Veterans' Affairs gold card holders are all eligible.



# THROUGH THE GENERATIONS

The pioneering families of Lancefield live on today in place names and in new generations, and nowhere is this link more evident than in the annals of the Lancefield Football Club.

Family names which we see on the football and netball club lists of today stretch back through more than a century of history to the stalwarts that lived in the town or who came out of the hills and bush to represent the honour of Lancefield on the football field.

For a few select families this history of town and football club is unbroken from our earliest days, and this pioneering connection is acknowledged in the history book to be released next year to mark the Lancefield Football Club's 150th year.

Take a drive through Lancefield and you'll see Foy Street, Connors Road, Showlers Lane, Hemphill Court and the landmark Wiegard Buildings.

Go further out into the farmland around town and you'll come across Linehans Bridge, Parks Lane, Shannons Road, Grahams Road, Grahams Track, Mahers Road, Talbots Lane, Talbots Track, Pattinsons Lane, Fagans Lane, Notmans Lane and Oakleys Lane.

Go even further into the bush at Cobaw and you'll find Mooneys Lane.

The history is being compiled by three intergenerational Lancefield identities who are very proud of their Tiger heritage: Denis Graham, Shirley Kishere and John Chisholm. A range of events culminating in a big reunion function at the Mechanics Hall on 1 April will mark the sesquicentenary.

Five families in particular are synonymous with the history of Lancefield and its football club, and you'll find all the details in the history book.

Not only do the five have history of pulling on the boots for the Tigers, but each have provided three generations of premiership players.

The flag history of the Connors clan stretches from Tom in 1888 to Peter in 1996.

The Graham dynasty covers flags ranging from Hubert (Brick) and Oswald in 1903 to Michael in 1996.

Bill Pattinson played in a premiership in 1907, and the most recent premiership player is Justin in 1996.

The Shannons first tasted premiership success with Martin in 1910, and most recently in 1966 with Bern and Keith

The premiership era for the Walshes is bookended by Frank in 1888 and Michael in 1966.

There will be plenty of representation from our pioneer families at the 150th celebrations in 2023, as well as other families who have made their contribution to our great club.

Numbers for the Back to Lancefield/Lancefield Football Club 150th reunion are likely to be limited to 300, so people need to get in early and book when the \$50 tickets come on sale.

The 150th anniversary will be a hard-bound coffee table edition, with plenty of photographs and extracts from the Lancefield Mercury and other publications of the time.



### **CHRISTMAS**

I don't know why, but I am really looking forward to Christmas this year. With COVID impacting the ability to come together the past couple of years, it feels like we will get an opportunity to enjoy events in December again. The Community Christmas Carols, our Kidzone Christmas Concert, the church's Family Christmas service on December 18, and our Christmas Day service are locked in. The COVID chains have come off!

Christmas is the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ, when God 'came together' with his creation. Jesus was born as a baby and "dwelt among us" (John 1:14). Or as The Message paraphrase puts it, He "moved into the neighbourhood". Just think about that – God came and lived

as a person amongst all that He had created. I find that truly amazing.

One of the names given to Jesus is Immanuel (see Isaiah 7:14), which means God with us. Not God against us, or God is mean toward us, or God doesn't care about us, but God actually with us. God loved and cared for us so much, He sent His Son Jesus to live and then die for us.

That means that I serve a God that has experienced life like me – thirst and hunger, temptation, betrayal by friends and great pain. Jesus went through all that. He knows what it feels like.



# HISTORYFEST A HUGE SUCCESS

The Romsey & Lancefield Districts Historical Society's HistoryFest held on Sunday 6 November was a huge success This was measured by an attendance of 65 people – a mix from historical societies, history and heritage groups, interested individuals and local residents. There was a real buzz in the Mechanics' Institute Annexe as we settled into a day filled with talks, presentations, discussion and great conviviality.

The day began with talks by Dr Peter Yule and Dr Richard Trembath. These historians have written prolifically on subjects as varied as the Korean War, Collins Class Submarines, the legacy of the Vietnam War, and the history of the Victorian Bar. Many of the historical societies acknowledged the degree to which their talks set the tone of the day. We were especially delighted that two representatives of the Royal Historical Society of Victoria (RHSV) participated fully in the day. We all learned a great deal about the range of research available online as well as the sources they make available to local historical societies.

Representatives from the Broadford, Kilmore, Romsey & Lancefield, Trentham, Malmsbury and Woodend Historical Societies spoke about their organisations, their projects and the significant local histories they had published. The Chewton Domain Group, Friends of Kyneton Museum and Wallan Wallan History Group (an online only group) all informed us about their activities and their own communities. Many of these groups have published extensively, and these books were discussed and were on sale at the end of the presentations.

Following our day of presentations, Rosemary Cameron, CEO of the RHSV, congratulated everyone on their efforts and their contributions. She said: 'When I was invited to attend and participate today, I knew that it would be a successful day, because the historical societies here today are successful.' Rosemary was right!

Tables had been set up in the foyer so that the societies could sell their books and other items of interest. While enjoying more conversation, sumptuous food, local wine and book sales, we were entertained with the live music of harp student, Georgia.

In 2021 the Society was successful in its application to the Victorian State Government for a grant to hold this HistoryFest. Funding was granted to encourage communities to reconnect after Covid lockdowns, and this aim was certainly achieved.






Year 5/6 Excursion to Latitude By Emma and Naite



#### DAY FOR DANIEL

A total of \$206 was raised for the Daniel Morcombe Foundation. We were lucky enough to have Dan Leach, a Victorian Police Officer join us to speak with students about safety. Dan also invited a couple of local police officers to join us for part of the session.

The Preps loved their police visit, especially the chance they were given to freely explore the police vehicles. For the Junior talks, the police officers discussed ways to stay safe while performing different activities and reminded the



children to go straight to a safety helper if they felt unsafe in any way.

In the prep classroom, they discussed body cues that tell us we are feeling unsafe and drew these on an outline of their bodies. Then they traced their safety hand which showed their 5 safe adults (safety helpers) to go to if they felt unsafe or uncomfortable.

In the 1/2 classes, the students looked at a clip of a fight in the playground and how it got out of hand because people didn't make good choices. They then discussed how they could have handled the situation better. They also looked at a clip about the importance of rules and the consequences of not following rules.

In the 5/6 classes they did a brainstorm about bullying and watched a video of Adam Goodes talking about bullying. Police Officer Dan talked to them about staying safe online and gave them some strategies. They also had the chance to check out different equipment the police use and have a close look at a police vehicle.

## SOFT PLASTIC COLLECTION

Soft plastics taken to Council's transfer stations by residents will not be impacted by the closure of REDcycle. These plastic items are collected by local Kyneton company, Victorian Regional Recyclers (https://victorianregionalrecyclers.com.au/), and are taken to GT plastics in Geelong (https://gtrecycling.com.au/) for mechanical reprocessing to pellets.

It is important to note that the transfer station only takes some plastics and not, for example, silver lined chip packets, silage wrap and snack wrappers. They do, however, take bread-bag tags and plastic bottle caps (collected separately in clear plastic bags). The transfer station soft plastic trial was to run for an initial six-month period which finished some months ago. Four tonnes a week (or 100-150 cubic metres a month) has been successfully collected.

Council has encountered some contamination issues, particularly with loose small plastics that make it difficult to go to market for an ongoing service. Council is working with the current provider and testing additional waste education messaging to overcome the contamination issue. Council is planning to be in a position by the end of the financial year to test the market for an ongoing service.

Council launched the kerbside soft plastics recycling collection trial in Romsey in November 2022 to support the community to reduce waste and recycle more.

Council confirms that its kerbside soft plastics collection trial in Romsey will still go ahead and will not be impacted by REDcycle's announcement to halt collection of soft plastics. All soft plastic items accepted in the REDcycle service, and that carry the Australasian Recycling Label (ARL)—Return to Store symbol or REDcycle logo are accepted in this trial.

All soft plastic items accepted in the REDcycle service, bearing the REDcycle logo or the Australasian Recycling Label (ARL) – Return to Store/Store drop-off symbol can go into the kerbside trial in Romsey.

The trial is being driven by the Australian Food and Grocery Council (AFGC and is part of a national trial for a stewardship program led by the Australian Food & Grocery Council (AFGC) and funded by the Australian Government.

Plastic collected will be going to our comingled processor APR (https://www.aprplastics.com.au/) which now has a soft plastic pyrolysis plant in Dandenong that will transform

the collected plastic back into crude oil for reprocessing back to plastic. The food processors who are members of AFGC will buy the material back for packaging, closing the loop.

Council officers are investigating APR's capacity to take more material at their facility in Dandenong, as we are expecting to get an increase in material from residents at the transfer stations. In addition, following the current trial, officers will investigate the potential to roll out the soft plastic collection across the whole shire.

In February 2023, Council and the AFGC will invite residents and business owners of Romsey to complete a satisfaction survey. Council will then look at options for an ongoing shire-wide service to support soft plastics recycling.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Bernie O'Sullivan said, "Council will consider whether any other interim local solutions are needed to help residents with their recycling needs in light of REDcycle's announcement. We know this is a popular service for locals to use. I'd like to remind residents they can still take their soft plastics to our transfer stations for free. We also encourage our Romsey residents to support the soft plastics kerbside collection trial taking place."

#### **RECYCLING SURVEY**

Council is relaunching the 'Let's Get Sorted' campaign materials in line with the state-wide campaign – 'Small acts, big impact' and wants to investigate household behavior, attitudes and knowledge to improve Council's waste education. 

#### **BIG SUMMER READ**



Koala numbers have declined throughout the Macedon Ranges, and have even become locally extinct in some areas. Fortunately, visitors are still able to observe koalas at Hanging Rock Reserve and it is important that we keep tabs on this precious population. Koala watchers were delighted to spot two koalas—a male and a female—sitting in Manna Gum trees.

This year there has been an extensive program of habitat planting at Hanging Rock Reserve. Counting koalas lets reserve staff know they are on track to keep the koalas happy at Hanging Rock.
