Thanks to the quick response from Emergency Services, the fire in Benloch is now officially marked safe. This time, we avoided injury, loss of life, and loss of buildings, but what about next time?

Let's work on there not being a next time.

Shortly after 1pm, on a Total Fire Ban (TFB) Day, Emergency Services were called to a fire originating from a property on Kitchenhams Rd, Benloch; a mere 3 km's away from the Cobaw State Forest. 2 hours later, residents were being told it was too late to leave. Thankfully, due to the effective and fast responses from our collective Emergency Services, the fire was declared under control by 4:30 pm.

All in all, 38 hectares were burnt (95 acres) spanning across several properties. There were over 200 volunteer firefighters on the ground, with more than 50 appliances and

7 aircraft. There was some damage to fences and equipment, but no loss of buildings, and more importantly, no injury or loss of life. A 15-year-old boy from Queensland has been issued with a caution following the fire.

Personally, we remain incredibly humbled by the wider response to this emergency in our community. The combined efforts of our surrounding CFA Brigades, Air crews, Forest Fire Management, Parks Vic, DELWP, SES, Rapid Response Team, Ambulance Vic, Vic Police, and the Rehab and Fatigue Units, are gratefully appreciated.

We would also like to commend our Benloch residents for their greater response in leaving early and taking their pets with them. Leaving early is always the safest option. When an emergency like this happens, a community is



MAKE 2019 YOUR YEAR TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

The Board and staff of the Loddon Mallee Waste and Resource Recovery Group (LMWRRG) would like to wish all residents in the Loddon Mallee region a happy and safe 2019. We look forward to continue our work with government, council, business, industry and the community to create sustainable solutions to waste so that the Loddon Mallee region is a beautiful, safe and healthy place to live now and into the future.

As we look to the year ahead there are many opportunities for us all to make small changes that will save money, reduce waste to landfill, and help our environment. Here are our top three reduction priorities for 2019.

SINGLE USE PLASTIC

Following on from last year's great success to reduce single use plastic bags, disposable coffee cups and plastic straws

let's continue this great work and look at other items that we can reduce or replace with more sustainable options such as replacing party balloons with bubbles, avoid excess packaging and use a reusable water bottle.

FOOD WASTE

There are many ways to reduce the amount and impact of food waste at home. When you consider the average Victorian household throws out \$2,136 worth of food each year, small changes can save your family a considerable amount of money.

It can be as easy as shopping with a list and sticking to it, making sure you're storing food correctly to keep items fresh for as long as possible, and finding creative ways to use leftovers.

E-WASTE

It is estimated that one in five Australians have unwanted electrical goods (e-waste) in their home or office and that the

amount of e-waste generated in Australia will increase by more than 60 percent by 2024, for televisions and computers alone. The good news is that e-waste is more than 95 per cent recyclable and the Loddon Mallee region has a number of drop off points to receive and recycle e-waste. So gather all those unwanted items and take your e-waste to a better place.

DO THE SCRUNCH TEST

There is a lot of confusion about what plastics can and cannot be recycled. Forget those hard to read numbers and symbols on plastic packaging, now all you need to do is give it a scrunch. The Scrunch Test is the easiest way to check whether your plastics are recyclable.

If you scrunch a plastic and it springs back to its original shape, such as a take away container, biscuit tray or plastic bottle, then it is recyclable in your kerbside recycling bin.

If you scrunch a plastic and it stays scrunched up or breaks, like a plastic wrapper or polystyrene, then it can't go in your kerbside recycling bin.

SIMPLE!

Unfortunately because soft plastics jam the automated sorting machines at the Materials Recovery Facility most Councils cannot accept soft plastic through the kerbside recycling bin collection, however this doesn't mean that soft plastics can't be recycled. In fact, most soft plastics can be recycled and are currently repurposed into outdoor furniture, signage and decking, to name a few things.

More and more supermarkets throughout the Loddon Mallee region are providing soft plastic recycling bins at the entrance of their stores and can accept items such as biscuit packets (outer wrapper only), bread bags (without the tie), cat and dog food pouches (as clean and dry as possible), cling wrap (free of food residue), frozen food bags, green bags (polypropylene bags), netting produce bags (metal clips removed), plastic Australia Post satchels, snap lock bags / zip lock bags and Squeeze pouches with lid on (e.g. yogurt/baby food).


Doing the Scrunch Test means that you are doing your bit to recycle as much plastic as possible and reduce contamination.



TIME TO BE VIGILANT TO KEEP THIEVES AT BAY

A recent spike in thefts in the Macedon Ranges is a timely reminder that we all need to be vigilant to protect our assets and those of our neighbours.

In early January I came across a truck abandoned on a track leading in to the Cobaw State Forest, and promptly reported it to police.

The truck was obviously stolen, stripped of valuable equipment and parts, and driven to the Cobaws. Thankfully the thieves didn't set fire to the truck, given the current dry state of the bush.

I had been in the same spot in the Cobaws the day before, so obviously the thieves worked under the cover of darkness or the late evening for their heartless venture.

Uniformed police were quickly on the scene after I reported the dumped truck, and hopefully they were able to collect enough evidence to lead them to the perpetrators.

The incident also highlighted the fact that someone had lost a valuable asset, and one which was obviously important to their business and their livelihood. Crime such as this costs us all. Theft of valuable assets pushes up insurance premiums, and that means we're all paying extra.

Recent stats and advice from the police indicate that trailers are a favoured target of thieves at the moment. If you own a trailer, you should consider buying a wheel clamp and a coupling lock to make it as difficult as possible for thieves to make off with it. Small battery powered angle grinders unfortunately are easy for thieves to carry and use, and make their job easier.

Recent data also indicates that tradies are a target for thieves, and their trailers, utes and 4WDs often reap a rich harvest of valuable tools and equipment. Many of our tradies carry thousands of dollars worth of tools, and to lose this equipment – and their livelihood – can be devastating.

So what can we do to help prevent thefts and help police to catch the crooks? We need to be vigilant and trailer owners need to ensure that the VIN number and other physical trailer identification is a highly visible.



If you see someone acting suspiciously, particularly if it's a person you haven't seen before, keep a close watch on them. Record the number plate of their vehicle. Most of us now have cameras in our mobile phones, so take some photos of what you're seeing.

And while you're doing this, ring the local police. If we're all acting as the eyes and ears for the police, it means they're able to do their job to maximum effect.

Keep an eye on your neighbour's home and property. Make it as hard as possible for thieves to target your possessions. Have the wheel clamps and coupling locks for your trailer, and where possible lock your trailer, valuable goods and your vehicle in a shed or garage when they're not in use.

Let's work together to help stamp out crime around Lancefield and in the Macedon Ranges.



WESTERN WATER

ANNUAL WATER OUTLOOK FOR 2018/19

Western Water customers are being encouraged to shorten showers, check for dripping taps and leaks and use water wisely in the garden after consumption increased by 11% in the past year.

Western Water General Manager Customer and Community Relations, Graham Holt, says the simple water saving actions were part of the voluntary water efficiency program - Target 155, and had the potential to make a big difference to home water consumption.

The 11% increase has been reported in Western Water's Annual Water Outlook for 2018/19, released in December.

Mr Holt says every year Western Water and other Victorian water corporations provide a snapshot of their region's water supplies and the actions to be undertaken to maintain supply.

"The Outlook reports an even chance of above or below average rainfall for December 2018 to February 2019 with supplies sourced through a mix of sources, including local reservoirs, groundwater and the Melbourne system. Recycled water is also used to support the regions recreational spaces and agriculture.

Some customers in the region will experience a change of water supply over summer – this is part of normal

operations as Western Water best manages available water resources to meet supply.

Mr Holt says climate change, population growth and increasing demand for water means that we need ensure we protect the security of our water supplies."

Mr Holt says Western Water is well-positioned to meet the dual challenges of climate and population growth but we need the community to remain vigilant in saving water where possible.

"We are investing in projects that maximise use of our water supplies however we also rely on our customers to use water efficiently."

Western Water's website has a number of tips for saving water in the home and garden through our Target 155 program as well as how to guides on checking for leaks which can lead to bill shock and wasted water."

Water corporations across greater Melbourne, supported by the State Government, have adopted Target 155, a voluntary water conservation program to encourage residents to restrict use to 155 litres of water or less per day.

Western Water customers are already demonstrating a responsible approach to water saving, using on average 194 litres per person per day throughout the year.



Due to the higher temperatures last month, water use rose to an estimated average of 202 litres per person per day. Western Water says that efforts to manage water use need to continue, especially with the hot, dry summer expected this year.

Western Water's two major reservoirs, Merrimu and Rosslynne, are at 32% and 24% of capacity respectively.

To reach the Target, Western Water customers need to save on average 40-50 litres a day. This equates to a little more than three buckets of water, and will vary from person to person and according to the time of year.

Graham Holt, General Manager, Customer, Community Relations and Operations, said:

"Customers can help reach the Target by taking shorter showers. Even one minute less is 7-20 litres saved, depending on the type of showerhead. Other water saving tips include turning off the tap when brushing your teeth, not rinsing your dishes before putting them in the dishwasher, and checking the weather forecast for rain before watering the garden. All these seemingly small changes can make a big difference."



TUSSOCK HITCHES ACROSS THE STATE

The Victorian Serrated **Tussock Working Party** (VSTWP) would like to advise landowners to ensure fodder and hay purchased this summer and autumn is free of noxious weeds, and in particular, serrated tussock (Nassella trichotoma). The previous year has seen perfect conditions for this weed of national significance to seed prolifically, resulting in many paddocks being infested prior to baling for fodder. Drier conditions also result in more

fodder being transported around the state and interstate.

Whilst it can be difficult to inspect all fodder purchased for noxious weeds, VSTWP Executive Officer Doug May suggests that "landowners should attempt to purchase stockfeed from reputable outlets that can verify the absence of declared noxious weeds and from areas outside of the serrated tussock core infestations around the fringes of northern and western Melbourne, Landowners are often unaware of the grassy weed in their paddocks, especially during a decent spring like the one we just had and may bale paddocks unaware of the viable seeds in the fodder," noted Mr May.

The VSTWP recommends that landowners set aside designated feed-out area, which allows the landowner to monitor this area regularly for the germination of weeds particularly after periods of rain. Landowners should keep an eye out for Serrated Tussock or any new or unusual plants in these feed-out areas and undertake control measures early before they flower and set seed.

Long standing member and current chairperson of the VSTWP, John Burgess, stated that the VSTWP "advocates that best practice management is to control and treat mature serrated tussock plants prior to flowering and seeding each

season with a registered herbicide, manual removal or cultivation".


