Red Door Books recently received grant funding


from Puffin Books Australia in order to set up Street Library in Lancefield. This funding was supplemented by our local philanthropic organization Small Change. The combined funding has allowed Red Door Books to purchase and construct four street libraries and stock them with books. Look out for the first library which will be installed at the front of the bookshop. Other proposed locations are:

Lancefield Park at the beginning of the Walking Track Lancefield Pharmacy

Lancefield Neighborhood House

Lancefield Mechanics Hall

Street Library is an initiative designed to encourage literacy - "The more you read, the more things you will know... The more you learn, the more places you will go..." Books have the power to transport people to a different world, experience the impossible, and unlock people's potential. The hope is that one day, a little boy with no books



in his house can pass by a local Street Library and discover a new world of opportunities.

Street libraries encourages community by bringing neighborhoods all over Australia closer together. We aim to build an Australian based movement that motivates people to engage with their community in a positive and easy way. When people take a book and leave a book, they create a cycle of generosity that allows them to share what they love with those around them. By participating in the Street Library movement, you too can help encourage reading, encourage sharing, and encourage community.

# GLASS RECYCLING COLLECTION TRIAL STARTS 7 AUGUST

A glass recycling collection trial in Lancefield will kick off on 7 August.

About 650 properties in the township area have been selected to participate in the trial, which will run for six months. Following the trial, Council will consider whether it is able to offer an ongoing glass recycling collection service in the shire. While glass is already being recycled by residents placing glass

containers in yellow-lidded recycling bins, it often becomes broken and mixed with other recyclables. When glass is broken and embedded in cardboard and paper, it is difficult to extract and recycle.

A similar trial conducted by City of Yarra has shown that glass recycling rates can be increased from 42% to 90% through separate collection of glass. Recent issues with stockpiling of recyclables and China's ban on importation of recyclables has prompted Council to look at ways to improve the quality of recyclables and ensure a sustainable recycling



service into the future.

Households within the trial area will have received notification by mail that they have been selected to participate. Each participating household will receive a separate 140L bin for the glass collection marked 'Glass Only', along with information on what can be placed in the bin. The bins are repurposed from the Romsey and Riddells Creek areas, as

these residents recently received new black bins as part of the new bin rollout program.

'Glass Only' bins will be collected once every four weeks. A calendar highlighting the dates for 'glass only' pick up has also been included in the information pack. There will be no cost to residents to participate in the trial. Recycling, rubbish and garden bins will continue to be collected as per the normal schedule during the trial period.

# **FUNGI** OR FUN GUY??

Did you know that mushrooms are a fruiting bodies of fungi?

As a society we mainly place plants and animals as the priority importance in an ecosystem. However, in Australia, in a single scoop of soil there is likely to be more species of fungi than species of plants and animals combined.

With the onset of cooler, wetter weather you may have noticed mushrooms appearing in all shapes, sizes and colours. Most people don't realise that the mushroom you are seeing is only the fruiting body of the larger organism. Fungi is neither plant nor animal but may have some similar characteristics but they lack many of the main features found in both plants and animals. The main body of fungi are the strands known as mycelium which are like a cobweb of strands that often are hidden from view.

Unlike plants they don't have things like leaves, roots, flowers and the green pigment chlorophyll that plants use to convert sunlight into energy. Without chlorophyll fungi cannot manufacture their own food so must obtain nutrients from other sources.

When combined with bacteria and protozoa, fungi form a crucial part of the environment by decomposing and recycling nutrients from dead plant and animal matter. They also form symbiotic relationships with nearly all species of plants enabling these plants to absorb soil nutrients and thrive. Without fungi, life on Earth would not exist. Nutrients would become locked in old plant and animal matter that would not break down. Forests would be choked with fallen branches, logs and leaves and soil would lose its nutrients and productivity.

Mushrooms also have other benefits such as providing an important food source for native animals. They are a critical component of making our agricultural systems productive and are an increasing primary industry of their own. Many varieties of mushroom are grown for human consumption and therapeutics.

The LPS Green Team received a grant from Landcare to build a frog bog at LPS. The students have designed and also



#### UPDATE ON DOGS AND CATS IN PUBLIC PLACES

Funding in the 2019/20 budget will see Council move a step closer to implementing the recommendations contained in 'Paws for Thought - the Dog on and Off Leash and Cat Curfew Review', which was endorsed by Council in March 2019. These recommendations include introducing an Order that requires dogs to be under effective control of their owner in public places, dogs to be leashed in all public places except in designated off leash areas and dogs to be prohibited from some public places for environmental reasons. It also recommends an Order for the introduction of a sunset to sunrise cat curfew and for cats to be prohibited from some public places for environmental reasons. Over the next six months, some further work is required in finalising some of the off leash areas and cat prohibited areas, a community education campaign will be developed and implemented and signage will be installed. Funding for an additional Local Laws Officer (Ranger) will help ensure that officers are able to get out and about in the community to help to educate residents about the new controls. The new dog control orders will become effective from 1 January 2020 and the new cat controls after 1 July 2020.

# **COBAW RANGES**- NOW HOLD THEM TO THEIR WORD

We've been snubbed in our bid to maintain the Cobaw State Forest in the same manner as it has served generations of Lancefield families. While the Victorian Environmental Assessment Council accepted amendments and changes to its interim proposals for most of the other forests in the Central/West Victoria region, it rejected all the concerns raised about its plan to turn the forest on our doorstep into a conservation park. That's disappointing, but we have to move on with the knowledge there will be restrictions on horse riding, camping and walking our dogs in the bush.

But more importantly, we as a community now need to hold VEAC and our forest managers to account to ensure they maintain our Cobaw Ranges in the way that they are promising. To be frank, the Department of Environment, Land, Water & Planning and its predecessor agencies haven't exactly set the world on fire (to excuse the pun) with their management of our Cobaw Ranges in the past.

DELWP set and published a three-year plan for controlled burns in the Cobaws from 2013 to 2015 and failed to do any burning in the first two years. It did all three years in one with a massive burn in 2015 – and we

know how badly that went wrong. Our forest has been poorly maintained for decades, and it's often the work of trailbike riders and recreational drivers who keep the tracks open and available. And that's vital for our emergency services.

We need an undertaking from DELWP or the other authorities who will be "managing" the Cobaw forest that they will maintain and develop it in a manner befitting a conservation park. That means maintaining our tracks. It means maintaining and properly servicing the designated camping areas. It means actively managing the endangered or vulnerable flora and fauna and Ecological Vegetation Classes they refer to as needing added maintenance. And they can't let it get overgrown for a decade to become a massive fire-trap. In short, if they're going to lock up the Cobaws against some activities we've enjoyed for decades, they need to maintain an active interest and involvement in looking after them. If not, we should all hold them to account.


We will have glimpse of court life and ceremony both through the eyes of European writers and artists and as



This classification covers a large proportion of the shire, and contributes a significantly to the character of the Macedon Ranges. The zone includes bushland, farms and tourist attractions and features highly valued landscapes. We'd like to know what residents value about the Rural Conservation Zone, and what opportunities there might be to preserve and enhance them into the future. The community survey is the next stage in consultation for the Rural Land Use Strategy, which will provide guidance on the future use, development and protection of land in our important farming and conservation areas. The survey follows on from consultation on issues in the Farming Zone carried out in 2017, and a survey of landowners in the Rural Conservation Zone carried out earlier in the year. The

landowner survey generated more than 700 responses and will provide valuable input into the development of the draft Rural Land Use Strategy, which will be released for broad community consultation in late 2019.

This new community survey provides an opportunity for anyone interested in these areas to have their say in the Rural Land Use Strategy project. If you've already filled in the landowner survey, thank you for your input – there is no need to also fill out the community survey. 

As with our physical growth so is it vital to our spiritual growth. We may have a second birth. The physical and the spiritual. Jesus declared, 'Except a man born again, he cannot see the Kingdom of God.' (John 3:3).

This is the second birth and the work of the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit may find a heart, cold and unbelieving in God - so no conception takes place; He may find a heart that is receptive but changes its feelings and so is 'stillborn'. Then there is the heart that is warm and consciously or unconsciously seeking God. The Holy Spirit enters that heart and gives it new life - Life in the Spirit. "Born again". That is only the beginning of a new life with God. We have to grow and not remain as babies in our knowledge, love and service for God.

It is all too easy to miss the Spirit's voice speaking to us, we must be sensitive

To "His still small voice." (1Kings19:12). Many years ago He spoke to me and said "Go to Church" and I did, that was the beginning of my Christian pilgrimage.

To grow physically and mentally, we need good food; so it is for our spiritual well-being. Paul reproved some Christians for still being on milk instead of by now being on solid food. (1 Corinthians 3:2)

The liturgical colour for these days of Trinity/Pentecost is green. Green speaks of growth. So in this season we are to

grow in grace and in our knowledge and love of God. We do this through spending time with God in prayer, praising Him in Church worship and Sacraments, fellowship with other believers, learning from each other and importantly studying His word - the Bible.

Though our physique may not be what is used to be, our spiritual being should still be growing and maturing and glorifying Him who made us and gave Himself for us.
