

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

## MIM OSMELAK WATERCOLOUR PAINTER

Mim (Miriam) Osmelak began painting at a very young age, in fact, as a school girl. She has always been interested in this artform because 'it took me to another place'. However, when Mim, like so many other women, suffered from post-natal depression, she was advised to find a hobby so, she found a hobby in painting! This was, she believes, her turning point. Mim undertook classes in watercolour painting at her local community house in Balwyn. From that moment, she said, 'I knew it was for me' because it was such a wonderful thing to do. That was more than 30 years ago, and Mim has been painting with watercolours ever since. For Mim, 'time stands still when I am painting'.

After taking classes at her local Neighbourhood House, Mim found her next teacher, Pat Turner, a great woman who was still teaching at the age of 70. From there she attended classes with David Taylor at the Victorian Artists Society in Albert Street, East Melbourne. She also became a model for life drawing classes at the Society.

Although Mim would have loved to study Fine Arts at the Victorian College of the Arts, raising children meant that this was never going to be a possibility. Instead, she continued honing her skills while participating in classes; in doing so, she was also refining her practice.

Painting with oils on acrylics is very different to painting in the medium of watercolours, she explains. As she describes it, 'the paint is always going to be the master... the artist is not ever entirely in control... sometimes because you are working with water, the paint takes its own path and that can be a magical thing.' In

admiring the paintings of Mim's that I have seen, I would never know that the paint rather than the painter, was the master.

When I asked her about some of the subjects she paints, Mim listed landscapes, seascapes and still life such as butterflies, bees and rusty gates – anything that attracts her attention. Life is full of worthy and inspirational things that are often overlooked, she believes. She will usually paint a series of one subject, then move on to another subject, making her range very broad. Mim is currently interested in working on and capturing the immediacy of light on the human body and skin.

Like so many of our local artists, Mim has exhibited her work for more than ten years — in places such as the Gallery at Mt Macedon, the Buttlejork Gallery at Kyneton and annual exhibitions at Woodend and Kerrie. Until the Mad Gallery closed, Mim also exhibited her work there.

About five years ago, Mim began teaching watercolour painting at the Romsey Neighbourhood House. She is adamant that 'anyone can paint' because 'you can just throw paint on paper and see what happens'. In the last couple of years, Mim has given up teaching in Romsey and begun teaching in Dunsford Street. Her studio in Dunsford Street is full of light and a beautiful space for both new and experienced painters. Her classes are held on a Friday afternoon from 1.00-3.00 pm (phone: 0455 131 659).

## **POP UP ART ...**SMALL WORKS FROM A BIG PLACE

I went along to the opening of this exhibition in the bluestone building at Riddells Creek Station and was delighted to view the wide range of styles, themes and expertise in the 249 selected pieces from 130 artists. A minimum of one piece and a maximum of three pieces per artist have been displayed. Each artist worked within a set size guideline and works are either 2D or 3D.

Set within the beautiful bluestone Riddells Creek train station are five large, beautifully crafted timber frames exhibiting these small works. There is also a glass cabinet showcasing 3D works. The creative energy released and varying mediums used within these display cases is astounding and I would encourage everyone to make a little time to take something out of whatever makes up your ordinary day and spend some time to look and experience this most enjoyable exhibition.

It is a wonderful union of local artist's works showcased in three of Victoria's most beautiful country railway stations – at Riddells Creek, Castlemaine and Bendigo (December 1 – 10). After their arrival in Australia, William and Ellen had eleven children – eight sons and three daughters. The first three sons were born in Geelong before the family moved to Emu Flat near Lancefield; it appears the remaining children were born in this area. William Angus (Bill) Chisholm was born on 6 June 1867 at Mt William, his birth was registered at Kilmore. William's older brothers Hugh, Peter and John moved to Highlands near Seymour. This was the Parish of Switzerland, County of Anglesey (the area between Kobyboyn, Dropmore, Yarck and Molesworth). Peter, John, James, Roderick, Ellen and other Chisholm's all selected land in the Parish of Switzerland, together totalling well over 2,000 acres. Bill farmed with his brothers Jim and Rod before purchasing his own farm nearby.

In 1908 Bill married Mary Ann Kennedy (1873-1958) and purchased a farm in Ruffy in 1910. Born in Kyneton, Mary Ann was the daughter of James and Nell (née Danaher) Kennedy. Bill and Mary Ann had three children: Ellen Margaret (Nellie, 1909-37), Kathleen (Kath, 1910-2007) and William James (young Bill, 1916-1986). Nellie was born in Yea, Kath in Gobar and Bill in Euroa. Five months after Bill was born, his father died of pneumonia following a riding accident. After the sudden death of her husband in 1916, Mary Ann moved the family from the farm at Ruffy to Lancefield which was close to her family in Emu Flat.

Young Bill Chisholm was educated at St Mary's Lancefield then Assumption College. After leaving school, Bill began work with Mr Hugh Cameron in the Lancefield General Store. Originally a weatherboard structure built around 1882, it was eventually replaced by the current brick shop and house in High Street. Hugh Cameron added his name to the brick façade of the building and operated the General Store from 1891 to 1946. Bill Chisholm and his older sister Kath both worked for Mr Cameron and took over the General Store when he retired. The store offered a wide range of items from groceries to clothing, hardware and farming supplies. Local people were employed to assist in the shop.

In 1948 Bill Chisholm met Anne Hennessy. They fell in love, but, as was the custom of the time, did not rush into marriage. Instead they corresponded for a couple of years while saving up to marry. They were married in Horsham in November 1950 at St Michael and St John Catholic Church. Bill and Anne had four children: Celestine Mary (b. 1951), William Francis (Bill) b. 1952), Anthony Dennis (b. 1954), and John James (b. 1957). The four children were all born at the Kyneton Hospital and attended St Mary's Primary School Lancefield. Celestine boarded at Kilbreda College, Mentone for her secondary education before going on to university and then working for the Victorian Government. The three boys all attended Assumption

the Victorian Government. The th boys all attended Assumption College, Kilmore. Bill has combined farming with various occupations and is currently a Councillor with the Mitchell Shire. Anthony worked for the Australian Government and John became an accountant. They retained the Kennedy farm at Emu Flat until recently. When interviewed for this

story, Celestine, Anthony and John all had vivid memories of their school years, growing up in Lancefield and the years their family operated the General Store.

When they were growing up, the population of Lancefield was only 300-400 residents.

The Chisholm children remember that St Mary's Catholic School, run by two Josephite Sisters, had only two classrooms – one for Prep to Grade 2 and the other for Grades 3 to 6. They had an enrolment of around 40 pupils. They also reminisced that entertainment for the children of Lancefield during the 1950s and 1960s included the visiting circus which set up alongside the Farmers' Arms Hotel and on vacant blocks around the town.

The General Store was open on a Monday to Friday from

9.00 am to 12.30 pm, then it closed for an hour for lunch. It reopened at 1.30 pm and traded until 5.30 pm. On Saturday the hours were from 9.00 am to 12 noon. Locals who required an item urgently out of hours knew that they could go to the Chisholm home and the shop would be opened up especially for them. Celestine Chisholm clearly recollects helping in the General Store and on Aunty Kath's side (the drapery). She also spoke about having responsibility for paying money into the bank in the days when Lancefield supported the Commercial Bank of Australia and the State Savings Bank. These banks had all closed by the 1980s. Her brothers spoke about going with their father and other employees on their rounds when

they delivered orders around the town and district. Service was all important. Often the children accompanied their aunt and mother on buying trips to Melbourne where they did the rounds of the wholesalers to ensure the shop was well stocked.

Bill and Kath Chisholm ran the business until 1973 when it was sold to become a supermarket. The first Coles supermarket had opened in Melbourne in 1960. By 1973 supermarkets had been built in every capital city in Australia, so Lancefield was not far behind the trend.

The Chisholm family have made their mark on the town and the area. Bill Chisholm died in 1986, his sister, Kath in 2007, and his wife Anne died in 2012. Bill Chisholm was a member of the Lancefield Water Trust Board and the Fire Brigade and helped organise the sheepdog trials and other community activities. Chisholm Drive was named after Bill Chisholm, largely in acknowledgement of his contribution to the local community and local business.

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## **BIN SERVICE GROWS**

The Macedon Ranges Council is expanding the options on using our green garden bins, following research showing the amount of food waste going into landfill. We can now place fruit and vegetables into green garden bins following the expansion of the garden waste service. Waste including scraps, peelings and whole fruit and vegetables can now go into the green bins, and will be processed with the garden waste and turned into compost.

Council data shows about 25% of the contents of our garbage bins is food waste which ends up in landfill, where it generates harmful greenhouse gases. By composting fruit and vegetable waste we can significantly reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill and at the same time generate a useful product in compost.

I understand that many keen gardeners in Lancefield already do their own composting to enrich the soil in their gardens, and I encourage this to continue. Others feed their fruit and vegetable waste to chickens and other animals, and I encourage them to continue that good work. The expansion of the green bin service will enable those residents who do not have green-fingers to do their bit.

I now take the opportunity to wish our Lancefield

Mercury readers and East Ward residents a merry and safe Christmas and festive season. I also reiterate my commitment to fighting for a fair deal for our East Ward residents, and recap on some of the issues where I've had to speak out. Firstly, I'm totally committed to an indoor swimming pool for the East Ward. The other wards and neighbouring municipalities have one.

I'm concerned that proposals to turn the Cobaw State Forest into a conservation park will lock up this wonderful jewel of public land and prevent the amenity our residents have enjoyed for generations. The proposals include a ban on firewood collection and restrictions on activities such as horse riding, dog-walking and camping. This fight continues.

I also took up the fight over the discrimination against the Lancefield Football Club, when the Council voted to fund nets behind the goals at every other footy ground in the municipality.

Stay tuned for 2019. I'll continue to strongly represent the residents of Lancefield and the East Ward.

Of course we must cut the pine trees down for our Christmas trees, with a star at the top and snow on its branches. As far as I know there was never snow in Bethlehem!



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

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

Be a citizen scientist during Hanging Rock koala count.

They're considered icons of the Australian bush, yet the koala faces significant threats. Locally, koalas are under pressure from issues like the loss of habitat and predators such as dogs.

Come along to the Hanging Rock Koala Count at Hanging Rock on Friday 7 December at 10am, and get involved in this unique citizen science survey aimed at finding out more about the reserve's koala population.

### GO BATTY AT HANGING ROCK

Pack a picnic and come to Hanging Rock Reserve on Sunday 16 December from 7.30pm to get up close with microbats. Referred to as 'insect terminators', microbats play a major role in controlling pests and assisting with pollination. They can even help spread seeds.

Bring a picnic, and be part of a discussion with bat specialist and naturalist John Harris, then join us to release bats captured in the program.

## WHICH 'MONEY PERSONALITY' MATCHES YOUR TEENAGER?

According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, Australia's household debt is among the highest in the world but financial literacy is not improving. The implications for young people, who tend to repeat their parents' money habits, are troubling. Romsey author Liliane Grace has written a new YA (Young Adult) novel to help teenagers identify their attitude to money, become financially literate, and develop better monetary habits.

'With life skills still not being taught in Australian schools as an official subject, and only intentionally taught in some families, most young people are left to unconsciously perpetuate family habits when it comes to saving, spending and investing,' Liliane says.

Liliane's new book, *Quest For Riches* – four Teenagers Discover the Keys to Wealth and Prosperity, shows how four 15-year-old students respond to the opportunity of a school trip to India. Each teenager represents one of the four 'money personalities':

- the 'Leader', who is entrepreneurial, prepared to take risks, and makes and loses money easily;
- the 'Perfectionist', who is a methodical saver but can get stuck in 'paralysis by analysis';
- the 'Steady Supporter', who works hard but can fall for get-rich-quick schemes and be overly generous – and sometimes a bit of a doormat;
- the 'Enthusiast', who doesn't want to miss out and 'must' keep up with the Joneses, so frequently lives beyond her means.

Liliane was approached by Australian Sweden-based life and business coach Camilla Mendoza to write the book as an accompaniment to Camilla's financial literacy workshop, 'Money Mastery For Teens'. The idea for this book was to model four different approaches to managing money as each of the teens responds to the opportunity. Who will save for the trip? Who will expect parents to pay? Who will assume a trip to India is not affordable?

In Part 1 the teenagers respond to the opportunity of the school trip to India in their four very different ways, in Part 2 they travel to India where they experience the dizzying extremes of wealth and poverty in that country, and in Part 3 they return home to financial challenges in each family. A mentor steps up to provide advice as these teens come to grips with their own financial habits and the effects on them of their parents' habits.

The beauty of this book is that the financial education is delivered through an entertaining and contemporary story. Liliane believes that life skills such as communication skills and goal-setting should be taught formally in schools as compulsory subjects. Author of the award-winning YA novel, The Mastery Club®, her new book adds the life skill of better money management. Readers can enjoy the book purely as a novel or respond to 'reflection question pages'.



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## RECYCLING

Recycling is a constantly evolving industry, with new initiatives and technologies in continual development. Despite improvements in recycling and waste management systems, the Australian economy is still losing a significant amount of valuable recyclable items that could be reprocessed into new products. Around 20% of the waste sent to landfill each year in Australia is made up of recyclable materials

Research shows that the main barrier to recycling efficiency in Australia is the contamination in kerbside recycling bins due to confusion about certain parts of the recycling process and the outcomes it achieves.

After households have put their recyclables in the kerbside co-mingled recycling bins, a collector picks up the bins and transport them to a Material Recovery Facility (MRF). Inside the facility, different materials are segregated through a series of both mechanical and manual processes including hand sorting, fans, trommels, magnets, eddy currents and optical sensors. The separated materials are prepared and sent to end-use manufactures to be made into new materials.

The most commons contaminants are recyclables in plastic bags, soft plastics, drinkware glass, food, polystyrene, clothing and nappies. Some of these contaminants are so common that waste companies have been developing scheme to collect and recycle them. A prime example of that is Redcycle, a program found in some supermarkets, designed to collect and recycle soft plastics, which are not accepted in the kerbside recycling.

Recycling reduces waste going to landfill and the need to extract raw materials conserving scarce natural resources. In addition to that, recycling reduces the amount of energy required to process and manufacture new products compared to virgin materials.

Romsey Ecotherapy Park Inc (REP) – formally known as GRAAP – was this year rebranded to reflect the formal adoption of Romsey Ecotherapy Park as the name for the health and wellbeing park project at the former Romsey Primary School site. With a new name, new logo, new website and social media platforms, the small but tight REP committee welcomed construction of the Park's first stage. The Active Nature Space officially opened in August more than 9 years since the project's conception.

A serious community campaign reaped success in the Pick My Project funding scheme in October which secured \$200,000 for construction of the Park's Climbing Forest. It is hoped this will be constructed in early 2019, although the details of funding agreements in this scheme have yet to be finalised.

The State Labour Government has made an election promise to contribute \$718,000 if successful in the State

Meanwhile, Macedon Ranges Shire Council formally voted to apply for funding under the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund. If successful, it will involve a leverage funding contribution to be made by MRSC.

Romsey Ecotherapy Park is now a reality and REP is

excited at the possibility of more government funding being secured. However, REP is determined to ensure the realization of the original vision for this important resource. As such, REP is preparing to undertake a corporate philanthropic campaign to raise sufficient funds to ensure construction costs are covered. A Park Patron and Ambassadors will be appointed as part of this campaign.

There is much to be excited about for Romsey Ecotherapy Park in 2019. REP would like to thank all local community members who have supported the project ("Friends of REP"), including the following: Macedon Ranges Shire Council - with special thanks to Jodie Turner, (Coordinator Community Places and Partnerships) for her wonderful

Romsey Community Bank branch of the Bendigo Bank - for the huge leap of faith demonstrated by last year's \$80,000 grant towards the Sensory Therapeutic Space and backed up this year with a sponsorship of the REP website.

## WATER SUPPLY CHANGES IN THE MACEDON RANGES

Western Water customers in the Macedon Ranges may have notice a change in their drinking water as several towns switch their supply source. Customers in Gisborne, New Gisborne, Gisborne South, Riddells Creek, Macedon and Mount Macedon have been switched from the Melbourne drinking water supply system to the local supply from Rosslynne Reservoir.

The water supply for other Macedon Ranges towns remain unchanged. Romsey and Lancefield will continue to source their water from local supplies, which includes bore and reservoir water. Woodend's water is sourced from local reservoirs.

Western Water's General Manager, Customer, Community Relations and Operations, Graham Holt, said customers "may notice a slight change in the taste of their water.

"This is quite normal, when we are switch from one supply source to another. The drinking water we supply is high quality, safe and meets the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines," he said.

## **FARMER SUPPORT DAY**


On Friday 19th of October was Lancefield Primary Schools Farmer's Day. The student council had been planning

## STILL TO COME THIS TERM...

On Friday 23rd November the Grade 3-6's will have had a visit to the Mt William Quarry for a one hour guided tour.

Mount William, Wil-im-ee Moor-ring (Home of many axes), north of Lancefield is one of the most important cultural sites of the Wurundjeri people and is National Heritage Listed in recognition of its national significance. Excavations reveal that giant wombats. or Diprotodon, as well as many other species of megafauna roamed the region until approximately 40,000 years ago. The bones of thousands of these animals are preserved in the clay of Lancefield Swamp, making the site one of the most significant for megafauna fossils in Australia.

On Friday 7th December (5.30-7pm) we will be hosting a summer picnic and end of 2018 celebration for families to come and

enjoy a family outing and celebrate our 2018 year.

**CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS:** Make or buy a beautiful candle or Christmas bauble and use a photo of your loved one to have on display.


CHRISTMAS RECIPES: Use a favourite recipe of your loved one for a get-together - perhaps print out copies to give to family and friends.


