Many Lancefield residents had bemoaned the fact that we have been bereft of a local fruit and vegetable supply for the last six months or more. But the tide has turned and once again Lancefield residents can buy their produce in the town instead of travelling to Kilmore or Kyneton, Gisborne or Woodend.

The owners of The Lancefield Providore, Gabby and Greg Cheatley, seem to have hit the mark on all counts. In particular, their juice bar has been a great hit – fresh juices have been in high demand since opening. And it is wonderful to see Lisa Choate re-engaging with her floristry skills and managing the flower section of the shop. Having fresh flowers available here is a welcome bonus.

Gabby and Greg, formerly of East Brighton, made their home in Lancefield in April 2014. Gabby has a background in the textile industry and has most recently worked as a book-keeper, while Greg comes from the corporate world. They chose Lancefield because of its proximity to Tullamarine Airport – Greg's job involved extensive travel so the location

suited them well. They have two children: their son Sam attends Lancefield Primary School and their daughter Ava is a student at Assumption College. The family have been happy in their chosen location, and when the opportunity to take on the lease of the former 'Fruit Shed' presented itself, they embraced it with great enthusiasm.

The Lancefield Providore is more than just fruit, vegetables and flowers. Their fruit and vegetables are purchased daily from the Melbourne fruit markets while specialist goods are locally sourced. Delicatessen items, packaged and fresh pastas and sauces, pizza and take-home meals, as well as other produce – such as eggs, teas and honey come from Kyneton, Woodend and other local areas. There is much to be found at the Providore! When asked if they will feature and promote local goods, the answer was an emphatic 'Yes'!

The very welcome presence of The Lancefield Providore will, I feel sure, be enjoyed by residents – and will no doubt attract many visitors from local areas as well.

The Deep Creek Landcare Group would like to take the opportunity to wish our community a very happy Christmas and a safe new year.

I would firstly like to formally thank our committee for all their hard work and attendance at the meetings throughout the year. Your volunteer contribution is vital to the success of our group and is valued greatly. Sharing time and talent is a wonderful thing as we all know volunteers make the world go round. We would also like to thank those in the community who have attended our working bees and planting days. Your participation makes all the difference!

This year has been a busy one for our little committee with a lot of community engagement. Some of these activities include two planting sessions with the Lancefield Girl Guides at the Lancefield Park for their Enviroguide badge and supply of materials for the girls to create insect hotels. We participated in National Tree Day at the Lancefield skate park with both members and general public planting out 300 trees and grasses. We have conducted two bush food presentations at St Mary's primary school. We have conducted working bees in existing project areas installing trial 'roo proof fence squares to protect new planting. We have conducted roadside clean ups on Lancefield/Kilmore Rd. Robin Ford volunteered his time and knowledge to put together the Bush Tucker exhibit at the Lancefield Show and the Megafauna festival. We are very grateful to you Robin for doing such a wonderful job.

This exhibit gives us the materials to share this knowledge with different community groups. Junior

Landcare showbags were collated and given to the successful children who participated in the 1000 books before school program at Romsey Hub. We have undertaken two Wildflower walks in the Cobaws in November. We have assisted DELWP and MRSC with wildlife trapping and monitoring in the Cobaw ranges and held community spotlight tours. We have this year planted collectively over 2000 Tree project trees for projects and members. Two of our devoted committee members have undertaken training with Melbourne Water to learn drought and Water monitoring of the Deep Creek ....and much much more....

If any of these activities peak your interest and you would like to get involved we would warmly welcome new members. We find that many committees including our own rely greatly on just a few volunteers to do much of the work and we are seeking volunteers that may be interested in becoming active volunteers or committee members. # TREAT TUSSOCK BEFORE SEEDING

Now is the right time to check your property for the noxious weed serrated tussock (Nassella trichotoma). The recent rains and warm winter in some parts of Victoria has been good for crops, but unfortunately, also good for the growth of serrated tussock. Controlling serrated tussock before the plant goes to seed is critical to prevent further spread, lost productivity and increased control requirements.

"Before flowering serrated tussock has a lime green appearance. When flowering the flowerheads have a distinctive purple colour developing as the seeds ripen in late spring and early summer. These features help serrated tussock stand out from the native tussock grasses," Victorian Serrated Tussock Working Party Community Engagement Officer Ivan Carter said. The VSTWP has developed an online video and information sheet to help landowners identify the unwanted grass, at http://www.serratedtussock.com/how-identify-serrated-tussock

"Serrated tussock has a fine leaf and will roll smoothly between the index finger and thumb, while native tussocks feel as though they have flat edges," Mr Carter said. "The leaves also feel rough when you run your fingers downwards due to fine serrations," he said. "A mature serrated tussock plant can produce thousands of seeds in a season, blowing up to 20 kilometres from the parent plant."

Controlling mature serrated tussock plants before they flower and seed can be done with registered herbicide, manual removal or cultivation. "Having a healthy pasture and competitive ground cover is one of the most important aspects to weed management, serrated tussock is a prime example of a weed that does not like competition and well established pastures," Mr Carter said. It's believed serrated tussock now covers more than 140,000 hectares of land in Victoria. Large infestations require ongoing management and the integration of a number of control techniques.



The program supports people who are socially and/or geographically isolated and not well linked into health, housing or community support services.

In particular the program supports people with complex needs such as an underlying condition, intellectual disability, serious mental illness, acquired brain injury, aged frailty or drug or alcohol dependence.

Lions: furry, brown and yellow mane, scratching, laying down and sleeping, (Lily)


Seals: light grey, short fins and black nose, swimming, diving and tricks! (Maya)

### FROM YOUR COUNCILLOR HENRY BLEECK

### FIRE READY - ARE **YOU** READY?

The Council is in the process of carrying out roadside safety works as part of the ongoing follow-up to the October 2015 bushfires, helping us to be fire-safe for this summer. Are you also working to be fire-safe? It's not too late for residents and property owners to take the appropriate steps to update their bushfire plan and prepare for an emergency. Council's current work is designed to make our roads safer to travel along and remove dangerous trees and branches.

We're already part-way through the works to trim back the potentially hazardous vegetation in the bushfire-affected areas of Cobaw, Benloch and Lancefield. The roads we've earmarked for work are Burke & Wills Track; Youngs Rd; Frosts Rd; Kitchenhams Rd; Feeneys La; Long Ryans Rd; West Scott Rd; Showlers Rd; Ashworths Rd; Musk Gully Rd; Bridies La and Three Chain Rd. Council has received funding from the Department of Environment, Land, Water & Planning – the agency which took responsibility for the "controlled burn" fire – and I expect their commitment to long-term recovery to be ongoing. We're mindful of the environmental values of trees and the benefits of our roadsides to native wildlife, so all vegetation is assessed before the work is carried



out. Some trees can be pruned where dead branches are overhanging the road and pose a risk. Other trees will be assessed as dangerous and will need to be removed. The tree assessment process is being done by qualified arborists and will help reduce the risk in these areas.

This is a timely reminder for all of us to do our own property assessments – not so much in terms of hazardous trees, but ensuring that we have clear areas around our homes to help provide a buffer in the event of fire this summer. If you have a concern about a hazardous tree in your area phone: 5422 0333 (including emergency after-hours) and a Customer Service Officer will raise a service request to have your concern actioned.

### HOW TO BEAT THE HEAT

With summer here it's important to know and understand the effects of extreme heat—who is at risk and how you can reduce the effect on yourself and others. Heat can cause illnesses such as heat cramps and heat exhaustion which in many cases can be fatal. So when the heat hits, here are some useful tips to ensure you remain as comfortable, healthy and cool as possible.

Drink water: Even if you don't feel thirsty, drink water. Always take a bottle of water with you.

Keep cool: Seek out air-conditioned buildings, draw your blinds, use a fan, take cool showers and dress in light and loose clothing made from natural fabrics.

Plan ahead: Schedule activities in the coolest part of the day and avoid exercising in the heat. If you must go out, wear

a hat and sunscreen and take a bottle of water with you.

Help others: Look after those most at risk in the heat – your neighbour living alone, the elderly, the very young, people with a medical condition and don't forget your pets.

Hot cars kill: Never leave kids, adults or pets in hot cars. The temperature inside a parked car can double within minutes.

On locally declared Heat Health Alert days, our libraries in Gisborne, Kyneton, Romsey and Woodend will be running our Beat the Heat program.

Head there for a comfortable air-conditioned space that offers free water, toys for the kids and of course, books, magazines and newspapers to read, as well as free WiFi and internet access.

### "DRAW"

'Draw' - is one of those little English words that has so many different meanings - to sketch an outline; to draw the blinds and blot out the hot sun; to draw out information; these are just a few. Another meaning, is to draw someone else to us - and they to us, hopefully. Jesus spoke these solemn words, in John 6:44:"No-one can come to Me unless the Father Who sent Me *draws* him." We do not come to Christ strictly on our own initiative; it is the Father Who draws us. Theologically, this is called prevenient grace, God's grace at work in us to draw us to Himself. It takes two to tango so we must be sensitive to His overtures and let ourselves to be *drawn* to Him.

Jesus also said in John 12;32, "But I, when I be lifted from the earth, will *draw* all men to myself." This was in reference to the Cross and the sacrifice of Himself for Us in order that our fallen, sinful selves might be made clean, forgiven, and restored to fellowship with the Father when we *draw* near to Jesus and receive Him as our Saviour and Lord.

Christmas is a good time to think about drawing near to God the Father, as He drew near to us as the Babe in the manger at Bethlehem, then, becoming the Lord of all and the King of Glory.

How will you spend Christmas? As the pagans did, "wassailing" a time of fun and feasting?

Or enjoying simple fun and feasting and worshipping with fellow believers before the Throne of the One Who came and died to save us all!

From St.Andrew's Day, November 30th, the Church begins her New Year and the Season Of Advent, meaning 'to come' starts. We begin to prepare for Christmas, remembering Christ's *first coming*, but more importantly, we need to be remembering and preparing for His *second coming*, "when He returns in the clouds of heaven and Great Glory", - then comes *the judgment*.

### **COMMUNITY GRANT MAKES GOOD "SENSE"**

A major contribution from our Community Bank will enable the Therapeutic Sensory Space at the Greater Romsey All Abilities Park to go full-steam ahead. Lancefield and Romsey Community Banks chair David Plunkett today announced the \$80,000 grant will be put towards key features including the proposed Rocky Gorge, Sensory Garden Water Feature and Kinetic Wind Sculpture. The grant was part of \$182,805 in grants and sponsorships for local groups and events – all money generated by the proceeds and returns from banking business with our two local branches. The latest allocation means more than \$1.3 million has been given to clubs, community groups and a range of other organisations around the district over the past 17 years.

According to Professor Seba, the chief economist at Stanford University, the future of our cars is "the scrapyard"!!! Petrol or diesel cars will vanish in 8 years. While the Professor's timing may be off by a few years, there is little doubt about the general direction of the motor car, as we know it. Many countries will ban these old cars. India is drawing up plans to phase out petrol and diesel cars by 2032, leapfrogging China's move to push for electric vehicles by 2025. This shift is driven by technology, not climate change policies. "We are on the cusp of one of the fastest, deepest, most consequential disruption of transportation", Professor Seba said. The tipping point will arrive over the next two to three years as electric car ranges will surpass 300 km and self driving EVs will appear. The Tesla model S electric car has only 18 moving parts, hundred times fewer than a combustion engined car and maintenance is near zero. That is why Tesla is offering infinite mile warranties.

However there are also disadvantages for EVs to overcome. Electric cars are now too expensive and need subsidies, but prices will drop to \$25 000 per EV. Electric cars are also heavy, their batteries are toxic and difficult to recycle. What will electricity cost, if everyone goes driving electric?

Global demand for oil, apart for use in aviation and the chemical industries, will drop by 30%. It is an existential threat to the car manufacturers, which are scrambling to design EVs. It will affect the North Sea oil bonanza. Russia, Saudi Arabia, Nigeria and Venezuela.

There are more cars manufactured than can be sold. Consequently car prices have fallen. I purchased a car 5 years ago for \$32000. The same car can now be bought for \$24000. Watching TV, one can see several brands advertised for \$17000 drive-away, with 5 or 7 years warranty. Why buy a 2 hand car? Trade-ins are not anymore preferred and 2nd hand cars are often unsaleable and may even cost money to be removed. So what is the future of your jalopy? The scrap vard.







Chauvel is a gripping narrative history that follows the extraordinary campaigns of the two most outstanding battlefield commanders of the First World War across all the Allied armies: John Monash and Harry Chauvel. John Monash commanded the Australian forces on the Western Front at the most critical time of the war, 1918. Almost uniquely among Allied generals on the Western Front, he learned the lessons of past failures and devised the tactics that allowed his Australian

troops to break through the stalemate of trench warfare, masterminding crucial battles, including Peronne, and at the Hindenburg Line that broke the German Army in France. In the war against the Ottoman Empire in the Middle East, Harry Chauvel led the 34,000-strong Desert Mounted Column. Chauvel was an Empire man, who considered himself as British first, Australian second. His attitude changed in the course of the war, when he realised he would have to ignore the directives of his British superiors and take the initiative in planning battle tactics himself if he was to defeat the Turks. He did this at Romani in the Sinai in August 1916; at Beersheba on 31 October 1917; and in the final 1918 drive to

push the Turks right out of the Middle East after 400 years of brutal rule over the Arab tribes. By the end of the war Monash and Chauvel had brought a distinctly Australian sensibility to their areas of operation, involving flexibility, innovation and a deep respect for the troops they led, which was in turn reciprocated by their men. Their impact on the war was immense and, in this fascinating and compelling account, bestselling author Roland Perry does full justice to their extraordinary careers and the soldiers under their command.

Birdmania by Bernd Brunner RRP \$34.99

There is no denying



that many people are crazy for birds. Packed with intriguing facts and exquisite and rare artwork, Birdmania showcases an eclectic and fascinating selection of bird devotees who would do anything for their feathered friends. In addition to well-known enthusiasts, such as Aristotle, Charles Darwin, and Helen Macdonald, Brunner introduces readers to Karl Russ, the pioneer of "bird rooms" and lover of the Australian budgerigar, who had difficulty renting lodgings when landlords realised who he was: George Lupton, a wealthy Yorkshire lawyer, who commissioned the theft of uniquely patterned eggs every year for twenty years from the same unfortunate female guillemot who never had a chance to raise a chick; Ambrose Pratt who leaves

As this book illustrates, people who love birds, whether they are amateurs or professionals, are as captivating and varied as the birds that give flight to their dreams.



They'll seek out willow when they are injured





### YEAR OF CONTRASTS

It's been a year of contrasts when it comes to safety on the bike out on our roads.

A number of high profile deaths occurred during endurance events around the world after collisions with other vehicles. None hit home harder than the death of Mike Hall in March this year whilst riding from Cooma to near Canberra. Locally we had a very serious incident on Black Forest Drive when a car drove straight through the back of three visiting cyclists in broad daylight. One of the cyclist is still going through recovery and therapy. It was enough for some of our local riders to call for Black Forest Drive to be converted to a single lane highway, a move we at Bike Safe Macedon Ranges endorse and support.

We were also disappointed with the government decision to not introduce a trial of the minimum passing laws and bring Victoria into step with most other states and territories. We continue to lobby for a change in this area.

On a positive note, many local cyclists have reported general good behaviour from other road users when being passed on our local roads. We like to think that our message of "Sharing the Road" has had some affect.





emergency and may vary between service providers.

- You may receive an SMS or call on your landline in some circumstances
- Sirens sounding nearby are a trigger for you to seek information, as they may indicate fire activity in your area. When you hear a siren, further information may be available via ABC local radio, commercial and designated community radio stations, and SKY News TV.
