

FORWARD PLANNING **A SUMMARY OF LAST WEEK'S GATHERING**

PLENTY OF INTEREST

Over 30 Lancefield residents attended last Thursday's dropin information session about forward planning concepts for three large residential areas in the town. Macedon Ranges Shire planning officers Suzane Becker, Gareth Hately and Johann du Preez were kept busy answering a range of questions, and explaining the importance of maintaining the town's characteristics. Several attendees were able to provide valuable background information about some of the properties which are largely undeveloped.

The three specified areas on the north-western, northern and eastern fringe of the town are already zoned residential. Following consideration of community and landowner feedback, proposed development plan overlay controls are expected to be drafted. A Planning Scheme amendment will follow.

Council is keen to see ad hoc and uncoordinated development in these areas eliminated, and the planning

officers in attendance were very pleased with the level of interest shown. Further information about the concept plans is available by contacting Mr du Preez on 5421 9502.

"We see the forward draft planning being pursued for the three specified residential parts of Lancefield as being logical and positive for the town's future. It was pleasing to see that the community consultation meeting on May 11 was very well attended, and some residents had initial concerns resolved.

It makes sense to retain many of Lancefield's characteristics in these residential areas ... it does not make sense to sit back and do nothing, and then see ad hoc activity take place in future years. Community input is very important and planning officers have assured us that all comments will be considered and responded to."

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

challenge as a Council is to ensure that the things that we love about Lancefield are not lost as we grow in the future. That's why I urge residents to have their say in a planning review of the town - to ensure that we don't lose what makes Lancefield such a beautiful place.

The Council has identified three large residentially zoned areas to the east, north and northwest of the town centre, and we want to move now to have the measures in place to ensure that development reflects the character of Lancefield if and when they come on line. We have detailed a number of characteristics of Lancefield which I believe should be a requirement in any new residential development. The grid-pattern streets, wider road reserves and nature strips and the street trees give





Lancefield its distinctive character, and I believe these must be a standard that carries through in any growth of the town. That's why it's important that we have these requirements sooner rather than later in an overlay in our planning scheme – so that everyone, including potential developers, know our minimum standards and that we are determined to maintain the characteristics that we love about Lancefield.





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THE VEGETABLES AND HERBS IN THE POTS ARE THRIVING

BOOMERANG BAG MAKING DAYS

Help tackle plastic pollution at the grass roots level. Join us on Wednesday 14 June and/or Monday 19 June from 10am – 12pm to sew some Lancefield Boomerang Bags. Sewing reusable bags from recycled fabrics is a growing movement to reduce the amount of plastic bags used for shopping. Boomerang Bags are for borrowing and returning, there for the times you forget your reusable bags and for encouraging people not to use the single use plastic bags which are causing a huge environmental problem. BYO sewing machine and fabric scraps if you have them. It's ok if you don't sew, we also need people to do cutting, pinning and screen printing the logos on to the bags.

INCREDIBLE EDIBLE LANCEFIELD - BIG POTS NEEDED

Thank you to the ingenious Rod Good for creating our wonderful recycled 'wicking bed' planters. The first three pots can be seen at the top of High Street outside The Hair Room. The vegetables and herbs in the pots are thriving and you will soon be able to pick some snow peas and rainbow chard.

The planters are made from recycled materials. Each has a water reservoir in the bottom and a central 'wick' which draws the water up to the plants roots, this is more water efficient than having the water drain through the soil and out the bottom.

We need some more of the large plastic pots/tubs to make more planters to fill up the south side of the street so if you have any you for donation please let us know.


We are still looking for a few program co-hosts and anyone else who would like to develop their own radio broadcast.

PLAN HOW YOU WOULD ESCAPE A FIRE IN YOUR HOME

Families who are well-prepared are more likely to escape their homes safely and without panic.

As part of your plan, all family members should know:

- The two quickest ways out of every room
- How they will exit from upstairs if your home has a second story

• An agreed-upon meeting place outside, such as the letterbox

• How they will call Triple Zero (000)

Download and print a home fire escape plan template http://www.cfa.vic.gov.au find out more.

To help create your plan, here are some Top Survival Tips:

• If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop and roll

- To help someone else, throw a woollen blanket over them to smother the flames
- Crawl low in smoke: the safest area for breathing is near the floor
- Use the back of your hand to check doors for heat before opening

Close doors behind you if you canDon't go back inside for any reason

WHAT PARENTS NEED TO KNOW:

Children are less likely than adults to wake up to the sound of a smoke alarm. Think about how you might be able to reach children's bedrooms if regular access is blocked by fire.

Families should practice 'fire drills' twice a year – more often with younger children.

USEFUL TIPS FOR PARENTS:

• Turn it into a game by timing how quickly they can escape • Make sure children know their home address and how to call Triple Zero (000)

• Use online games and activities to teach children about fire safety

NEVER LOCK YOUR DEADLOCKS WHEN YOU'RE AT HOME:

During a fire it will be dark and smoky – and a deadlocked door could block your escape. If you must keep deadlocks locked, leave your keys in the door.

BASIC TREATMENT FOR BURNS:

- Remove clothing around the burn, unless it has stuck to the skin
- Cool the burn under running water for 15 to 20 minutes. Never use oil, butter or ointment
- Cover the burn with a clean cloth or cling wrap and keep the patient warm
- See a doctor if the burn is blistered, larger than a 20 cent coin, or on the face, hands, or feet

A CLAIM.... A COMMAND.... A PROMISE

We have followed the earthly life of Jesus over these last six months from His birth in Bethlehem; His public ministry of teaching; healing and miracles to His death on the Cross for the sins of Mankind - ours - then, His rising from the dead by the mighty Hand of God. Now we celebrate Ascension Day, forty days after His Resurrection when He returned to the Glory of Heaven from whence He had come!

Matthew, (28:16-20) records - how he and the other disciples went to a mountain in Galilee as Jesus had commanded and met with Him there. He claimed that "all authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me" – a great claim indeed.



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


INTERNATIONAL MARTIAL ARTS SEMINAR AT LANCEFIELD

This term at Lancefield Primary School (LPS) our You Can Do It! focus is on resilience. Resilience is being able to bounce back when something bad happens. Resilience means being aware of ones feelings and knowing how to stop getting too angry, down or worried when something bad happens.

In order to bring out the best in our students at LPS and eliminate the worst, we also explicitly teach Positive Habits of the Mind and eliminate the negative. Habits of the Mind are the beliefs people hold about themselves, other people and the world. They determine how young people interpret and evaluate the world around them. While people are often unaware of their Habits of Mind, they nonetheless guide the way young people think about what happens which, in turn, largely determines how they feel and behave. With the help of parents and teachers, our students have the power to strengthen their 'Habits of the Mind'.

On Thursday 8 June from 6.30-8.00 pm, we invite interested community members and families of Lancefield PS, Romsey PS and St Mary's PS to join us at a Parent and Community Information session presented by Marg Milne from the You Can Do It (YCDI) program. 
ATHLETICS

For the month of May, Mrs Deidre Knell is running Pre School Story time and Parent education sessions in our






school library from 9-10am Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. It's not too late to join in.




WESTERN WATER LANCEFIELD WATER USE LOWEST IN MACEDON RANGES

Lancefield residents were the best water savers in the Macedon Ranges in April, using an average 137 litres per person per day. The figure is a big improvement on April 2016, when Lancefield residents used 194 litres per person per day. Western Water's water use figures show the average daily water used per person for April was: Riddells Creek: 220 litres, Macedon: 194 litres, Romsey: 180 litres, Woodend: 166 litres, Gisborne: 164 litres, Lancefield: 137 litres.

Things that can help you reduce water usage include shorter showers, only washing clothes when you have a full

load, and mulching your garden to keep water in the soil. Under Permanent Water Saving Rules you can water your garden or lawn with a watering system such as drippers or a sprinkler, but only between 6pm and 10am. Being aware of the rules will help households keep their water use to 155 litres or less per person per day, which is the aim of the State Government's Target 155 campaign. You can find out more about Permanent Water Saving Rules, get water saving tips, see reservoir levels and check daily water use figures at WesternWater.com.au.


