PRIVATE HERBERT GOLDING (1880-1916) AND THE LANCEFIELD MEMORIAL

Herbert (Bert) Golding, the second of 10 children, was born in England in June 1880. He was only 2 ½ when he, his older brother William, and parents, Alfred and Kate, arrived in Australia. The family settled in Canterbury, Victoria where his father set up a boot factory. Although other members of the family went into the factory, Herbert became a journalist. He worked with a number of Victorian and South Australian newspapers.

Herbert married Annie Florence (Flo) James in 1905. Two sons, Herbert Victor and Donald James were born in 1905 and 1912 respectively. In 1913 Herbert became the proprietor of the *Lancefield Mercury*. The newspaper was published and printed at the office in High Street, Lancefield in a Golding Family – Herbert is the only person in uniform. Annie Florence (Flo) Golding, Herbert's wife, is kneeling at his left shoulder. Herbert Victor (Vic) Golding their elder son is in the middle of the photo with his head outlined by the baby's dress. Donald (Don) James Golding their younger son is standing just behind Herbert's right shoulder in front of his grandmother.

building which is now the Costume Hire shop.

With the War in its early stages, and prior to the fateful Gallipoli campaign, Bert responded to the Australian Army's recruiting efforts. On 25 February 1915 the 34 years old *Contined on page 2*

enlisted in Lancefield, and took his oath before Enlistment Officer Councillor Robert Hemphill. Prior to departing from Australia, Bert sold the Lancefield Mercury back to Murray A. White, the man he had originally purchased it from in 1913. Herbert Golding marched away from his family to what became known as the Great War. Like so many others, he left with faith in his commitment to his country and the Empire; he believed it was the right and honourable thing to do. He had faith that God would protect him and return him home safely to his family. After his departure, Flo and the boys moved to Cheltenham to live with her family until he returned.

Bert joined the 23rd Battalion which was raised in March 1915. After training at Broadmeadows, on Saturday 8 May

the Battalion embarked on the troopship Euripides for further training in Egypt. In early September 1915 the 23rd Battalion transferred to Gallipoli. They held positions at Lone Pine, only a few yards from enemy lines, until December when they were among the last troops to leave the Peninsula on the night of 19-20 December 1915.

The 23rd Battalion arrived in France in March 1916. In July they were transferred to the Somme. The Battalion suffered horrendous casualties during the Battle of Pozieres and the Battle of Moquet Farm (23 July to 3 September). These Battles were part of the Battle of the Somme. Bert was seriously injured on 26 August 1916 with wounds to his right arm and thighs and a broken hip. He was admitted to the 49th Australian Casualty Clearing Station but died the next day, 27 August 1916. Private Herbert Golding was buried in the



British Military Cemetery at Contay, a few miles from where he was wounded.

The family treasures the letters he wrote from the Front. His letters reassure his family that he was well and in good

spirits, and was strong in the Christian faith which had led him to enlist. The following is an extract from one of his letters to his wife from the Gallipoli trenches:

Dear Flo

I have been at the front about a week ... I soon spent a night in the trenches; at our part we were 5 or 6 yards only from the Turks, and our




chaps threw bombs by hand over into the Turks' trenches, they must have shaken the soul-cases off them. My job was to wait with a blanket to smother the bombs the enemy threw at us. An officer laughed when he asked what I was doing and I said 'Back-stop!'

It is a striking comment on the futility of war, and the supremacy of human nature, that we slept all our time off, in a traverse a few yards back, though it sounded as if all the fiends of Hell were pounding and tearing at the walls to get at us and tear our viscera out. It is no use being frightened, because Kingdom Come is just round the corner day and night...There is plenty of hard work here especially carrying kero tins of water up, but the air is fresher than Egypt so we

should get strong. We have Turk prisoners working, they are strong men. They fight fair. We will be all right till we have to make a big charge, then some will be lost, but I am sure we have the Turks licked, though it is hard to dislodge them ...

We are all well. I do pray you will not be left lonely, but God has been with me and is still. I am glad we came to relieve the weary chaps who have held the fort here so long. Give my love to them all and tell them I am happy because I am doing my duty and just thanking God, for all you know, I have to thank Him for in bringing me so far. I want you to know I don't mind being here, nor dreaded the front.

Private Herbert Golding's name was never added to the local memorial at Lancefield when it was constructed in the 1920s. The omission was probably due to the fact that his wife left the area after his enlistment. That omission has now been rectified. His name has now been added to the Lancefield Cenotaph. It has, in many ways, brought his spirit home to his family and the Lancefield community. The addition of his name to the Cenotaph allows his memory to live on through his extended family, many of whom were proudly preset on Anzac Day. His grandson, Mr Douglas Golding, flew from interstate for the ceremony and spoke of his grandfather at the service.



I wish to record my appreciation for the hard work of the committee to see its vision through to what will very






shortly be a conclusion, and to keep their eye on the task at hand even when there was uncertainty over funding sources.

COUNCIL'S FIRST **CLIMATE CHANGE ACTION PLAN** DRAFTED FOR PUBLIC EXHIBITION

Macedon Ranges Shire Council has drafted its first Climate Change Action Plan and is seeking community feedback from 18 April to 9 May.

The draft Action Plan outlines how Council will reduce greenhouse emissions from its operation by 25 per cent by mid-2021.

In recent years, Council has invested in several works to reduce greenhouse emissions, including the installation of pool covers at its aquatic centres to reduce the need for heating water, the installation of solar panels at the Gisborne Administration Centre, and converting residential streetlights to energy

efficient LEDs. Details about further works are presented in the draft Action Plan, which together will reduce greenhouse emissions by 1,910 tonnes of carbon dioxide (CO2).

The draft Climate Change Action Plan also outlines how Council will support community efforts to address climate change, and promotes a shared Councilcommunity vision-consistent with the Victorian Government's target for a zero net emissions Victoria by 2050.

Stunning talent from Brazil, Italy, Austria... and Australia coming to Woodend



The Rechabites, thirteen in number, led the way, walking, followed by the Oddfellows, thirty in number, on horseback, then came the hearse, followed by the relatives of the deceased, and a long string of vehicles and horsemen. In this order the melancholy cortege proceeded to the Melbourne Hill Cemetery ... "

On Tuesday 16 May 2016, Mary Anne Thomas, State Member for Macedon, will lead a discussion and information session on the forthcoming Voluntary End of Life Legislation. The meeting will be held at the Lancefield Neighbourhood House, High Street Lancefield, at 7.00 pm.

Later this year the State Parliament will be debating and voting on Legislation about 'end of life' choices for terminally ill people in Victoria. The Legal and Social Issues Committee Inquiry has spent two years researching this important issue and produced a Final Report late last year. The Minister for Health, Jill Hennessy, appointed an Advisory Panel of experts to take the findings further with a view to put them before Parliament. They have also provided a Discussion Paper that will be available at the Lancefield community discussion evening.

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

COBAW FAUNA SURVEY

Macedon Ranges Shire Council has been working with the Victorian Government and Deep Creek Landcare to undertake a fauna survey of the Cobaw State Forest. Activities planned included trapping, installation of remote cameras, spotlighting surveys and a bird surveys.

The spotlighting evening had 25 people attend. Ringtail Possums and Boobook Owls were sighted. On leaving the forest many also saw a Brush-tailed Phascogale crossing on the road.

From the cameras are there have been lots of Antechinus and some photos of a Mountain Brush-tail Possum which is a first for the region. Another interesting species is the detection of Feather-tail Gliders at several sites. Feather-tail Gliders have been recorded once in the forest before in the 1970's. There is only a small handful of records of Feathertail Gliders in the Macedon Ranges.

Unfortunately the bird count planned for early April was cancelled due to high winds.

More information will be advised as it come to hand.

For those who want to explore a career path further, we will try and give them an opportunity to pursue that with someone in their chosen field. Like the lucky kid who gets to be MP for a Day, it might be quite possible to give other kids

the chance to be a vet, doctor or storyteller for a day. Once we know what kids want to do, we will try and broker relationships to give them a full day experience in their chosen (potential) career path.

The Field Trip is run by young people for young people, empowering kids aged 9-24 to pursue their passions, peers and path. Launched in August 2015 in the Macedon Ranges, the Field Trip has gone from strength to strength and welcomes more kids who want more from their lives and want to positively contribute to and lead their communities.

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



A HAPPY, HEALTHY AND CONNECTED COMMUNITY

There are over 400 Neighbourhood Houses in Victoria, six of them are in the Macedon Ranges, all of them are run by a committee of volunteers.

Most Neighbourhood Houses get some funding from the government to pay a coordinator. The reason the government provides money to pay a coordinator is to help the committee carry out the community development activities they plan. Lancefield has twelve people on the committee and a coordinator who works 20 hours a week. New committee members are welcome to join at the annual AGM in October, volunteers are welcome to join at any time.


The Story Orchestra- By Jessica Courtney-Tickle. RRP \$27.99

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





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A REMINISCENCE BY AN OLD RESIDENT LANCEFIELD MERCURY 1892

I haved lived in this district during the last 36 years, and my experiences may not be uninteresting to your readers.

Thirty-eight years ago I arrived in the colony on board an emigrant ship, in company with 200 fellow passengers, who were, like myself, weary of the old world and intent upon trying their fortunes in the new land of Australia. My capital was very small, and I found that when all expenses incendental to landing had been defrayed only a few pounds remained in my pocket . . . enough to procure food for two or three weeks, but nothing more.

In common with my fellow passengers, I had an idea that if I could only reach Victoria I would speedily acquire enough money by wrenching the hidden treasures from the goldfields to enable me to return to my friends in England with my pockets full of sovereigns. But this dream was rudely dispelled as soon as I set foot on shore, for I found that the principal goldfield was at Bendigo, 100 miles distant, and that the only way to get there was to walk and carry a swag on my back.

Being compelled to do something for a living, I took my blankets and a few articles of clothing, and set out upon the journey. I tramped along over what are known as Keilor Plains, and lay down to sleep the first night under a wattle tree near the southern slope of Mount Macedon. The night was fine and warm, the mighty forest was filled with strange

noises, which, though startling to me at the time, have since become familiar, and I lay there for some hours watching the stars twinkling through the umbrageous foliage above my head, and wondering whether any other human beings felt so lonely as myself. Before the sunrise next morning I resumed my journey, and, not withstanding the unacustomed labour of carrying a swag on my back, made good progress.

Sometimes a light vehicle or a horseman passed me, and after enquiring whether I was going in the right direction or not I trudged bravely forward. In three days I reached Bendigo, and joined in the general scramble for gold, but though I worked hard, and toiled from daylight till dark, fortune refused to smile upon me, and my slender monetary resources were rapidly exhausted.

Weary and dispirited, I abandoned the apparently hopeless search for the precious metal, and came to the conclusion that as I was not one of Fortune's Favourites, I had better get hold of something which would, at any rate, provide for me the bare necessities of life.

Having had some experience as a carpenter, I set about making inquiries where work was likely to be found, and had no difficulty in procuring it at a daily wage of 15 shillings. Though the gold fever had not completely left me, I worked steadily at my trade, and by dint of industry and care scraped together about £300.



Growing somewhat sick of Bendigo, which had promised me so much and given so little. I turned my face again towards Melbourne, with the intention of returning to England by the next sailing vessel. When I reached Kyneton I heard that there was some good land at the northern slope of Mount Macedon, which could be purchased from the Governement at £1 per acre.


As I had been born in a farming district in the old country, and knew good soil when I saw it. I resolved upon inspecting the locality mentioned, and without hesitation tramped from Kyneton to Rochford for the purpose of examining the available land. No sooner had I put the spade into the ground than I felt satisfied that a living could be made by cultivating even a small-holding, and as a land sale was to be held at Kilmore a few days afterwards, I chose a block that seemed to offer superior advantages and made up my mind to buy it if possible.

I attended the sale, and secured the coveted allotment at the (sic) upset price. In the purchase of the land I had expended most of my money, but I had enough remaining to buy a pair of horses, a plough, a pair of harrows, dray, seed wheat and oats, and to enable me to build a rough hut with shingles and pailings procured from some splitters near Hesket.

Without going into details, I may state that I married and settled down on the farm, and lived there from that date to this. I have brought up a large family, given most of my children a fairly good education, settled them all in life, and at the preset time, after paying all such expenses, have a good

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credit balance at my banker's. I can look the whole world in the face, "for I owe not any man", and though my life in Lancefield has not been uniformly prosperous, yet on the whole I have prospered more than I ever hoped to do.

I am not the only one now living in your district who can relate a similar experience. If I had remained in England, and know that to-day I should have been working for about 3 shillings a day, and had a wife and family living from hand to mouth, therefore I thank Heaven that I was tempted to leave my father and mother and try my luck in Australia, and though my wife sometimes urges me to sell out and return to my native country, I am determined to live and die in the fair land which has been, on the whole, so good to me.

During the last few years farming has not been so remunerative as it used to be or ought to be, but yet, speaking for myself I came to Lancefield 36 years ago a poor man, invested all the capital I possessed in the district, struggled for years to conquer adverse circumstances, and now I am in a position to retire from agriculture (sic) I choose to live in any part of the world in the enjoyment of Optium cum dignitate. This is what Lancefield has done for me, and, I doubt not, for scores of others, and though for the last two or three years things have not been so prosperous for us as might be desired, yet I ask my fellow farmers. Where could we find a better, more reliable, more productive district beneath the sun. The unanimous answer must be - There is none.

If a man cannot make a living in Lancefield he cannot make one elsewhere.
